Lightning strike sends Apollo controls haywire Space men in launch drama

America's Apollo 12 spacecraft was struck by lightning when it was launched towards the Moon in hair-raising conditions last night.

Rain pelled down and lightning flashed across the sky as the spacecraft lifted off from Cape Kennedy and ground crews held their breath when the mission commander, Charles Conrad, reported that some of his controls had gone haywire.

The whole episode was described by the astronauts later as "our big bit".

Conrad radiated back to ground: "I think we got hit by lightning... we had everything in the world drop out... there were so many alarm lights on that we couldn't read them all!"

The astronauts separated from the Saturn rocket and floated with the lunar module. The launch, watched by President Nixon, had become a race against time as the bad weather closed in on Cape Kennedy.

Later, Apollo 12 drifted out of Earth orbit and set off on its 11-day voyage to the Moon.

U.K. AGREES TO LEAVE LIBYA

The Middle East News Agency reported from Tripoli yesterday that Britain had agreed to Libya's request for British evacuation from the country and termination of the 1953 Anglo-Libyan friendship treaty.

The agency has also announced that Libya has issued a decree nationalising all foreign banks in the country. The only Libyan member of the council is chairman, Col. Muammar Gaddafi.

Other members of the council include the bank's directors and the bank's shareholders.

The decree also stipulated that the shares owned by Libyans in the companies should be sold to the state for a price of not less than 25 per cent of the face value.

Mayor planning to ignore Kanu resignation rule

The Mayor of Mombasa, Coun. Masfiah Kombo, yesterday challenged the validity of the Kanu rule requiring all Mayors and councillors to resign their posts before making elections to Parliament.

He declared that he was going to ignore "this unlawful behaviour" and go ahead with plans to contest the Mombasa constituency in the forthcoming general election.

Coun. Kombo, who was one of the four Kenya mayors affected by the rule announced from Kanu headquarters in Nairobi, on Thursday, said the order was not only surprising but also a bad precedent for the future.

He said at the same time a resolution and an M.P. yesterday announced his resignation from the council in protest against the Kanu directive.

Two other members of the council, Mr. W. N. Mwanjumba and Mr. M. E. O. Ombao, who were also contesting Parliamentary election in the Mombasa West and Mombasa South constituencies respectively, also yesterday announced their resignations.

Coun. Julius Boyo, who is also secretary-general of the Mombasa branch of the Kenya Workers' and Peasants' Organisation, said he was of the order as it did not set a precedent. "If it is confirmed, I shall have to think of the official policy I shall have to take."

Four to die for part in Congo coup attempt

A court martial in Brazzaville has sentenced four men to death for their part in a coup attempt which the Anzab Government said it crushed last week.

The four men were condemned to death for their role in the coup attempt which was organised in a meeting in Brazzaville on November 20 and 21.

Another 20 persons were acquitted of the charges. The trial was held in a court martial presided over by the former prime minister, Pierre Moukoko.

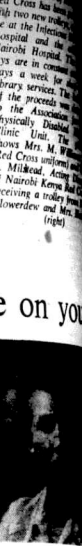

A forecast that East African Airways would become one of East Africa's major single foreign currency earners was made by the Minister for Communications, Research and Social Services, Mr. J. S. Maloleka, yesterday.

Mr. Maloleka was speaking when he presented the accounts of the corporation for 1968 at yesterday's session of the African Legislative Assembly in Kampala.

He said that, during the year, the foreign exchange earnings of the corporation amounted to Ksh.24,130,000, compared with Ksh.19,480,000 in 1967.

He noted there had been a record number of passengers and that the surplus in operations amounted to about Ksh.1,475,000, compared with the previous year's figure of about Ksh.220,000.

The total number of passengers carried was 22 per cent more than in 1967, a record figure of 521,989 of whom 245,113 travelled on the domestic routes and 76,876 on the international routes.

Frequencies had been increased and flights had been inaugurated to Greece and Hongkong.

Mr. Maloleka said that the airline had been increased to Europe during 1968, with the airline now operating to Athens, Rome, Paris, Frankfurt, Copenhagen and London.

However, the Minister pointed out, although profits had been good they would have been better but for the acute competition on the international services at water level.

Foreign operators increased their share of the air services further, he said.

