


Sir,

I have the honour to refer to your despatch No. 928 of October 31st respecting duty paid on drugs imported for the use of Mission Hospitals.

2. I have been in correspondence with the Uganda Government on the subject of placing all drugs, medicines and antiseptics on the free list; as a result of which it appears that that Administration is reluctant to surrender the revenue involved. It is however proposed to include these articles in the Customs Tariff Amendment Bill which will come before the next Session of Council and the Governor of Uganda will be again asked to waive his objection.
