# Record number of jobs for school-leavers

There is a history of job opportunities in the past year than at the present time, the Minister for Education, Mr. Mwendwa, told the Assembly yesterday.

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# POLICE MEETING Many Luo members says Mr. Moi

The Vice-President and Minister for Home Affairs, Mr. Moi, told the House at Question Time that for security reasons he was unable to answer a question from Mr. M. Oduho-Chillo (K.P.U. Nyakach) asking why no Police or Army recruiting had taken place in Nyakach for two years.

Asked at a supplementary question if the Government had adopted a policy of not recruiting Luo, he answered a definite "No".

Mr. Moi went on: "We have on a number of occasions stated that we cannot as a Government bring recruiting on to a tribal basis."

A large section of the Luo people were in the police, he said, so why should these people say we are discriminating?

The question is to be raised again on adjournment.

Mr. Oduho-Chillo (K.P.U. Ugunya) asked the Minister of State in the President's Office, Mr. Koinange, what steps had been taken to discipline chiefs and sub-chiefs who he alleged had "practically involved themselves in a Kano meeting at Ugunya market on January 17th."

At this meeting, he alleged, resolutions containing "a strong warning against K.P.U. M.P.s and the Opposition leader, Mr. Oduho-Chillo, were passed."

Mr. Koinange said no steps had been taken because the allegation was unfounded. The chief and sub-chief had been at the market, but on administration duties. They were only benchmarking the image of Kenya.

# City status plea

Notice of a motion pleading on the Government to grant city status to Nairobi was given in the House by the speaker, Mr. M.P. Mark Mwangi.

He pointed out that if salaries were increased for the judiciary other civil servants would also increase. The Government had the whole salary structure of the civil service under review.

The Minister for Education, Dr. Kioko, urged Members not to blame a machine for the mistakes of technicians. He had been asked by Mr. Oduho-Chillo to explain alleged irregularities in the computer marking of C.P.E. papers.

Dr. Kioko said the K.N.U.T. had sought constantly to blame the computer for some irregularities in the marking. The facts were, however, that some technicians were not sufficiently used to the computer and some irregularities occurred as a result.

"My officers worked day and night to correct these irregularities and I am satisfied that in the end we got the correct result for all the pupils."

Mr. Mwangi asked Mr. Koinange to say what action was being taken to replace documents destroyed by the colonial administration just before independence.

The Minister for Natural Resources, Mr. Ngunjiri, said the Government could already do a great deal to improve the country's image.

# Police disperse election meeting

Riot police under the Nakuru Police Divisional Commander, Supr. Gitecho, dispersed a crowd of Kano supporters who had gathered at the Nairobi Community Hall yesterday for election-leavers' party.

There were no incidents but police kept back at the Kano office, which was closed by the sub-branch officials themselves last night ago, after a dispute over the administration of sub-branch funds.

The decision to disperse the crowd which had been picked up as delegates to conduct the elections, was understood to have been made in Nairobi and communicated to the Rift Valley provincial authorities through Police Headquarters, Nairobi.

News that the election would not take place was conveyed to the Nakuru District branch chairman, Mr. Kinias Kimani, the district executive officer, Coun. Geoffrey Kamau, who is also the Mayor of Nakuru, and the Nairobi sub-

branch chairman, Mr. Kariki Chotara, by police at Nairobi.

The officials who had made arrangements for the elections were astounded by the news. The meeting had been licensed by the S.C. for Nakuru and the delegates who spent the night on a farm on the outskirts of Nairobi, had been brought in to the hall.

The officials frantically tried to contact Nairobi by telegraph for clarification. They were unable to obtain any response until the Nairobi branch had sent out details.

The Nairobi sub-branch office, which has been in constant disarray since last year, was closed when Mr. Chotara, the branch chairman, the organising secretary, Mr. Choka, openly disagreed with the sub-branch treasurer, Mr. Joseph M. Kiruiru, and the vice-chairman, Mr. Elijah Kibouchi.

The officials closed the office and later asked the administration to ensure that nobody used it. The matter was brought before the district branch, which decided to hold fresh elections.

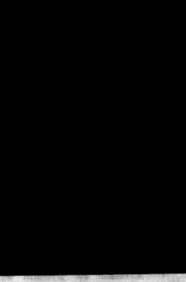

# Associations of Kenya throughout Kenya

## Messages

**Mrs. D. THOMSON**, vice-chairman of the Kenya Youth Hostels Association, discusses the achievements, hopes and problems of the association which recently joined 44 other countries in the International Youth Hostel Federation.

After years of sometimes disappointingly slow progress, the Kenya Youth Hostels Association is forging ahead and has much to offer the young people of East Africa and travellers from overseas. It now has seven hostels in attractive parts of the country, where youngsters can stay cheaply, and more are being planned as soon as circumstances permit.

An ever-growing stream of hostellers from abroad, many of them students, are visiting Kenya and using its hostels, partly because they want to see the country's wildlife and other attractions but also because Nairobi is strategically situated on the tourist route.

The result is that the International Youth Federation is taking an increasing interest in Kenya and has already given us £1,000 for new projects with a promise of more to come.

A blueprint of a National Youth Centre of Kenya City Hotel, side by side with a Kenya Youth Hostel, is in the final stages of completion in Nairobi.

The article below explains yet another step forward, a plan for a hostel in the beautiful surroundings of Fourteen Falls, near Thika. It is a really making progress, but a constant stream of visitors from overseas is that they do not know Kenya youngsters at the hostels.

This is mainly because so few African know about the fun and interest which can be found as a member of the association. We hope this page will make more of them realise what the K.Y.H.A. has to offer.

I have been delving into the history of Youth Hostels in Kenya — the files, the minutes and the suggestions for the first hostel on an area located in Kenya — way back in 1957.

The name of Sir Derek Erskine, the first chairman, who was based at the Kenya Y.M.C.A. was roped in to make our own suggestions on the possibility of starting a Youth Hostel here.

Others who helped were men like Dr. L. R. Gregory, Dr. L. S. B. Leakey, Mr. Balder Agazzi, now a physical training instructor at Jamhuri High School, Mr. John Porter at that time the Principal of Jeju School, and now Dean of Studies at University College, Nairobi, Mr. G. S. Amar, a former Principal of Jamhuri High School.

## Log cabin planned near 14 Falls

Two or three years ago, when I was first elected vice-chairman of the Kenya Youth Hostels Association, I met a charming old lady — she is 93 — who owns a part of the land near one of the best-known spots in Kenya, the Fourteen Falls, about 40 miles north of Nairobi.

