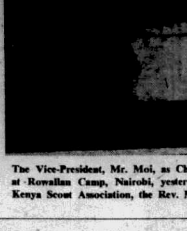

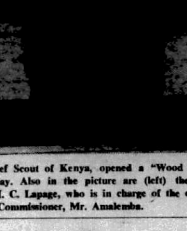

HARD WORK KEY TO DEVELOPMENT

The Siaya District Commissioner, Mr. Francis Cherogony, has appealed to the people of Gem location, Nyanza Province, to direct all their abilities and efforts to the economic development of the location. Mr. Cherogony, who was installing Mr. Barrack Ogwayo as the sub-chief for Malira sub-location, said that the improvement of the country's development depended on hard work and co-operation by everybody. He called on the people who were working in various towns in East Africa or elsewhere to take a keen interest in the development of their villages and shambas. The D.C. strongly criticised people holding responsible posts for neglecting the welfare of their home areas and villages — they were doing a great disservice to the location. He advised them to take a keen interest in the welfare of their areas. Some of these people did not even have houses for themselves claiming that they could not build a house at home because the place was hard work and co-operation by everybody. Stressing the importance of good farming, Mr. Cherogony told his listeners that farming was the mainstay of the country's economy. All people, he went on, should develop their shambas fully. This work should not be left in the hands of women alone. Earlier, the D.C. delivered 20 bags of cement to the office for the chief of Nyanza Gem location now being built on self-help basis. He commended the people in the area for the good work they were doing on self-help projects. He assured the people of North Gem that he would provide funds to complete the remaining work on the project. A sudden fire swept through three houses and two granaries at Angilo sub-location of East Gem location on Saturday night. The fire started at about 3 p.m. and spread rapidly. Nyawa Mwangi was taking a siesta in one of the houses. The alarm went up and the people around the village came to assist in rectifying property from the burning houses, but the blaze got worse and the rescuers could not remove anything from the affected house. The cause of the fire has not yet been established. — K.N.A.

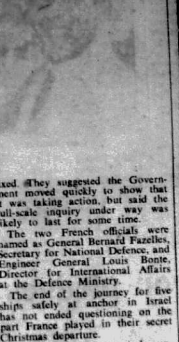

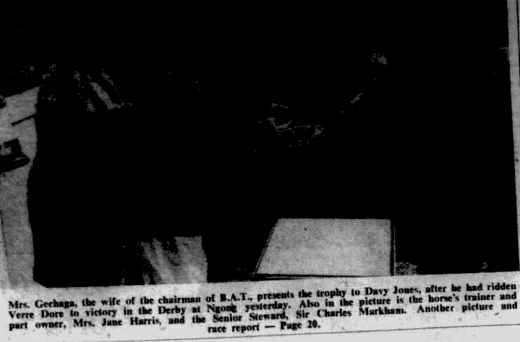

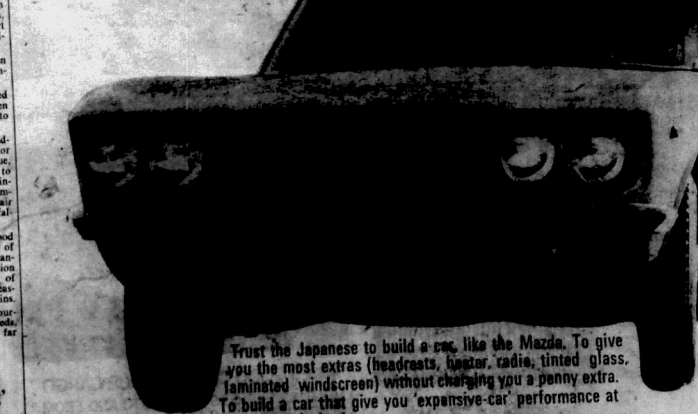

### Price falls hit crop

Standard Staff Reporter, Arusha.

There has been little response among farmers in Arusha region this season to the cultivation of pyrethrum because they have been discouraged by falling prices, according to the monthly report of the Regional Director for Agriculture, Food and Co-operatives.

Some estate farmers have even decided to withdraw from the industry, says the report.

Besides that, the farmers faced another disappointment when milles became the main menace to the crop.

The Ministry is planning to advise on proper husbandry for the crop. It will also continue, with the help of co-operatives, to make higher pyrethrum, containing clones, available to the farmers. This will maintain a fair income for them despite the falling prices.

But there has been a very good response to the cultivation of cotton, and the Ministry is planning to encourage the expansion of the crop in the lower areas of the region with the aim of increasing production, the report explains.

The Ministry is also to encourage the planting of more oil seeds, particularly seed cotton. So far the response has been good.

**Coffee farmers hand over £5,610 for projects**

A delegation of coffee farmers from Muthambi Location, led by their chief, Mr. Japhet Harman, called the District Officer for Nithi Division, Meru District, Central Province, Mr. P. Murateta, at Chuka divisional headquarters to hand him £5,610 for aiding "social self-help projects" in the location.