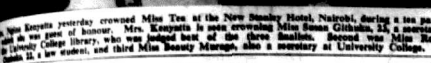

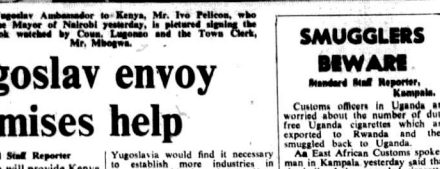

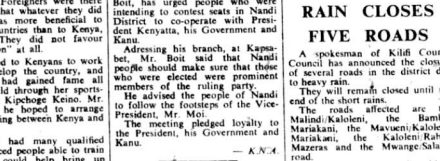

Refugee camps under control of commandos

A United Nations spokesman at U.N. headquarters in New York has admitted that Arab commandos are in control of a number of U.N. administered Palestinian refugee camps in the Lebanon.

An official report said 14 of the 15 camps — out of 16,000 Palestinian Arabs — were in the hands of commandos and were being used for military training.

After the statement on Thursday by the U.N. spokesman, an angry debate was expected yesterday in the General Assembly's Special Political Committee.

The committee was due to debate a report on the operations of the U.N. Relief and Works Agency, which cares for 1,400,000 Palestine Arabs. But the discussion is expected quickly to focus on the Lebanon situation.

A spokesman said the agency's Commissioner-General, Mr. Laurence Michelmore, had already made representations to the Beirut Government. The Secretary-General U Thant is also considering what action the U.N. may take.

U.N. is in serious financial straits and some diplomats fear that the United States Congress might reconsider a projected \$2,200,000 (about 69,200,000) appropriation for the agency unless the commandos were expelled or assurances were received that U.N. operations were proceeding normally.

In his report to the Assembly, Mr. Michelmore stated that U.N. was 'not responsible for the maintenance of law and order in refugee camps.'

Tough condemnation of South Africa and Portugal's policies was expected to be endorsed yesterday by two U.N. bodies dealing with colonial and racial questions.

Both the U.N. Trusteeship Committee and the Special Political Committee were expected to give a wide measure of support to draft resolutions condemning Portugal's refusal to grant independence to its African territories, and South Africa's policy of separate racial development.

The resolution on Portuguese territories, introduced by a large group of Afro-Asian countries before the trusteeship committee, commends the collaboration between Portugal, South Africa

and the illegal racist minority regime in Southern Rhodesia, which is designed to perpetuate colonialism and oppression in Southern Africa.

The apartheid resolution, introduced yesterday by over thirty Afro-Asian States before the special political committee, calls on all U.N. members to cut off air and sea communications with South Africa.

Informed sources said that African States which insisted to approve Indonesia's absorption of former Dutch New Guinea were influenced by concern for South West Africa, among other considerations.

The sources said that Ghana, Dahomey, Gabon and Togo wanted more time to consider all the aspects of the 'act of free choice' carried out in the territory now known as West Irian, before deciding whether to approve what they felt might be a precedent with far-reaching African consequences.

They were concerned lest at some future date South Africa should invoke the precedent by consulting tribal chiefs in South-West Africa in order to obtain their approval for a takeover.

The 'act of free choice' in West Irian was limited to a consultation of the regional authorities in the primitive territory.

At the United Nations itself U.N. staff were evacuated from an office building on New York's East Side, a bomb had been placed to go off in premises in Lexington Avenue, where the U.N. lease two floors for its publications department.

The charge was made in a Mogadishu radio broadcast on Thursday night by the official spokesman of the Supreme Revolutionary Council, Colonel Mohammed Ali Samatar, who said the money was spent between January and October 20, 1969. The army coup which ousted the Egal Government was staged on October 21.

Col. Samatar said the budget passed by the Somali Parliament for the year 1969 only authorised Egal to spend about £35,000.

Quoting figures from records issued by the Revolutionary Council, he said Mr. Egal had in fact spent nearly £1,180,000.

Of this, he said, more than £45,000 went on 'blackmailing' M.P.s as a means of buying their votes.

The M.P.s, he explained, were paid the money on top of their regular Parliamentary salaries.

Mr. Egal had spent a further £20,000 on himself, the Colonel added.

The former Premier was alleged to have misappropriated the money from the Ministry of Finance and other Government institutions.

Col. Samatar promised to give details today of Government spending inside the country before the start of the year. He said the Revolutionary Council would also disclose all foreign aid granted to Somalia since 1960, when independence was achieved, and how this aid was used. — A.F.P.

nation.'

