One-party State not for Kenya ays Minister

Kenya had no intention of becoming a one-party State, the Minister for Education and Science, Mr. Mungai, said yesterday. With the Minister for Commerce and Industries, Mr. Kibaki, he was addressing a Press conference in Harambee House, Nairobi, on matters connected with the elections.

Dr. Mungai, who said similar meetings would be held weekly to brief local and overseas journalists during the election period, added that the Government did not intend to keep Kenya a one-party State by law but would leave the door open for any people who were dissatisfied to form another party.

He said the security situation in Kenya was very good. Nyanza was quiet and calm after the recent disturbance when President Kenyatta visited Kisumu to open the Russian-aided hospital.

Many people had come forward to support the Government saying that Nyanza could not be left behind. There were no 'organised or disorganised groups' backing the banned K.P.U. Some people had felt they were being intimidated previously and had not come forward as election candidates, but they were now doing so. Candidates in the province were men of good calibre, including lawyers, headmasters, university graduates and school servants.

There would be free elections in the North-Eastern Province as in other places. There was no K.P.U. there and the people had put up many candidates.

Dr. Mungai pointed out that two former K.P.U. officials, Mr. Kagia — who until his resignation had been allowed to take part in the elections. The decision rested with President Kenyatta in the case of other former K.P.U. prospective candidates.

Kanu was not going to give any individual candidate support and it would also not come out to support any individual candidate. He said there had been no direct criticism of the Kanu Manifesto since 1963, but people had asked for more to be done, for example, in education and for health facilities to be extended to the rural areas. They had also asked for more land for settlement and employment was worrying some.

At the end of the conference, Dr. Mungai organised reports made by some overseas newspapers on the health of President Kenyatta. He said, 'I enjoyed very good health and was continually active'. Mr. Kibaki said that the purpose of the conference was to have a free and honest discussion with the people of this country. He said that they were all well and he was happy to have a proper background of what was going on in the country. Government after that questions on anything you want to write it.

On the election, he said that it was free for all election. Mr. Kibaki said in electing candidates would be speaking on the Kanu Manifesto. They would be invited to share a platform during the campaign.

Mombasa's Mayor not to stand for election

Three of the four Kenya mayors who on Tuesday announced their intention to stand for election as M.P.s formally resigned yesterday. They were Samson Odoyo, the Mayor of Nakuru, Coun. Geoffrey Kamau, and the Mayor of Thika, Coun. D. K. Mundia.

The Mayor of Mombasa, Councillor Maullu Kombu, changed his mind and in a surprise announcement said he no longer planned to contest the Mombasa South seat.

Councillor Kombu told reporters he would not be contesting any Parliamentary seat. On Tuesday he had announced that he was complying with the new Kanu rules requiring him to resign as Mayor if he intended to stand for election.

He said in a brief statement yesterday: 'In the light of the recent directive of the party (Kanu), I have given serious thought to the matter and I have now finally decided not to contest any Parliamentary seat.

'I am very grateful to all my supporters and sincerely hope that they will take my decision in good spirit.'

Stressing that he was still a member of Kanu, Coun. Kombu said he would always remain a loyal member of the party and called on all members to support Kanu's Government.

MAURITIUS RESISTS RUSSIAN ADVANCES

'White' funeral Mass for Mr. Kennedy

A "white" Mass funeral will be held today for Mr. Joseph P. Kennedy, multi-millionaire head of the Kennedy clan, who died on Tuesday.

Cardinal Richard Cushing of Boston, a close friend and spiritual adviser to the Kennedy family, will celebrate the Mass in St. Francis Xavier Roman Catholic church in Hyannis, a few miles from the Kennedy compound in Hyannisport, Massachusetts.

The "white" funeral was originated at the Vatican Two Ecumenical Council. It symbolizes resurrection. Previously, only Catholics were buried.

