ABJOURNED MEETING OF THE CHAMBER.

A SLIP IN PROCEDURE?

GOVERNMENT & BANKRUPTCY

The Thika Smel Limited case, one considerable interest in employment and mineral labour, was heard by the District Commissioner of Fort Hall at Thika on July 24.

It appears that 19 Kavirondo natives engaged by Thika Smel Limited for work on their plantations disagreed and laid complaint before the authorities that wages due to them had been withheld by the Company; thus they did not receive food when ill, and that the work was too hard for them.

Without the holding of any preliminary enquiries in terms of sections 105 and 106 of the Criminal Procedure Ordinance, 1912—which sections invite such enquiry before any summons is issued—the Thika Smel Company was exonerated with the summons under the Masters and Servants' Ordinance to appear before the Court at Thika on July 24.

The Company was represented by Counsel, the Inspector of Police appearing on behalf of the complainants.

During the lunch hour the Prosecutor decided that in view of the evidence that had been given by the complainants he should withdraw the charge against the Company and he accordingly did so.

Counsel for the Company submitted that in the circumstances that the District Commissioner was present, that the Managing Director of the Company, his witnesses and all the complainants were present, he should proceed to hold a magisterial enquiry to see if all the circumstances under which the complaints were made should be thoroughly investigated. Counsel further urged that the quasi-criminal proceedings taken under the Masters and Servants' Ordinance should never have been initiated without the preliminary enquiry by the Magistrate so hasty and properly invited by the legislature when enacting the Criminal Procedure Ordinance.

The following were appointed to the sub-Committee Major Dako Mose (convener), Messrs. Aronson, Monckton and Sutton. It was agreed that Mr. Kemp, of H. M. Trade Commission's Office be asked to assist and that the sub-Committee should have power to co-opt.

Appointment of Secretary.

In regard to the procedure connected with the appointment of a Secretary, Mr. Tannahill moved:

"That the rules of this Chamber be added to by the inclusion of the following rule:

"The Secretary to the Chamber shall be appointed annually at the Annual General Meeting on such terms and conditions as shall be decided at the meeting."

"Should the post of Secretary fall vacant during the year his successor shall be appointed at an ordinary or special general meeting."

The motion was voted out of order in virtue of the rule that requires 20 days' notice to be given, and Mr. Tannahill accordingly gave notice of his intention to move above.

Voting of Delegates.

Mr. Tannahill moved and Mr. Aronson seconded:

"That it be a standing instruction to every delegate from this Chamber that while acting as a delegate he shall speak and vote solely in accordance with the resolutions or resolutions of the Chamber unless otherwise authorized by a specific resolution of the Chamber."

Considerable discussion ensued, mainly to the effect that such a resolution was really necessary as no delegate had exceeded his powers.

On the Chairman's suggestion it was decided to hold the matter over to be brought up before the Chamber when it meets to elect its delegates to the Association.

Bankruptcy Law.

Captain H. F. Ward reported that he learned from the Attorney-General that if the Law Society would point out where the scales should be placed for the market, he would resolve the question.

Capt. Ward subsequently moved that the Law Society be approached and asked to take the matter up. This was agreed to.

MALARIA EPIDEMIC

P.M.O. AND PREVENTIVE MEASURES.

CHEAP QUININE.

Dr. J. L. Gilks, Principal Medical Officer writes:

"The present season is marked by a distinct increase in the amount of malaria in the country; and as a result, it appears that work on plantations has been, in some cases, seriously interrupted."

"It also appears that in some instances outbreaks of malaria have been mistaken by employers of labour for influenza."

"It is safer, therefore, at the moment, to regard all cases of illness as being due to malaria."

"The provision of quinine for the treatment of large numbers of boys may become a serious problem if it is not undertaken as cheaply as possible, and I have been recently making enquiries among the chemists as to the cost of this drug."