President Nixon added: 'History will record that, in a period of crisis, we met the challenge.'

'I know that when the security of America is involved, when peace for America and for the world is involved, when the lives of our young men are involved, we are not Democrats, we are not Republicans, we are Americans.'

The United States was going through a period of 'very great problems' at home and abroad, President Nixon said: 'Today we have a war that is difficult, that is controversial, so there must be discussion.'

TWO KILLED CHICAGO BATTLE

A policeman and a youth said to belong to the Black Panther movement were killed and seven other policemen and Negro youth wounded in a gun battle in a Black ghetto area on Chicago's South Side.

The battle erupted when patrolman and squad cars went to the area after a call from a man who warned of an attack in an alleyway on an abandoned, burned-out building in an area known to be used by militant Black Panthers.

Some of the snipers were reported to be wearing black berets and, according to police, were expert marksmen.

Patrolman Frank Braxton, 36-year-old father of three, was the first to be shot in the face by a sniper. He was abandoned by a fellow patrolman and died in the hospital.

More E.A. Asians want U.K. visas

The British Government will face a sharp increase in immigration applications from East African Asians in 1970, the secretary of the Committee for Uniting Kingdom Citizenship, Mr. Fratful Patel, has predicted.

A backlog of 5,000 applications has built up since 1968, when legislation restricted the number of special immigration vouchers available to them to 1,500 per year, he said.

The U.K. Citizenship Committee, an all-party body of Members of Parliament and Peers, has urged the Government to increase the special voucher quota to 5,000 for the next two years, or to re-allocate to African Asians unused work vouchers from the 8.5 million annual quota available to Commonwealth citizens.

The Home Office has confirmed that work vouchers can be issued to African Asians providing they have professional qualifications or a job to go to.

Although nearly half of the work vouchers were unused last year, only four were issued to East African Asians, a Home Office spokesman added.

The Home Secretary, Mr. James Callaghan, told Parliament on Wednesday that 29,150 Commonwealth immigrants had come to Britain in the first nine months of this year. — Reuter

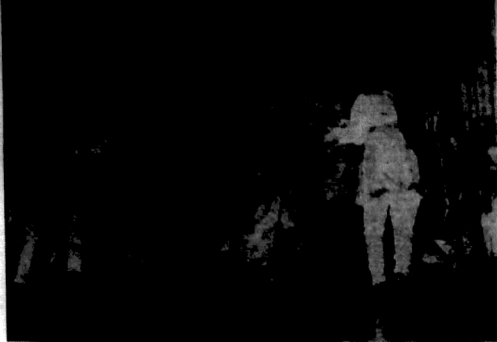

The delegation presented the President with a memorandum relating the history of the school and contained several points which President Kenyatta said the Government would look into.

The third delegation was from Cotu, Nairobi, led by the general secretary, Mr. J. D. Akumu, and several members of the staff. Mr. Akumu on behalf of Cotu gave the President £25 given by Cotu headquarters' staff and another £25 contributed by members of Keneteo staff, all for the Armed Forces Hospital Fund.

The fourth delegation came from Equator High School, Thika, led by the school's headmaster, Mr. C. C. Jant, and also included the school manager, Mr. M. K. Kavan, who gave the President £41 to help destitute children.

The fifth and last was a musical "Up With People" from the United States, which is on a Kenya visit.

The President told the Kirinyaga delegation that their land was very fertile and that they should exploit its resources to get better yields. He urged them to plant cotton and rice as the two crops would do very well in their area and were also in great demand.

Speaking on the forthcoming general elections, President Kenyatta advised the people to vote for the faithful and hard-working candidates who would represent them well.

On education the President reminded them that they should educate their children and bring them up to understand that they were the leaders of tomorrow.

"Thinking those who had contributed to the Armed Forces Hospital," President Kenyatta added, "Self-help projects are very important all over the world and if all the wamanchi take part in them Kenya would be a very progressive country."

Earlier, Mr. Koinange in introducing the delegations to the President said that the people of Kirinyaga were very hard-working as their excellent production of cotton and rice showed.

The third delegation was from Cotu, Nairobi, led by the general secretary, Mr. J. D. Akumu, and his deputy, Mr. Chege, and several members of the staff.