Mr. Kennedy, who served as American Ambassador to Britain before the war, died on Tuesday after a heart attack. He had been an invalid since he suffered a major stroke in December, 1967.

Members of his family, including Mr. Kennedy's wife, Josephine Kennedy, and Mrs. Rose Kennedy, widow of President John F. Kennedy, were at Mr. Kennedy's funeral today.

MALAWI MAGISTRATES TO TRY DEATH CASES

Malawi's local courts will be able to try murder and manslaughter cases and impose the death penalty under legislation passed by Parliament in Zambia.

Previously capital cases have been tried only in the High Court and the right of appeal from judgments in such cases has been suspended.

The new Act for the Local Courts Amendment, which was passed by Parliament in Zambia, will give the High Court judges the right to try capital cases.

Japan begins vital talks with U.S.

President Nixon and the Japanese Premier, Mr. Eisaku Sato, have started vital talks concerning the return of Okinawa to Japanese administration, and on thorny trade problems.

The United States will in all likelihood continue to use their military base at Okinawa even after returning it to Japan in 1972. But they are almost certain to stop stocking atomic bombs there unless a grave international crisis makes it necessary for them to request Tokyo's permission to do so.

The communique will probably be couched in vague and general terms, indicating only that Okinawa's recovery into a nuclear base would be envisaged only if it was necessary for the defence of Japan or of the neighbouring areas.

Okinawa, like the mid-Pacific island of Guam, has been the base from which the B-52 heavy bombers take off for their raids against Communist positions in South Vietnam.

It is also used secretly for stocking huge quantities of neuro-toxic gas, which is still stored there although it was supposed to have been removed from July 22.

Another major item on the agenda is U.S.-Japan trade. U.S. purchases in Japan now exceed its sales by \$3,500,000,000 yearly.

To reduce its Japan trade deficit, the U.S. is seeking the removal — at a faster tempo — of Japanese import restrictions and limitations for Japanese textile exports.

Some sources indicate that the U.S. side might try to link trade issues with the return of Okinawa, but officially there will be no connection between the two subjects.

Astronauts make first voyage back to Earth

Astronauts Charles Conrad and Alan Bean blasted into orbit around the Moon yesterday aboard the landing craft Intrepid on the first stage of their voyage back to Earth.

"Right down the pike," Conrad reported as the tiny craft rocketed towards orbit. "Oh, look at that rill down there," the spaceman said. As he read off the ever-increasing altitudes above the lunar surface, Bean exclaimed: "What a hot machine."

The command and lunar module linked up again in orbit around the Moon at 1801 G.M.T. yesterday in a perfect docking operation.

The docking ended the most crucial phase of the Apollo-12 voyage. A failure to achieve docking successfully could have resulted in a tragedy as complete as had the Intrepid failed to get off the Moon.

The landing module was piloted by Charles Conrad and Alan Bean, scheduled to crawl through the lunar surface on foot for half an hour, bringing with them their samples of lunar rocks.

Earlier, Conrad and Bean became the first men to take two walks aboard the lunar surface. They were seen on one- and-a-half-hour trips by the large-antenna first station.

News of the appointment was given at the Vatican in Rome by Pope Paul and in Nairobi by the Apostolic Pro-Nuncio for Kenya and Tanzania, Mgr. Pfluegl.

The most spectacular moment of the walk came as they arrived at the edge of the crater behind Surveyor. In order to make the 50 yards descent into the crater the men roped themselves together like mountain climbers. Just before the climb down the Houston Space Centre authorised them to extend their walks from the scheduled three-and-a-half to four hours.

When they eventually reached the Surveyor, they reported it in fairly good condition but said it appeared to have been damaged, probably during its bumpy landing when its braking rockets malfunctioned.

"They also found that the probe's original pale blue and white paint had been scuffed a dull grey by the heat of the Sun. Among parts of the Surveyor which they detached to bring back to Earth were a television camera and a section of tube filled with special bacteriological cultures designed to establish whether bacteria can survive under lunar conditions.