The money was raised by individual farmers who are members of Muthambi Farmers' Co-operative Society Limited immediately after their last coffee payout.

The money, which was banked with a local branch of a commercial bank in Chuka under the name of Muthambi Location Development Committee, will aid the following projects:-

- Kim Harambe Secondary School - £2,250 for constructing a teacher's house and improvements to Form Two classroom.
- Karanti Harambe Secondary School, £205 for improving teachers' houses; and Kajifidhi Harambe Secondary School, £105 for improving the water system and a teacher's house.

Other projects to be aided are

Muthambi Self-Help Health Centre - £500 for improvements to the building, and the proposed Magindu Harambe Secondary School, £2,250.

The school has applied for registration from the Ministry of Education and it is hoped that approval for its registration will be given.

Mr. Murateta, receiving the delegation, expressed his gratitude to the people for their positive move in the task of nation-building.

He promised to give the committee and the people of Muthambi his wholehearted support to make the project a "living reality".

Mr. P. K. Murateta also laid the foundation stone of extensions to classrooms of Wera Primary School in Mwinili Location.

The ceremony, which was attended by hundreds of people, was followed by a fund-raising campaign which fetched a total of £20,174, 6/6s, including a cheque and a packet of cement, chickens and 12 bags of vegetables and fruits which were to be auctioned. The project is estimated to cost £750.

In launching the campaign, Mr. Murateta said few people could accomplish much more than a large crowd and pointed out that when there was less there would be progress.

He and his wife, who accompanied him, promised to provide a door for all of the classrooms.

The District Officer reminded the crowd that education was the backbone of nation-building and said they should donate generously to the project.

**£185,612 collected in G.P.T.**

In his annual report for 1968, just released, the Provincial Commissioner of Western Province, Mr. P. K. Bolt, indicates that the total amount of G.P.T. collected by chiefs in the province was £185,612, out of the estimated £200,000.

The P.C. states that 1968 was a year which had relatively more active than the previous years, with special emphasis placed on economic development.

As a result of the survey, the F.A.O. states that the future of Robusta, which has by far the greatest possibilities for expansion in Africa, might depend on how far this coffee is able to compete with Arabica of lower grade since these are sold at competitive prices on world markets. During the last few years, Robustas have conquered many European markets and exports into the United States of America have steadily increased. Africa produces some of the world's best Arabica but also a bulk of Robustas, the quality of both varieties varying from country to country.

In the South American section the competition from African Robustas is mentioned and the survey states that an immense task has to be accomplished if South America's coffee industry is to maintain its present share in world production. "To avoid further accumulation of large surpluses," the survey states, "Brazil, and to a lesser extent Colombia and the other producing countries, must increase production to export possibilities and domestic consumption by a considerable reduction in acreage. The replacement of coffee by other agricultural activities, thus integrating this crop into a well-balanced agricultural economy, constitutes one of the most urgent problems."

In Asia, at the time of the survey was written, great damage had been inflicted by coffee rust and huge areas had been devastated mainly in India, Ceylon, Vietnam, Indonesia and the Philippines.

In the section dealing with Kenya the spread of Coffee Berry Disease is described as "alarming" and it is noted that effective control measures had not, at the time of writing, been established. The survey states that the vital importance of producing a large proportion of very high quality coffee in Kenya emphasises the great importance of all research and publicity having an influence on coffee quality.

Increasing labour costs on estates can be expected to reduce gross profits and in marginal areas may make coffee production uneconomic," says the F.A.O.

The value of Kenya coffee exports in 1962 were 28 per cent of total exports compared with 54 per cent in Uganda and 13.7 per cent in Tanzania.

Of the coffee produced in Kenya, Arabica accounts for 99.8 per cent and Robusta for 0.2 per cent. The crop was first planted in the country around 1900 and in 1935 an area of 48,000 hectares was under coffee, but this was gradually reduced to 24,000 hectares by 1950.

A new expansion started in the early fifties and by 1966 the total land under coffee was more than 82,000 hectares which the F.A.O. describes as "an enormous increase only after 1937 but expanded considerably after 1955. Output of coffee increased more than three-fold in the decade to 1965 and the share of peasant farming rose from two to 36 per cent."

In 1965 some 20,000 bags of Kenya coffee were sold locally, consumption per head being around

130 grams per year — "low, as it is everywhere" in Africa with the exception of Ethiopia and Madagascar," says the survey. In 1963, estates were producing an average of 375 kilograms of green coffee per hectare. Present productivity for estates is now approximately 700 kilograms and for smallholdings approximately 900 kilograms. Both achievements are described by the F.A.O. as remarkable.

The survey estimates that the number of coffee farms was 250,000 for the whole of Kenya of which 200,000 were in Central and Eastern provinces including Machakos; 40,000 in the west; and 10,000 spread over the other areas. Very considerable areas of suitable land remain unplanted to coffee but the present Government policy in accordance with the International Coffee Agreement is to prevent a further expansion of the area under the crop.