"The chemists in Nairobi have arranged to supply Quinine Bi-Sulphate in pound lots at the price of Shs. 50 per pound for cash, which is a reasonable price and leaves only a small margin of profit. The arrangement will apply to the various branches. It might, therefore, be suggested that the smallest employer of labour who would not require as much as a pound, could combine together to purchase the amount and share it out after receipt of the master might be arranged through the various associations."

"Quinine bisulphate is soluble in water and for ease in use should be made up as follows—"

"To an ordinary whisky bottle of water add four tea-spoonsful of quinine. The resulting mixture will give a strength of 10 grains of quinine to two table-spoons."

"The tea-spoons should be of the ordinary, not the afternoon tea size, and the quinine should not be heaped up."

"During an attack of fever, I would suggest that two or three doses of ten grains each of quinine should be given, and this amount may be lessened when the attack is over."

"If it is desired to give the quinine in powder form the amount which can be heated on a 25 cent piece is almost exactly 5 grains."

"As a pharmacologist to wild labour going sick with malaria I would advise the giving of a dose of 20 grains of quinine to two successive days at such times, e.g., Saturday and Sunday, and this should, of course, be combined with the ordinary anti-mosquito measures, draining, avoidance of standing water, etc."

GOVERNOR AND THE NANDI

An Interesting Discussion at Kapsabet

ALIENATION OF NANDI LAND

DEATH FOR STOLEN THIEVES

Below is from the official report of the bazaar held by His Excellency the Governor at Kapsabet on July 8.

The following Chiefs were formally presented to His Excellency and conversed with him on behalf, and in the presence, of the rest of the tribe:—

- (1) Arap Chepkoech, Chief of Location 9.
- (2) Arap Teget, Chief of Location 8.
- (3) Arap Gitongo, Chief of Location 15.
- (4) Arap Chepkieny, Chief of Location 7.
- (5) Arap Kipeles, Chief of Location 26.
- (6) Arap Kessia, Chief of Location 15.

The following questions were raised by the Nandi and replied to by His Excellency:—

- (a) Variation of parts of the Reserve for settlement.

His Excellency informed the Nandi that the boundaries of the Reserve had now been quieted, as they stand today, and assured them that no further modification would be made in the future, with the exception of the possible leasing of sites for objects of public utility, or the benefit of the tribe, and then only on the expressed agreement of the Nandi themselves. This assurance was received with manifest satisfaction.

With, I believe, one exception, firms in Nairobi do not issue catalogues, nor, except to a very limited extent, do they make use of your and your contemporaries' pages to advertise their wares with the result that, to save the trouble and expense of writing to find out the precise requirements and then, after sending a letter containing the amount, would be customers' upon country often do without the articles required, or obtain them at an enhanced price from the local Indian store keeper.

Dear Mr. Chess Editor:

I have read with interest "Prin-
cipes" letter in last Saturday's
issue. By all means let us have
End-games, provided they are in
addition to, and not in substitution
for, the Problems regularly appearing
in your columns.

Moreover, the time allotted for
the solution of End-games may
serve, by comparison, to demon-
strate the greater beauty of prob-
lems!

As regards the respective merits
of problems and end-games, it may
be that the latter are of greater
utility in raising the playing strength
of amateurs in one section of the
game, but, however helpful the ma-
tural student in the long chess
column, one does not need merely
in this to teach him. It is not in
this spirit that one writes on a
Saturday with the first attack of
days to ensure favorability of the
key whether the "Stonewall" has
arrived. What is more, I very
much doubt whether your Mr.
Editor, with to understand the idea
of developing "amateurs" into the
present writer into mechanically
perfect end-games.

Where end-games are concerned my own
experience is for those which have also
a beginning such as the master's
game published in your column
from time to time, where one bene-
fits the other by the play leading up to
the final stage.

ROUND THE WORLD

MAJOR BLAKE'S ITINERARY OF GREAT FLIGHTS.