The Apollo-12 mission set a number of records—The two astronauts walked for nearly eight hours on the Moon, compared to two hours and 40 minutes for the first Moon walk.

They walked over 1,800 metres on the Moon surface. The distance covered by Armstrong and Aldrin was not measured, but is estimated to be 75 metres for Armstrong and Aldrin.

They also set up a nuclear-powered mail-bombardier on the Moon's surface which will continue to send information back to Earth for a year.

Conrad admitted that the world would not see the colour photographs he took shortly after landing on the Moon, of the Earth rising over the lunar horizon. He left them behind on the Moon.

Struggling in the Moon's one-sixth gravity to place soil samples in special bags, he said: "Come on, get out of there. If I didn't know, I'd swear it was a wind-up toy. It never had enough in it to sample bags in a stream of strong particles streaming through lines in the sand."

Ground control kept up its exchange of banter with the astronauts, telling Conrad the semimobile place on the Moon earlier had recorded his "hunder-ty" footsteps.

Conrad threw a Moon rock along the surface, bounce as Earth scientists checked the recording instruments. "That's sounding fine and cheerful but that dropped up in their first sort," said they were sorry they could not walk longer on the lunar surface.

"We could work here eight or nine hours," Conrad told ground control.

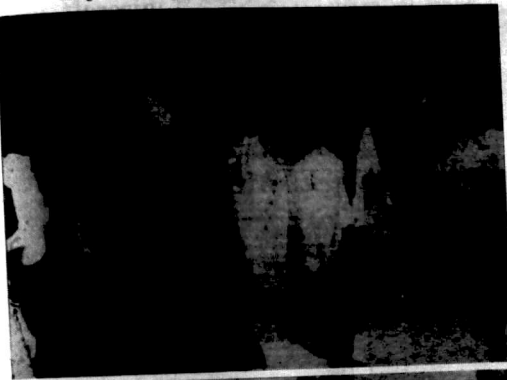

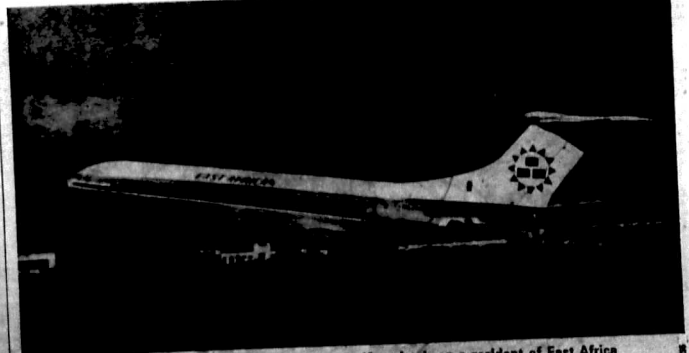

FARMING REVIEW

Controlling the menace of stock parasites

The parasites which infest stock are many and varied, and virtually all fall into two general categories, external and internal. These groups are self-explanatory — external parasites attack the animal from the outside, that is on or through the skin, whilst internal parasites are to be found in the intestines, liver and other organs.

External parasites include ticks, fleas, lice and mites. They may live their entire life on the animal, or merely use the animal as a means for blood meals to sustain their development, such as the tsetse fly. They affect the health of the animal in many ways, by causing irritation, interfering with skin circulation, and by transmitting the seeds of disease. The irritation may lead to severe scratching and self-mutilation which allows for the entry of further disease-carrying bacteria.

Most external parasites such as ticks, fleas and lice, of course, this is particularly so in the case of the tick. The least of these from most parasites can lead to severe anaemia. Finally they may be vectors or carriers of specific disease.

In East Africa the relationship between the tick and the various diseases it may carry are vitally important. Unless such tick-borne diseases as East Coast Fever, Anaplasmosis, or Redwater are controlled there is no possibility of rearing and breeding exotic or exotic stock.