Over a leisurely cup of tea we discussed the possibility of building a Youth Hostel on an acre or so of her land and she generously agreed to donate a specified area for this purpose.

I was jubilant, thinking that all I needed was a legal transfer, and in my innocence, or maybe enthusiasm, that in three months I could have a charming log cabin in the African style overlooking the beautiful river and within a minute's walk from the falls.

I signalled local labour to clear the land, local timber for the construction and assumed that within three months the money would be in my hands.

I was quickly disillusioned when I was told it would take at least a year. Only people such as surveyors, lawyers and architects know the complexities involved in this sort of transaction — but I was learning.

The first snag was learning from an article in the East African Standard that the plot was to be transferred into a national park instead of the plot already donated to the site for our Youth Hostel. I had to go to the Director of the National Parks and still hope for compromise on the title.

Then the struggle really started. I had to find a surveyor who could tell me what the boundaries of this land was within the boundaries of our country. I had to find an architect who would be prepared to design a building which was free of debt, a building which would be of a design I had to get seven copies of serial photographs so that the site plot could be pinpointed.

## Where hostellers can stay

The seven K.Y.H.A. hostels are situated as follows—

**NAIROBI** — This hostel is adjacent to the Kenya Institute of Administration offices at Kasaba. The honorary warden lives at the Institute and visitors report to him on arrival.

**KITALE** — Many travellers from Calvo have stayed at this hostel, which is on the Machelo River. The honorary warden lives at the Farm of Mr. Peter Graves, who sets up a camp for visitors on arrival.

**MOUNT ELGON** — The summit of the 14,200 ft mountain can be reached in about three hours from this hut. The amenities are rather primitive but warm clothing is essential as it is very cold at night.

**MOMBASA** — Facilities here have been made available by the Christian Council of Kenya at the Karamani Centre, 11 miles along the road to Malindi. Advance booking is essential.

**WUNDANI** — Help for hostellers has been offered by Mr. D. G. Graham in the beautiful Tala Hills, 30 miles north of Voi.

**NYERI** — Limited facilities are available at an African settlement run home in the townships.

Kenya's Youth Hostellers can take pleasure in helping these overseas guests but before they do this they must show the necessary pride in their own country. Now is the time for them to show the spirit of Harambee by co-operating in the association's work.

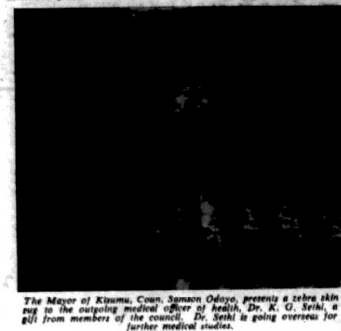

## Women's education pioneer returns

Makereke University College, the oldest constituent college of the University of East Africa, is undergoing a silent revolution. Among its 2,500 students there are about 500 women from East and Central Africa and other countries.

Before the Second World War — when Makereke was the only institution of higher education in East Africa — there were no women students at the college. Nor was there an alternative women's institution for higher education in the four territories.

The sad fact was that few girls had been given a chance to progress their minds for higher education, which was monopolized by men.

At the Second World War boom, a bachelor woman in England was conceiving tactics of how to fight a war against prejudice for the emancipation of the female intellectual world.

Her name — Miss Margaret Graham, now principal of St. Mathias Teacher Training College, Bristol. This is a Church of England institution and when Miss Graham became its principal in 1954 it had 75 girls only. She has since seen her college grow from 75 to 460 students, including men.

She can now boast of having introduced girls at Makereke and men at St. Mathias College.

Makereke remained a monopoly for men until 1945. In 1946 Miss Graham had been invited by the then principal of Makereke College, Mr. Turner, to come to

Africa and introduce higher education to women in the four East African territories. He had also been asked by King's College, Budo — like then Kabaka's College — to find a tutor for their girls who were rivaling with boys in higher education.

When Miss Graham came to Africa she hoped to interview 130 women from whom she would accept 100 students to start the first women's class at Makereke. She was disappointed to find only one girl in form six eligible for university entrance in the whole of East Africa. Her name: Catherine Senkatuka, of Budo.

Miss Graham said that the thought there were intelligent women up-country who were denied the chance of exploiting their gifts. She was right. For a full year she worked hard preparing for the next academic year when more students would be surprised to see their names on their exclusive campus.

She carried out an extensive search throughout East Africa for girls and women who would constitute her first class. She interviewed businessmen, parents, politicians, colonial administrators, and many influential people for support and encouragement.

It was due to her untiring patience and energy which involved journeys of many hundreds of miles that Makereke College eventually admitted women students and became convinced of their capabilities and potential contribution to the country.

A great part in initiating and influencing the decisions related to the admission of women in higher education and eventually to the University of East Africa and the institutions abroad recently returned to Uganda as a guest of the Faculty of Education at Makerere University College, as an external examiner.

Her efforts were supported by other well-known women educationists in East Africa like Mrs. Mary Stuart, wife of the former Arabist of Uganda, who has been honored by her name having been given to the single women's hall of residence on Makereke hill, Miss Helen Neatly, and others in Uganda who believed strongly in women's education.

Miss Graham and Miss Kijoh were the first European resident in the first European residence in the women's hall of residence at Makereke, since converted into a guest house. She later became the first warden — administrative head — of the women's hall of residence, popularly known by the men students as the "Bo".

The "Bo" now houses about 156 women students which makes it difficult to realize that East Africa's first institution of higher education started reluctantly with only six women students in 1946.

The six are: Mrs. Florence Luboga, nee Wamala, who is Uganda's only woman member of Parliament; Mrs. Yemima Kabaronz, nee Nungwero, a District Commissioner in Uganda; Mrs. Margaret Kabazi, nee Kamuhigi, who was Uganda's Acting High Commissioner in London when Uganda's first High Commissioner to Britain, Mr. Baxanham, died suddenly; Mrs. Anthea, nee Senkatuka, working with the Ministry of Culture; Mrs. Margaret Mukasa, nee Mulindi and Mrs. Catherine Shonby, nee Senkatuka, a teacher in Uganda.

Five of the pioneer students, except Mrs. Margaret Kabazi, who is overseas, were so excited to learn that their former teacher was returning to East Africa that they turned up in force at Entebbe Airport to welcome her.

When she landed on Uganda soil after being away for over 15 years, she was presented with a bouquet by Miss Elmer, the daughter of one of her former students. A

coffee party was organized at Entebbe in her honour by Mrs. Kijoh-Sekula, wife of the Minister of Finance, and one of the earliest students to be admitted at Makerere.

