2. Date of Birth.

I was born on the 6<sup>th</sup> December  
next year.

He served long and well in India.

An uncle was the late Sir George Hemansoy R.C.B., who died on the 26<sup>th</sup> of last month in London. He, as Colonel of the 15<sup>th</sup>. Sikhs, and in other capacities rendered excellent service to the Crown.

A short time before his death he was appointed Colonel-in-Chief of the 15<sup>th</sup> Sikhs.

Another uncle Major Patrick Hemansoy was killed in the Bhutan campaign.

Another uncle Major Douglas Hemansoy was in the "Kheddar Elephant Catching Department."

### 3. Family

My family is a military one  
and comes from Ballymacnamay  
and Ballyhennessy in the  
county of Cork in Ireland.

Various members of my family  
have done good work for the  
Crown.

My father - Mr. R. L. Hennessy  
was in the United Provinces and  
Central Provinces Police. He did  
good work for the Indian Govern-  
ment and was thanked by the  
Governor-General.

My grandfather - General John  
Hennessy was an officer in  
the British Army.

Another uncle Mr. Septimus Warren  
retired as Commissioner of the  
Harbours Board of the  
Central Provinces.

On my mother's side mention  
Colonel Gerard V.C. - my  
great uncle.

#### 4 Education

I left India at the age of  
about three years.

I was educated at the Masses-  
field Grammar School, Cheshire,  
and also abroad in Germany,  
Austria, France and Italy  
under tutors.

I was also at Dr. Chelwade's  
and the Revd. A. Postcard's  
Establishments in Dublin and

wargane-on. Thames, respectively.  
Had an excellent knowledge of  
German and French and the  
other language than I endeavoured  
to keep up by reading.

5 History from date of arrival in India  
made an early marriage in  
England.

On my arrival in India in  
October 1895, I found myself  
unable to accept for appointments  
which were offered to  
me, by reason of the fact of  
my being a married man. The  
appointments were for the post of  
Assistant District Superintendent  
of Police but the rules did not  
allow of a married man entering

I also obtained nominations for the Opium and Seaway of India departments, but was unable to take up the appointments for the same reason.

Eventually in April 1896 I obtained an appointment as an Inspector in the Northern India Salt Department.

I was promoted to the rank of Assistant Superintendent and Superintendent.

Service in the N.I. Salt Revenue Dep't.

I served in this department from April 1896 to May 1901.

Entering as an Inspector, as before stated, I worked my way

up to the rank of Superintendent.

I believe that the Commissioners

I.C.S, C.I.E. (present Commissioner)

will bear me out when they say that  
my promotion was due to my  
own efforts.

I was on special duty in the  
Bambhar Lake in Rajputana.

I was appointed to the Kohat  
district (Frontier) when the Salt

Mines were taken over by the

N.L. Salt Revenue department.

This was a responsible post and  
meant the institution of a new

and not popular system among  
the frontier tribes.

I remained in the Kohat District  
for four years.

My name was twice mentioned  
to the Secretary of State for  
India, in Annual Reports, for  
having done good work.

I believe moreover, that reports  
by my superior officers, as to my  
work have always been satisfactory.  
factory

May I add that I have been  
twice offered the chance of  
returning to the Salt Department  
by Mr. Dane. This of course  
is purely kindness on his  
part, but shows I think that  
my work was good.

7. Work as an Extra Assistant Commissioner.

I joined my appointment as Extra Assistant Commissioner in Bira Domaik Khan (North West Frontier Province) in June 1904.

Early in the present year I acted as Sub-Divisional Officer and Commandant Border Military Police, at Taut, in the same district, for a period of three months. The Sub-Divisional Officer is also S. Office Political Officer to the Bhittans.

I believe my work at Bira Domaik Khan and at Taut

were considered satisfactory.

While at Taub I accompanied an exploration party up the Takk-i-Sulman (11000 ft) - a trans border mountain, with Col Briggs D.S.O (C.R.D.B.A.J.A.H) & Captain Alexander D.S.O. in the capacity of Political Spur.

I was transferred to Peshawar for two months from the 1<sup>st</sup> August 1905.

### 9 Personal Habits.

I am practically a total abstainer  
from alcoholic liquors.

Some of active habits and am  
accustomed to riding long  
distances. Have done a lot  
of shooting - including big  
game (tiger) in the Central  
Provinces.

At school won many prizes  
for athletics and was  
Captain of both Cricket and  
Football XIs.

My constitution is good as it  
evidenced by the fact that I  
have been in the hottest and  
most trying climates of India  
since my arrival in the  
Country in 1895 and have  
only had four and a half  
months leave. Three months  
of this were spent on the broad  
of my back with entire few  
in the plains for the most part.  
After being a fortnight and odd  
(after two relapses) I returned  
to the plains in September  
and rode 50 miles, within  
the first week of my arrival,  
to cut off some raiders.  
I mention these facts to

extremely grateful.

of Nairobi, East Africa.

If I am so fortunate as  
to obtain an appointment  
such as I desire I should  
always endeavour to prove  
myself worthy of the con-  
fidence placed in me and  
to carry out my duties in  
a satisfactory manner.  
I attach a recommendation

from the Honble the offg. Chief  
Commissioner of the N. W.  
Frontier Province.

At Colonel Beane the Chief  
Commissioner of the Province,  
at present on leave in  
Europe, may, I believe say


