

# M.C.C. to come says every teachers due back at work today

**Minister criticises attitude to**

South Africa I do not want to see them playing cricket in Kenya. If there is anybody who wants to make a fuss over this issue, they can do so in Britain, not in Kenya. ## Mr. Shako gets to grips with problems of new job

Kenya's new Minister for Tourism and Wildlife, Mr. Shako, yesterday began his first tour of the country's tourist areas and was plunged straight into several of the problems facing both tourism and wildlife. He began by visiting Keekorok Lodge in the Masai-Mara Game Reserve and later spent the night at Tretops. In the next few weeks he plans to see several other places on the tourist circuits.

"I have been selling these places overseas," he said. (Mr. Shako was Kenya's Ambassador to France and West Germany for three years). "Now I am glad to be able to see them in my own country."

Much of the day was spent listening to the suggestions and proposals — of people in the industry and officials from the departments of his Ministry. High on the list were the problems of poaching and the encroachment of agriculture on wildlife areas.

Later, he told the *East African Standard* he felt his Ministry was "a most important one and becoming more important to the economy of the country."

"I think people generally are beginning to realise and appreciate the importance of wildlife in the country," he said.

Asked about the poaching in the Mara, which he had visited there, Mr. Simon Potts, his top aide, was very serious. Mr. Shako said: "Where the poaching is bad, the need is for more staff, we will have to find more staff."

Asked about the possible conflict with ranching in Karisako and Narok, where large-scale land reclamation is planned, he said: "The Government are aware of the importance of tourism. I am afraid we will have to see that the national interests prevail over individual ranching interests."

At the same time, he undertook to give sympathetic consideration to the problems of farmers who might be willing to farm game animals, but at the moment do not find it feasible to do so.

Mr. Shako said he felt something should be done about suggestions made by Mr. Jack Hlock, of Wildlife Lodges Ltd, who showed him where certain accidents happen to tourists who are being taken to the lodge for treatment.

Some medical facilities were certainly needed at remote places, Mr. Shako said, though initially it would probably be up to the lodge-owners to provide them.

Primary school teachers, who have stayed away from their posts in protest at the non-payment of their wages are expected to return to work today — when the December salary pay-out starts.

The general secretary of the Kenya National Union of Teachers, Mr. S. Kioni, said yesterday that he had been assured that all the teachers who had not paid salaries except Kiambu — had received funds. The G.W.C. council had been given permission to seek an order to return to work today.

Mr. Kioni said officials of his union yesterday met the Deputy Permanent Secretary to the Ministry of Labour, Mr. Mutugi. He thanked the Ministry for intervening in the matter and the Ministry of Education and Local Government on Tuesday in which the union threatened to petition Parliament if all salaries were not paid this week.

Mr. Kioni said the union understood that the Kiambu council had been told to convene an immediate meeting and to adopt a resolution asking permission to pay salaries over the weekend. The union believed that the council responded to its teachers and that the meeting should be held before the weekend.

He hoped the council would not delay the directive, as it had done on two previous occasions.

If the council did not act on the directive the union would call out all its members. It was not an ultimatum, he said.

The Clerk to Mbaraki County Council yesterday refused rumors that he was planning to resign. He said he had decided to continue to work for the county. He said the funds were received only yesterday from the Government and payments would commence today.

Mr. Muliro said yesterday that although all primary schools in the country were opened on Monday, those in the Kakamega District were still "officially" not open because of confusion over payment of school fees.

The president of the K.N.U.T., Mr. D. M. Mutindi, who is also secretary of the provincial council of the union in the Western Province, talked about the confusion when commenting on a circular sent to have been sent to all schools in the district by the District Education Officer, Mr. V. J. Odour, telling headmasters and headmistresses that no child should be admitted before paying fees.

In the circular Mr. Odour is claimed to have said that "any teacher who admitted such children would not only be disciplined but also prosecuted for an illegal offence."

Mr. Mutindi said teachers in the district had no confidence in Mr. Odour and demanded his removal from office.

In another Press statement Mr. Mutindi called on the Provincial Education Officer to set on a new motion picture to be shown in all schools. The resolution complained about classes without teachers in the province and said a joint delegation of the union and M.P.s from the province would seek an interview with the Minister for Education on the matter next Monday.

It said 825 classes had no teachers — 76 in Busia, 222 in Bungoma and 527 in Kakamega. Mr. Mutindi has asked all newly-qualified teachers who have not been offered places to report to the union office before Monday.

The organising secretary of the Nairobi branch of K.N.U.T., Sammy Mutitu, said in a statement yesterday that the branch had a meeting with the Minister for Education yesterday which concerned the delays in paying teachers.