Miss Graham told a reporter that she first went to Gayaza High School, the leading girls' school in Uganda, and there discovered a teacher who could be accepted as a mature student. This was Miss Wamala. Mary Senkatuka was also teaching at Gayaza High School and she was recruited as a student.

A Sara Chief, Mr. Mulyanti, requested Miss Graham to consider his daughter Margaret, who was in her fifth form. Then two others, Yemima Nungwero and Marjorie Kabazi, were recommended. That made six potential students.

It was particularly few but Miss Graham did not lose heart. She thought there were some women in Kenya who would be considered for Makereke entrance, but she said, she was told by the Kenya authorities that she was 23 years too early. She then went to Tanganyika and there was none there. She was advised not to waste her time by going to Zanzibar.

So the lucky six formed the first bunch of women students at Makereke College.

She recalled that she used to

hold special courses for her students during vacations in order to prepare them for degrees or their equivalents. She sent to London papers of five of her students to be marked. Their standard proved to be equal to that of students in Britain. Until a few years ago Makereke University College was attached to London University which awarded degrees and other qualifications.

The then Miss Wamala — Mrs. Luboga, M.P. — took a post-graduate diploma in education at Oxford after her Higher School Certificate studies at Makereke; other girls in the United Kingdom were doing this diploma after their degree work.

Miss Mary Senkatuka went to London, did social studies, returned and worked in the then Welfare Department. Later, she returned to Bristol where she took a degree in history.

Miss Graham is proud that many prominent women in East and Central Africa went through her hands, including the first woman doctor in East Africa, Dr. Josephine Nambou.

Asked whether there were tensions between men and women students then, she said the men were very kind, sympathetic and understanding during her time. All six of her pioneer students are married with families.

Miss Graham is visiting East Africa for five weeks. She is staying in the first women's hall of residence, now a Makereke guest house. A dinner in her honour was arranged at the Grand Hotel, Kampala, last Saturday.

# Rhodesian plan 'not forced by extremists'

Rhodesia's Prime Minister, Mr. Ian Smith, has denied that extremist members of the Rhodesian Front Party had pushed him into accepting the country's proposed apartheid-style Constitution.

Mr. Smith made the denial to an audience of 600 at a political rally in a farming centre about 65 miles from Salisbury.

He told his audience that majority rule in Rhodesia would be a handover to international Communism through nationalist leaders who had been indoctrinated overseas.

At a rival political meeting last night in Karoi, about 100 miles north-west of Salisbury, Mr. Pat Bhebe, chairman of the moderate Centre Party, said that Britain was turning a blind eye to some nation-breaking because it was not its intention to wreck the Rhodesian economy.

He said that nearly everything exported from Rhodesia was going out in trucks and documents, and although Britain was fully aware of this it turned a blind eye to some of it.

The Afro-Asian group at the United Nations will ask the Security Council to examine the Rhodesian situation next week, it was announced in New York.

This follows Mr. Smith's plan to turn the country into a republic with a new constitution enabling minority whites to retain political power.

Denunciation Committees were meeting yesterday to urge a new resolution condemning the Rhodesian situation for sanctions to be imposed.

# M. POHER LOSES MOST OF BACKING

M. Georges Pompidou appeared to be heading for victory in the June 15 runoff Presidential election as his nearest rival, M. Alain Poher, lost most of his support.

Mr. Poher, who had been elected President in May, said that he would announce his decision to step down before the runoff.

A leading Socialist, the former Premier, M. Andre Leites, said that he would support M. Poher should he be re-elected.

The Communist General Confederation of Labour (CGT) said that it would support M. Poher should he be re-elected.

The CGT described both candidates as "typical representatives" of the ruling bourgeoisie.

It also promised a rough passage for the future President, outlining a ten-point list of priority claims, including wage rises to catch up price increases since last June, shorter working hours, earlier retirement, working taxes, employment guarantees and other demands.

M. Pompidou also received grudging support from M. Rene Capitant, a former Justice Minister and the only Government member to resign after Gen. de Gaulle left the Presidency.

He declared: "I abstained in the first round of voting, but everyone knows that in the run-off you vote against the enemy. Since the main adversary is M. Poher... there is nothing else but to vote for M. Pompidou."

The flight of supporters from M. Poher's candidature following his relatively poor showing in the first round of the elections leave

him with only two political formations solidly behind him: the Radical, Socialist, constituting a minority of the Left-Centre, and the Socialist.

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Informed sources said he has told M. Poher that he did not back his candidacy, and that he would announce his decision to step down before the runoff.

The Centre Democrats are split, half of the leaders supporting M. Pompidou and the other half supporting M. Poher.

Observers believed it highly unlikely that M. Poher would withdraw, but said his progressive isolation could only complicate the task he set himself — to prove that a strong Centre tendency exists among the electorate and must be maintained to provide an alternative to a straight fight between Gaullists and Communists.

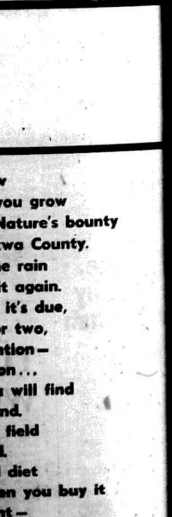

# Age-old device protects farms from wildlife

For many years wildlife conservationists in Africa have been the problem of devising control methods to prevent animals, buffalo and rhino from destroying crops, property or settling areas.

In East Africa the problem has assumed even greater significance since independence. The Governments of Kenya, Tanzania and Uganda have pledged to conserve wildlife as a vital attraction for their booming tourist industries.

But at the same time the Governments, in their efforts to provide landless and unemployed citizens, are encroaching on areas reserved for the wild animals by fencing some of them for human settlement.

Conservationists would like to see that animals living in national parks and reserves are not killed for their skins or for their horns, but that they are not killed for their meat, crops or property.

One of the most effective methods of protection is the use of fences. The fences are made of wire or other material and are designed to prevent animals from entering the settlement.

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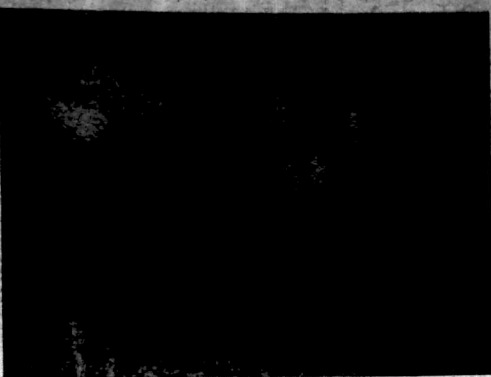

farms. But they have now been stopped.