However there is a strong desire

to plant more coffee if the Government will remove the restrictions and the F.A.O. estimates that the tonnage produced is likely to increase to about 1,300,000 bags this year. The survey lays little emphasis on the Government's efforts at diversification and points out that as estates the trend is towards greater specialisation in coffee and there is little interest in diversification. On smallholdings, Government policy has been to ensure that on each holding sufficient food for subsistence is grown as well as cash-cropping crops, such as coffee.

As far as Tanzania is concerned, the F.A.O. points out that in contrast with Kenya and Uganda the emphasis has been on output from estates although according to a 1959 survey there were some 250 estates and 207,000 smallholdings. The F.A.O. points out that there is no doubt that replanting on a large scale is needed if Tanzania's output is to be maintained over the next two decades.

## EXTRA £5,000 FOR COTTON CROP

An additional loan of £5,000 has been approved by the Commissioner of Co-operative Farmers' (Cotton) Co-operatives Union to enable it to cope with the purchase of an increased volume of seed cotton in the two locations of Karakoram, South Nyanza District.

This was disclosed by the Senior Co-operative Officer in charge of the Rachuonyo Farmers' Co-operative Union £15,000.

He told the farmers that the system of purchasing cotton, cash on delivery, was technically cumbersome and expensive. This, he said, required a very high standard of business efficiency, tolerance and willingness to work hard on the part of union staff, and orderliness, co-operation, perseverance, determination on the farmers' part.

Mr. Arene stressed that a considerable amount of work should be done by the farmers, free of charge in their own spare time, to save their unions some running expenses and to streamline the remaining minor marketing difficulties.

Poor farmers will be protected

The District Co-operative Officer for Nakuru District, Mr. Thaddeus N. Ochieng, has reiterated an earlier statement that the Government would not stand by and see poor farmers in co-operative societies, exploited by a few irresponsible, dishonest and money-hungry people.

Mr. Ochieng, who was accompanied by the examiner of accounts from his office, Mr. S. W. Muigai, was addressing the committee members of the Arimi Farmers' Co-operative Society at Elburgom.

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# A year of challenge

Kenya enters the New Year with a brand new Parliament and Development Plan. The National Assembly will meet soon to begin its business with more than 100 new faces.

President Kenyatta has set the keynote with the advice repeated to successive delegations of M.P.s. They bear a heavy responsibility to the people who elected them and, if they pay attention to the lesson behind the electoral rejection of so many M.P.s in the old House, they will stay close to the people in their constituencies. The President's opinion is that M.P.s must at all times realise why they were elected by showing good actions and leadership.

The Government will not face any formal Opposition. Instead, all the Ministers and M.P.s are Kaniu, which is in truth the ruling party, and its manifesto will be the pattern for governmental policy. But the fact of only one party in the National Assembly does not mean the Government cannot, or will not, be subjected to criticism on individual points. Already, there are signs of a radical wing developing on fiscal questions. "Support, in principle, criticism in detail" can be the line for Backbenchers to follow, when they feel they have constructive criticisms to offer.

"Parliament is not the place for unfruitful criticism", President Kenyatta has pointed out, but should be used "as a place where constructive ideas are put forward". The Government in a one-party legislature is criticised not from across the floor by Members sitting on Opposition benches; not even from Cross-benches; but by its own Backbenchers when they have something meaningful to say about proposed legislation; for the Government belongs to them.

In a message congratulating the President on the inspiration of his leadership, the Vice-President said he prayed that, in the Seventies, which has just dawned, "Not to reach the Moon but, keeping its feet on the ground, to put first things first. There is tranquility with progress on all sides. The Mayor of Mombasa summed up the situation and the opportunity when he described 1970 as a year of challenge."

Cowley Kombo added: "Let us forget our political differences, bury tribalism and start the New Year with a new motto for a united Kenya. There could be no better recipe for success, but the motto is there already — harmony, and all that is needed is to apply its spirit in practical deeds."

Instead of divisive politics, let the leaders of *wamunchi* concentrate on economic development and *wamunchi* will respond. A target of 6.7 per cent national growth has been set in the development planning for the first half of the decade. This is slightly in excess of the achievement over the last planning period, but not a shade too high.

Its accomplishment will depend upon the united effort of politicians and people, businessmen and farmers. Only in an expanding economy can Kenya hope to find work for the thousands of youngsters leaving school every year. All other devices to reduce unemployment, finding work for Kenyans, are expedients. A heavy preponderance of school leavers for many years to come must find their livelihoods on the land. Tourism is leading ahead, as an employer of labour and revenue earner, but agriculture remains the bedrock.

Kenya should listen to the warning against the uncontrolled rise in population. If the current rate is maintained, many of the benefits of economic expansion will be nullified and the standards of living will not improve as the nation expects. Forward into the Seventies, then, a united nation under a resolute Government which knows what it wants and where it is going.

Crocodiles tearing at an impala carcass and a hippo weightlessly walking by, attended by a horde of fish. These are just two scenes from Alan and Joan Root's latest television film, *Mzima — Portrait of a Spring*, that was recently shown on colour television in England and Germany.