The control of such parasites is normally carried out by applying insecticides to the infested animal. The application may be in various forms, such as a dust, spray or dip and spray, as in the case of ticks, or as a pour-on, as in the case of lice. The aim is to kill the parasites on the animal and to prevent them from re-infesting the animal as far as possible. This latter is called residual effect.

Because such parasites do not always live their entire life on the host animal, other methods of control which generally mean to effect good hygiene and management are also important. A simple example would be the dog flea. If you keep the animal's bedding clean at all times you will get a significant step towards ensuring that the dog is clear of fleas.

The insecticides used today are almost entirely chemicals from the Organophosphorus and Dithiocarbamate groups. As such they can be toxic if not used properly. It is essential for both the animal and the person carrying out the treatment that the labels of all insecticidal preparations are read properly and followed accurately. If this simple precaution is taken

anders insecticides are perfectly safe in every way.

Internal parasites, as has already been pointed out, live inside the animal body. They normally take the form of worms either round, flat or tape. Unlike external parasites they are not carriers of disease, but if they are present in large numbers they can cause a state of emaciation and death. In most cases, when they are everywhere, it is because of a failure to deworm. Internal parasites become greater and greater.

In nature, animals normally live with small numbers of internal parasites quite happily. However, where there is intensification of stock there is even greater intensification of parasites. They affect the animal by feeding on blood and intestinal contents and by damaging the organs they live in, say the stomach lining, reference gastric intestinal worms or the liver as far as the fluke is concerned.

Again the research chemist has come to the aid of the farmer and many dewormers or vermifuges are on the market which clear the animal of the parasites. This sort of treatment leaves no residual effect and must often be carried out regularly to protect the animal. As with external parasites, regular deworming should be combined with good management. Where possible, stock should be kept in the same contaminated field from which they come. Chemicals used internally are normally less toxic for obvious reasons than those used externally, but again the proper dose must always be given. Over-dosing may lead to toxicity and death.

We have made no mention so far of blood parasites which are usually present in the system of the animal life. These consist of many various diseases such as East Coast Fever, Cattle Tick Pyrethroidosis, and others. These minute parasites are carried by other parasite vectors such as flies or ticks so that the control of one parasite is tied up with that of another.

The economic losses to the farmer caused by general stock parasites in deaths, loss of condition and general unfitness are incalculable. It is certain that the light to control them will become more and more vital as farming progresses in East Africa. All the most modern drugs are available to local farmers and it is time to use them wisely and effectively if he is to go to the end of his tether.

The cost of proper control, though perhaps somewhat high times, will be returned many fold over by allowing stock to develop under conditions where parasites both internal and external are kept to a minimum.

INSTITUTE'S ROLE IN FIGHT AGAINST PESTS

The basic function of the East African Tropical Pesticides Research Institute is to test and develop new chemical compounds for their value in controlling many different pests that are harmful to mankind or damage crops grown in East Africa. The range of pesticides currently under study at this Institute includes those for use against insects (insecticides) such as tsetse flies, mosquitoes and insect pests of cotton, sisal, beans and sugar cane, and those of the elimination of weeds and scrub (herbicides). Chemicals are also being screened for the control of bilharzia-carrying snails (molluscicides).

Herbicides are being studied against weeds in sugar cane, wheat, coffee-plantations, french-beans and lettuce leopards.

Different chemical compounds are also evaluated for the control of fungal diseases of plants and trees (fungicides), the most notorious disease being, of course, Coffee Rust Disease.

In addition to examining new chemical compounds for their potential value as pesticides, this Institute is also very much concerned with the development of techniques for the most effective and economical way of applying them, and its research activities include the development of spraying equipment and the development of techniques for applying the pesticides.

In research staff includes scientists of many branches such as chemistry, entomology, physics, botany, and plant pathology, and engineering. Their combined effort has enhanced the Institute's activities which have helped in the development of East Africa.