Lahore, August 1.
Major Blake's programme for his round the world flight is provisionally settled. He flies to Calcutta, thence to Burma, the Malay States, China, Japan, Kamakura, Alaska, Vancouver, Halifax, thence in a flying boat to Labrador, Greenland, Iceland, the Orkneys, and he expects to reach London in October.

Ambala, August 2.
Major Blake has arrived from Lahore.

London, August 2.
In the House of Commons Capt. F. E. Guest, replying to Lieut.-Colonel Moore-Brougham (Q. U. Rochester) said he understood a proposal was about to attempt a world flight by an all-British crew next year. The participants had approached the Air Ministry, which was satisfied that the project was sound and had a reasonable chance of success. The Ministry was prepared to assist when the time came. He understood the Air League of the Empire was also helping.

STANDARD BANK

London, July 17.

The report of the Standard Bank of South Africa for the year ended March 31 shows that the profit including £200,000 brought forward, is £700,007, from which have been appropriated £50,000 for bank premises account, and £100,000 for officers' pension fund.

A sum of £607,311 was paid out in dividends, and £101,220 has been carried forward. The deposit, current and other accounts total £2,010,041, cash in hand, £2,010,040, bills discounted and advances, £2,010,040.

C.O.D. SYSTEM.

Engineer arranged to submit a report to Council the following week, and the Council had decided the following motion:

"That an estimate be submitted of the amount involved and that a digest of the scheme be brought before the Council before final acceptance."

In regard to a recommendation by

the Town Planning Committee that the Town Engineer should get out the necessary levels for a new

scheme in Government Road

Councillor Montgomery wanted to

know why the Bazaar had been left

out of this scheme. He was informed

from the Chair that funds had re-

stricted action in this matter and

that owing to the fact that it would

be less difficult to prevail upon people in Government Road to install

water closets than the Bazaar it had

been decided to commence the work

in Government Road. After further

discussion, it was decided that the

Town Engineer be asked to take

levels which would include certain parts of the Bazaar.

Councillor Hollingsworth objected to the recommendation of the Town Planning Committee "that the extension of the commercial area along the west side of Swamp Road be not agreed to". The Committee had not considered the points sufficiently that he had put up, and he thought that the time had arrived when some allowance should be made for commercial enterprise in suburban areas.

The Chairman replied that the Commercial area had been very definitely demarcated by Government and it was extremely doubtful if any extension of alterations would be agreed to. Further once they started extending the area it would be difficult to know where to stop.

There would be repeated applications from people at the edge of the boundaries for inclusion in the commercial area. Councillor Russell opined that there was no urgent necessity for shops in the suburban areas.

Other recommendations of the Town Planning Committee were as follows:

In regard to the murkering of the sanitary lane behind Valley Road, after discussion, it was resolved to recommend that this lane be considered as a sanitary lane and not as a public road.

It was resolved to recommend accepting the suggestion of the Land Office that the extension of land granted to the Khosa Community for a cemetery be cancelled and that the plots in question be offered to the Muslim Community for use as Cemetery.

It is further resolved to recommend that Council should control all Indian and Native Committees to the extent of prescribing the layout and that the boundaries be prepared and bylaws framed for ensuring observance of the plans.

It was resolved that the suggestion of the Municipal Engineer for improving Quarry Road should be adopted and that he be instructed to arrange with the various Indian Communities before carrying out the work.

A letter was submitted from the Railway Authorities agreeing to the Royal Road alignment, but asking for formal confirmation of the proposed extension of the Reserve which embraces the Stockmarket and Enclosure plots, in which one the General Manager is prepared to waive his claim on the land reserved for the Railway in the present Native Location.

No other tea, and no other tin, is so good.

It was further agreed that the Royal Road alignment, will lay out their location, should be asked to consult the Council.

It was resolved after discussion to recommend that the suggested improvements at the native market be proceeded with and that the master of providing a central market be postponed until the agreement with Mr. Veerappa has been signed.

The following scheme of a rest house put forward by the Native Location Committee was adopted by Council without comment.

