I the undersigned most humbly and
respectfully beg to draw your attention
with full hope of help which is nearly due
on consideration of political point alone

As I am a poor and helpless I am coming
to your door for help as I did little duty in
work beneficial to both East India India
and India in 1915 in B. E. Africa but
on account I got unfortunately quite
out of what I ought to get

I am attaching history of the matter herewith
and respectfully to request to the Colonial
Secretary (to whom I made appeal against
the B. E. Africa Government's decision with
the original letter which I received) As
your Lordship and ^{Lord} Lydenham got well
acquainted in your time in India
personally about the ideas habits and
knowledge etc of my poor brothers in public
and private duties

Hoping to be excused for the trouble &
anticipation of favour of favourable early
reply of decision considered politically only

History of my work in 1915 in B. E. Africa
in connection with war which was with
every (month) of stopping food stuffs 304
which was going to enemy through Indian
merchants whose shops were on Uganda
Railway from Mombasa to Kisumu
(100 miles from sea to Uganda point)

In 1915 in Mombasa I was editor
of one Ugandan news paper named
"East Africa news" Mr Sanderson then
was a municipal commissioner and
special duty officer for above purpose
requested me personally after and
after to help in above matter. gave me
a verbal promise on behalf of British
nation that "I will not suffer an any
prejudice brought by my Indian
brothers or their friends of any nature
but will be at most measured what
may be in power of your and mine
British nation or Godly second nation"

There upon I did my best to stop and
suppress the food stuffs going to enemy
and I got success in two months on the
length of 100 miles where some thousands
shops of my Indian were selling and
buying and finished the duty by God's
favour successfully.

But in doing the above some people

nation in 1915 by the President.