Large areas of the world have been freed from malaria control due to the development of the synthetic residual, insecticide now internationally known as D.D.T. Much of the basic field research of this insecticide was done by this Institute first in the Katanga area of Uganda in 1946, then in the Taveta area of Kenya in 1953 and in the Mbulu area of Tanzania in 1963.

This Institute also began to experiment with aerial application of insecticides against tsetse flies in 1948. Ultra low volume spraying techniques have reduced the cost of application of insecticides against tsetse from £1,000 to £100 per square mile.

These research activities are fruitful in Zambia where the methods of thermal exhaust spraying of insecticide, developed by this Institute in 1946, is being used to control tsetse flies in 100 square miles of grasslands intended for cattle rearing.

A little known compound a few years ago — N-tritylchlorobenzene — was found by this Institute to be very effective for the control of bilharzia-carrying snails. The compound suitably formulated is now widely available as a proprietary product.

Studies on the insect pests of sisal have now led to general recommendations for control of sisal-worm in plantations. By developing low volume techniques of aerial application of insecticide concentrates, the Institute has made available these techniques for use on a commercial-scale for the control of insect pests of sisal-branches and of cotton.

Similarly, aerial-spraying techniques for the control of the fungus disease — Dothistroma Nodulis — developed by the Institute hold promise for more effective control of the disease in East Africa.

Breakthrough in East Coast Fever

One of the largest single organizations of the East African Veterinary Research Organisation at Miguga, Kenya, have been working since 1948 to find an effective cure for East Coast Fever which is the most serious

livestock disease in East Africa today. In areas where East Coast Fever is most prevalent there is an annual mortality of 10 per cent. Although research has been going on for many years no group has come together to go research on a vaccine for this disease. The first has yet been made which can successfully cure the disease. As a result of a survey on livestock in East Africa carried out by the United Nations Development Programme and the I.N. Food and Agriculture Organisation in 1965, it was decided by the three East African

governments that greater effort should be made to find a solution to this disease. In March this year, a joint project of the U.N.D.P./F.A.O. and the East African Community was launched to carry out research on tick-borne diseases and to investigate the possibility of producing an effective vaccine against East Coast Fever. Under the project manager, Mr. M. P. Cunningham and the co-manager, Mr. Ahmed Rashid, who is also the director of E.A.V.R.O., a group of eight researchers, including F.A.O. experts, went into

joint studies aimed at finding a vaccine. In what the project manager described as a breakthrough the group has been able to come up with a very promising vaccine. The group has been able to prove that under laboratory conditions, cattle can be protected against East Coast Fever by this vaccine. How did the group go about it? Parasites which cause E.C.F. were obtained from the tick and then preserved alive in liquid nitrogen at minus 196 degrees Centigrade. When small doses of the preserved parasites were inoculated into the susceptible cattle, the animals showed mild reaction and after a time they showed some immunity. "This is the most promising breakthrough in the struggle to find an effective vaccine against E.C.F. achieved in the last two months". In order to ensure a regular supply of the parasites, a tick colony has to be maintained by feeding the ticks on rabbits. The eggs of ticks are kept in small tubes until they hatch. After hatching the larvae are then fed on to the ears of the rabbits until they grow into adults and are later taken to be preserved alive in tubes and kept in the laboratory. Mr. Cunningham explained that by weakening the parasites it is possible to stimulate immunity without causing serious disease. This may be achieved by exposing the parasites before inoculation into the cattle to gamma rays from a radioactive cobalt source. This source will be obtained through a machine to be installed at the Faculty of Veterinary Science at University College, Nairobi, by the International Atomic Energy Agency within the next few months. In the past it has not been possible to immunise cattle by injection. It could only be done by placing infected ticks on cattle.