The Committee favour a scheme on the lines proposed by Bishop Perie and in fact have such a scheme in contemplation themselves. His proposal, however, is framed, is inconsistent with the accepted policy of giving no free grants of township lands to religious bodies. The Committee propose to institute Municipality controlled rest houses, and as Bishop Perie is a very non-sectarian they feel that the best way for him to further his object would be to contribute to the Municipal Scheme."

The recommendation of the committee on the scheme of the following scheme from Mr. J. R. M. Minto for a period of 6 months was accepted without comment by Council.

Nairobi has for some considerable time suffered from periodic outbreaks of burglaries and other crimes, perpetrated chiefly by natives. The police, although handicapped in many ways, have long been doing their utmost to cope with this menace, but appear to have been unable effectively to put a stop to these series of crimes. Their chief handicap in dealing with the question is the very slight control they have of the unemployed natives in the town, who, it is to be supposed, are chiefly responsible for what goes on. A conversation with a senior police official recently revealed the fact that the police are extremely anxious to obtain control over all the natives of the town, and to centralise and define responsibility for them. Only in this way can the dangerous unemployed element be effectively supervised. The only law in existence under which the police can effect any sort of control is the Vagrancy Ordinance, and this measure, it would appear, gives little opportunity for dealing with the unemployed and unemployable criminal class since it deals in general terms such as "without visible means of subsistence," and while a native has even a minute sum in his possession and can say that he is living in one of the villages with a brother, sister, cousin or son, and although he may have done no work for years, he cannot be termed a vagrant and the police are powerless. It is not difficult or unfair to associate this type of individual with many of the crimes in and around the town. It is understood that discussions are at present proceeding between various authorities with a view to bringing into operation a series of laws governing this class of native. We are not aware of the form that these laws will take, but with the experience of recent years in their minds the public will expect a greatly strengthened power of control, and its effective application when it is given to the police. Divided responsibility must cease. The main principle which should be laid down, we suggest, is that a native living in, or in the vicinity of, the town, should either be in bona fide employment, or on some clearly stated, even though temporary lawful occasion, or else he should be returned to his reserve immediately. A law of this nature is very general in South Africa, and works remarkably well. The law usually followed is that if a native comes into the town from the territories in order to look for work, he is given a pass by a responsible authority, valid for a given period, within which he must find work or return to his home. A certain amount of discretion is allowed in the granting of the pass, and if a native is not successful in finding work and has some reasonable excuse, the pass may be extended. In this manner the towns are kept fairly free from the undesirable class of native criminals such as police reports of recent years have repeatedly stated are becoming a permanent section of the Nairobi community. There are estimated to be in Nairobi about 2,000 natives who belong to the unemployable criminal class and are a constant nuisance to the police and a menace to residents. If some such laws as mentioned above are brought into force this class would almost wholly disappear. Either they would obtain work, of which there is plenty, either in town or in the country, or they would return to their reserves (whether by choice or force in immaturity), or further, they would be phased out of harm's way by the authorities. There is one other point in connection with this question which we should like

LAND SETTLEMENT.

To the Editor "E. A. Standard,"
Sir—Will you be so good as to give publicity in your columns to the following facts concerning the Land Settlement Advisory Committee?

It will probably be of considerable interest to your readers to know something of the extent of the committee's work which has already and of the capital that they represent. Up to date we have received a total of 315 letters or telegrams.

Of these 20 are without capital and ask for prospects of employment only.

Of the remaining 295, the amount of capital and income is mentioned by only 67. Of these 17 have insufficient capital and will be encouraged to come to Kenya. The remaining 50 represent the very considerable sum of over £120,000 and in addition £4,000 a year.

From a perusal of the remainder of the inquiries it appears certain that the average capital and income would not be less than the average of those who have stated definite amounts. It may therefore be estimated that the total amounts represented by all these inquiries would be some £300,000 and in addition £12,000 a year.

