March 12.—It is understood that Naval redistribution beginning on 24th inst will include the modernising of the Mediterranean fleet and the formation of a second cruiser squadron on a permanent basis to show the flag throughout the Empire.

Mar. 15.—The budget expenditure is estimated at £16 Millions and it is anticipated that there will be a deficit of 14 Millions.

The People agreed to pay £1,000 damages and apologize in the *House* of Commons.

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PARIS THREATENED WITH Famine.

March 20.—Famine is threatening Paris owing to the dislocation of business consequent to the strike. Five million letters are undelivered.

The strike is rapidly spreading in the French Provinces.

The Postal Employees and Government equally unwilling and many of the Post Offices in Paris and elsewhere are closed.

LOSSES INESTIMABLE.

March 22.—Birrito is isolated by the Postal Strike.

March 19.—Reuter at Belgrade learns that the representatives of the Powers will again interview Servia in favour of peace and Servia is given to understand that in the event of war she will remain entirely isolated and cannot expect assistance from any quarter.

March 21.—In the House of Commons Mr. Asquith read a telegram sent by Lord Crewe to Plunkett expressing the warmest appreciation for the generous and patriotic offer of New Zealand. Naval Fatality.

Frontal Attack.

March 20.—Mr. Baldwin has given notice of a vote of censure declaring that the policy of Government regarding the immediate provision for Dreadnoughts does not secure the safety of the Empire.

Mar. 23.—The Navy continues to be the chief topic. Reuter at Wellington (New Zealand) states that the Government has offered immediately to defray the cost of a Dreadnought and a battleship.

The Premier Fisher says that the Empire is only just awakening to the question of defence.

Lord Crewe's Reply.

March 24.—Lord Crewe has replied to New Zealand in the most gracious manner and said that Government would consider the offer immediately.

An Effective Navy.

March 24.—The House of Commons without a division passed the vote for an effective navy.

That Your Petitioners are all either direct or indirect shareholders in land situated within the District of Kilindini.

2. That owing to defective legislation and the want of a sufficient force in time within the Protectorate, the Sultan of Zanzibar is at present unable to fulfil his functions as a most important part of the government.

3. That Your Petitioners are anxious to protect their lands and to have them registered.

4. That when the late Land Titles Ordinance was passed by Your Petitioners, they were not aware that it would be applied without delay to the lands of Kilindini.

5. That Your Petitioners are anxious to have their lands registered.

Quarantine and Branding.

The meeting agreed and Mr. Brandl V. O. stated that he had been instructed by the C.W.O. to attend the meeting and explain to the Association the Government's policy on the Caravan Road from Natura to Kisumu. The Departmental Committee had estimated the value of the cattle but the farmers did not obtain any benefit from branding on the neck, and the Departmental Committee had decided to mark the cattle on the neck.

Mr. McDonald said that the farmer would make it possible to mark the cattle on the neck, and he had no objection to the method of marking.
