3. There will still be two appointments, however, which do not carry pension rights. A Nurse will, therefore, be engaged in the first instance for a tour of service on agreement as is done at present, and, if she is specially recommended by the Principal Medical Officer and the Governor for re-engagement, she will (provided that there is no pensionable appointment available) serve a second tour on agreement; but, unless there is a reasonable prospect of a vacancy in the permanent establishment occurring to which she can be admitted in due course, I am of opinion that her engagement on agreement should not be again renewed after the second tour of service.

4. In accordance with the usual practice, all the service of a Nurse,

whether

whether in one of the temporary or the permanent appointments, will be reckoned for pension, if ultimately she fills one of the pensionable appointments.

5. A. I presume that the three pensionable appointments will be filled by Miss Paterson and the two senior nurses, but I shall await your recommendations.


