My Lord,

With reference to Your Lordship's despatch No.462 of September 10th 1908 authorizing the continuance of the payment of incidental expenses to those received them when proceeding on or returning from leave, I have the honour to transmit herewith a copy of a letter from the Treasurer.

As Your Lordship will perceive it is suggested that the practice now followed in the case of officers of the superior establishment should be adopted, i.e that the privilege should only be enjoyed so long as the subordinates in question remain in their present grades and should be surrendered on promotion. A fixed allowance is also proposed in lieu of a refund of actual expenses incurred, the calculation of which causes a considerable additional work in the Treasury.

Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that the freatest difficulty is experienced in the Treasury in checking the claims for incidental expenses of members of the subordinate staff proceeding on and returning from leave. These claims include a multiplicity of small charges for loat hire, carriage hire, porterage and similar items of cut of pocket expenses.

- 2. It is impossible to verify such charges locally and discretion has to be exercised in allowing, reducing or disallowing them.
- The result is that it is most difficult to act in all cases with uniform fairness and complaints are constantly received from members of the staff that some of them have been worse treated than others.
- 4. I have accordingly the honour to suggest that a system of fixed allowances be introduced in lieu of a refund of actual expenses.
- As you are aware a number of Officers on the superior establishment still draw fixed allowances of

27-10-0 in addition to their return tickets to Europe.

These are allowences formerly granted by the Foreign

Office and the continuance of which has been sanctioned
by the Colonial Office until the officers are promoted.

- 6. In the case of members of the subordinate staff the Colonial Office ruling conveyed in Colonial Office despatch No.462 of 10th September 1908 is that "Clerks who have already received reimbursements of "their incidental expenses between Mombass and their "homes should be allowed to retain this "privilege on future occasions".
- 7. I submit that it would be equitable to restrict this privilege, as in the case of officers on the superior Staff, to the period to which an officer serves in his present grade i.e. without promotion.
- 8. As regards the fixed allowences which I suggest should be granted in lieu of refund of actual expenses I have gone very carefully into the matter and as a result of my investigations have the honour to propose the following scale:

Other subordinate officers who are granted 3rd

Other subordinate officers who are granted 3rd class steamer passages Rs. 20 each way.

9. If His Excellency approves of these recommendations I have the honour to suggest that the senction of the Secretary of State be obtained therete.