The branch was also concerned about information it had received that teachers who received their jobs to fight the recent primary election would not be reinstated at their old salaries and positions, and that they would be benefited retrospectively.

## ISRAEL WORRIED OVER ARMS DEAL

Israeli Foreign Minister, Mr. Abba Eban, has voiced concern at current negotiations on the supply of French Mirage jet fighters in consultations on the Middle East will not be a complete failure," he affirmed.

Mr. Eban said it was impossible to draw any parallels between the French attitude and the one adopted recently by the United States.

The U.S. in his view had always remained "faithful to certain principles" including the view that Israel's peace had been negotiated. There had been no U.S. pressure for Israeli withdrawal from occupied areas in the Arab region.

The divergences between the American attitude and that of the French and Soviet Governments, still exist, and the result is that the four big powers engaged in consultations on the Middle East will not be a complete failure," he affirmed.

He said that while landlords and estate agents were entitled to a reasonable profit, a fair living wage for their investment, agreed for money must not be the criteria of such an investment.

Landlords should co-operate by revealing those people although it is pointless to generalise about them without giving full details including receipts issued by them, the situation of such premises, etc.

The landlord and estate agents concerned in the recent complaints of all races, he said, "it is most shameful indeed, especially in the case of citizens exploiting citizens. Non-Kenyans tolerated either."

With regard to inhuman conditions in the city and municipalities, he had had talks with the authorities and a cleanliness campaign is under the way.

Private landlords and local authorities had been repeatedly warned regarding inhuman conditions and the bad impression created abroad. "I would probably be up to the lodge-owners to provide them."

# Problems in Kenya

As a livestock and pidgeon exporter not only for cattle, sheep and pigs but also for honey. 





### Capable commentary on export development

In his book *Agricultural Export Development*, published for the Makerere Institute of Social Research by the East African Publishing House, Yosi Kyeziama takes 12 major agricultural commodities which constitute 80 per cent of the area's total exports. These are: sisal, arabia coffee, rubber, coffee, tea, citrus fruits, pyrethrum (flowers), sisal, cotton, groundnuts, wheat, and extract and unrefined maize. These crops were chosen either because they represented major export values, such as sisal, coffee and tea; or because they were important exports in the near future. The author deals with the period from 1948 to 1966 and explains that at some stages the advantages of export expansion in a study of this kind must be balanced against the disadvantages arising from the fact that some of the original statements may have become outdated.

One of the main conclusions to come out of the book, which is number 24 in the East African Studies Series, is that the greatest difficulties in increasing exports of manufacturers' products are seen almost certainly that the East African countries will, for a considerable time in the future, have to depend on exports originating from the agricultural sector.

A commission of the European Economic Community has proposed price cuts for butter, wheat and rice and lower production quotas for sugar as means of eliminating surpluses of these products in the Six.



# Record Stock Market Index

Just before the close of the old year, the Kenya Government floated an issue of six per cent development stock, repayable in 1994 at par, in other words having a life of 23 years. Application lists close tomorrow, but it is understood the response so far has been excellent.

No doubt the issue will be over-subscribed, as so many recent floatations have been in Kenya. At the issue price of £8 per £100 nominal holding, the annual yield runs out at 17.5 per cent. On the surface, this performance would not appear to be over-optimistic measured against expectations by investors but the yield from equities has been falling steadily in recent times.

The new Kenya issue has the advantage that its interest payments and redemption proceeds will be freely transferable within the scheduled territories. Moreover, the stock is eligible for the investment of blocked funds, which can be transferred on maturity. The chief reason for the response is that so much liquid money is on tap in Kenya.

The Nairobi Stock Exchange has been suffering from too much money chasing too little scrip. Possibly, statements will be unacceptable to the public, who will argue there can never be too much money around. The potential factor is too little scrip. Its availability has led to a restriction of business, with higher prices ruling for equities.

Take B.A.T. and E.A.P. and L., for example. These shares are virtually unobtainable. B.A.T. made a sensationally successful public issue. B.A.T. made a sensationally successful fractional allocations. Today, B.A.T. 10% shares are quoted at 25% - cum dividend, with nobody selling. Assuming the 16% Per cent dividend will be maintained, which is a fair assumption from the chairman's statement on results for the first quarter of the 1969-70 financial year, the yield is 16.8 per cent, getting on for 22 per cent lower than was customarily expected by investors a year or two ago.

The net yield of E.A.P. and L. 20% shares, standing at 23%, with a dividend of nine per cent, is £7.13, and so the story goes on. The breweries have had a good year. E.A. Breweries 10% shares are quoted at 19%, so the 13.5 per cent dividend shows a yield of just over 17 1/2%, though the bonus issue must not be overlooked. In motors, Marshalls, paying a dividend of 22.5 per cent, show a net yield of 18.50%.