It is surely not necessary to enlarge on the great benefits which Kenya would receive from the influx of such a sum not to mention the productive capacity of a large number of keen and intelligent new settlers.

And more enquiries come in by every mail!

A large proportion of these inquiries come from Officers of the Indian Army retiring under the Retirement Scheme. These ex-Officers will be men who have spent some years in a profession which no longer holds out a prospect of a reasonable future. They therefore realise that in most cases the professions are closed to them, since they would have to compete with much younger men.

way passenger, and signs in the posters advertising Nature, the

dairying, and so on.

Dairying.

Then it was decided to take up dairying; and with characteristic promptness these financially disabled settlers turned their attention to subduing their particular piece of wilderness for the second time, and starting it again in 1932.

Their job of work included the following items:—Lands, cattle, other game had to be driven off the property, crooked or native cattle and pedigree bulls generally acquired and kept alive by regular dairying, ploughing and grazing, systematic seed-sowing, and broad useful boundaries, and firebreaks of mixed planted species sown, well dug, fenced, and built houses, barns, fences established and family life commenced.

And today one sees the neatly finished roads of these, years of ceaseless, accurately directed endeavour in a highly efficient, well-conducted revenue-producing estate; and in permanent homes, in which healthy young Kenyans are growing up.

Nairobi, though somewhat far away, became the object of economic attack. To obtain a fair if not leading share of the milk supply there every attention has been given, firstly, to securing a dairy herd that will produce a maximum quantity of high quality milk for a minimum consumption of grain, and, secondly, to putting an honest, scientifically pure, dependable product on the market.

Mombasa, too, was the market and immediate markets secured at the Colony's only port; where good clean raw milk came in transit in the wilderness and a novelty hardly to be expected under the tropical conditions.

But the change in the railway has killed that trade; yet today a few customers still remain who prefer Kilima Kiu milk, though it can arrive only four times a week, to any they can procure elsewhere; and they insist on getting it. Is it impossible for some system of daily trailer or light train service to be inaugurated that would prevent such injury being thoughtlessly done to budding primary enterprise, maintaining thereby constant connection for 15 passengers and perishable goods with the sea-coast?

The Plant.

In the spacious dairy, built of cool brick with stone-dressed doors, I was privileged to see with the fine pasturing plant which, as far as I know, is without equal in Kenya. Before inspecting this I was out to the cow milking in the houses scattered throughout the estate in which the herds are most carefully and thoroughly milked.

The Wakamba milkmen are provided with cold hot water in which to wash their hands, as well as the necessary udder and flannel before beginning on each separate animal.

The first cleaning of the teats fluid takes place in this house,

the second occurring at time of milking. So that the process of discovery in Kilima Kiu milk of dead mice, frogs, hairs, bits of dirt or other foreign matter by the consumer is exceedingly remote.

The steam-driven pasturizing plant first heats the milk to 100° F., after which it is retained in a tank for twenty minutes to allow the effect of this germ-killing process to be entirely thorough. Then the milk descends in a wide cascade down the cooling apparatus, kept below freezing by a refrigerator plant, and in the space of one minute is run into the dispensing cans—an insulated vacuum type, at a temperature of 40° F. However, in covered cans, it is carried to the station; the Nairobi milkmen go to the station; while Mombasa gets it in cans that of many other districts, drawing their requirements from the great dairy farm, owned by the Nairobi Milk Marketing Board, situated in the neighbourhood of the Uganda Railway.

No having failed in their attempt to make cows drink, the holders have their cows to the station; while Nairobi milkmen who will carry out their deals for them and by so doing they will save their faces before the natives.

Pasteurization.


It is desirable perhaps for the information of the uninitiated to enlarge a little on the subject of pasteurization. To those who are apt to mix, in their knowledge of the subject, the method of pasteurization with sterilization, it may be explained that the latter term usually means the total destruction of milk, which has the unfortunate effect of rendering this otherwise naturally nutritious and digestible food indigestible, impossible to