Mr. Akumu on behalf of Cotu gave the President £25 given by Cotu headquarters' staff and other £25 contributed by members of the Armed Forces' Hospital Fund.

The fourth delegation came from Equator High School, Thika, led by the school's headmaster, Mr. C. C. Jani, and also included the school manager, Mr. M. K. Ravan, who gave the President £41 to help destitute children.

The fifth and last was a musical "Up With People" from

the United States, which is on a Kenya visit.

The President told the Kirinyaga delegation that their land was very fertile and that they should exploit its resources to get better yields. He urged them to plant cotton and rice as the two crops would do very well in their area and were also in great demand.

Speaking on the forthcoming general elections, President Kenyatta advised the people to work for the faithful and hard-working candidates who would represent them well.

On education the President reminded them that they should

educate their children and bring them up to understand and over the leaders of tomorrow.

Thanking those who had contributed to the Armed Forces Hospital, President Kenyatta added: "Self-help projects are most important all over the world and if all the women take part in them Kenya would be a very progressive country."

Earlier, Mr. Koinange in introducing the delegations to the President said that the people of Kirinyaga were very hard-working as their excellent production of cotton and rice shows. — K.N.A.

The unprecedented security precautions came amid fresh outbreaks of violence in the wake of Sunday night's vicious fighting between police and radicals using patrol bombs as weapons.

Police reported scattered attacks on police outposts and railway stations yesterday morning — mostly in the Kamata area bordering the airport — and first reports indicated more than 140 students were arrested — at least 1,600

others, including 230 girls, were arrested over the weekend.

The root of the radicals' agitation is their demand for the immediate and unconditional return to Japan of Okinawa, an end to the US-Japan security treaty and removal of all American bases on Japanese soil. Last week they vowed to take over Tokyo Airport and block Mr. Sato from leaving.

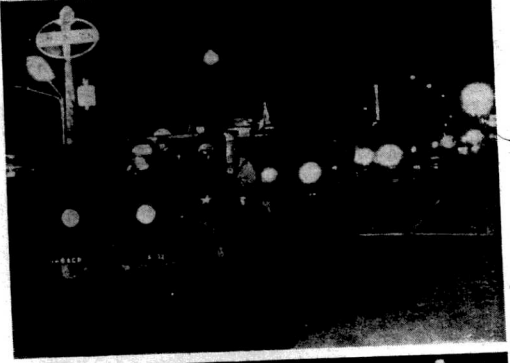

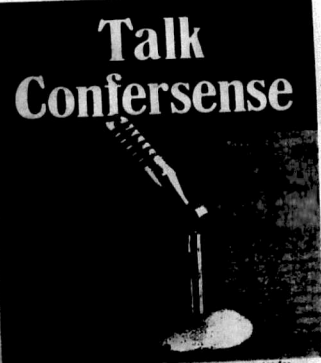

Severe cation for Ouma by F.I.F.A.

Standard Staff Reporter William "Chege" Ouma, the Kenya and Gor Mahia F.C. forward, has been severely cautioned by the world football body, F.I.F.A., for misconduct on the field of play.

F.I.F.A. after a recent disciplinary meeting in Zurich, stated that Ouma's case was brought up following a report from the Ugandan referee, Mr. Kintio-Mubanda, on the East African Challenge Cup match played between Kenya and Tanzania played in Kampala, Uganda, on October 1. Ouma was sent off the field two minutes before the final whistle for throwing the ball at the referee in protest against a decision he had given. Earlier in the game Ouma was warned by the referee for a similar incident.

F.I.F.A. has warned the Kenya Football Council Committee that if any further disciplinary action is taken on Ouma's conduct a more serious view will be taken. Ouma has also been suspended automatically by F.I.F.A. for three international games for being sent off in the Tanzania-Kenya match, which the former team won 3-0. Ouma has missed one international already and is not expected to play for Kenya in the forthcoming game against Westfalia, of West Germany, on December 31.

Kenya has been invited to send a delegation to the IX Ordinary General Assembly of the African Football Confederation in Khartoum, Sudan, on December 10-12. A list of candidates of African national football associations will be submitted to A.F.C. officials at the meeting. Kenya will be invited to send two referees to attend an international coaching course in Khartoum from December 10-12.

