I have the honour to refer to my Confidential despatch No. 28 of the 16th of February, and to request that early arrangements may be made to fill the post of Matron at the European Hospital, Nairobi, rendered vacant through Miss Stoddard's retirement.

2. The selection should be made from those candidates who have served in the capacity of Acting Matron or Assistant Matron in one of the larger London Hospitals, and the lady appointed should not only be thoroughly conversant with all branches of nursing work, but be possessed of tact and the disciplinary firmness necessary to control with success a staff of Nursing Sisters.

3. The Principal Medical Officer does not consider it advisable for this senior appointment to be made from the ranks of the Colonial Nursing Sisters, who have given practically their whole life's work to hospitals
