MR COBB'S APPLICATION ON BEHALF OF CAPT HERON FOR LAND

In indication negotiations which ensued re Capt Heron's land at Simba after receipt of Lord Grange's despatch No. 347 of 20th June 1909, recommends, in view of offer made to Mr Cobb by Sir Percy Girouard, that Mr Cobb's application for 5,000 acres of leasehold land should be granted on understanding that it shall be an already surveyed area and not situated on the Mau.

I have the honour to refer to my despatch No. 347 of the 25th of June 1916 respecting certain land held by Captain R. M. Heron at Limuru, and to inform you that Mr. E. P. Cobb, that gentleman's attorney, has recently applied to me for a reconsideration of the case.

It will be desirable that I should now place you in possession of the negotiations ensuing after the receipt of the despatch. In 1914 Lord Crewe's decision was conveyed to my office in the usual course, and on the 2nd of July 1916 Mr. Cobb addressed a letter to me to the Admiralty giving reasons why forfeiture should not be taken and asking my predecessor would grant him permission to graze animals in the vicinity during the period of development, or alternatively to him to take up land in another district.