The executive officer of the Kenya Football Council Committee, Mr. M. Mwangi, said yesterday: "The decision was shockingly biased. Ouma made a mistake but he was not sent off. It was a disgraceful decision. We are disappointed that the referee, Mr. Kintio-Mubanda, made such a decision. Ouma did not touch the referee. He was only protesting against a decision he had given."

Surprisingly Uganda are not expected to play in any change in their status. Uganda's team is still in the final stages of preparation for the return leg against Kenya in Kampala on November 29, with the threat that they are out to turn the tables on the Kenya side.

Uganda are still complaining about decisions made in the Nairobi event, especially in the lightweight and middleweight contests. The Kampala team manager, Mr. Francis Nyangwe, said: "We are disappointed that the referee, Mr. Peter Manene in the flyweight class. He did enough to beat the Kenyan. and will continue to regulate the volume of credit in the economy as well as to guide the private commercial banks so that their deposits may be channelled into those fields of investments which make the highest contribution to the national development effort.

Health

The aim of Kanu Government is to provide free medical treatment both out-patient and in-patient for all citizens, as well as raising the standard of the service.

In pursuit of this goal Kanu Government have in the last five years made major strides.

Free treatment for children and out-patients has been introduced and it is working well.

Through public funds and self-help programmes hospitals and dispensaries and clinics have been built all over the country to the extent that health facilities available to our people have been more than doubled.

Programmes of public health improvements are being carried out in every district. In addition, other Governmental programmes such as rural electrification and water supply which promote better health are being expanded.

To provide manpower necessary for the expanded national health programme we have more than doubled the training facilities available for doctors, medical assistants, hospital assistants, nurses and others.

Kenya now has its own School of Medicine and its own National Nursing Training College.

Kanu Government will expand and diversify this programme so that we may have a clinic for every village and a doctor for every 10,000 people.

We shall build new hospitals and existing ones will be fully equipped and properly staffed hospitals. The Kanu Government will take over the planning, financing and programming of health services from Local Authorities to ensure a more equitable distribution of health facilities and also their rapid and orderly expansion.

The hospitals now operated by voluntary organisations, including missionaries will receive larger grants-in-aid and their development programmes shall be fully integrated with the national development plans for health services.

Our programme for the eradication of tsetse flies, mosquitoes, etc. shall be doubled.

Public health education shall be expanded in collaboration with the

Education

The Kanu Government is guided by the principle that every child in Kenya shall have a minimum of seven years' free education.

In pursuance of that great objective our first requirement has been to provide the necessary school facilities and teachers.

We have, therefore, in the last five years built through public funds and self-help programmes numerous new primary schools to the extent that 70 per cent of the children of school age are now enrolled. Actual enrolment in primary schools has increased from 360,000 to 1,200,000 and is projected to increase to 2,000,000 during our new Plan period.

The output of teachers has more than doubled. The expansion in secondary schools has resulted in a more than threefold increase in the enrolment between 1964 and 1967.

The curriculum has been at all levels improved and modified to ensure that people are trained and prepared for a contribution to the development process of our nation.

We are now poised for a great leap forward in the expansion and diversification of our education.

Our primary and secondary schools will be expanded to cover other parts of the Republic. For Kanu believes that only a healthy child can utilise the opportunities provided by the school to develop to the full his intellectual potentials.

The building of harambee primary and secondary schools through self-help shall be expanded but shall also be better coordinated through District Development Committees to ensure maximum utilisation. More harambee schools

necessary to man the various institutions in our country.

Finally it remains Kanu's commitment that education shall be regarded as to prepare our youth for their role in the building of an independent, self-reliant and truly African nation.

Land

Since independence, Kanu Government has been guided by two objectives:

First, to intensify the programme of land consolidation and reclamation as a prerequisite to the intensification of modernised and mechanised agricultural production so as to raise farm incomes throughout the country.

The amount of land which has been surveyed and registered is now well over 1,600,000 hectares.

This programme shall be intensified and a further 7,400,000 hectares registered by 1974.

Our second objective has been to resettle African farmers on land previously occupied by foreigners.

This programme has been more successful than any similar programme anywhere else in the world.

We have in a short space of five years resettled more than 50,000 families or more than 300,000 people.

While this has been achieved there has been no loss in production.

In fact the production of wheat, maize, milk, pyrethrum, wool and other products has doubled from those same farms where resettlement has been carried out.

The Government will acquire all abandoned and mismanaged farms for the purpose of resettlement of those that are now landless.