In their reports, stockbrokers say, the market remained very firm to the end of 1969, with prices finishing on a strong note. One company reported "old year went out with a bang" - as business was very active until New Year's Eve and thereafter the Stock Exchange index reached an all-time high of 184.02, a point of 1.58 over the previous week and an increase of more than 23 points over the year.

These comparisons would seem to reflect buoyant economic and financial conditions, but other factors must be taken into consideration. For instance, currency exchange control permission was given up to the beginning of 1969 to remit Kenya money in order to purchase East African shares on the London register, provided such holdings were then transferred to Nairobi. The decision to end this concession has contributed to restriction of the availability of stock internationally.

Availability is of paramount importance to the Stock Market. Many of the leaders are almost unobtainable, not to mention some of the smaller concerns, and the latter becoming increasingly bought as the former dry up. Institutional investors mopped up a tremendous proportion of the Government stock and equities last year, leaving only a small proportion available for private investors, at rising prices.

This trend can only be halted or reversed by new floatations, since there is undeniably a considerable amount of liquid money in Kenya. This is a financial climate which might be considered attractive to developers. The weakness is that investors go for established companies having good and sustained trading records, while too few new enterprises are being started, financed out of the country, thus affording employment while emerging the national economy. Investment in Kenya in primary producing concerns, but insufficient are being started, outside tourism, to expand the national economy as it should.

The Exchequer surplus approached £14,000,000 at the end of November, almost double the figure 12 months earlier. Externally, Kenya's assets continue to mount. Accepting that huge amounts are needed to finance development, education, medical services and so on, the financial situation ruling at present cannot justify stringent fiscal measures.

Once he was felt wherever he went... by cheering crowds and his nation's leaders. He was the major sporting hero in Czechoslovakia, feared by every distance runner in the world.

But though Emil Zatopek, one of the greatest track performers in history — brought prestige and honour to Czechoslovakia in the 50s, he is now officially in disgrace.

Zatopek, 47, has been dismissed from all his jobs in Czech sports organisations. And he has even been fired from the few a few jobs he has been given since Mr. Dubcek's overthrow.

He was forbidden to set foot on his home town of Prague, and his passport was impounded, and the threat of the hard-liners, Zatopek and his wife had signed the famous 2,000-word 'freedom manifesto' drawn up by the intelligentsia before the invasion.

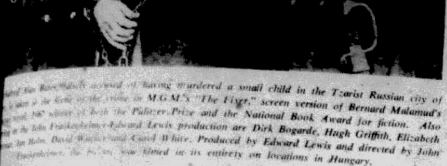

## MALAWI LONE VOICE AT CONFERENCE

The 11-nation East and Central African Foreign Ministers Conference has ended in Lusaka with Malawi, the first Black African State to establish diplomatic relations with South Africa, sharply dissenting from the final communiqué.  
The Malawi delegate, Mr. R. B. Chidzira, that country's Minister for Agriculture and Natural Resources, said afterwards that his country would co-operate with neighbouring white-ruled Portugal, Mozambique and that it believed in "peaceful solutions" to Africa's problems.  
Malawi did not believe in the solutions recommended by the conference for the transfer of power to Africans in White Southern Africa, he said.  
Delegates at the conference have reportedly spoken out strongly against Malawi's policy of friendship with White Southern Africa.  
Mr. Chidzira said Malawi also dissociated itself from the conference.

Sen. Kennedy may be sued

The parents of Mrs. Mary Jo Kopechne, who drowned last July in Sen. Edward Kennedy's car when it plunged into a river after a party, are considering suing the Senator, the newspaper *Harvard Crimson* said in a copyright article. The car fell into the water from an unprotected wooden bridge on Chappaquiddick Island, Massachusetts, on the night of July 18 and 19.  
Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Kopechne's lawyer, Mr. Joseph Panagani, said, however: "I am not in a position at this time to discuss any negotiations we have had or if any negotiations have taken place. We have no immediate plan to file a suit right away."  
The newspaper said the news of a possible lawsuit was given to it by a "family associate" of the accident, where an inquest into the case was continuing.  
Judge James Boyle was trying to determine the circumstances of Mrs. Kopechne's death from a legal aspect.  
He will have to decide, in the light of the evidence, whether or not criminal proceedings should be started against anyone involved in the case.  
The *Harvard Crimson* said that "only an out-of-court settlement is likely to stop the lawsuit."  
Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Kopechne against Sen. Kennedy. There may never be a public acknowledgment that a suit was ever considered," he said.  
In Berkeley Heights, New Jersey, Mr. Kopechne denied that he and his wife were thinking of taking legal action against Sen. Kennedy.  
"There is no basis to that at all," he said.

