When the estimates were prepared, in September last, it was proposed that the reconstructed line should follow the Thika Tramway as far as Chaninbridge, but the scheme did not include any provision for telegraph facilities for the Railway Administration. It was understood that funds had originally been provided for this in the estimate for the Tranway, but that it had subsequently been decided that telegraph facilities could be dispensed with as only one train was to be on the Tramway at any one time. Since then the construction of the Tranway has been completed by the Public Works Department and it has been handed over to the Railway Authorities. Shortly after the commencement of working the Honourable the General Manager intimated that he considered a telegraph to be necessary, and the indent for material; which is now in the hands of the Secretary of State, is partly on Post Office and partly on Railway account, the Railway contributing towards the cost. A line also exists (to which I am referring later) between Nairobi and Chaniabridge. It will be necessary to provide a telegraph line from Chanlebridge to Donyo Sabuk connecting the two fireless stations (for the moment we will not consider at whose expense) and there only remains the section between Donyo Sabuk and Machakos to make the loop complete. I had this scheme under consideration long before anything was heard of the Imperial Aireless proposals, with this difference. that I proposed to complete the loop by the erection of a line from Machakos to Juja Form.

and Nyeri is only a temporary one. It was hurriedly constructed some & years ago, before the Thika Tranway was even muggested, and is carried, in part, on growing trees. It originally served only two Stations, vis: Kiembu and Fort Hall. But, as a result of the growth of European settlement to the North of Nairobi, there are no fewer than six felegraph Offices served by this one temporary line. A seventh will be opened at Nest Kenia in the course of the next few weeks and it will probably be necessary to previde for a further office at Punda Hilis in the near future. The line

of the Imperial system. It will be observed that the area dealt with extends as far as Magadi and as far North as the West Kenia district. The devails of the soldens are as follows:

(a). The Magadi Sods Company will presently commence active operations. A large staffwill be employed and the volume of Post and Telegraph business will be considerable. We have no Telegraph Office there at present nor. if we had, is there any outlet for the telegraph traffic so far as the Post Office is concerned. This Department has only one wire from Nairobi the goast, which wire could certainly not earry any further way-side traffic. It is necessary to make provision accordingly. If we erect an extra wire, for Post Office use, on the existing line of poles between legadi Junction and Mairobi we merely add to the trouble which results from having all our wires on the same pele line, i.e., all our eggs in one basket. An accident to one wire frequently involves interruption of the whole. the other hand, we can build up a complete connection from Magadi to Nairobi by some other route, this will result in our having a sort of loop line which could be utilized for the maintenance of communication between Nairobi and Mombasa in case of complete interruption of the telegraphs along the Railway at any point between Nairobi and Magadi Junction.
