Dr. E. W. Waters' Services in the Uganda
Protectorate.

Dr. Waters Dec. 3, 1900.

Dr. Waters was appointed on Dec. 3, 1900 to the post of Medical Officer under the Administration of the Uganda Protectorate at a salary of £450 per annum.

From do. Apr. 28, 1901.

In April 1901 he made application to the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, that, as he was actually in the permanent service of the Uganda Protectorate, the time he had spent previously in the service of the Uganda Railway Committee might be counted as pensionable.

To Treasury. June 19, 1901.

This request was submitted to the Treasury with a brief account of Dr. Waters' services.

From do. June 29, 1901.

The Treasury replied that Dr. Waters' application should be refused.

Dr. Waters was transferred to the East Africa Protectorate in April 1902. Sir C. Eliot asked permission by Telegraph in May to exchange Dr. Waters for Dr. Walker. Subsequently, however, Mr. Jackson telegraphed that Colonel Sadler, who was not anxious for the proposed exchange, stipulated that if it should be effected, Dr. Waters should not take Mrs. Waters with him as he would be stationed in a Nile Province. Mr. Jackson proposed, however, that as Dr. Waters was now settled at Lamu, the question of exchange should be held over until one of the two officers concerned went on leave. My Lord,

I have the honour to report that I have granted 6 months leave of absence to Dr. Hyattstone Bates, who has submitted a request to be allowed to resign from the date of the expiration of his leave, on the ground of ill health, which I have accepted.

The circumstances are these: it was brought to my notice that Dr. and Mr. Bates, particularly the latter, were addicted to the unmoderate use of alcohol, and that the latter was attracting public attention at Lamu: I directed the Principal Medical Officer to proceed to Lamu and enquire into the matter. On this being commenced, Dr. Bates intimated his desire to resign, and I deemed it desirable to let the matter rest at that. His leave will take effect from the 1st of June.

3. Dr. Waters has been for five years at home without taking leave or a change and it is probable that his health has been impaired by continuous service in the unhealthy Tana District.

4. Dr. Waters has applied for such gratuity as he may be entitled to. He was first employed on the Uganda Railway in May 1898 was transferred to the Uganda Protectorate in December 1900 and to this Protectorate in April 1902.

5. Under the circumstances it would appear doubtful whether he would be entitled to any gratuity. I should be inclined to take as liberal a view of his case as possible, because he is reported to be a particularly able medical Officer whose career has been marred mainly by circumstances over which he had no control.
