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

# A LAND BANK

## An Urgent Growing Local Demand

Land Office - since its formation has gone on leave, and in due course its duty will be performed. The Committee give permission for the several of a proposal which has been made before by the "E. A. Standard" - and by many public and private individuals. We refer to the need for taking a step which comes from the placing of all responsibility for the granting of land to the hands of the Colony. The system leads itself to direct abuse, from which only the Government can always and entirely escape, and even at the expense of any such reprehensible practices, which we believe the record of the Land Office in recent years to be creditably clear, there would be no guarantee of the potential rôle of farms and concessions through their being surveyed and planned primarily on the considerations of their owner and size and convenience. For instance, it is often the case that the land required to be obtained before the right and division of areas for settlement can be regarded as in any degree satisfactory. The Government Forest Department and Land Surveyors, most of whom are largely arbitrary, are fixed determinants of the lay-out and survey of land for allocation, but very soon and non-technical difficulties in respect of the subdivision, and material possibility of the severance, of the areas. The Land Office has no agricultural advice. Land Surveyors, while other duties enabled them to acquire some knowledge of agriculture, have been withdrawn from this branch, now almost entirely in Nairobi, and the Commissioner of Lands has very little knowledge of agriculture, and the best method of dealing with the problem of dividing lands for settlers. From this point of view, then, a Land Board, on which a representative of the Agricultural Department had a seat, and on which were also with present members of the Government, ex-patients of its farming possibilities would be a far more solid security than the land which is our present, and in the future, the best and even the best and most competent of individual commissioners in the value of the Board as a safeguard against possible jobbery, and the history of administration in this Colony is simply eloquent and finally decisive. It is not too late even now to take呈entatives. We end our expression on any officials, but we do say that, in any day of the system of government, the "E. A. ## THE GOVERNMENT OPPORTUNITY

### VIEW OF PRODUCERS INVITED

Many months ago His Excellency the Governor promised the formation of a Land Board. He has since intimated that a Bill was being prepared for this purpose. We are aware that the establishment of such a scheme entails very considerable care, but we submit that the time has come when, in respect of the legislative stage, is not only desirable but necessary, that it may shortly become imperative.

The steps taken by the Convention of Agriculturalists during this year towards a reduction of native wages do not represent the only or the main means for saving the industry of the Colony.

Another very vital factor is the formation of a Land Bank on sound lines, similar to those operating in South Africa.

The principle has been put into practice in Ceylon, where there is great depression in the tea market, though it is questionable whether the distress there approaches that which actually exists in almost every market, and which threatens to become worse.

The principle has also been accepted here.

The Government have an extremely favourable opportunity at the moment to initiate the scheme.

The loan is amount over a million sterling of it is said to be available at call from the Crown Agents.

The allocation of these sums has not yet taken effect. It is not too late for review of the existing arrangements.

In a recent memorandum to the Government, the Association of Agricultural Producers has recommended the formation of a Land Bank in order to save and to invigorate industry, rather than expand this very costly loan on harbour developments; the need for delayed payment rates to the diversion of funds from the pressing need of developing the produce of the Colony and facilitating its transport to the Coast.

The "E. A. Standard" invites the suggestions of district associations and individual producers on the project, with a view of securing, in advance of the Legislative Council discussion of the proposed Bill, a full and clear expression of public opinion and experience.

The need of such a Bank is urgent. While the Government are preparing their measure, and before the country is finally committed to undivided and comparatively reproductive expenditure, it is timely to express the expression of public opinion.