## Sino-Soviet talks made no progress says paper

No progress had been made in the Chinese-Russian border talks in Peking up to the time they were recessed last month, the leading Hong Kong Communist newspaper *Tung Pao* said yesterday.  
Observers in Hong Kong consider the newspaper as Peking's major vehicle for unofficially conveying its views on the talks.  
The *Tung Pao* Pao, in a report from Canton, said the Soviet Union had spurned a Chinese request for a military disengagement along the 4,500-mile frontier pending the outcome of the border talks.  
The report, quoting informed Chinese sources, said the Soviet Union had acted contrary to an understanding reached last September between the Soviet Prime Minister, Mr. Kossygin, and the Chinese Premier, Mr. Chou En Lai, when the former stopped briefly in Peking.  
"The Soviet side refused to restrain its armed forces during the period when the negotiation was continuing and did not agree to have the armed forces of both sides withdrawn from any contact in the disputed areas," the report said.  
The report, which was the top line of the story in the paper, put the blame squarely on the Russians for what it called the lack of progress in the talks.  
But it did not say if the talks had been resumed. The chief foreign negotiator, the First Deputy Foreign Minister, Mr. Vasily Kuznetsov, returned to Peking six days ago.  
The talks were recessed last month when Mr. Kuznetsov went to Moscow ostensibly to attend a parliamentary session in November. But the *Tung Pao* Pao reported that there was no sign of progress in the Peking talks and it was taken by observers as a reliable sign of the progress of the talks in the absence of any official news from either Peking or Moscow.

# Do-it-yourself trunk calls

One evening this week, the V.O.K. put out a captivating television Forum discussion about STD, which means Subscriber Trunk Dialling. This is the super technical and fabulously expensive system of do-it-yourself trunk calls enabling anybody lucky enough to have a telephone in Nairobi to dial distant places without losing their hair waiting but—after frustratingly being answered by the operator.

The purpose of the Forum was to ask questions about the operation of STD and have them answered by experts. As is so often the way with discussions, this one repeatedly wandered away from the central track. The inquirers were determined to screw their victims down over delays and impositions on the part of exchange operators and the long lists of applicants waiting for telephones.

The victims were equally resolved to brush all these allegations aside. There is no available delay, they countered, because if you dial 0 and have to wait ten minutes or more this is because the operator is busy dealing with somebody else who might come up on the board before you. Neither are the operators rude; but if they are—arguing an alternative defence—it must be the caller's fault for being rude first. Whether or not this case can be argued successfully, the disconcerted caller should be fortified by considering an old saying about the customer always being right—even with a monopoly.

Truth to tell, personnel in charge of the STD will often be almost always courteous and helpful. They will often go to inordinate lengths, with an international call for instance, to find people in inaccessible places and redirect calls to other numbers in their quest.

The trouble about the telephone is that it is an abominably anti-social instrument, bringing outsiders bursting into the privacy of your hearth and home when they are not wanted; but a highly convenient instrument when wanted and vital in an emergency.

What is irritating is to be told off in a condescending manner or be offered free advice, such as the experience which befell a caller who wrote to the Press some time ago, saying: "After having a very personal conversation with my girl friend, I was tapped by an operator during the conversation. The operator had received some rather unimpressive and uncalled-for advice on how to handle our affairs. I have, but two days later, received another unbearable shock." It seems his patience was exhausted with "alternating repetitions of exaggerated services" for 30 minutes which reached the crescendo of: "I cannot help you... call... if you still want the line back, you will have to insert another 140."

Allowing that all operators are human, if callers are not and are busy every unforgiving minute of their hours on duty, what the inquirers could not bring themselves to accept was that masses of money (from loans intended for development) should be spent on STD and super-hyped exchanges, while existing installations, and the Industrial Area was quoted as one (no wonder) have frequent faults. Moreover, there are hundreds of applicants on the waiting lists. This is where the real P.R.O. job for the Post Office comes in, to explain that installing the latest equipment pushes development forward, to prevent overloading and breakdowns, creating more lines for more, the waiting lists in East Africa are nothing like as long as those in some of the European continental countries, where there is no prospect of getting a phone for years to come and then probably only after paying a fine.

In wonderment, the inquirers wanted to know the sense of installing new-fangled machinery if that cuts down the number of manual workers wanted. Sophisticated machinery does not do as singularly unhelpful thing for African countries badly needing to provide more and more jobs for youngsters leaving school. If computers and other machines do create new jobs in the field of a different kind, for there has to be a turn-over from the clerk making entries in a ledger to technicians minding the machines.

