I have called attention on another
paper (relating to small postmasters of
the shopkeeper class) to Sir P. Girouard's
tendency to give way to the racial
sentiment of the white settlers
possibly at the expense of Protectorate
funds. In this case, as in the case of the
postmasters, if Europeans can be
employed with equal economy and
efficiency in these minor posts, there is
not much reason why the white settlers
should not be humoured. But any apprecia-
~~tion~~ expense or loss of public efficiency
would not be justified.

 With reference to paragraph 7 of Your Lordship's Despatch No. 768 of the 25th of December relating to the Estimates for 1910-11, I have the honour to transmit herewith a copy of the report of a Committee appointed to consider the grading and emoluments of the European Clerical Staff of the Protectorate.

2. As Your Lordship is aware we have depended up to now for the most part on the services of Asiatic Clerks but there is a strong public feeling in favour of their supersession in certain offices which come into close contact with the white population, e.g. the Land and Survey Offices, the Agricultural and Veterinary Departments and in Administrative Offices in settled districts.

3. This prejudice against persons of colour, although I think that it is scarcely justified by any lack of courtesy on their part in the past, is no doubt national enough and at any rate, as it exists, it is desirable to meet it as far as may be possible without undue expense.

4. It has therefore been thought advisable to standardize and assimilate the conditions attached to European Clerical appointments in order to obtain uniformity and to hold sufficient inducement to attract men of a suitable class.

5. The Committee have in their report formulated a scheme which appears to me to be reasonable and not excessively costly and I would venture to recommend its adoption.

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1. The Committee after holding two sittings, begs to submit its opinion on the question of the grading of European Clerks.

In the early days of the white occupation of British East Africa, when there were few white men in the country the clerical work was almost entirely done by Indians, in which category are included Gachese. Many of the clerks at the present time are of this class, and where they are qualified and have got much dealings with an outside white public, there are sufficient reasons on the ground of economy for continuing their services.

But it must be recognised that, as the white population increases, European clerks must be more and more recruited.

The proposals set forth in this report relate mainly

to the offices in Nairobi. Doubtless there are some offices in outside districts and outstations where the employment of white clerks will be considered advisable.

If it is considered that European clerks must be employed in certain offices of the Protectorate, it is evident that their salaries must be fixed so as to give them at least a living wage; that is a salary such as to induce / trustworthy men of good education to engage themselves with a fair prospect of a gradual rise of pay, and also, if possible, of a position.

The Committee understands that His Excellency the Governor has proposed that the pay of all European clerks should be fixed at £130 a year, with annual increments at the rate of £10 up to £300, plus free quarters or a house allowance. It is believed that such a rate will be sufficient inducement to obtain and retain the services of European clerks with the necessary qualifications and it is recommended that the house allowance be fixed at £40 a year.

At the present time the rates vary from £30 to £40, the later agreements showing a £38 rate. Considering the high rents prevailing in Nairobi the Committee thinks that the house allowance should be fixed at £40. Even at this rate it is often difficult to obtain a house which can be occupied by a married couple, and it must be assumed that some of the clerks are marry.

The salaries given in the preceding section being fixed for the majority of the European clerks, the Committee is of opinion that a higher rate must be allowed for the Heads or Superintendents of those offices which contain

many /

many clerks. For such post it is proposed that the salary be fixed at £300 rising by annual increments of £20 to £300, with free quarters or £40 house allowance.

The prospects thus open to an European on entering the Clerical Service will be a salary commencing at £130 a year plus free quarters or £40 house allowance, with an annual increase to £200; with the chance, if he does specially well, of obtaining one of the posts of Office Superintendent on a higher scale of salary.

5. A further inducement will be the prospect of a pension. In this connection the Committee has tabulated the number of posts in each office which require to be held by European clerks, and has recommended that a certain number of these should be treated as permanent: the occupants of which latter would then be eligible for pension under paragraph 14 of the regulations of January 1st 1808.

6. The following statement exhibits the appointments which the Committee considers should be held by Europeans, marking those which should be classed as permanent.

House allowances must be made in every case; they are not shown as all who are named are entitled to a uniform rate of £40.

Secretary & Agricultural. The posts entered are already held by Europeans.

Public Works Dept.: The Commissioner of Public Works hesitates for the present to make all of the posts named permanent. An extra European clerk is recommended for Kisumu or Lamu to act as relief clerk should the clerk in Nairobi fall ill or go on leave.

Provincial Commissioner's Office. The post of clerk in this office is held by a well qualified man. When he goes the post should be given to an European on the usual scale of £130 to £300.

As white residents are very numerous in Nairobi and around Kyambu at least one of the clerks in each of the District Commissioners' Offices should be an European.

The post of Registration Clerk, held by Mr. Bulthorpe, is graded with Office Superintendents.

It is doubtful if the appointment should be shown here, as Registration Clerks are under the Principal Registrar of documents. It has been included to emphasise the fact that the man holding the post should be an European, and well paid.

Land Dept.: The posts shown are all filled by Europeans and no change in this respect should be made. The work at the present time is very heavy. In the hope that it may decrease in course of time, it is proposed to make

only

only the first six permanent.

Survey Dept.: The Chief Clerk and Accountant in the Trigonometrical Branch requires special qualifications and receives £250 per annum and a house. His appointment and that of his assistant in that branch (receiving £80 a year) have been excluded at the present time from consideration.

The Director of Surveys considers that there will always have to be one Superintendent in the office. When Mr. Rehn Doe's successor would come under the usual scale for Superintendents.

Separate representations are being made by the Director of Surveys on behalf of the Civil Service Accountants in the Cadastral Branch.

In making the above proposals the Committee has borne in mind the necessity of both efficiency and economy. The members trust that they will be approved by both His Excellency the Governor, and by the authorities at home.

Enclosed is a statement showing the expenses usually incurred in a month by one of the office superintendents, a married man without children. The items are by no means extravagant. This fellow draws only £1.25/- a month.

It will be seen that the statement does not include anything for clothing, boots, insurance, saving for wife's passage and incidental expenses. Even without these expenses he is spending more than his present monthly income; and were it not that he has some small savings he could not
