In Parliament.

General Election Imminent

The Licensing Bill Passed and Rejected.

Nov. 21.—The Licensing Bill was read a third time by 350 to 118 votes with no material modifications.

Nov. 25.—A meeting of Unionist Peers resolved by a large majority to reject the Licensing Bill. Lord Lansdowne told the House of Lords on the ground that it fails materially to advance the cause of temperance and violates every principle of equity.

The New Education Bill.

Nov. 20.—Mr. Asquith announced that New Education proposals will be embodied in a new Bill to be introduced to-day.

All parties are anxious for a settlement.

Nov. 21.—Mr. Haneman has introduced the Education Bill, but details were withheld pending a final agreement.

Nov. 25.—A clause of the Education Bill is Cawnpore Temple, teaching for three quarters of an hour a day replaceable by denominational teaching two mornings a week at a cost to the particular denomination.

Nov. 20.—The "Papayan," liner, Sardine, while just leaving Malta for Egypt went on fire a mile outside the Harbour. There were 200 aboard and the passengers and crew became panic stricken and many jumped overboard. A strong wind interfered with the rescue and many perished.

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Your Lordship may perhaps be inclined to reply—“You have received a grant from the Home Government has granted you a Legislative Council at which the expenditure of the monies contributed by you can be discussed”—therefore it would be well to let me know the statement you are going to make.

When the Legislative Council was first created we were allotted three Members to represent us but His Excellency took no pains, as far as can be ascertained, to learn the views of local political bodies or of commercial associations so whether or not the Colonists nominated by him were acceptable to the people. We admit the nomination system is in force in this Colony but nevertheless we have always understood that even a nominated Member can be rejected if he so chooses.

It is hard to believe that His Excellency has not been able to find three Colonists capable of fulfilling the position of Legislative Councilors who would be equally acceptable both to His Excellency and to the Public.

In spite of the disregard shown by Public opinion the Legislative Council carried on its duties and the Public were more or less satisfied with the “inch” obtained. Then came the time when the Colonists made their claims during which the two nominated Members for the Highlands were removed by the King—His Majesty being of the opinion that their display of zeal on behalf of the Colonists was rather excessive.

Colonial Secretary—“I am the third Member, representing the great Coastal and Lusitano interests decided to take a whole year’s holiday in Europe.”

At the same stage His Excellency the Governor, was therefore called upon to replace the two Highland originally nominated non-official Members.

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CORRESPONDENCE.

Lake Albert Gold.

It is rumoured that gold has recently been discovered at Mount Elgon, a mountain on the frontier between Uganda and the Congo Boundary. Mr. Amason, who with Mr. O'Brien was the original discoverer of the Alluvium Gold in Uganda, has heard of a find of 20,000 francs and it is now in the Semikit River district.

Extension of Railroads in German Africa:

In May of this year the German Bureaucrat responsible for the construction of the railroad from Mombasa to Kisumu, estimated that the cost of extending the railroad to the interior of the country like that the settlers had enough to do to struggle on and keep his men employed. He also said that the cost of building high prices of farms required an enormous amount of labour and that the cost of maintaining the railroad rates were so high that the cost of maintaining the railroad would be very great.

The extension of the railroad will be completed in about two years.

It is estimated that this total of about 2,000 miles will be completed and in operation in from six to seven years.

3rd. That each settler shall pay his way for the twelve months in which he may stay.

4th. That the lease be a perpetual one and that the settler shall have the right to renew his lease for another period of time.

5th. That no transfers be given to anyone who owns 5,000 acres or upwards if an acknowledged fact that there is no land available for settlement by any other entrepreneur settler so much as a perceptual land surveyor.

6th. That under such conditions good enterprising men would go only not to take up Government land but could buy from those who had obtained financial circumstances which did not allow them to do so. The money would be put in circulation and a more prosperous and satisfactory state prevail.

I know that some will agree with what I say yet I am fully convinced I could give many good reasons for my suggestions and could point to precedents in other Colonies where some of these simple clauses have proved satisfactory.

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Uganda Railway.

From a return just issued the capital expenditure on the Uganda Railway up to March 31 last amounted to £5,369,536, while sundry additional items bring the aggregate down to £5,400,000. Between September, 1906, and May 1908, a total of £1,502,592 was borrowed in Uganda, and the amount outstanding in respect of the annual interest created a sum of £19,112 is provided annually in the vote for Colonial services.
