to inform you that in view of the  
outbreak of rabies in this country  
dogs are only allowed to be imported  
from the country (E.A.P.) if they  
have been in a clean district for  
a month; they must be sent  
first for a fumigation in a metal  
basket & not be taken out till a  
board ship ~~and~~ the East Africa  
Colonial Dept. reserves the right to  
enforce further restrictions after  
considering circumstances in any  
special case. The Board of Agriculture

will be consulted if arrangements can be

made for the issue of a certificate  
to accompany the dog, certifying  
that these conditions have been  
complied with.

2. As regards the restrictions  
of which are or may be imposed in  
S. Africa I am to suggest that  
you shall apply to the Secretary of  
Office of the H. Comm. for S. Africa
