It appears that a considerable difficulty has been experienced by the Surveyors in called upon to give evidence in Courts of law in cases in which officials concerned are also present as plaintiffs, as in the absence of any reciprocal qualification their evidence cannot command less weight than that of the learned Surveyors.

3. To avoid this difficulty, the members of the staff are anxious to obtain the Proletariate license which would either themselves hold a number of qualifications in one of the self-governing Dominions (Canada, etc.) or if the original members

(the East staff) or those who have a special qualification which includes observation for time, longitude, and azimuth. Some of the senior officers are learned Surveyors in the Union of South Africa or elsewhere and others already possess the required knowledge of astronomical methods. If the rest it is hoped that the arrangements can be made next year for instruction locally, but it would be of great assistance if you could undertake to secure for a necessary instruction at the O.S. Office those members of the staff who will be on leave during the next few months.

We can usually arrange for the Ordnance Survey to receive Government surveyors for instruction when they are recommended for the purpose - and if a man's mathematics were good enough I think there would be no objection to instruction in astronomical surveying. Then it is always possible to arrange for tuition by the Royal Geographical Society's Instructor.

Dear Mr. Townsend,

I enclose a copy of a despatch from Sir H. Belfield as to the possibility of a course of astronomical lectures for surveyors while on leave from the East Africa Protectorate. We are not quite clear what licence Government Surveyors have to, or can with advantage to the Government, obtain and we should be glad if you could explain the point to us.

As regards the final words of the despatch, this would mean that allowances would not be paid, as I do not suppose that either you or Mr. Galbraith would have occasion to make use of the facilities proposed.

It may be difficult to arrange a course of lectures for so few surveyors as are likely to be available at any one time, but it should not be hard to give effect to the intention of the Governor's proposals.

4. I would suggest that allowances and expenses be given as in the case of the course of Anthropology, but only in the case of those officers who are on the permanent and pensionable establishment.

Sir,

I have the honour to enquire whether arrangements could be made for a course of lectures in Astronomy for Surveyors whilst on leave in England.

2. Surveyors who wish to sit for examination in order to obtain a licence are required to have a practical knowledge of astronomy.

3. The course of lectures should deal with the knowledge of astronomy required for survey purposes and should include practical instructions in taking sun and star observations with the theodolite for time, latitude and azimuth and in the computations involved.
