Sir,

With reference to your despatch No. 867 of the 15th ultimo, I have the honour to report as follows respecting the tender for the supply of coal for the Uganda Railway.

2. On the 25th day last the Manager, Uganda Railway, advertised for tenders for the supply of 10,000 tons of Natal or Transvaal Steam coal to the Railway under the following conditions:-

(a) The coal must be stacked at the places appointed or loaded into trucks as the manager may consider to be most expedient.

(b) In the case of delivery at the side of Kiffinini Pier the coal would have to be loaded into waggons.

(c) The total quantity required will not exceed 10,000 tons under this tender.

(d) Tenders should give alternative rates for the different methods of shipment and delivery and must be the inclusive rate per ton for such delivery.

3. Three firms tendered for the contract, viz.

Messrs. Smith Mackenzie & Company, the British East Africa Corporation and Messrs. J. & A. R. McCrae.

4. The quotation submitted by the British East Africa Corporation was Rs. 23.75 per ton delivered into trucks or stacked on the beach. This was the lowest and most suitable and consequently the order was placed with that firm.

5. Messrs. J. and A. R. McCrae's tender was fully considered and discussed by the Railway Tender Board and a copy is forwarded herewith.

6. You will notice that the amount stated is ten to twelve thousand tons and not for ten thousand tons as asked for. Further the conditions given would permit of two shiploads of 6,000 tons arriving within a few weeks of each other, this would be very inconvenient as the facilities at Kilindini are taxed to their utmost by a cargo of 2500 tons. The firm, however, subsequently withdrew their tender as they were unable to make satisfactory arrangements for lighterage.

7. Mr. Kinchin's suggestions will be borne in mind when further tenders are invited.
