Commander Cole called the other day & ^{he} asked for a prior's certificate on the ground that he was an approved claimant for a land grant. I explained that prior's recommendations are only being given to land-applicants - to any new settlers. He then mentioned that he was getting a year's help from his brother - and added that the V.C. Co had fully well guaranteed him a passage almost at once if he could get a prior's recommendation from us, which very much surprised me. Commander Cole did not mention the Training Settlement ^{as} he mentioned in his letter. Our principle has been not to recommend new settlers or open stations new businesses, but this seems quite

W^s Coke called yesterday

Her husband, a Land Allottee, has already gone
abroad - She wishes to follow with
her children (two), and a governess, as

soon as possible after the 1st of January.

I explained that though I thought she & the
children might be recommended for privacy, I
was afraid the governess would not be,
unless there were strong grounds, medical
or otherwise, for an exception being made
in her case. W^s Coke then gave the follow-
ing reasons for requiring a governess. She
herself is going to join her husband on the
farm, leaving the governess & children in
Nairobi; when the house on the farm is ready
the children will join them, with the governess.
The governess refuses to take the children out
alone, so that W^s Coke cannot go out
herself abt the children & governess follow
her in taking up flax-seed & other things
on the farm, so can abt delay sailing, especially
as one of the children is delicate & if this

sailing is postponed they will be going
through the Red Sea at the most unhealthy
time -

I think the reasons are genuine and
sound and am inclined to recommend
the whole party, though it will be
a slight exception to our rule about
medical certificates for ~~genuine~~ or
nurses. Seeing Mrs Cole a hearing about
her future activities, I could not ask
her to produce a medical certificate to
say that she was ~~unable~~ on
medical grounds, to
take the children out alone!

I explained, of course, that we were not
in a position to know how long she might have
to wait even if recommended for travel.

In support of this application, I beg to put forward the following particulars:-

Miss Debenham, The Hon. Mrs Grant, Commander and Mrs Coke have formed a private syndicate for the purpose of starting at the earliest possible moment a large experimental farm in British East Africa, conjointly with a Training Settlement for Educated Women, and a private Boarding School (the latter in co-operation with the leading emigration societies at home).

It is imperative for the initiation of the scheme that the members whose Priority Certificates are now applied for should represent the syndicate as soon as possible in the protectorate. Furthermore, I, the undersigned, have been granted one year's half-pay by the Admiralty from July 15th, 1919, for the purpose of proceeding to British East Africa, and, unless I can be given a Priority Certificate for my passage, it will be impossible for me to ^{assist in carrying} effect satisfactorily the intended inauguration of the scheme within the specified time.
