The present scale of salary for Office Supts (£250-£15-£400.) dates from 1914. Progressively it has risen from £180 by £20 to £270. The new scale is a 1st class scale but the Govt. (26900/14) is still (para. 4 of the) opposed to the grant of 1st class privileges.

This proposal to give the 1st class rate of house allowance accords with the parity of this 2nd class position, but apart from that I consider that the Office Supts have done very well and that there is no more room for grant than £60 than any other class 5 man who

distinction of men who may reasonably
be expected to marry or buy therefore
live rent free and men for whom
maintenance is unreasonable & who
must therefore find £20 of their
cost from their own pockets.

[The Gov.'s statement that
the proposal would not effect pension
is correct in all officers drawing not
more than £500 cost £40 for
quarters for pension purposes.]

I should prefer to refuse to approve
on the grounds that the O.S. have
been well provided for and that the
necessity for public economy makes
it undesirable to allow any increase
in the emoluments of the Govt
Officers at the present time. But
the Govt would probably (as in other cases)
take exception to the suggestion that
he is not fully alive both as to
economy and the amount of
wages (say £120 p.a.) is not
large.

The proposal might perhaps
be approved on the understanding
that it will not be allowed to
form a precedent for application
from other classes or who pay
rent & money to the Govt.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit for your favourable consideration the question of an increase in the house allowance granted to Office Superintendents in this Protectorate.

2. The present allowance of £40 per annum was presumably fixed at a time when it was possible to rent a house for this sum. Of late years, however, the general increase in values has been so considerable that the minimum rental is at least £60 per annum.

3. I consider that an officer who has reached the status of Office Superintendent may reasonably be expected to wish to marry and settle down, either in a house of his own or in one taken on a lease of several years. In the latter case, he is under existing circumstances compelled to contribute £20 per annum or more out of his pocket towards the cost of the rent. I need not enlarge on the financial aspect, as an officer's emoluments though doubtless sufficient nevertheless render it incumbent upon him to live with economy. Moreover I consider it inequitable that he should

be required to make this payment.

4. I therefore recommend that the rate of house allowance be raised to £50 per annum in the case of Office Superintendants who cannot be provided with Government Quarters. The proposal will not affect the question of their ultimate pension and will not be regarded by them as tending to confer upon them the other privileges of a first class appointment. It will, on the other hand, serve to assure them that the Government is willing to assist them in so far as it properly can.

Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your confidential despatch No. 96, undated, relating to the amount of the house allowance granted to Office Superintendents.

2. I regret that I am unable at present to approve of your proposal to increase the allowance to £50 per annum. It is not yet three years ^{since} ago that the scale of salary of the Office Superintendents was very substantially increased. The considerations which constrained you to suggest the increase of their house allowance no doubt apply also to the other second class officers of the Protectorate, and in any case I feel that it is very difficult to sanction increases of emoluments