About 40 to 50 contractors employed people to dig the moat in 20 months.

Mr. Parke explained that it cost about £400 a mile to dig, dig and cover the moat and later protect it with a fence from the farm side and make drains to allow water flow from the moat.

Mr. Parke suggested that his moat should be a good example to other farmers in Kenya.

"Before I built the moat we were trying to control incursion of game on the farm by shooting," Mr. Parke said.

He said that on several occasions his employees had been trampled by buffalo who had invaded the farm.

Since the completion of the moat it had not only helped to conserve the game but it had also made the farm more efficient.

The ditch, which would cost only about £200 a year to maintain, was 98 per cent effective.

Money should be raised, Mr. Parke suggested, either by Government or private organisations.

Already the Tanzania Government had sent its officers to study the moat system with a view to using it there.

The Game Department hopes to extend the moat to include the Wainwright Glades on the Aberdare Range when a decision is made on the ownership of the glades. This will extend the moat up to the western boundary of the Aberdare National Park.

The game warden at Thomson's Falls, Mr. Abdon M. Anders, who supervised the construction of the moat, said he hoped the National Parks authorities would take it as their responsibility to extend the moat to Marwa in Chamaia Settlement Scheme.

"We shall still have the problem of game entering settlement schemes from the Chamaia scheme unless the National Parks close it," he said.

Since the construction of the moat to Deighton Downs Estate and Ndaragwa Fesi schemes there has been no problem of game interfering with farms around it.

"This is the home of the elephant and the buffalo. They migrated from the Aberdare National Park and many of them used to come during the rainy season to destroy crops on farms."

The moat is covered with trees to prevent weathering, to prevent rain falling on the exposed surface and to maintain constant temperature in the ditch. This strengthens the ditch by allowing grass and trees to grow across it.

The moat also helps to prevent animals from entering the settlement. It is a ditch to an effective depth of 10 feet and the sides are covered with a post and rail barrier so that the animals cannot jump over it.

The moat method is being widely used around the Aberdare National Park. One of the farmers at Thomson's Falls, Mr. M. R. Parke, managing director of the 13,000-acre Deighton Downs Estate, Ndaragwa Fesi, on the southern slopes of the Aberdare Range.

Mr. Parke said: "We lost a considerable amount of grazing by the animals, especially buffaloes, which used to come from the farm. They were eating the planted grazing which later built for livestock."

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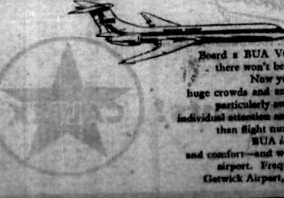

# Modern port emerges

It is impossible to say when the port first became a port. It can look back as far as the days of Solomon, 1,200 years before Christ, rather more than 3,000 years ago.

The Book of Kings there is a record of the feet of Hiram of Tyre, who came to the East African coast before Christ, rather more than 3,000 years ago.

In fact the first port structure was not built in Mombasa Old Harbour but at Mbaraki. This was a jetty, built in 1896, of timber; later it was replaced by an iron structure built in the form of a letter S and upon which were placed railway tracks.

This jetty was specifically for the export of goods.

They were landed by ship boats and brought to the shore before being merchandised to the wharves. When the Portuguese built Fort Jesus they built a ramp along which commodities could be hoisted, slid or rolled to the Fort pier.

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It was the first pier of the Cape Colony and the fall of Singapore. Quick surveys of the Port of Mombasa were carried out and the pier service expanded to receive the large number of ships.

Like much the envy of Japan into the war and the fall of Singapore, Kilindini became a Class "A" naval base, and a conveyer assembly port. Anti-submarine and anti-aircraft defences were set up, and a "Port War Signals Station" established. Ships and naval store ships were stationed in the Harbour.

A Royal Naval personnel pool and a naval dockyard were established. To deal with increasing cargo and improve the turn-round of conveyers further deep-water berths, 12 in length, were constructed north of Berth No. 3. Construction began in 1941 and was completed in 1944. At one time a total of 217 berths, 114 of which were at Kilindini Harbour.

With these two extra berths, the end of the war found Kilindini ready in case with improved airports and canteens and this it did.

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In 1912 a firm of consulting engineers started investigations for the building of deep-water berths on the pier immediately north of east Kilindini. But this was not done until the World War held up all development.

For four years the port, working with the meagre facilities, handled an tremendous volume of war material, all of which had to be man-handled from ship to 45,000 tons further was done until 1920 when berths were invited for the construction of two deep-water berths, 1,300 feet long with a depth along side of 17.05, of 13 feet, complete with two double-voyed transit sheds.

The contract was given to Pauling and Company in 1921 to build these two berths. In 1922 a contract for a further two berths was entered into in 1925, and for a fifth berth in 1929. The whole project was completed by February, 1931. An additional facility at oil berth, capable of berthing the largest tanker then afloat, was completed the same year.

The outbreak of the World War in September, 1939, saw Kilindini under construction, plans were made to meet future development. Byes were turned to the mainland and work was started on a causeway, connecting the northern end of the port on the island itself to Kipevu on the mainland.

At the same time dredging and cartworks for two new mainland berths, each 600 feet long, were undertaken. The causeway was built in 1941 and the berths were completed in 1942. At one time a total of 217 berths, 114 of which were at Kilindini Harbour.

use by lighters carrying material for the Uganda Railway from ship to shore. Even so heavy material was brought to the beach at high tide, dumped into the water and retrieved when the tide ebbed. Eventually there were four jetties used for the receipt of railway material, and these handled everything that arrived.

It was not until 1907 that the construction of the first lighterage wharf began. It was a simple concrete-block wharf 550 feet in length and fitted with steam cranes. All traffic was handled at this wharf until the pier of the deep-water berth was opened in 1926.

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11 and 12, were handed over by the contractors in June, 1929, and the remaining two berths, No. 13 and 14, were completed to quay level by October of that year.

In the Port Reel War raised approximately a half-million cubic feet of all and mud from the seabed. This was carried in hopper barges a distance of four miles along Port Reel Bay and dumped into a deep depression in the creek bottom. There is now a minimum depth of 33 feet at low water ordinary spring tides at the approaches and up to the point of the berth coping.

Quarry contractors delivered by barge from Mtwazi Creek some 230,000 tons of boulders for the rubble tanks which are roughly 96 feet in length and 20 feet wide of the berth coping.

