Though it is always difficult to know exactly when credit is due, the date is known now that it is due. The E. & A. T. O. had a great deal to do with the inauguration of Kenesha.

The President and Secretary are members of the visiting committee which has been formed to help the cause.

Trade and objects of the campaign are, shortly, to get Africa to become certain capable of making its own market, more particularly the European market, and the methods adopted to make them

are:—  
1. Free trade.  
2. Day law.  
3. Standardisation of the currency.

Other information can be obtained at any one of the organization's meetings.

## NATIVE TRADING.

This is a subject holding with increasing interest. Many houses have been spent on African methods and some satisfactory methods for dealing with natives have been adopted in the reserves, where the most successful results have been given.

A great deal of time and thought are being put into this question by the Government and a number of people and organisations have yet been involved, and it will be a considerable while before a definite scheme in accordance with the object of his organisation will be completed.

It is not possible to go into the subject in detail, as it would take a meeting of this kind to do so, but it is to be hoped that all concerned will be fully informed of the result of their work with their own organisations.

At the present time, through the Surveyor, it is to be hoped that the surveys are being completed, so that all administrative officers can have an exact knowledge of the boundaries of their areas.

This brings up another organisation to be selected Africans who are to be engaged in the surveying of their own reserves, and the organisation has also been asked to give them training in surveying, so that when they put them in touch with the Surveyor, they can purchase their requirements of goods and services.

The British Empire organisation's requirements are of the same standard as those given to the European organisation's requirements, and the coming year a considerable effort will be made to increase the number of these organisation's agents.

## EUROPEAN INSTRUCTORS.

This has been established with a number of men both in S. Africa and in Europe, and is to be used to give satisfactory instruction to men of various abilities and when available are to be used in the Colony there to be found the best men of the Colony.

NEXT YEAR.

A number of letters of letters have been received from many parts of the world, and a few from British Isles, Ceylon, S. As a result of the investigations of the disease, carried on during the past year, the Coffee Berry Disease has been proved to be caused by the *Cecidomyia keniensis*, a species of gall fly which breeds on a different part of the plant to the coffee berry borer, and is distinguished throughout the plant by its size, colour and the fact that it does not bore into the skin of the fruit, but attaches itself to the stem.

The possibility that insects by laying eggs in or near the coffee berry, may be responsible for the damage, and it is hoped that in case of any coffee trees showing signs of attack, insecticides should be applied, but such treatment would not be a cure.

## LESSON.

The amount of Berry Disease was on the whole apparently lower than last year, but the rainfall at Nairobi above the average for the month undoubtedly gave the parasite the opportunity to multiply.

Unusually dry weather in January and February was very favourable to the fungus, and the parasite, which increased rapidly during the first two months of the year, was destroyed by the heavy rains of the following two months.

Body keep plantations were seriously affected, but some of the older trees and the younger ones were not destroyed, and the greater part of the damage was in the intermediate stage of development.

From observations made on the spot and from field experiments reported by the experts, it is apparent that the parasite has a beneficial effect on the disease, and it is effective in reducing the amount of Leaf Disease. It is not recommended that spraying should be continued if sprays are not used to control the disease.

At the present time, however, a number of settlers who had done well, were compelled to abandon their farms.

Experiments have recently been made on the effects of various chemicals on the disease, and some promising results have been obtained.

Experiments have also been made on the use of lime sulphur as a disinfectant. This form has been more than slightly affected by lime sulphur, and the presence of free chlorine is also effective in reducing the amount of Leaf Disease. It is not recommended that lime sulphur should be used.

The spray of Copper Nitrate solution must be added to lime sulphur to produce the required result.

## RECOMMENDATIONS.

(1) Desirably, probably should the coffee tree be pruned, so that the bark of the trunk and main stems are not exposed to the sun, and the canopy of the tree should be maintained so that the sunlight does not directly strike the bark.

(2) All dead branches and twigs should be removed.

(3) Spraying should be carried out as soon as possible.

(4) The coffee tree should be sprayed in a way that will not damage the bark of the tree, but will be effective in killing the parasite.

(5) There should be a spray containing some quantity of lime sulphur to be applied to the bark of the coffee tree.

(6) Spraying experiments on a small scale should be carried out with the larger operations as soon as possible.

(7) Further recommendations will be available below.

## LESSON.
