3. Family

My family is a military one  
and comes from Ballymacorney  
and Ballyhennessy in the  
County of Cork in Ireland.

Various members of my family  
have done good work for the  
Crown.

My father - Mr. R. L. Hennessy  
was in the United Provinces and  
Central Provinces Police. He did  
good work for the Indian Govern-  
ment and was thanked by the  
Governor-General.

My grandfather - General John  
Hennessy was an Officer in  
the British Army.

Another uncle Mr. Septimus Hanson  
 retired as Commissioner of the  
 Harbours Division of the  
 Central Provinces.

On my mother's side mention  
 Colonel Gerrard V.C. - my  
 great uncle.

#### 4. Education.

I left India at the age of  
 about three years.

I was educated at the Mascho-  
 field Grammar School, Cheshire,  
 and also abroad in Germany  
 Switzerland, France and Italy  
 under tutors.

I was also at Dr. Chelwood Crawley's  
 and the Revd. A. Pritchard's Grammar  
 Establishments in Dublin and



Wargane-on. Thamus, respectively.  
I had an excellent knowledge of  
German and French and the  
Latin language. I have endeavoured  
to keep up by reading.

5 History from date of arrival in India  
made an early marriage in  
England.

On my arrival in India in  
October 1895 I found myself  
unable to accept four appoint-  
ments which were offered to  
me, by reason of the fact of  
my being a married man. The  
appointments were for the post of  
Assistant District Superintendent  
of Police but the rules did not  
allow of a married man entering

I also obtained nominations for the Opium and Survey of India departments, but was unable to take up the appointments for the same reason.

Eventually in April 1896 I obtained an appointment as an Inspector in the Northern India Salt Department.

I was promoted to the rank of Assistant Superintendent and Superintendent.

Service in the N. I. Salt Revenue Dept.

I served in this department from April 1896 to May 1904. Entering as an Inspector, as before stated, I worked my way

up to the rank of Superintendent.  
 I believe that the Commissioners  
 of Salt Revenue - Mr. A. B. Patterson  
 I.C.S. (retired) and Mr. R. M. Dand  
 I.C.S., C.I.E. (present Commissioner)  
 will bear me out when I say that  
 my promotion was due to my  
 own efforts.

I was on special duty in the  
 Sambhar Lake in Rajputana.  
 I was appointed to the Kohak  
 District (Frontier) when the Salt  
 Mines were taken over by the  
 N. I. Salt Revenue Department.  
 This was a responsible post and  
 meant the institution of a new  
 and not popular system among  
 the frontier tribes...

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I remained in the Kohat District  
for four years.

My name was twice mentioned  
to the Secretary of State for  
India, in Annual Reports, for  
having done good work.

I believe moreover, that reports  
by my superior officers on my  
work have always been satis-  
factory.

May be add that I have been  
twice offered the chance of  
returning to the Salt Department  
by Mr. Dore. This of course  
is purely kindness on his  
part, but shows I think that  
my work was good.

7. Service as an Extra Assistant Commissioner.

I joined my appointment as Extra Assistant Commissioner in Dera Ismail Khan (North West Frontier Province) in June 1904.

Early in the present year I acted as Sub Divisional Officer and Commandant of Border Military Police, at Taut, in the same district, for a period of three months. The Sub Divisional Officer is also Extra Office Political Officer to the Bhattanis.

I believe my work at Dera Ismail Khan and at Taut

were considered satisfactory.

While at Taut I accompanied an exploration party up the Takht-i-Suliman (11000 ft) - a trans border mountain, with Col Briggs D.S.O. (C.M. Dera) & Captain Alexander D.S.O. in the capacity of Political Officer.

I was transferred to Peshawar for two months from the 1<sup>st</sup> August 1905.