The deck of the berths is over water and supported by reinforced concrete piles varying in length from 16 inches to 24 inches square, weighing as much as 20 tons each and up to 90 feet in length. There are 40 piles built into 500 berths with some of the piles the largest ever used in East African harbour works.

The deck of reinforced concrete was designed to carry cranes and storage of the commodity and its loading into vessels at a wharf built in 1913 and demolished in 1922.

The present-day installation comprises a ready-rebuilt storage shed atop the cliff opposite deep water berth No. 9 with a total superficial area of 73,000 square feet roofed with Tororo corrugated asbestos cement sheets, whose two

overhead conveyors take the Port Reel installations and deliver the bagged soda ash at the south end of the shed.

A further specialised installation is that of the East African Storage Company Ltd. for the storage of bulk molasses drawn from sugar factories in Tanzania, Kenya and Uganda, and its export to overseas markets in tankers chartered for the purpose. The delivery pipe was installed under the northern of the two Magadi soda conveyors and terminates at the coping of Berth No. 9.

It is fed from three storage tanks adjoining the Magadi soda shed, one of 15,000 tons of molasses, and two having a capacity of 3,500 tons each. The bulk molasses are delivered to the Ramihi sugar works, and in railway tank wagons from north-eastern Tanzania, Kenya and Uganda.

The most recent development is the bowing of the delivery rate from the tanks by compressed air, which reduces the time of emptying a 324-ton capacity tank to about a quarter of the time taken by gravity discharge.

A further application of compressed air is the cleaning out of the tanks by high-pressure water jets. Taken together, these innovations have greatly reduced the turn-round of rail tank wagons to the advantage of the Railway and the Company, whose current export of bulk molasses is running at about 100,000 tons per annum with an envisaged potential, depending upon the availability of transport to the Coast, of 125,000 tons per annum by 1972.

Back at Mbaraki, where the first pier was built in 1896, a major new project is under way. For many years the wharf had lain practically unused, but in 1967 it was decided to rehabilitate Mbaraki.

Interest had been shown by the Hamburg Portland Cement Company Ltd. who wished to build a cement bagging and loading project which among other advantages would obviate the road transport over Nyali Bridge and through the town of bagged cement for export. In an enterprise undertaken jointly by the Company and the East African Harbours Corporation, construction is proceeding with a target date for completion of the first phase by February, 1970.

Three cement silos each with a capacity of 5,000 tons, plus a packing plant, will supply a large gantry carrying conveyor belts into the holds of loading vessels alongside.

Other industries have shown an interest in using sections of the new wharf, and if maize, vegetable oil and other bulk products as well as cement are loaded at Mbaraki, this will still further advance the speed of handling and alleviate the pressure on the Kilindini deep water berth.

Thus has Kilindini progressed, a truly East African saga, of endeavour and expansion, a project started by the British and developed by the Colonial governments and today a complex which since independence has been almost entirely Africanised, run by the descendants of those who first man-handled the merchandise mentioned in the Periplus, 2,000 years ago.

## Need filled by deep water berths

Despite of being superseded the Kilindini deep-water berth on the other side of Mombasa island, the old pier and port is still an attraction for tourists and a place calling people for the view which will ply on the sea winds as they have done for centuries past.

### Continuing link with the past

The Old Port of Mombasa was the original anchorage used by dhows since before the time of Christ. It lies on the east side of Mombasa Island and is entered between Ras Serrani, the site of the modern light-house and Port Signals Station, and Mackenzie Point about half a mile N.N.E.

Since the dawn of history dhows and smaller craft have arrived on the south-west monsoon between the months of December and April. With the change of the monsoon they were returned to northern ports including the Persian Gulf, the Arabian Sea and India. This pattern remained and as a result Mombasa Old Port became the centre of all Indian activities and the Old Town grew up round it.

With the modern development of East Africa and the building of the Uganda Railway, Mombasa Old Port remained as the harbour for steamers opening up passenger and cargo traffic between East Africa and the other continents of the world, and it was as well that changing conditions demanded improved facilities for ocean-going vessels that the need was diverted to Kilindini on the south-west side of the island, beginning with the construction of a wharf at Mbaraki in 1896 and a lighterage wharf in 1907. The first deep-water berths were started in Kilindini Harbour itself in 1921.

Ever today, however, coastal craft and dhows come as from time immemorial on the south-west monsoon to Mombasa Old Port, and much of the passenger traffic of the East coast and the crews that man them is retained at Mombasa.

So too are the traditional cargo handling methods. No mechanical application, hoists, drums and pack-ages of all kinds and sizes are manufactured between the ship and the road transport connecting with the wharf. It is the Government's policy to retain the traditional methods.

The sole connection to modernity in Mombasa Old Harbour is the bulk loading plant established by the Hamburg Portland Cement Company Ltd. at Mackenzie Point, between the harbour entrance and Nyali Bridge.

Here, as a berth suitable for the company's fleet of ocean-going bulk carriers, a new 324-ton capacity wharf for delivery to export markets as far away as the East of Africa and the Arabian Gulf.

At the landing station built on the island, all goods for shipment are taken ashore for shipment to the mainland.

## Tribute in figures

It was not sufficient to introduce the regulations for cargo handling at East African ports which had been widely applied. One of the first considerations of the new organisation was to instil a sense of interest and responsibility throughout the staff which numbered roughly 15,000. With immediate effect it was decided to send senior staff to Europe to work in the principal ports.

This has provided invaluable experience and the knowledge gained has been reflected in productivity. On the Administrative side staff members were also sent on courses. At home, training of the highest possible standard has continued in the Kipevu Training Centre while the training staff at Dar es Salaam was increased.

Apart from the Company's own teaching organisation use was made of the East African Staff College and the Kenya Institute of Administration, the training available for female staff at Claudi College, and for technical candidates sponsored by the Company at the Mombasa Technical Institute.

At Mombasa in co-operation with U.S.A.I.D., a team of American stevedores have brought their instructional expertise and this in-the-pot training has been extended to Dar es Salaam with the introduction of two Danish port stevedore instructors.

For two years Mr. H. Paolink served with E.A.C.H.S. as Technical Consultant and gave the most valuable assistance. At the end of this officer's term of service he was succeeded by Captain F. de Meulder.

East African Railways and Harbours have at Mombasa provided a progressive building of facilities to relieve a smothering throughput. These included the bringing into full commission of deep water berths and sheds 11 and 14 with stacking yards and ancillary facilities.

A new integrated structure replacing the old sheds 7 and 8 is now in its final stage of construction and plans are ready for more deep water berths at Kipevu.