The squatter problem will receive special attention. Already more than 14,000 families have been settled, those remaining will be settled during the next few years.

Kanu Government will continue the policy that no citizen, whether individual or company, shall be allowed to buy agricultural land in Kenya.

The programme of loans for purchase of land shall be continued and enlarged.

The pastoral areas in Kenya will in particular benefit from the programme of water supply and land reclamation and range management which the Government have introduced.

The Kanu Government will not tolerate the holding of unutilised large tracts of land by anyone who is not allowed to make use of the country's needs to make use of all available land in order to secure rapid and widespread development.

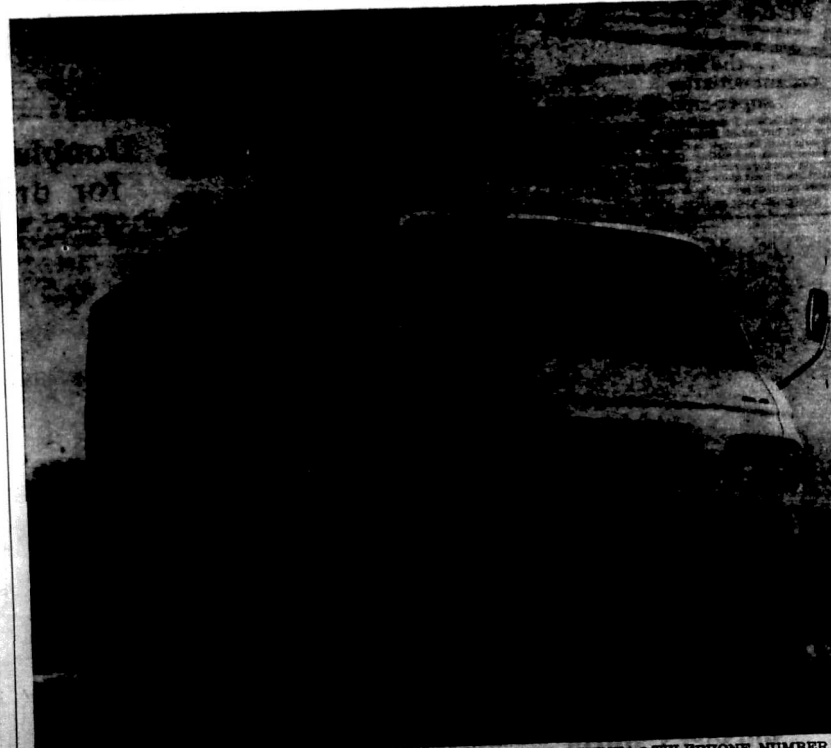

The veteran film director, Mr. Alfred Hitchcock, now 71, has finally deserted make-believe spies in his 51st film, the dramatic world of real-life espionage. It is *Topaz*, based on Leon Uris's best-selling book about the Cuban missile crisis and alleged Russian espionage in the French Cabinet.

"At least it is possible to inject some humour into them," he said. "There is precious little humour in real life espionage."

Real life spy stories have their complications of libel and diplomatic offence as Mr. Hitchcock saw when he set out to direct with Leon Uris's book has never found a publisher in France although translations found some way there from Montreal.

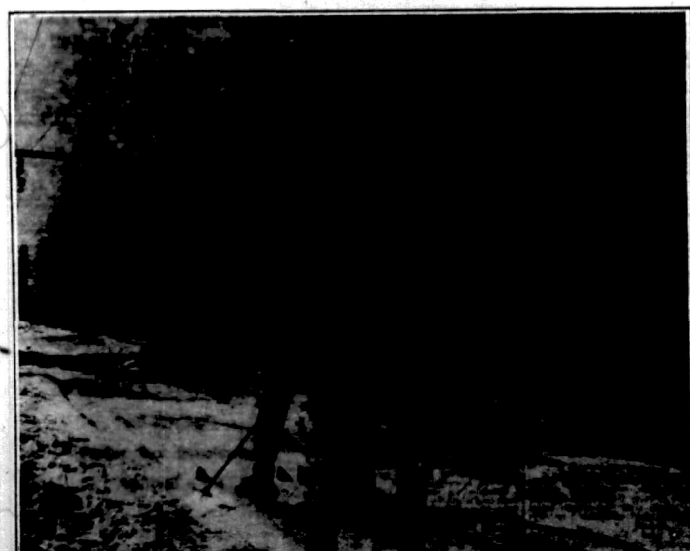

Elections must be orderly says P.C.