"It took eight months to produce and was the most difficult and riskiest project I have tackled to date," said Mr. Root, who has completed more than three dozen wildlife and scientific films.

The film starts at the birthplace of Mzima on the Chyala Hills, and goes on to tell the story of the ecology of the Springs. Because they graze on land and then deposit most of their dung in the water, hippo excrement once way flows energy that greatly enriches the water and supports a flourishing population of crustaceans and other life. This nourishes a large variety of fish, which in turn are preyed upon by waterbirds, eels, otters and crocodiles.

The increasing of all these species make, a fascinating story that is filmed in the only way that can be really appreciated —

"To get our pictures we used a variety of methods including a narrow, glass-fronted tank that I lay on for days on end, and a crocodile-proof cage designed at an island of trees". Mr. Root told

"When I make a film about a place it often leads to a rise in tourists wanting to go there — often much to my regret," he says, "being happy when I am closest to nature at its wildest."

His early films made in conjunction with Dr. Bernhard Grzimek did much to encourage the European tourist to visit East Africa, and his film on the Galapagos Islands made that area a prime tourist target. He has received a number of awards.

As a result of the Mzima film, the Zoological Society donated £2,000 to pay for extra tourist facilities at the Springs in Tsavo.

Alan Root and Dr. Grzimek also donated copies of the film to the Kenya National Parks and the National Museum for educational purposes. The Museum is planning to give a show soon to give local people an opportunity of seeing the film and a closer look at the underwater world of Mzima.

old bones in the sea of Ras Dog that we might have been experiencing the sort of magnetic disturbance that years ago may have had something to do with the building of the Mize, north of the Mize, which contained neither rivets nor bolts.

There was a superstition that there were magnetic areas on this coast that were so strong that the metal could be drawn out of a ship. I shall not scoff at them again for the difficulty in fixing position was the beginning of a chapter of accidents in Formosa Bay that was to deny us a snug anchorage throughout a wind-torn night.

The Africa Pilot dealing with the coast from Ras Ngomeni to Fiume Giuba entrance makes no mention of possible magnetic disturbance, but dots touch upon the strength of the currents.

There is little literature for yachtsmen concerning offshore sailing in East African waters and the Plover which generally speaking is regarded for professional sailors in large vessels.

Another yachtsman at Mombasa, Philip Channing-Pearce, had, however, warned our skipper about the currents in the bay. M. D. Carefully also mentions these in his book *Crafting The Kenya Coast* which, in fact, I read after our voyage. He writes: "There is a really strong set to the West

and you must be at least 50 degrees over this..."

Together with these currents and an uncertain position, a freshening NE wind came in during the afternoon and the two of us in Furaha found ourselves running for shelter at Kipini where the Tana River flows into the sea through a series of marshes on the northern side of the Africa.

An non-nautical attraction of Kipini is the fact that the old town of Komomo which, in the 17th century, was the most important place on the Coast. For sail to tall towers, Lamu is to fall into the known history of East Africa.

In modern yachting one of the things you try to avoid under sail is to run down a lee shore, and as the wind veered we found ourselves doing just that, hoping to turn around the rocks that lie off Kipini and make the anchorage

for a night. In our bunk instead of the cockpit."

However the current set us well into Formosa Bay and by 6 p.m. we found ourselves resting peacefully in a heavy swell and disorienting soundings.

There was only one answer and that was to resign ourselves to another night at sea and at first light under the stars we were off.

This we tried to do under reduced canvas but the currents still held us back in the bay. It was not until 9 p.m. that night that we managed to get back under plain sail and by then we were dangerously close to our old friend Ras Ngomeni where all the trouble had started.

We were like a needle drawn to a magnet. We couldn't see the headland, of course, but estimated our position from the lights of the Italian rocket launching platforms which we believed to be some way to the East of Ngomeni. They were not shown on the chart but two boats were indicated when the chart was made in 1964 and it was to these that the launching platforms may have been moored.

Some close-hauled work to windward and the soundings deepened and we were out on the North Kenya Bank for the night, sailing just South of East till 1:30 in the morning when we estimated that the northward, starboard tack would give us a good landing for the Lamu approach.

Keeping a night watch not far above the water line in a small boat in rough weather is a desperate and serious business. For one thing as the waves thunder past the dark the speed seems to be enormous. Alone on the deck with your partner taking his turn in a bunk you imagine lines of breakers ahead.

Clouds became large, until dawn running down before the kaskari from Fersa. One sock's reassurance by looking at the chart. There is nothing but sea.

And one is much more conscious of the night sky. This particular night the heavens were full of falling stars. Time and again they flashed down through space as if struck by some celestial God.

At one time I heard a soft, repeated "boom" heavily repeated again and again.

I mistook the water and then close alongside a round, sly shape moved through the swell. "Oomp!" I perceived. And they were still with us at first light, dashing under the bow and more friendly than the turtle that greeted us that morning.