At Dar es Salaam three new berths are under construction, but a new approach to port working came with the necessity to provide facilities for imports and exports of Zambian traffic.

In 1967 copper exports increased

until monthly tonnage were between 12,000 and 13,000 tons. In November of that year the Uthungu shed came into operation on the Morogoro road. This shed, which has a capacity of 100,000 tons, is probably the largest in Africa and has alleviated much of the pressure on Dar es Salaam port itself since it came into use for the storage of Zambian traffic.

Both Tanga and Mtwara received their share of improvements and equipment.

In general the Company has continued to renew and extend its holding of capital equipment. It can be said that the ports served by E.A.C.H.S. are among the best equipped in the whole of the developing countries of Africa for handling general cargo.

In this respect, the Company organised in November, 1967, a conference in respect of unitisation. The event was of its kind the largest and most important ever held in East Africa and over 300 participants attended from East Africa and overseas.

The chair was taken by Mr. C. Tamala, then Chairman of E.A.C.H.S. and Chief Traffic Manager of E.A.R. and H. Through the conference came a high degree of interest and understanding of this new important phase in sea and land transport, and as a Company E.A.C.H.S. were able to assist shippers and ship-owners with satisfactory results which can be seen in all East African ports today.

The steadily increasing demand from shipping lines to have their own cargoes lifted before shipment has encouraged the Company to organise a department for this purpose. Special facilities for pellets and ships gear were made available to those requiring them and special staff trained.

During 1968, with all systems working, the Company was able to break all former records for tonnage handled at Mombasa and the increase of some 300,000 tons was effected without any extension in the number of working berths.

Considerable effort was deployed during the year in organising to a high level of efficiency all handling sequences pertaining to Zambian imports and exports.

The Company was disappointed that the heavy tonnage looked forward to were less than ant-

ipated. Nevertheless all ports in 1968 handled increased tonnages against the recorded figures for the previous year.

In addition, 1968 marked a determined effort to consolidate the staff position. Since 1964 emphasis had been on training and promotion of local officers to replace non-contents. By the end of 1967 the Africanisation programme had reached a stage of virtual completion of its first objective, and now the phase has arrived of establishing local officers on a permanent section and departmental basis.

One of the features of working at Mombasa was the great improvement of the handling of maize. Six Vacuators are now in use. These machines have made it possible to do away with time consuming and expensive hand trimming operations while the grain loading ships saw their time in port considerably reduced.

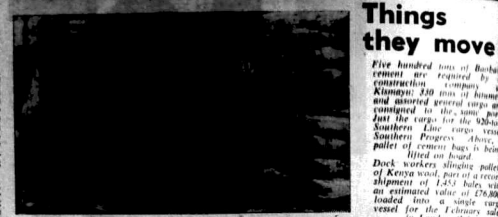
The average tonnage handled per ship's working day is now 1,500 tons as against 900 tons in 1967.

The East African Cargo Handling Services is a huge complex and the beginning and end of its raison d'être is the smooth movement of cargo to and from vessels in East African ports. But this results like an over-implication of the giant industry.

In ever-changing conditions the staff of the organisation have to be familiar with the principles and efficient in the practice of all modern procedures. In a world of specialised experts, computers, utilisation and machine millions of tons of cargo of every description are being handled skillfully by men trained in the last degree.

Next year and the year after will bring new demands, new methods. Already E.A.C.H.S. men are being taught the latest advances in some of the largest and most progressive ports in the world. In Headquarters and Branch offices African women are working with mechanised business systems and machines.

In 1964 it was said that cargo handling could not be effected by East Africans. The figures of tonnage throughput speak for themselves. One of the greatest and most important industries in East Africa handles the output and the needs of 30,000,000 people. It is a job being well done. It will continue to be well done.

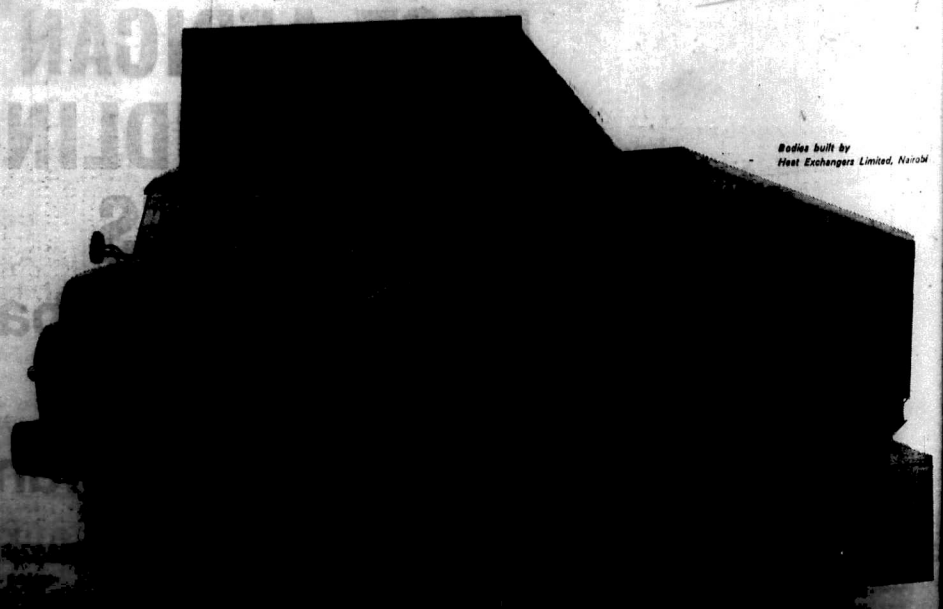

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# The Harbours and ports of East African Harbours Corporation

The Harbours and ports of East African Harbours Corporation are controlled through the Harbour Master's office and include the jacking, hoisting and unloading of vessels in and out of ports, the operation and maintenance of all harbour cranes and craft, the maintenance of all coastal and Harbour lighting and buoyage, the management of moorings, moored and unmoored vessels, inland waterway operations, and the issue of Harbour Certificates and the survey and inspection of vessels and cargo.

When a ship calls at any of our ports, the local agent as required by regulation to notify the port management in advance of the expected date and time of arrival. This is done at a daily morning meeting between the port manager and ship's agent.

When the date and time of the ship's arrival are established with certainty, the Harbour Master, who is in charge of the Marine services of the port, makes the necessary arrangements for the vessel to be brought in and berthed on the berth allocated to it by one of our pilots.

Shipping movements to the Harbour are controlled through the Harbour Master and the signal station through telegraph and V.H.F. (Very High Frequency) radio connections. The Harbour Master also controls ships on his V.H.F. radio within a range of 20 miles.

