



POLLY NOTE.
Successful Chicken Raising

A question which is often raised amongst us is how the best method of raising chickens should be adopted. The following notes may be of interest to those who have been hatching chicks and who will like to know more about the subject.

Eggs for Setting:

It is important to lay eggs for hatching as soon as possible after they have been laid. If the eggs are laid at night, they should be collected at daybreak. If the eggs are laid during the day, they should be collected at night. The best time to collect eggs is in the early part of the morning. Late in the evening eggs will be found more reliable.

The incubator:

The incubator must be kept at a constant temperature of 37° F.

A NEW CONCERN
Popular Apartment Victim of an Accident.

MR. GRIFFITHS' OFFICE,
Nugent Amiable and Impressive Person.

Story of the death of Mr. George Griffiths of the Nairobi Police has come as a shock to many personally or by experience. His was a life of service to the public, and he will be missed by the members of the community.

Mr. Griffiths was riding along the Nairobi Road on his bicycle on Tuesday, June 24, at about 5 p.m., when he was struck from behind by a motorcyclist who had been racing his bicycle. He was thrown to the ground and received shocks to the left side of his head, which caused him to fall and sustain a fracture of the skull. He was taken to the Mombasa Hospital, where he died on the next day.

The Mombasa leaders, gathered at the scene of the accident, and the word went to a neighbouring town, where the police were summoned to prevent further trouble. They were present when the body was brought to Nairobi, and the coroner's inquest was held on June 26.

The coroner's report stated that he died from a fractured skull.



Proposed by Mr. J. M. D. Another example of the willingness of the Government to meet all reasonable requirements of the opposition is to be seen in the case of the Uganda Railways. Although Adenauer, himself, said that they had no objection to the formation of a "monolithic" alliance, with one party, the Uganda National Party, and the other the Uganda People's Union, the former could not be found to endorse the proposal.

Mr. Blackett also visited Uganda and appears to have been satisfied with the beauty of Victoria Nyanza.

Senate Protection.

After the election of Ruth, Adenauer, the wife of the Uganda politician, the writer who is a member of the Uganda National Party, although the Premier's supporters had been elected to the Senate, the Uganda National Party would run candidates to provide a majority of their supporters in the Senate.

It is to be hoped that the Uganda National Party will be able to find a sufficient number of supporters in the Senate to enable them to obtain a majority.

Imports Protection.

Adenauer's policy of import protection has been generally accepted, and the new government has a right to expect that the same will be continued.

He seems to be determined to do his best to protect the interests of the people of Uganda.

Mr. Blackett's policy of import protection, however, is not yet clear, and it is to be hoped that he will continue to support the policy of the Uganda National Party.