The world of the experts gets crazier. Millions in money have been spent to enable man take a walk on the Moon. Yet nobody can cure the common cold, cancer or corns, or explain how a cat purrs. "Keep your feet on the ground" became the concluding theme of the Forum, no doubt the inquirers waving at the back of their minds the thought that astronauts wearing capricious on their heads will soon be piling around the Milky Way. In the midst of the fandango of this technological age, the simple things of life get forgotten. "What shall it profit a man if he shall gain the whole world and lose his own soul?"

# ensures people's freedom

The Socialist Federal Republic of Yugoslavia has learned through bitter experience that too much centralisation of power can slow progress, cause frustration, delay decisions and make some individuals almost "mad with power". Normal people with too much power in a strongly centralised government become unconsciously arrogant because they find themselves deciding the fate of millions of people.

To avoid this sort of situation, Yugoslavia has embarked on decentralisation of power and has set up a Federal Republic which ensures a uniform basis for the economic and political system, the basic freedoms and the rights of its citizens, the unity of the economy and the monetary and credit systems.

The Socialist Republic, which is the Central Government, is headed by President Tito—a man considered by most Yugoslavs as the father of their nation. He is admired by both young and old and is the moving spirit behind Yugoslavia's mode of social organisation.

The Federal Assembly elects the President and the Vice-President by a secret ballot, and also elects the Council of the Federation, the Executive Council and the Constitutional Court and the Supreme Court.

The Federal Assembly decides on all economic, social, political and cultural matters, and also elects the Federal Secretaries of State.

The Federal Assembly is composed of five chambers with a total of 670 Deputies. The chambers are: the Chamber of the People, the Chamber of the Republics, the Chamber of Public Health and Social Welfare, the Chamber of Nationalities, the Chamber of Education and Political Culture, and the Chamber of Chamber of Nationalities.

The six Republics (regions) are: Serbia, Slovenia, Croatia, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Macedonia and Montenegro. Two autonomous provinces (form part of Serbia) are: Vojvodina and Kosovo.

All the republics have the same set-up of government as the Federal Republic, each having five chambers representing varied interests. They have power to plan for their own economic development, their own education up to university level and have almost full internal self-government.

They discharge all affairs pertaining to their political, economic and cultural life. Only defence and foreign policy is centrally controlled, otherwise the republics are free to run their affairs as they wish.

A new law must always be passed by at least two of the Federal chambers, but the Chamber of Nationalities must give its assent before any act becomes law.

The electoral system of Yugoslavia appears to be one of the most interesting in the world. A Deputy can only be re-elected once after serving a term of four years.

This gives a maximum of eight years for a Deputy to serve in the Assembly. A Deputy who retires after eight years can stand again at least two or three more years.

The electoral system in Yugoslavia can be equated to the just candidates in Kenya, where all candidates were Kana, and every candidate had to prove his worth before the electors.

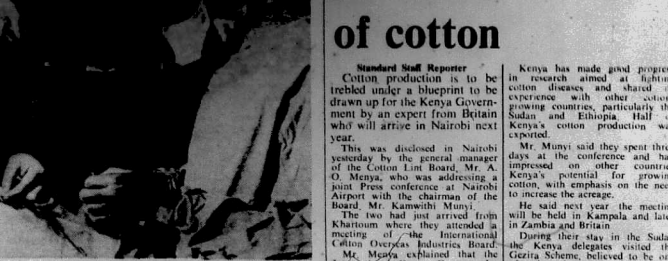

# Biafra boom calls for new boom in Kenya

## Standard Staff Reporter

Only a person blind to statistics and common sense could fail to see prosperity in Kenya today, the governor of the Central Bank of Kenya, Mr. Duncan Ndegwa, said yesterday.

He told the Kenya Institute of Management that Kenya's rate of growth since independence had been one of the highest in any developing country, and added: "I am nevertheless suggesting that there is room for a further boost in our words of economic activity."

Measures taken to offset the effects of the devaluation of Sterling in 1967 had left the Central Bank with foreign exchange reserves of over £58,000,000 on January 10—more than double the figure in June last year.

With the present high liquidity in the country, the Central Bank would like to see its controls on borrowing by foreign-controlled companies.

What people do not seem to know is that the Central Bank and the Government have relaxed these measures considerably. Funds for use in industry and farming activities are granted with very little restrictions for all companies. The banks have permission without restriction to the Central Bank to lend to any company up to 20 per cent of foreign capital brought in to a foreign enterprise.

What the Central Bank questions is pressure for unlimited access to borrowing savings in Kenya by foreign-controlled companies. If they wish to do so they should be incorporated in Kenya otherwise their activities would be more exploitative than productive as they will be able to send out proportionally larger profits than capital brought here.