The director of the organisation, Mr. Ahmed Rashid, said that although there was now a promising vaccine, it was not certain how

applies the vaccine would be in the field. The known effective methods of controlling the disease by spraying and dipping cattle will continue to be employed in the field. "It will take about five years before the new finding can be applied in the field" said Mr. Cunningham. A number of questions have got to be answered and facts established. Also it must first be proved whether the cattle in the field can be protected against the disease by inoculation as it is now being done in the laboratory at Miguga. If the new finding is proved to be applicable in the field, the joint F.A.O. and the East African Community will have made the biggest advance in the history of research into East Coast Fever.

The Community's contribution towards this three-year project is about £100,000 in kind and about £20,000 in cash. "Although the disease is not as dangerous as rinderpest, which today can be prevented by a vaccine distributed through research at Miguga, the effects of the E.C.F. could be very disastrous to the now common high bred cattle. Unlike the short-horned Zebu, high bred cattle have no resistance against E.C.F."

Mr. Rashid said it is difficult to introduce the high bred cattle in areas where the disease is prevalent

because once the animal contracts the disease it will die. Thousands of cattle died of the disease in Bukomaland, Tanzania, in 1965. He said that without proper dipping or spraying an outbreak of the disease could occur anywhere at any time. The distribution of the disease in Kenya is over the whole of South Nyanza and the Coast. In Tanzania it is found over very wide areas. In Uganda it is in most parts of the country. As most of East Africa is now going in for large-scale high grade cattle farming, the successful application of this new finding in the field will be a welcome development to cattle farmers.

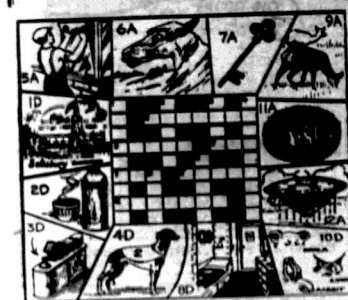

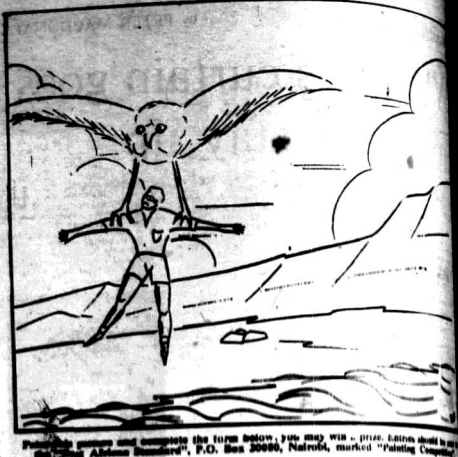
OCEANOGRAPHY Scientists keep weather eye open

WOMEN'S WORLD visits two Nairobi fashion shows

The Y.W.C.A. staged a lunch-hour fashion show at the headquarters in Kirk Road, Nairobi, this week. The idea was to entertain members and guests, and to publicise the dress-making organisation within the Y.W.C.A.

The main aim of this group are to provide a "custom" dress-making service, to expand the present organisation to include a wider range of school uniforms, tie-making and shoe-covering and to find agents for wholesalers at home or overseas.

The group employs up to five full-time seamstresses and is hoping

to employ two more on a temporary basis.

The organiser is Mrs. M. K. Davies and the group teacher is Mrs. Eva Chipenda, from Angola who was trained in Switzerland and the assistant maker, Mrs. Chipenda, together with Miss Kath Jones, a new Zambian volunteer worker, designed the clothes shown.

In each case Kianga material, Kenyan, or Tie-Dye material was used, and the designers achieved original and striking effects using the style of a dress to accentuate the pattern in the material.

Belt shoes added extra glamour to many of the clothes, by lowering necks of their most exotic sandals and shoes.

The designers, Mrs. Jessie Shepherd, herself looked extremely elegant in an ankle-length dress in Kianga material and matching shoes. The first ensemble which she introduced was called "Face-randa". Modelled by Sue, it consisted of a trouser suit with bell-bottom trousers and a matching sleeveless jacket with a high-necked full-sleeved silk blouse of the same lavender colour as the trousers and jacket.

