MR J.H. RISELY  
TERMINATION OF APPOINTMENT

Reports as to delay in passage home. States views as to period of voyage home via South Africa. Amount due from Provident fund £62.7.7.

Mr Butler

Mr Riseley's account

of the circumstances in which he came to travel via the Cape (21880/16) appears to be quite inaccurate. He stated that he was bound to proceed home by that route, & was not allowed to wait for the next Suez boat: the Gov now explains that Mr Riseley said he could not wait, and was therefore allowed to travel by the Cape route. In these circumstances, he is not entitled for the whole period of the voyage, & his leave is rightly calculated on the Suez-Marseille basis.

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch No. 341 dated the 17th of May on the subject of the termination of the appointment of Mr. J.R. Risely, Accounts Clerk, Uganda Railway.

2. Mr. Risely was informed on the 13th of March 1916 that his appointment would be terminated. The first available steamer after this date was the Messageries Maritimes S.S. "Yarra" which was booked to leave on or about the 12th of April, but Mr. Risely stated that he could not wait for this service and requested that accommodation might be secured for him on the British India Steam Navigation Company's S.S. "Palancotta" which sailed for Durban on the 22nd of March. This was done.

3. Subsequently the sailing of the S.S. "Yarra" was cancelled on the 23rd of April, a month after Mr. Risely had left;

I consider that the period taken on the voyage from Bombasa to England via South Africa should, with the exception of the twenty days reckoned as the normal duration of a voyage to England via Suez, be counted as part of an officer's leave. It is true that the sailings by the northern route are at the present time somewhat infrequent but the journey via South Africa neither is, nor ever has been, compulsory, and may moreover be regarded as affording no small proportion of that rest and recuperation which is one of the primary reasons for the grant of leave. I do not recommend therefore that Mr. Risely's representations on this point should receive consideration.

5. The Chief Accountant has already informed the Crown Agents for the Colonies that the amount due to Mr. Risely from the Uganda Railway Provident Fund is Rs. 935.71 or 162-7-7. This amount is made up as follows:-