Well over half the money being used in Kenya was borrowed money, and a situation could arise where the country's spending exceeded available savings plus borrowing overseas, leading to inflation.

But though a long boom of confidence in money and lack of inflation miseries in unimpaired policy, the Central Bank's policy was not to intervene in the event of a slump in the economy.

Explaining why this was so, Mr. Ndegwa traced the country's monetary history since devaluation in November 1967. After devaluation, he said a sudden expansion in the demand for bank advances led Kenya facing a loss of nearly 20,000 tons of its foreign exchange account.

The Central Bank took action aimed at reducing the demand for advances by the business com-

In Teheran yesterday the deputy leader of the British Labour Party, Mr. George Brown, said he was more optimistic than before about the possibilities of a political solution to the Israeli-Arab conflict.

Mr. Brown, who is touring the Middle East, said on his arrival: "In fact I have met here a sense of realism and full understanding concerning the urgent need of settling the conflict."

Mr. Brown will be having talks with Iranian leaders and the Shah, and will be the guest of the Iranian Government during his stay. He leaves for Tel Aviv tomorrow.

In Jerusalem the Israeli Defence Minister, Gen. Dayan, said Israel was ready to exchange prisoners with the Lebanese, whom the Lebanese Government wanted the return of Israeli frontier guards captured by Eilat commandos on January 10.

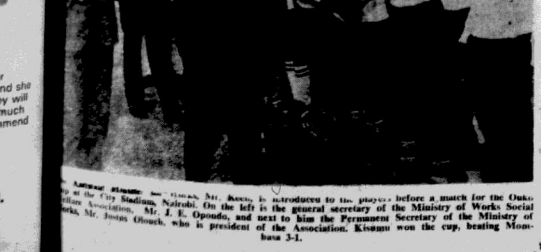

## No early U.S. landing Party girls 'grounded' on Mars

The United States, which crowned its space achievements in the 1960s with man's first landing on the Moon, is expected to set itself more modest goals in space in the next decade.

The Space Budget for the coming financial year will probably be less than the \$3,000,000,000 being spent in the current year, and it is unlikely there will be an early commitment to put a man on Mars, informed sources said yesterday.

President Nixon has been examining various alternative space programmes but Space Agency officials are reported to have abandoned hope that he will adopt the most ambitious — and costly — plan, culminating in a manned flight to Mars in 1983.

If the Administration rejects this programme the earliest a Mars landing could take place would be 1986.

A reduction in space spending may have been foreshadowed by last week's announcement that the reusable six Apollo manned flights to the Moon are to be spread over an additional two years, into 1974.

A cut in the space budget would help the current fight against inflation and answer critics who say the money is needed more urgently for social problems.

The Space Agency's major objectives in the 1970s are the development of an Earth-orbit shuttle ship and the establishment of a manned orbiting space station.

President Nixon will probably make a statement on space objectives after the 1971 Space Budget is announced with the rest of the Federal Budget later this month.

## PARIS AFRICANS IN HOUSING PROTEST

Seven hundred African workers stayed locked inside a disused chocolate factory in protest against the housing conditions of their countrymen in France.

The occupation of the factory in suburban Ivry started when demonstrations were held there last week the funeral of five African workers who died of asphyxiation after their unheated room to ward off the cold.

The Ivry factory serves as a home for the 700 Africans, who have been refusing to pay their rent for several months.

They say the factory agent told them he was going to increase the rent but refused to provide showers or toilets. Electricity and water supplies to the factory have been cut-off.

Police said only one of 24 people detained during a demonstration outside the factory on Saturday was still in custody.

They named him as Roland Castro, a young architect who edits a Leftwing magazine, and said he had been charged with insulting police and inciting a riot.

About 160 people held during other demonstrations connected with the funeral of the five Africans have also been released, police said. They included the writers Marguerite Duras and Jean Genet.

## Tashkent silence imposed on me says Mr. Bhutto

A former Foreign Minister, Mr. Zulfiar Ali Bhutto, has accused Pakistan's military regime of stopping him from revealing a mystery behind the declaration of Indo-Pakistan Tashkent declaration of January 1966.

Mr. Bhutto, leader of the pro-Peking People's Party, threatened to boycott next October's general election if he is not allowed to tell Pakistanis what they have a right to know.

Mr. Bhutto was Foreign Minister when ex-President Ayub Khan went to Tashkent four years ago to sign a peace declaration with the

late Indian Premier, Mr. Shastri, after their war over Kashmir in September, 1965.

The Soviet Premier, Mr. Alexei Kosygin, sponsored the declaration which aimed at bringing India and Pakistan together.