Until recently the group has been operating at a near loss, but in July the executive committee of the Kenya Y.W.C.A. approved a grant of £500 a year. If the group had more orders, especially from wholesalers, and can expand the school uniform service (it already offers uniform dresses for

All Kenya local authorities support Mr. Kenyatta

State Presidential candidate resolution passed

Representatives of all Kenya's local authorities meeting in Mombasa yesterday gave unanimous support to the proposal that President Kenyatta should be the only Presidential candidate in the forthcoming elections.

A resolution to this effect was moved by the Mayor of Nairobi, Coun. Isaac Lugonzo, as chairman of the annual meeting of the Association of Local Government Authorities in Kenya. President Kenyatta's nomination paper is due to be handed in to the Attorney-General's office this morning.

Central take-over of services 'in people's interest'

Standard Staff Reporter.

The decision to give Government control of certain county services including health and education — in the best interests of the people, the Minister for Local Government, Mr. Sagin, said yesterday in Mombasa.

He went on: "The financial position of many county councils has gradually deteriorated to a point that they are not able to maintain a basic minimum of their services. The reason for this has been mainly that the increasing demand for services has very much outweighed the resources of revenue in those councils."

"However, in some cases poor financial control and unrealistic budgeting have been contributory factors."

"Most county councils have been very disappointed with the small amount of grant money they got this year. The money which was set aside by Government as grants to local authorities this year was very much below what was reached a state when they cannot meet the ever-increasing demand for services."

"Another reason which has prompted this decision to transfer these three services to Central Government is that there has been considerable talk in which these services could be expanded. Many schools, dispensaries and health centres have been built on a self-help basis."

"On completion of these buildings some county councils have taken increasing expenses without regard to the fact that they are a major contributory factor to the financial position of some county councils."

"Many county councils have therefore accumulated very large debts."

"The Government will also take over the collection of Graduated Personal Tax and school fees."

"On the question of health services, the Government has sympathetically looked at the allowances back-dated to July 1, 1969. In any case, the rates it has approved in these rates it should be reported to the Ministry and necessary action shall be taken."

616 expected to contest primaries

A total of 616 prospective candidates are expected to contest the forthcoming primary elections, according to the deadline — noon yesterday — and had placed their 250 deposits with KANU. Three people who were late were turned away.

Air crash inquiry opens

A team of British experts arrived in Lagos yesterday to help investigations into Thursday's crash of Nigeria Airways' only A-30 in which 87 people were killed.

The 19-member panel included representatives of the British Board of Trade, the British Overseas Airways Corporation, the British Aviation Insurance Corporation and Lloyd's of London. Senior members of the team met Nigerian Transport Ministry officials.

The jetliner crashed and burst into flames soon before it was due to land at Lagos international airport at Ibeju.

The dead included the all-British flight crew, named by a Government statement as Capt. Moore, flight officer Gordon, flight officer Hunt, and senior engineering officer, Mr. Parker.

One unconfirmed report said the plane was sighted before it crashed, with smoke trailing from one of the engines.

Passenger aboards included nationals of Nigeria, France, Switzerland, West Germany, United States, Britain, Australia and New Zealand, according to reports. Names were being withheld pending notification of next-of-kin.

Rescue workers had recovered 56 charred bodies from the crash area by yesterday evening.

The delivery of many next of kin of East African Airways' flight and last Super VC10 will not be held up despite the tragedy, a British Airways Corporation spokesman emphasised yesterday. However it was just possible some modification or extra check would be necessary as a result of the investigation. — Agency

NO EARLY RETURN FOR ASTRONAUTS

Apollo-12 mission controllers in Houston yesterday turned down the suggestion that the Moon explorers return to Earth a day earlier than scheduled.

As the astronauts passed their spacecraft commander, Charles Conrad, asked ground control if there was sufficient fuel in the craft's main rocket engine to fire come out of lunar orbit and head for home.

