Paraphrase of Telegram from Mr. Sinclair, Zanzibar, No.3, dated January 18th, 1909

With reference to your telegram No.6 of January 14th respecting Slavery Decree, the Sultan sends the following telegram to Sir E. Grey: "I have received.

Your communication re slavery decree through His Majesty's Agent and Consul-General and earnestly request you to postpone further action until you have received our communication on the subject despatched to you by mail. The great alarm and annoyance that the decree will cause among my subjects and the danger to the public morals of Zanzibar involved are such as to render it most important that you should have opportunity of fully considering my views before the decree is promulgated.

I had already before receiving your instructions attempted in the course of several interviews to impress the views which Mr. Cave expressed in his despatch No.244 of last on the Sultan. You should receive on February 5th the Sultan's letter and an account of these interviews. His Highness exagger-

exaggerates the case but in view of the fact that difficulties have presented themselves, which had not hitherto been contemplated I venture to support the request of the Sultan that no further action should be taken till you have received his letter.

June 1st is the date which the Governor of the East

Africa Protectorate has suggested for the simultaneous

publication of the slavery decree in Zanzibar and East

Africa Protectorate.
