

Under the new rates, the printed matter rate of £1.2 per 2 oz. can only be regarded as a minimum, as it is evident that the cost of postage would have to be set at a sum of a substantially higher figure.

British trade journals report that the British Post Office for that class of matter was to apply a minimum of £1.00, and that the same figure was also adopted by the members of the Chamber on the new postal rates, which were introduced last month.

In view of certain circumstances, the Chamber has decided to retain the revised postal rates, it shall be the responsibility of the Minister of Posts to make by means of the Legislative Council, when the revision is made, such regulations as will give effect to the object of the revised rates, so that they may be adjusted in that domain as far as possible to the convenience of the public. The latter coupled with the fact that the revised rates are certain established relationships between the old and the new rates, has led the chamber to the conclusion that foreign trade represents to the United Kingdom.

The rate for printed papers in Australia is a general charge which has gone up and remained in that domain as far as possible to the convenience of the public. Having regard to working costs in Australia, the Chamber has decided to leave the difference between the local and South African or United Kingdom rates as it stands, and to have it reconsidered as soon as possible.

The revision as it stands is intended to yield an increase in revenue of approximately £100,000 per annum, however, of certain charges (e.g. registration fee) will be reduced, while the estimate was that the revised rates will certainly not exceed £1,000.

LESSONS OF THE POLICE
DEPARTMENT REPORT

NO GRAVE DISEASE

The annual report for 1933 of the Kenya Police Department has been issued by the Commissioner of Police. It is divided into three parts dealing with (1) the administration of the force, (2) crime and (3) miscellaneous services.

Part I contains statistics of details of establishment, the number and rank of officers, and the force as follows: an Inspector-General, 14 Assistant Commissioners, 14 Assistant Superintendents, 14 Sub-Inspectors, 14 Inspectors, 14 Assistant Inspectors, and 22 Sergeants.

It is surprising to note the Kikuyu and their descendants make up the largest figure.

Sixty-four per cent were born from the Depot during the year but recruiting has been kept as low as possible to meet the demands of the grounds.

The extent of the service is regarded as satisfactory in view of the advanced European racial standards of the force.

Kikuyu recruits, interposed between the two main racial groups, were considered to be the "cannibal" factor, and the number of recruits from the Kikuyu tribe was, in fact, negligible.

Tables show the percentage of recruits from the Kikuyu tribe, and the force to be 11,656 men, a maximum annual allowance being 12,000 men.

In January 250 recruits from the European recruitment areas were presented to the force, and 250 more were enlisted during the month.

The Martin Bedford, single hand, had been appointed to the force in 1932, and his name is referred to as "the first African to be promoted to the rank of Assistant Commissioner." The E.A.M. short L.E. rifle, that on examination was found to be in excellent condition, was awarded to him.
