Sir,

With reference to your letter Ne: 234/12 of 10th August 1909 in which you point out that you have received no reply to your. letters Nos 169 and 184 of 21st May 1909 and 14th June 1909 respectively on the subject of the application of the Colonial Office Regulations in this Protectorate. I have the honor to inform you that I did not consider any replies necessary in view of the circumstances under which any cases of departure from the Colonial Office Regulations came to be reported by you to me.

- 2. In this connection I have the honor to refer to Secretariat Minute Paper 138/1909 emanating from my letter No:176/118 of 10th December 1908.
- The position is briefly as follows: I do not consider the Colonial Office Regulations applicable as a whole to the circumstances of the East Africa Protectorate and I am aware and have reported that there are a number of necessary departures therefrom. I asked His Excellency to take certain steps to remedy the existing state of affairs but His Excellency could not see his way to accede to my request.
- I accordingly informed His Excellency that I would endeavour to take the necessary action in my spare time and asked Mr: J.A. Barnes ( who was acting for you during your recent absence from the Protectorate on special duty) to assist me by bringing to my notice any departure from the Regulations which he came across in the course of audit.
- I have now had an interview with His Excellency the new Governor on the subject and I gather that he is prepared to take further action on my original suggestion but, before doing so, wishes to be furnished with copies of all regulations etc. at present in force. I am forwarding the information called for by His Excellency through the Secretary and am at the same time endeavouring to adjust the Colonial Office Regulations to our requirements.

7. It would therefore in my opinion be preferable to wait until His Excellency has decided on the steps he will be prepared to take to remedy the existing state of affairs as a whole than to deal with each instance of departure from the regulations as it arises.
