Sir,

I have the honour to report that Sergeant Instructor  
H.C. Fitzgerald of the Police at Mombasa who was granted  
7 days leave by the Lieut. Col. M.C. from the 2nd inst.  
for the purpose of visiting Mombasa to see his brother  
who was passing through to Patal has not returned to  
duty. It is believed that he has probably left for  
Lamu or India by the S.S. "Bundesrath" which sailed from  
here on the 2nd instant. He has also taken with him  
some Government property, such as his kit, revolver &c.  
Sergeant Fitzgerald was on a three years' agreement  
and joined this Force on the 26th August 1904.
