This would be ample except for health reasons (it is the same then after 30 days at unhealthy stations), & I think it would be well to say that when it is approved as a general rule these must be prepared to forego a part of it if it should be necessary to recall them in order to meet the administration in war.

Sir,

I have the honour to inform you
that the question of leave arrangements for
the Protectorate civil staff has recently been
engaging my serious attention as because of
the war it has been necessary to retain a large
number of officers for longer tours of service
than the "maximum tour" of 30 months. A
considerable proportion of these are actively
employed with the local expeditionary force.
There are practically no reliefs available to
enable the remainder to proceed on leave until
after the termination of hostilities, while
the issue is still further complicated by the
fact that a number are serving with the Imperial
Forces in Europe and that a number of vacancies
exist in the sanctioned establishment which it

is found impossible to fill at present.

2. I believe, however, that it will be possible in the case of most departments to arrange for a certain amount of leave to be granted in rotation without the necessity for obtaining temporary assistance from elsewhere. But it will be quite impossible to allow officers to avail themselves of the whole of the leave they will have earned during their first period of absence after the war. In addition to the extra leave earned by enforced protracted tours of service, those officers who were recalled from leave in August 1914 have in the aggregate a considerable amount of deferred leave due to them. I therefore suggest that as a general rule the amount of leave in England which any officer may be granted shall, except on medical certificate, be limited to 180 days during his first period of leave, any balance being carried forward to subsequent periods.

3. An example of the leave problem is afforded by the Provincial Administration Department, as follows:-

4. In the case of the Medical Department, however, some special arrangements will be necessary. In this connection I enclose a report by the Principal Medical Officer showing the position of his staff. I can only suggest that 7 medical officers be engaged for a period of one year as proposed in paragraph 7 of the report. It appears to me possible that at the end of the war a certain number of officers at present serving with the Army might be available and I have the honour to request that the matter be taken up with the War Office when convenient.

5. Similarly, as regards the subordinate medical establishment, the India Office might be approached on the subject of the temporary secondment of Assistant Surgeons and Sub-Assistant Surgeons.

Re Leave of Medical Department Personnel.

The present moment may not be inopportune to raise consideration of the question of leave for Medical Officers, and what arrangements are contemplated towards relieving the congestion when the tension of the military situation is relaxed.

2. The attached lists show (1) all the names of the staff who by the 1st. of October 1916 will be entitled to leave of absence on completion of a full tour of service, with the number of days overdue; and, (2) those who by the first of April 1917 will be entitled to proceed home on completion of full tour of service.

3. It is preeminently desirable that when the reaction which I anticipate sets in after peace that these members of the Medical Staff who are entitled to leave should be sent home at the earliest opportunity. I have nothing but praise for the way the staff as a whole have worked during the last 2 years to overtake their manifold responsibilities in the face of unprecedented conditions; with many of them it has been a case of being on duty night and day. I have done my best to conserve the strength of the Staff by affording them odd days of local leave when and where they could be spared, and the necessity for this becomes increasingly frequent.

4. It is obvious that the withdrawal of 63 per cent of the staff will mean a very serious dislocation of the most of medical work in the Protectorate and I have the honour to enquire how it is proposed to deal with the emergency.

5. The question is complicated by many issues. There is the uncertainty of how long the campaign in this country will last or how long the aftermath of sweeping up on the conclusion of hostilities will take. I am informed that a large number of new battalions of K.A.R. are being raised, but whether these are to be Protectorate troops, or under the Colonial Office or War Office I do not know, nor whether when these points are settled I am to be asked to take over without further warning medical charge of these units. It is openly rumoured that a punitive expedition will be undertaken in this Protectorate in conjunction with the Police Service Battalion now what in the N.F.D. on what scale or of probable duration I am unaware. All these points will have to be considered in arranging for the leave of absence to the staff.

6. To avoid a serious breakdown in the Medical Administration of the Protectorate I can only suggest the following:-

Thus 2 Medical Officers of Health and 7 other Medical Officers would be required in addition to those available so as to carry on effectively provided all 13 Medical Officers who are overdue for leave are permitted to go at the end of this year.

The average number of days leave due to each will be 190 or plus the time taken in voyages nearly eight months each.

7. If the services of say 2 Medical Officers with D.P.H. degrees and 7 Medical Officers for ordinary work could be obtained for the period of one year the staff ~~overdue~~ due for leave could be allowed to go. The time taken in outward and homeward voyages for temporary Medical Officers, if these could be engaged, would bring their actual service in the Protectorate down to about 10 months as against the 8 months actual absence of the 13 members of the staff on leave.

8. The subordinate medical staff also presents difficulties in the arrangement of leave and duties.

43 of the Assistant and Sub-Ass't Surgeons are due for leave in October after 33 months service and 27 in April 1917 after 45 months service. 26 of this staff belong to the I.S.M.D. and 25 are due for return to the Indian Army this year. It is very doubtful also whether they can be replaced from the same source if not allowed to re-engage for a further period of service in the Pro-tectorate. At any rate they will have to be allowed to return and take their leave.

9. Of the Nursing Sisters 4 are overdue for leave in October. It may be possible to carry on, if the hospitals are not overtaxed but in the latter event it is likely that local assistance could be obtained if the war is ended.

10. Another dispenser will have to be engaged to fill an existing vacancy and with this establishment complete the medical storekeeper's leave can be arranged for.

11. The duties of the Sanitary Inspectors can be arranged for if the 4 now overdue can proceed on leave this year.