Our landfall was none too good and placed us off Ziwaya rocks just north of Kipini where we had been trying to find anchorage the previous day.

This is the nastiest looking collection of rocks I have ever seen. They stand in row after row out to sea like bad teeth in a skull and the water breaks heavily over them. The wind, of course, was directly onto them and we were back in the sort of current which the previous day had trapped us in Formosa Bay.

All things considered it was time to start the engine and six hours motoring paralleled with the sand dunes ashore and past the island of Tenewe and Kinyika brought us to the Lamu sea marks.

By 2:15 p.m. we were anchored under the old Arab houses and the scowling waterfront cannon of Lamu. The passage from Mombasa had taken 52 hours.

# Kenya now most popular tourist spot for Germans

If there is one country in Europe that needs to be sold on Kenya's tourist attractions it is Federal Germany.

"I will never forget the first time I saw Lake Nakuru as long as I live. I am going back next year," is just one of the many similar phrases which pop up every day in the Press and advertising departments of German tourist agencies. Letters pour in from Germans who have made one trip to Kenya and return to Germany just counting the days until they can get back.

Most German travel agencies recommend Nairobi as a base and offer for amounts in the region of £250 a ten to 16-day air trip to Kenya with full board. These tours can be with rifle or camera and Tsavo Park seems to be the most popular spot.

The money that flows from such ventures gives Kenya another source of funds in the Federal Republic, beside that raised from coffee.

There are no figures for 1969 but the capacity planning of one of the largest German travel firms, NILL, Neckermann-Tour, is symptomatic of the development to come.

Of the 150,000 tourists who visited Kenya in 1968 over 15,000 came from West Germany, that is 10 per cent. They thus played a considerable part in raising the £16,400,000 Kenya earned by tourism.

Kenya has had a state travel agency in Frankfurt for a long time and was again represented at the Third International Tourist Fair in Berlin, in March, last year.

The Federal Republic is also promoting tourism as a part of its development aid to Kenya. In 1966 the German Development Corporation in Cologne and the German Hotel and Restaurant Federation recommended the building of hotels in Kenya. A year later leading German hotel and travel agencies and the airline Luftfahrt combined to found the German Hotel Association for Developing Countries.

Its first project, a chain of hotels with a total of 400 beds in Kenya, has almost been realised. This co-operation helped to build the Voi Safari Lodge and the Napia Lodge, each with 100 beds, in Tsavo National Park.

In order to offer better boarding possibilities at Malindi the Sidon-Planungsgesellschaft, Bam Landshut in Bavaria plans to build a 240-bed hotel at the resort.

The Federal Republic's co-operation with Kenya in tourism also embraces giving expert advice, sending German hotel and tourist specialists to Kenya and training Kenyan personnel in Germany. Germany also aids Kenya in building tourist roads to open up

the national parks and game game reserves dated to get to.

Cold storage facilities at the kennels permits the bulk buying of meat. Cooking of meat and meal goes on in one corner of the compound, which gives an interesting activity for the animals to watch throughout the day.

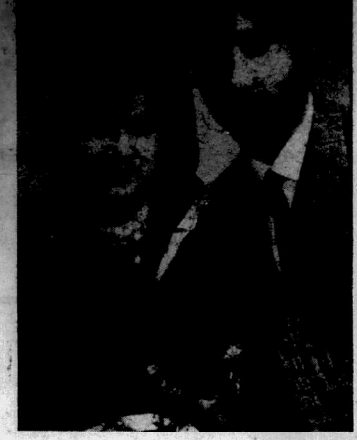

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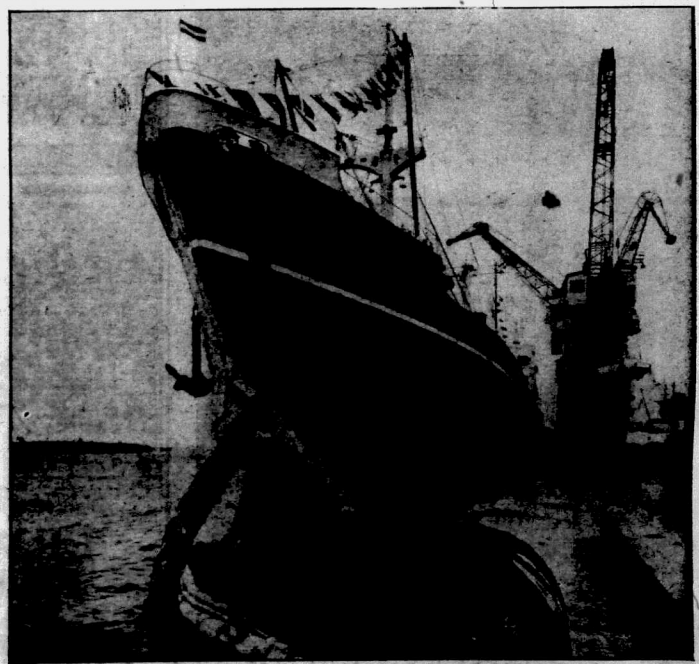