When a ship is signalled by the signal station, usually at a distance of 10 to 15 miles, the signal is passed between the ship and the station through telegraph and V.H.F. radio, and the identity of the ship is established.

Information is then passed on to the pilot on duty and at the same time the Harbour Master is alerted. The mooring gang who will receive and moor the ship at the berth are also alerted to readiness.

The pilot travels in the pilot boat to meet the ship at the "pilot ground" where he boards the vessel via a rope ladder which has been rigged away from the wind and rain. The pilot then signals the ship to proceed to the "berth" where he meets the Harbour Master or an old friend of many voyages - the Harbour Master's assistant.

After sailing negotiations in the channel, the ship is met by the tug boats and the ship is moved to the berth.

DAR ES SALAAM - HISTORY OF A PORT

# Serving a new hinterland

The port of Dar es Salaam, historically well known as "Haven of Peace" besides its various roles attached to a capital city, is an unchallengeable gateway to Tanzania which over the years past has spontaneously developed to acquire and serve a vast hinterland consisting of various states.

Today the port is celebrating its first inauguration as the Headquarters of the East African Harbours Corporation which will administer the four main East African ports of Mombasa, Tanga, Dar es Salaam and Mtwara. Hitherto the ports as a department of the E.A.R. and it had their headquarters at Mombasa.

The history of the City of Dar es Salaam is necessarily the history of its port. Before 1856, Dar es Salaam was known as all it was used because Bagamoyo, owing to its proximity to Zanzibar and to the fact that it showed more ability to cross the channel at all times of the year, was an important port especially during the 19th century. Bagamoyo marked the end of the long slave and ivory caravan route to Ujiji.

No port facilities were needed or built because it could easily be drawn up on the beach. Also the Germans used Bagamoyo as headquarters of their first attempt at colonisation.

On the other hand Dar es Salaam with its inhabitants' respect for hostility was well hidden from the

open sea, had an awkward entrance, strong winds, currents and tides; and was hence unsuitable for ships to enter or leave.

Tradition has it that in those days there was a village in the vicinity of the harbour just behind the present Lighter Wharf, founded by an Arab immigrant. The other village was Kilindini where the Ocean Road Hospital now stands.

Seyyid Majid, son of Sultan Seyyid Said of Zanzibar, had for some time thought of establishing a small residence for himself behind the present Lighter Wharf. His dreams came true when Seyyid Majid became Sultan of Zanzibar in 1856. Throughout the 1800s increasing interest was shown in Dar es Salaam harbour and although efforts continued to use Bagamoyo, Dar es Salaam was rapidly being recognised as a larger sheltered deep harbour.

Seyyid Majid decided to make it an alternative sea port and a new town of more than 100,000 people. Dar es Salaam as a cooler and more peaceful residence in East Africa was rapidly accepted by Seyyid Majid in September, 1869. Dar es Salaam attracted some 1,000 people mainly for the sake of their health.

Unfortunately Seyyid Majid died in 1870 and was succeeded by his brother Seyyid Barghash who took no interest in the new settlement and soon Dar es Salaam fell into decay. A hurricane in 1873 devastated Dar es Salaam. So both the death of Majid and the hurricane ended the short Arab influence but the other trade equivalent small port facilities were built in 1880.

The town was revived by the arrival in 1883 of German in 1883 the town, with some 5,000 inhabitants, was granted to the German East African Company and in 1887 a small trading station and military settlement marked the beginning of the German era at Dar es Salaam.

There was strong opposition from Bagamoyo that Dar es Salaam should not be used as an alternative port or seat of Government. However, already the Imperial German Government had by then purchased the position of his investiture from Sultan Barghash for £200,000 and occupied the town in 1891.

It was used as a German military depot until in 1891 (the seat of Government was transferred from Bagamoyo to Dar es Salaam which became the capital of the German East Africa colony). The physical and marine difficulties which had been raised by those opposing Dar es Salaam were proved wrong when in 1892 a steamer was raised from the harbour. Local disturbances and sporadic fighting were subdued.

Several commercial enterprises moved over from Zanzibar and a Customs Department was created. A few port and marine facilities were established, the buying of the African harbour entrance began in 1891 and the construction of a lighthouse on the outer coral reef was completed in 1894.

During this period one reads from records that cargo was man-handled into lighters, transferred to sheds and warehouses. Mention is made of a floating dock having been put into service in 1902. The fleet of coastal craft continued to grow and as Dar es Salaam was a military depot for German East Africa — and a naval base — repair facilities became necessary and a dock-yard was built near the entrance to the Southern Creek.

During this period the Germans erected a number of important buildings. The High Court and the other Government offices along Avani Road, The City Hall also belongs to this period. St. Joseph's Cathedral, the Lutheran Church and the present Ocean Road Hospital were also built then. The growth of the town was further stimulated by the start of the Central Railway Line and supply of electricity.

In order to facilitate the unloading of railway materials a small Railway Contractor jetty was built at Dar es Salaam in 1900 during which year a large Customs warehouse was being constructed. A better quay equipped with cranes had a link with the town by road and rail. This wharf, which was officially opened in 1907, was known as the Town Quay. Today it is a dock-yard with berths built near the Lighters. Although Dar es Salaam took longer to have deep-water berths, plans for them were considered as early as 1906.

All development ceased during the First World War. However, in 1921 important developments took place when sites at Dar es Salaam and Kilgona were leased to the Belgian Government to facilitate the handling of traffic to and from Eastern Congo.

Under the Milner-Oriz convention Britain undertook to grant freedom of transit across East Africa to all traffic to and from the Congo, Rwanda and Burundi.

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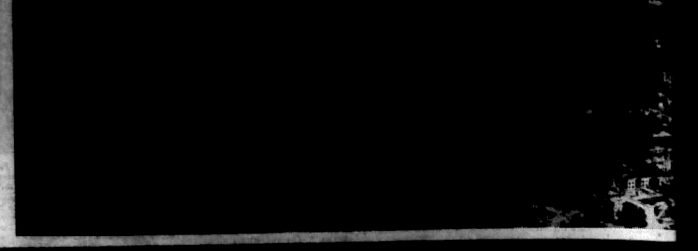

## Unused potential of Mtwara for future

Mtwara is an entirely new port and although there is no doubt it was used during the show era, its modern development unlike that of the other East African ports was not sparked off by railway building.

