 The OAG asks for a successor to Miss Barnes as a Postal Clerk & Telegraphist - the vacancy occurred 4 July. He has also asked for a successor to Miss Phillips as a Telegraphist, the vacancy falling due on 1 December next (File 720).  
 The present position is that the ~~two~~ ladies who have been selected for appointment as Postal Clerks and Telegraphists are not allowed to proceed to EA on account of the salaries (See Qd 65 (A.P.)); and we have asked GPO to inform them that they are at liberty to offer themselves for other service, their nomination for EA to be cancelled if they do (H.3525). It seems evident therefore, to ask GPO to select any more ladies at present.