It was the hope of President Kenyatta that the coming elections will be conducted as orderly as possible, since there will be no hot topics involved, the P.C. for Eastern Province, Mr. E. M. Mahibu, told a hot baraza at Kitui yesterday.

From next year, the Government will take over from local authorities such as education, health, roads and the collection of G.P.T., the P.C. said.

The fact that there was only one political party in the country and all candidates belonged to that party had made it easier for the public to choose candidates, as all they would have to do was to judge each of them according to his record and character.

Mr. Mahibu, who was on his first leg of addressing barazas in the province to explain the procedure to be followed during the elections, warned that it was wrong for anyone to direct another whom he or she should vote for.

Even former M.P.s should not try to influence people to reveal their choice as a right. The choice was entirely on the people themselves.

All candidates would be accorded equal opportunities in address, the P.C. said, and all would be held in legally licensed meetings and there will be no bias or favouritism.

Speaking on thuggery and intimidation, he warned that nobody would be allowed to behave with impunity. He said that there was one area of the province where cases of would-be voters for candidates were being pierced

with a piece of metal as a election mark to get them identified. "This is thuggery and most brutal", Mr. Mahibu said, and could not be allowed to continue. About 100 people had been rounded up for questioning, he said.

Mr. Mahibu, who was introduced to the baraza by the District Commissioner, Mr. J. P. J. Bonyo, earlier held a separate meeting with all district officers, chiefs and sub-chiefs in the Kitui County Council chamber and warned them not to align themselves with any candidates.

Mr. Bonyo told the baraza that the election would be held on only one day, December 6, and whoever did not cast his vote that day would miss voting altogether.

To help the public, the number of polling booths would be increased from 43 to 77.

Mr. Bonyo said chiefs must be able to identify their people during voting and be able to control the crowds. He appealed to them to be completely impartial.

Province's earnings set a record

Income from crops and livestock in Eastern Province in 1968 reached a record figure of £7,107,448 9s. the P.C., Mr. E. M. Mahibu, revealed in his annual report. This was a tremendous improvement on the report noted, as total income for 1967 was only £4,905,560. Farm earnings reached £5,372,121, compared with £4,579,938 in 1966, and livestock products fetched £1,735,327 against £1,325,621.

Coffee continued to be the overall key cash crop and carried £1,152,982 16s., compared with £1,367,257 7s. in 1967. The breakdown of earnings was: Fern, £2,202,966; Embu, £279,741; Machakos, £370,070 7s.; and Kitui, £209 4s.

A significant increase was that of vegetables, which jumped from eleventh place in 1967 to second overall place and earned £753,638 7s., compared with £39,764. Third place went to pulses, which earned £498,579 against £288,511 5s.

Miraa, grown only in Nyanbembe Hills of Meru, earned £370,640 compared to £272,556 the previous year. Make production went up substantially from an income of £70,895 to a record figure of £70,895.

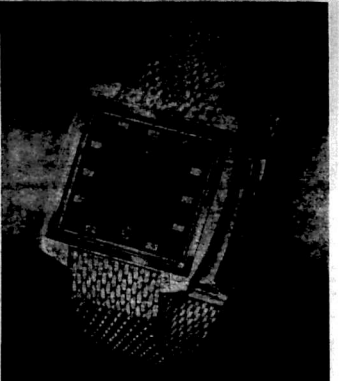
Favourable weather increased earnings from £69,093 to £100,200. Another substantial improvement was that of cotton from £48,002 to £87,939. It jumped from an overall sixth place to seventh place in 1968.

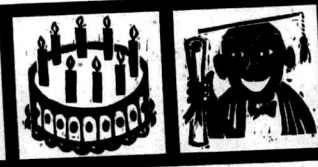

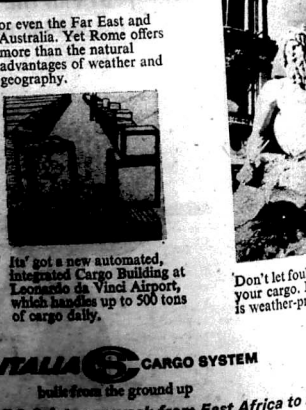