But the ordinary Pakistani viewed it as a diplomatic defeat and Mr. Bhutto — who later left the Cabinet — promised to disclose the mystery behind the talks at a mass rally.

About 25,000 people gathered to hear Mr. Bhutto claim instead that a Col. Qureshi and two other people met him when he arrived in Rawalpindi by plane.

They told him, he claimed, he should not speak on the Tashkent agreement and Indo-Pakistan conflicts or they would invoke the Official Secrets Act against him.

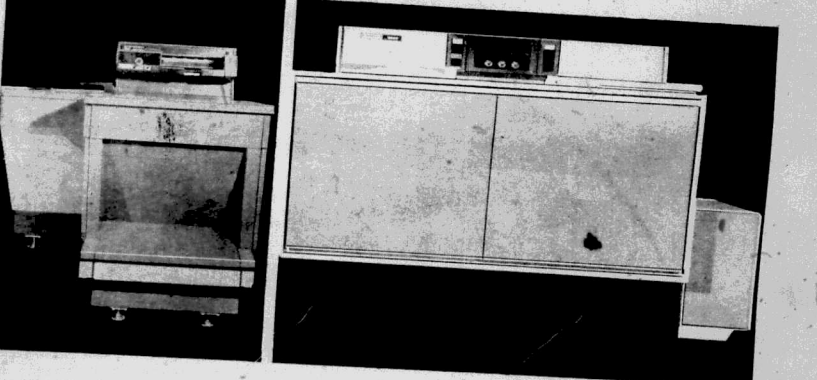

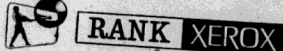

It seems a long way from the useful, Cockney-sounding style that became the rage of the mid-60s under the careful guidance of her manager Justin de Villeneuve, to the glitz of a Hollywood musical comedy. But Twiggy, 26 years old last September, has long cherished the idea of doing a musical.

She will go far miles to see a revival of the old Fred Astaire-Ginger Rogers musical classics of some thing of that style would find its way into any movie, she agreed to make. Top officials at the lavish studio-office of Twiggy Enterprises in London's West End are eager about just how far negotiations have gone. But they do agree

# The best woman pilot of 1969

While Sheila Scott of Britain was attracting world attention as the only woman entrant in the London-Sydney air race — someone else was following in her footsteps. Without fuss, a lone woman pilot climbed aboard a tiny plane at Gatwick Airport and set off solo for Australia. For Janet Ferguson it was just another routine job.

When, before Christmas, she was presented with the Sir Alan Cobham Award as the outstanding woman pilot of 1969 — Sheila Scott is a previous holder — she was covered in confusion. "What is it for?" she asked in astonishment.

Janet Ferguson, modest and virtually unknown, is one of the world's best women pilots with a string of qualifications that would make many a male pilot envious.

She is cool, skilful, resourceful and utterly fearless. In the past year she has flown thousands of miles solo over some of the world's toughest routes — across desert sea, jungle and Arctic snow. Yet she does not own a plane and has never won a race in her life.

This quiet woman is one of a rare breed — a rare breed of fearless who flies, quite simply, the difficult, exacting and exacting, yet fascinating business of being a pilot.

Janet will talk about her job in a matter-of-fact way. Delivering and collecting parcels of all shapes and sizes to and from every corner of the world, often in bad weather conditions, is just routine for her.

Janet Ferguson, who has just been named the outstanding woman pilot of 1969, is a quiet, modest woman who flies any plane anywhere as a job of work. She is a ferry pilot. Whether it's an Otter plane to Iceland or Jersey cows for Europe Janet is happy to do it, reports PAT STOTT.

"Yes, it does mean I have to know how to handle all kinds of aircraft equipment. To run into freezing cloud on route would have been fatal."

Janet found herself stranded in Iceland for two weeks, waiting for low cloud to lift for the hop across to Greenland. Even then the plane was ill-equipped to go up to Sandstrom, a sophisticated air port.

Janet had to make for Narvik, carrying an airstrip sited at the end of a fjord and helped in by mountains. With Narvik being equipped for daylight-only landings, and daylight in winter, the Arctic winter pilots always try to avoid it.

Nevertheless, with a cool head below the cloud — and above the light still in hand — Janet got through.

When I questioned Janet Ferguson's how she would just part-

icular trip he said simply: "You know that when Janet does a job there won't be any mistakes."

Peter Nock, the most experienced ferry pilot in Europe, who runs his own company, is the man who gave Janet her big break. Three years ago he broke with tradition and turned down dozens of male applicants to sign her up for his company.

"She is an outstanding pilot who happens to be a woman, that's all," he points out. "She gets the feel of each one of the minute she starts flying it."