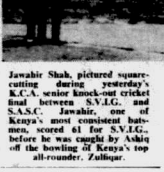
# Verre Dore on to win Derby

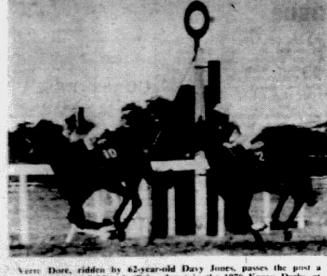

Workers play big part in planning

JORAM AMADI of the "Economic Standard" recently visited Yugoslavia in a report of President Tito's activities. In the first of a series of articles, he describes the system of industrial co-operation which gives Yugoslav workers a direct say in the running of the business they work for.

A unique system of managing the country's industries and developing the economy has been developed in the Socialist Federal Republic of Yugoslavia, which is situated in the Balkan peninsula, with its northern regions spreading into Central Europe.

With a population of about 20,000,000 and covering an area of 582,766 sq. miles, Yugoslavia is the only country in the world where a social system of self-management operates in her enterprises and other institutions of economic activity.

A Yugoslav worker participates in the management of the enterprise where he works, of the building where he lives, of the schools where his children go for education and also participates in managing health and other social institutions which offer him their services.

During the post-war period the Government nationalised all the big industries, almost the entire banking system, wholesale and commerce including foreign trade. The economy was run by the State in a strictly centralized manner. But later experience proved that nationalisation of all means of production and the State management of the economy had not substantially altered the position of workers and producers.

There was a decline of interest among the workers and great weaknesses and shortcomings emerged in the system where the State ran the country's economic life. The economy was in fact running down to zero the system was changed.

The Federal Assembly in Belgrade, at the proposal of President Tito, passed a law which set into motion a system of decentralisation of industry and the economy. All State enterprises were handed back to the people and the Government is under obligation to take into account all decisions of the workers' council.

This system of self-management

The first phase created conditions under which workers were given the right to manage the enterprise. State management was abandoned and the workers were given the right to manage the enterprise. The second phase followed when workers got the freedom to decide on the production of their products. At this stage, the State had powers to decide on investment and the material resources of the workers was somewhat limited.

The last and third stage followed in 1965 when there was widespread economic and social reforms in the country and all private enterprises had more right to decide on investments. Workers had more powers to decide on the production of their products. A Workers' Council composed of between 15 to 30 members is elected in all major enterprises. The size of the council usually depends on the size of the enterprise. It has up to 70 employees form a workers' council of all workers.

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# Big welcome for U Thant in Guinea

The United Nations Secretary-General, U Thant, received an "enthusiastic and dynamic" welcome in Conakry, Guinea, yesterday, Radio Conakry reported.

U Thant, who flew to Conakry from Dakar, Senegal, for the third stop on his African tour, was met at the airport by President Sekou Toure and diplomatic and Government officials.

The Secretary-General went immediately to the 28th of September Stadium where he and President Toure spoke at a reception organised by the "militant population of the capital", Radio Conakry said.

President Toure said that though the United Nations was "practically paralysed" and "incapable of solving problems", Guinea offered its support to U Thant, the radio said.

Calling U Thant a "dignified representative of peace", Mr. Toure said the United Nations should not become an instrument of conscience for superpowers and militarists but should be an instrument for the benefit of all peoples.

U Thant, in his reply, termed Mr. Toure one of "Africa's greatest leaders" whose courage and leadership qualities he admired.

The Secretary-General said he hoped the next decade would be important in decolonisation and development.

The Radio Conakry political commentator said that U Thant's visit showed his special interest in Africa. He will be in Conakry until today, when he flies to Monrovia, Liberia.

Earlier yesterday, the United Nations leader made it clear in a talk that Biafra's secession was unacceptable to the world body.

Speaking at a Press conference he said that the U.N. could not and would never accept the principle of secession in one of its member States.

Flanked by the Senegalese President Mr. Senghor, U Thant said that he entirely shared the view of African Heads of State on the Nigerian crisis and called on Biafra's leader, Gen. Obiwu, to help end the war. The African Heads of State adopted a resolution at the O.A.U. meeting in Algiers in September opposing Biafra's secession.

He said that the United Nations had spent about £170,000,000 to prevent Katanga Province from seceding from Congo (Kinshasa) because the U.N. respects the integrity, independence and sovereignty of its member States.

The casualty toll in Sunday's Vietcong mortar attack on two refugee camps near Dong has risen to 12 killed and 72 wounded, the U.S. Command said in Saigon.

About 40 mortar bombs crashed into the camps, destroying corrugated iron homes. All the victims were civilians.

A South Vietnamese spokesman said refugee camps have been a regular target for Vietcong terrorism, but this was the worst in terms of casualties for nearly seven months.

An American spokesman said: "Since there is no military installation in the area, we are considering this a deliberate attack against a population centre."