This would have the effect of sending Yankee Clipper on a later flight path to Earth, thus cutting short the planned 73-hour return voyage.

The controllers, however, said "No, no problem, we just thought we might have enough fuel to do it." Conrad replied cheerfully when he was told that the astronauts, who are spending their last hour in lunar orbit taking photographs of future Apollo landing sites, will splash down in the Pacific Ocean on Monday afternoon as planned.

The three Moonmen, Pete Conrad, Alan Bean and Richard Gordon, woke up just before 0700 G.M.T. after sleeping for about seven hours.

Their well-earned rest followed a momentous day which included a perfect blast-off by the Intrepid lunar module from Ocean of Storms followed by the successful docking of the two space vehicles and the eventual jettisoning of the lunar module on the Moon's surface.

Between now and then, the astronauts will eat, sleep, and go on a further photographic mission today over their scheduled 73-hour stay over the Moon.

Conrad said that about 81 per cent of the Moon mission scheduled over the past two months, before heading for home. — Agency

Spy ring arrests reach 50

Israeli security police have arrested 50 more alleged members of an Arab sabotage ring unearched in Acre on Thursday bringing the total number of arrests on charges of sabotage of the past few days up to about 50. It was reported in Tel Aviv yesterday.

The police are believed to be contemplating further arrests. In addition to the ring uncovered in Acre, other sabotage groups have been uncovered in Jerusalem, Hebron, Gaza and Tubas.

Among those arrested during the past few days was the Jewish wife of one of the five Arabs arrested on Thursday. Another six Arabs were arrested in Acre.

Police said the leaders of all the five sabotage groups so far uncovered were in contact with a third West group based in Haifa.

Determination got Machakos man to the top

A 26-year-old graduate, Mr. Mwangangi Waita from Machakos, joined the fiscal department of the Caltex organisation in New York last May — and the story leading up to his presence in New York and his employment by the oil firm shows a clear determination to obtain a first class education.

The young Mwangangi's schooling was interrupted by his father's financial difficulties and he did not complete his Cambridge School Certificate course. 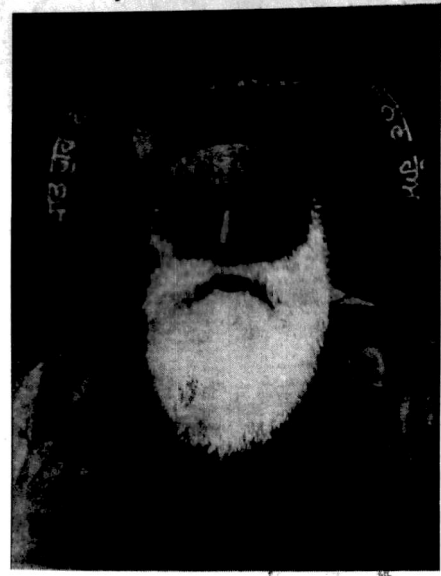

SHRI GURU NANAK

GURU NANAK, THE FOUNDER OF SIKHISM, was born at Patwandi, a small village 40 miles from Lahore (now in Pakistan). He was a moody, meditative child and even in his schooldays preferred the company of itinerant holy men to that of his schoolmates. His interest in religious discourse persisted in his youth and he abandoned one trade after another in pursuit of truth, and ultimately made it his sole mission in life. He left his wife and sons, and with a Muslim companion called Mardana he travelled far and wide visiting places of pilgrimage and seeking the company of scholars and divines. His travels took him as far as Assam in the East, Ceylon in the South, Mecca in the West and Tibet in the North, and brought him into contact with many people including the first Mughal Emperor Babur.

During the last 15 years of life, Nanak settled down in the town of Kartarpur and preached his faith. The disciples that gathered round him became the Sikhs.

Although Nanak had two sons, he chose a devoted disciple to take his place as spiritual successor.

He who deems himself a Sikh of the true Guru