In fact, during 1969 Peter Nock persuaded Hawker Siddeley, the British aircraft factory, to break with tradition and allow Janet to help with deliveries of the HS125 via the Arctic route to America.

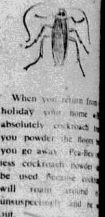

# Magistrates have the responsibility of ensuring that the "insidious practice" of court prosecutors asking the court to impose deterrent sentences on convicted persons is stamped out, a Kenya High Court judge, Mr. Justice Trevelyan, said in Nairobi yesterday.

He made the remark when quashing the conviction and sentence of seven years imprisonment imposed on Karim Magharia by a Nairobi magistrate, in October on a charge of handling a stolen radio.

An order by the magistrate that the applicant should undergo five years' police supervision after the jail term was also set aside.

Reviewing the evidence on which the magistrate had found the appellant "guilty," the judge said there were inadequate reasons for convicting Magharia.

"There was evidence of an insidious practice given by police, but no mention of it was made in the indictment and it was to be presumed the magistrate decided not to rely on it. Moreover, he had said he found the applicant to be a thief without giving the slightest reason for so bold a statement," the judge said.

The charge appeared to be defective, nor were the requisite ingredients of handling a stolen radio all found to be established in the indictment.

Mr. Justice Trevelyan said: "Yet again the prosecutor, despite statements by judges of this court, is contenting on the reply given to me and once more it is pointed out that this practice is most improper."

"The prosecutor should give the facts and that is all. Magistrates have the responsibility of ensuring that this insidious practice is stamped out."







...warm welcome in Nairobi today, after his State engagements with President Kenyatta and public appearances at Mombasa and Voi. The Coast party turned out to greet him in a display of cordial friendship.

The Archbishop of Uganda is also President of Cyprus. He and the President of Kenya will be remembered as the outstanding leaders in the anti-colonial era of the mid-20th century, when their countries were among so many that attained sovereignty.

An incident during that period gave rise to a jesty moment when His Beatitude asked to be taken to the jetty at Mombasa. Again he stood on the spot where he had been taken off to be put aboard a British destroyer and exile on the Seychelles.

At that time, he was conducting the independence movement in Cyprus. As he reminded guests at the State luncheon, "President Kenyatta was also in prison for the same reasons and the same cause—the struggle for freedom."

This newspaper can share his interest in looking back to that scene 14 years ago. In great secrecy he had been flown from Cyprus to arrive one Saturday morning in Mombasa where he was whisked under close security guard to the destroyer which had arrived from London.

Nevertheless, the East African Standard was able to pierce the veil of secrecy and obtain an outstanding world news scoop. Aerial pictures were taken of Archbishop Makarios still under close escort, he found a Standard staff reporter waiting, the only pressman to get there for three weeks.

In those days, communications were restricted and it is impossible to recall the exact details of his arrival. Had he been sent in advance, by ship bound for Italia, calling at Mombasa, which had arrived from London on the Sunday, ahead of the destroyer.

News about Archbishop Makarios was sent to the outside world frequently during the ensuing weeks of his exile. Later, while writing to the East African Standard, he was able to describe his living conditions on the island. He was the beneficiary of special treatment from Cyprus beached so were the preliminary planning could take place in order to get a permit in position. Well, that would be telling!

## 'Deterrent sentence' caution

Kenya's judiciary is independent in meeting out justice, as the Attorney-General is in deciding whether to prosecute. However, a serious warning has been given in the High Court against what Mr. Justice Trevelyan described as "the deterrent sentence" of court prosecutors asking magistrates to impose deterrent sentences.

He made this statement in quashing a sentence of seven years' jail, to be followed by five years' police supervision, passed on a man charged with handling a stolen wireless set. In doing so, the magistrate has been rebuked on grounds of the High Court. Several heavy sentences had been pronounced in appeal. Public notice has been taken of disparities in sentencing imposed in different magistrates' courts for crimes of varying gravity.

There is a duty upon the judges and magistrates to reflect the weight of public opinion in relation to offences which have ever drunk driving and crime with violence. They are entitled to take into consideration the depth of public concern when imposing sentences, guilt having been proved according to the tenets of the law.

What Mr. Justice Trevelyan rightly had in mind when quashing magistrates was that they should not be influenced by special pleading for deterrent sentences on the part of court prosecutors. Holding that this practice is "most improper," he maintained the duty of a prosecutor is solely to present the facts of the case. The decision as to guilt or innocence and, if the former, the sentence, should be left to the magistrate. Appeal against the decision lies to the High Court, with ultimate recourse to the Court of Appeal for Eastern Africa.