## ZAMBIA NO BUILD REFINERY

The Zambian Government has announced plans to start building the country's first refinery during the first six months of 1970.

The Ministry of Information said the £37,000,000 installation would end Zambia's dependence on refined oil imported from Dar es Salaam through the oil pipeline that was sabotaged recently.

Negotiations between the Zambian Industrial Development Corporation and the Italian company ENI are well advanced, the Ministry of Information said.

Construction will start after the two groups sign an agreement.

Other oil companies operating in Zambia — such as Mobil, Esso and Cadoma — would also be invited to participate, the Ministry said.

The location of the refinery has not been decided, but it probably will be built at Ndola, where the Tanzanian pipeline into Zambia ends.

The Government hopes to develop an industrial complex around the refinery to create jobs in Zambia, which suffers from chronic underemployment.

Two Americans were killed and nine injured when Vietcong ambushed a military convoy with barbed wire and light arms just south of the Demilitarized Zone, about eight miles from Quang Tri.

In the Saigon region sporadic skirmishes were reported on Monday between U.S. troops and Vietcong. Helicopters were called in to the Long Khanh Province, 40 miles north-east of the capital.

The Vietcong will observe a four-day truce beginning on February 5 to mark the Tet Lunar New Year festival, the National Liberation Front Radio announced yesterday.

The Tet Festival is celebrated on February 6 and 7 and marks Vietnam's changeover from "the year of the ox" to "the year of the dog".

The South Vietnamese Government has not yet stated its position concerning any possible Tet truce.

The Saigon Press has reported the presence of Chinese and North Korean technicians in the central highlands and the coastal area of Central Vietnam.

The daily *Quen Fien*, quoting Gen. Lu Lan, the South Vietnamese Army general in charge of the second tactical region, which covers the 12 provinces of Central Vietnam, reportedly told a group of National Assembly Members that "reports of the presence of Chinese and North Korean Communists" in that area had been circulating for some time.

However, he added, "there was no written document proving the existence of Chinese and North Korean fighting units" in the region.

## NASA REMOULDS ITS MOON PROGRAMME

The administrator of Nasa, Dr. Thomas Paine, has said the American Moon exploration programme would be trimmed back in the number of flights, but would be strengthened scientifically.

Dr. Paine said the Apollo programme would end with flight Number 19 in 1971 instead of Number 20 two years earlier as the timetable had called for. In effect, the programme is being extended two years but reduced by one flight.

"The Space agency is recasting its Apollo programme to more scientific goals," Dr. Paine said in an interview.

The extension of the programme is being spread out as much for science as for economy, Dr. Paine said.

"We certainly are trying to economize, but we have spent seven billion dollars just developing the Saturn-5 and 24 billion dollars for the entire Apollo programme, so it's important to get the maximum benefit out of those vehicles."

There have been complaints from scientific quarters about the technological rather than scientific nature of the Apollo programme. Indeed, several scientists have resigned from Nasa in the past few months complaining that "pure science" had been treated as the "poor relation" in the programme.

Apollo missions orbiting the Earth from 28 to 56 days. This programme, called "Apollo Applications", will run from July, 1972, to March, 1973.

Apollo Moon flights 17, 18 and 19 are scheduled for 1973 and 1974.

## Judge refuses plea by Sen. Kennedy's lawyer

A plea by Sen. Edward Kennedy's lawyer to be present throughout the whole of the inquest on the death of Mary Jo Kopechne has been rejected by the inquest president, Judge James Boyle.

Sen. Kennedy was among the witnesses heard on the first day of the inquest to determine the legal cause of the death of Miss Kopechne, found dead in the Senator's car after it had plunged off a bridge at nearby Chappaquiddick Island in July.

Judge Boyle also ruled that lawyers would be able to present testimony if they were in possession of new facts.

As Sen. Kennedy left the inquest, being held behind closed doors, he told Pressmen he had given evidence for an hour.

He reminded reporters that he could say nothing more in view of Judge Boyle's ruling that no information of any description

about the proceedings should be given to the Press or the public.

Earlier he had said he was happy the inquest was finally being held.

Sen. Kennedy returned to his Hyannisport home where he will remain at the disposal of the inquest. The hearing is expected to last four or five days.

He has already been given a two-month suspended jail term and banned from driving for a year after admitting leaving the scene of an accident "involving personal injury".

Originally scheduled to begin in public on September 3, the inquest was postponed and turned into a closed hearing after lawyers for Sen. Kennedy and other witnesses petitioned the Massachusetts Supreme Court.

The findings will not be made public for some time.

## to buy British jump-jets

Two firms, Hawker Siddeley, which is associated with Westlands, and the British Aircraft Corporation, have been studying the idea. They will present plans for a short take-off airliner based on the B.A.C. 111 jet.

Referring to Rhodesia, Mr. Nkama said Britain, as the legal administering authority, had to all means seek to force an end to the defeat in its attempts to bring down the Government of Rhodesia.