The Railway Administration, Bagamoyo as a port and seat of Government, and similarly when Tanga was intentionally developed to stimulate plantation agriculture and European settlement. In the case of Mtwara, although there was a vital wharf built about 1920, the original initiative for the construction of a new port came from the managing agents for the Overseas Food Corporation known otherwise as the Groundnuts Scheme in 1947.

Had the groundnut scheme not stopped, Mtwara would have been a prosperous private port. The work on clearing the site began in February, 1948, and other preliminary works included building staff quarters, opening a quay, constructing a blockyard, workshop and storage sheds.

Apart from the shortage of labour, several setbacks in Mtwara in 1950, another blow to Mtwara. Even now, Mtwara with all modern port facilities remains underutilised, as few ships call there.

The storm which hit the area in 1952 affected labourers who were diverted to emergency operations elsewhere. The two stages of developments in Mtwara which had deep water berths opened in 1954 do not follow the pattern established elsewhere in East Africa.

Despite its being a superior natural deep harbour, Mtwara has never been able to overcome its disadvantageous situation.

The ports of Kilindini and Lindi also were a challenge to Mtwara's survival. Most of all it is the presence of a large incomeless hinterland which despite its economic potentialities remains underdeveloped.

After 1951 local production factors and world market prices did not warrant continuation of the Groundnuts Scheme and all earlier hopes by Mtwara to become another Mombasa were drastically reduced.

Very recently there was hope that Zambia traffic would pass through this port. However, soon after adding several facilities and a shed in readiness for Zambia traffic, the road difficulties, particularly bridges and the gradient, have made it impossible for this hope to be achieved.

Few tonnages of copper went through the port for one year. Recently the production and processing of Cashew nuts in large quantities is one of the hopes to bring back life to Mtwara when steel production has declined.

As for the future of Mtwara port, most reliance can be put on the current plans by the Government to open up the Southern Region with more economic activities.

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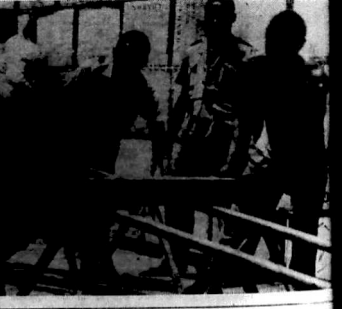

# No effort spared to make City Players satire a winner

Despite the implications of its title, it seems that the organisers of *How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying* are working pretty hard.

Not that I have ever known the Nairobi City Players ever try to succeed in show business without really trying, but the occasional rumours I hear that the rehearsal seats is indicative that there is some concentrated effort going on.

Cracking the whip for this production is Alice Dale, whose first musical production for the City Players was *Gypsy* and *Dolls* which, for me at any rate, was their best to date.

As Alvin Karpis was also produced, it is interesting to note that the Theatre Group, including *Warrior's* Charles, have more recently the pastime, *The Sleeping Beauty*. This is, of course, no stranger to the techniques of either musical or dramatic production, but it was trained in one of the hardest and most unglamorous schools — the Scottish variety stage — and has been seen in her earlier productions.

As a producer she also has the gift of being able to put herself into every individual part and coax her cast into shape without losing sight of the overall picture. The result you will be able to judge for yourself at the National Theatre next week.

The City Players, in case you had not noticed, have a habit of cropping up.

I see from the latest dispatches from the Mombasa Theatre Club that the Nairobi group has offered to produce the work for next month's production, which is set in Paris about 1900. The principal actors playing *Reverence*, fresh from his triumphs in *Gypsy* and *Dolls*, is the well-known actor, who is set in Paris about 1900. 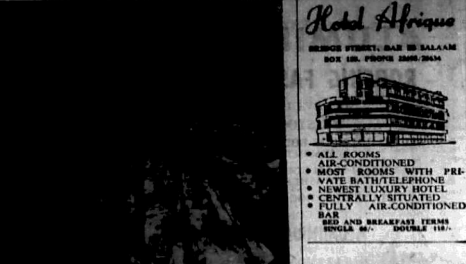

# Shape of things to come on the East Africa pop scene

It is often some weeks before new releases in Britain and Australia reach East Africa, and so for pop music fans today a few details of some of the discs that have come out during the last month so they will have an idea what they will be playing themselves and hearing on the radio soon. Most of the numbers have not made the overseas charts yet.

The *Beat*, by Simon and Garfunkel, is their first single since *Mrs. Robinson*, and is already doing well in the British and American hit parades. The mellow duet, which is the duo's characteristic sound, with rippling guitar accompaniment and throbbing bass, is not so instantly catchy as *Mrs. Robinson*, but a few playings make it easily liked. On this occasion there is a background orchestra which makes its presence felt half-way through and dominates the proceedings towards the end.

The lyrics, as usual for Simon and Garfunkel, have more meaning than in many pop songs, and are a fascinating study in tonalities.

Already established hit in America, *Oh Happy Day* introduced something new in the line of pop music. It is taken from an L.P. called *Let Us Go Into the House of the Lord*, has the lyrics of a Negro Spiritual, but its infectious, bubbling sound has endeared it to fans of all kinds of pop music.

Recorded by the Edward Hawkins Singers, formerly the North California Youth Choir, which drew its members from Pentecostal Churches in the San Francisco area, it is a frank attempt to make the gospel go pop. It has survived attempts by some U.S. broadcasting stations, to ban it on account of its religiosity.

Its compelling and easily singable

sound should make it a hit in East Africa.

The first *Beat* singles for two years show him in a more mature "middle-class" style, which is topping the L.P. charts, it is a reflection on a waning year which makes a melodic ballad backed by a singing organ and gentle bass.

The *Kinks'* latest single *Flamingo* has been chosen as the L.P.C. television for the use of the three-letter word "boom". The lyric "plastic legs that go right up to his plastic boots".

Although the number has been played on radio, the cameras turned away when they tried to sing the word on television.

His comment: "Society everyone knows what a bum it is so ridiculous. They've even asked me to say 'boom' instead. I agree with his judgment, but in view of all the fun, wouldn't 'boom' have been an agreeable compromise?"

Tom Jones' latest, *Love Me Tender*, has a faster tempo than usual for him, but it is so enjoyable for that. It has a full L.P. backing along with the lyrics providing a fitting backing.

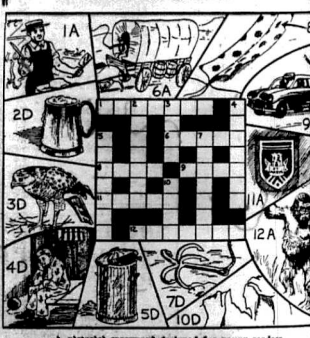
