I have Taid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Mr. Fiddes's letter of the 8th ultimo (18763/1911), having reference to the difficulties which have arisen in connection with the Note Issue in the East Africa Protectorate.

In reply, I am to request you to inform Mr.

Secretary Harcourt that, having regard to the fact that
the tendency of the trade of British East Africa is in
an increasing degree towards sterling-using countries
rather than British India, My Lords consider it essential
to retain the sovereign as the effective standard of value;
and They would deprecate any proposals which would involve
the discontinuance of the free issue of notes against
British gold.

My Lords are of opinion that steps should rather be taken to encourage the circulation of the sovereign (or of notes covered by gold) and at the same time economise the use of rupees by the imposition of a limit of legal tender upon the latter coin and They suggest that this limit should be the same as that for silver coin in the United Kingdom - viz. 22 or 30 rupees.

This will not, however, in itself be enough to secure an adequate supply of rupees to meet the growing trade of the Protectorate, since so long as the importation

of rupees from India is more costly than the importation of Sovereigns from the Cape and elsewhere, the former coin will not be brought in in the ordinary course of trade.

Further My Lords see no reason why the profit on the issue of what will henceforward be a subsidiary coin of the Protectorate should accrue to the Government of India rather than to the Protectorate Government.

They therefore propose that a special rupee should be coined at the Royal Mint for circulation in British East Africa concurrently with the rupee of British India. Such rupees can be purchased for the currency reserve either with gold shipped from Mombasa or with gold to be received in London in exchange for notes to be issued in the Protectorate according to an arrangement similar to that in force in the Straits Settlements.

If Mr. Harcourt concurs in these views, My Lords will cause a draft Order in Council to be prepared for consideration making the necessary amendments in the existing law relating to currency and the Note Issue.