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

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# Have make-up bag, will travel

"There's a gentleman I just have to finish off — he isn't quite brown enough." This was my introduction to Jacques Jefferies, make-up artist with the *Mogul* TV film team currently filming several episodes in Kenya.

Jacques, who says he is 27, looks about 17, and this is no make-up trick. When I met her in the swimming pool at the Paradise Hotel she wore very little make-up herself but was hard at work putting it on other people.

Here is a job that many girls would give their eyes teeth for, but it's no sinecure. The hours are long and irregular and the work is hard, according to Jacques. Filming can go on until all hours and, on outdoor work, in all sorts of weather. It is only when you watch her at work that you realise the long years of training and experience behind those skillful fingers.

Jacques, now a supervisor with the B.B.C. make-up department, has a total staff of 100 people, left school at 16 with three "O" levels, which happened to be the right ones, in English, Art and History.

She had no idea then of her eventual career, but trained as a hairdresser — a three-year apprenticeship, finishing with a City and Guilds Examination. A friend at

the same salon decided to write to the B.B.C. for a job, and Jacques, idea, did the same.

The friend did not get in, but Jacques did, the still does not know why, but she appreciates her luck, which would not be possible today because of the competition for these jobs, and the technological advances made by television.

The B.B.C. now likes its make-up trainees to have "A" levels, preferably some art training and a City Guilds qualification, so no girl could start as Jacques did, at 18.

New trainees do an intensive three-month course in the B.B.C. make-up school, which is practically the only one of its kind in the world. After this they gain experience on the job, as junior members of a team, working up to final supervisors. Jacques is one of the few in the present assignment — it means more work but it is less complicated.

Hospital letters from potential trainees far exceed the number of jobs available — for roughly every 2,000 applicants, there may be one place. Girls are chosen as much for their personality as their qualifications — and the chief characteristic they need, according to Jacques, is a genuine liking for people and an ability to get on with everyone. All the paper qualifications in the world are of little use if you have a temperance!

It is likely to "show" those ill-tempered people, the actors. Make-up girls should be patient, cheerful, adaptable and always ready to help. Background — and as far as I could see, — and a general knowledge of a make-up artist's training, they need a sense of humour and an irrepressible whiff of energy.

When filming is over for the day, most people can sit back and relax, but the make-up girl, alone, may be bombed even when she is at home. Jacques describes, not as a side job, when a B.B.C. trainee filmed *Lorna Doone* in England's West Country, as was not too light for a dry climate. It rained a good deal, the actresses were not used to it, and every night the make-up girls worked late to wash and hairdress the stars.

# HUNTER CLEARED OF MANSLAUGHTER

Hans Peter Graf, 29, a hunter, was acquitted by a Kenya High Court judge, Mr. Justice Trevelyan, yesterday on a charge of the manslaughter of Mr. Albert Rodriguez on July 19.

Three assessors appointed to assist the judge in the trial had been asked to give their views on the evidence. Mr. Graf had told the court how he accidentally shot his friend Rodriguez while on a hunting expedition in the Kenya Game Park.

# Judges urged to be tough with poachers

The Director of Tanzania's National Parks, Mr. J. S. Owen, yesterday called for a tough line against poaching which should include imprisonment of commercial poachers and the forfeiture of their weapons.

Mr. Owen said his call in the wake of the recent spate of heavy poaching by big game in areas across the country's national parks, especially Serengeti.

Presenting an eight-page study, 'The Problem of Illegal Hunting in and Around National Parks', to the delegates of the judges and magistrates' conference, Mr. Owen appealed for sentences with a real deterrent effect.

Commercial poachers were making rewards on poaching so high that even the maximum fine authorized by the Ordinance could often be paid cheerfully from the proceeds of the offence, Mr. Owen said.

Kenya's Industrial Court yesterday rejected a demand by 321 non-citizen employees of National and Grindlays Bank on the question of the deduction of the bank's provident fund and National Social Security Service contributions from compensation paid to employees on leaving.

The president of the court, Mr. Saad Cockar, said that if the demand had been successful, it would have cost the bank 282,000 in addition to the 1,000,000 which it was already committed to pay under a compensation scheme for non-citizens.

He praised Kenya banks, including National and Grindlays, for fulfilling their promises to non-citizen employees who lost their jobs through the Government, had worked in a good and enlightened manner.

All credit must go to them for having taken an extremely realistic view of the plight of their non-citizen employees who would lose jobs through the change of their own or the banks. The Immigration Act, which would strip citizens should make way for foreigners and that was how it should be.

Mr. Cockar said that the court had very thoroughly examined the ingenious arguments put forward by the Kenya Union of Commercial Food and Allied Workers, but found there was not enough merit in them to persuade the court to make an award in their favour.

Mr. Moisey said that in comparison with other countries the jurisdiction of the lower courts in Tanzania was fantastically wide. In a primary court of a magistrate, the judge after his appointment as a trial officer and sent a magistrate to preside over 24 cases and his civil jurisdiction in customary and Islamic law jurisdiction is unlimited and exclusive.
