Mr. Dubcek looking slightly annoyed to reporters as he crossed to the airport lounge.

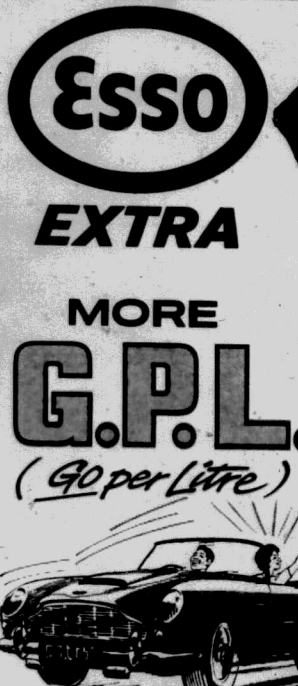

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394 killed at My Lai say Viet Buddhists

South Vietnam's militant Buddhist Church announced yesterday that it was committing itself to an investigation of the alleged My Lai massacre but for establishing the whereabouts of the 284 people had been killed and 25 wounded.

The "An Quang pagoda, headquarters of the Church, said in a statement that investigations were continuing into reports that the total death toll was 570.

So far members of 33 families had come forward to report the loss of 129 relatives in the massacre. The deaths of a further 92 members of 26 other families had been reported by non-relatives, and outsiders had reported the deaths of another 103 people from 35 families in the adjoining hamlet of My Hai on the same day — March 16, 1968.

The statement said the unaffiliated Buddhist Church was conducting the investigation because it had no faith in measures taken by the Government over the affair.

The Government has denied that there was a massacre, but said that 26 civilians were killed at My Lai in accidental deaths.

Other engagements included a North Vietnamese and National Liberation Front attack on Zmureux village near the 4th U.S. Infantry Division base of Pleiku in the Central Highlands. The Americans killed 14 attackers in 10 minutes, suffering no losses themselves.

Vietnamese and NLF forces continued their build-up around Da Nang air base, constructing bunkers and fortifications, and U.S. officers expect an attack there either before or just after the Tet festival on February 6 and 7.

U.S. Marines clashed with one Viet Cong L.P. men building a bunker near An Hoa, south of Da Nang, and killed eight of them. The Marines had artillery backing, and had no losses.

Other clashes occurred near the Cambodian frontier and north of Saigon, near the headquarters of the 1st Infantry Division.

Shadow on Premier's Future

India celebrated its 20th Republic Day anniversary yesterday with the national scene still marked by political and economic instability and the Government facing a series of synoptic problems.

The Premier, Mrs. Indira Gandhi, has just completed four years' stewardship of the country, but splits in the ruling Congress Party and disruptive tendencies in a number of states and communities have cast shadows over her future.

The way in which Mrs. Gandhi handled the 1967 Communist leadership in the Congress Right-wing, led by old party stalwarts, and her tactics to induce urgent solution can mean chaos or a new era, a nation of more than 500,000,000 people.

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POPE 'BITTER' AT CELIBACY SNUB

The Pope yesterday proclaimed a new Roman Catholic saint and said he found consolation in the canonisation "in this hour of tribulation for the Church and of bitterness for us."

He said this during the ceremony in Saint Peter's Basilica, Rome, for the canonisation of a 19th-century Spanish nun, Maria Soledad Torres Acosta, founder of the Servants of Mary, a religious order which cares for the sick.

It was the 80th canonisation since the beginning of the century. Other saints canonised this century include Saint Joan of Arc, Saint Bernadette of Lourdes, the Robert Bellarmine and Saint Theresa of the Sacred Heart.

The Pope's reference to the Church's present tribulation and his personal bitterness was believed by Vatican observers to be linked with the current situation of the Church in Holland.

The Pope has strongly defended on several occasions the celibacy of priests. In a letter on Christmas Eve before a pastoral council, the Pope specifically asked the Dutch bishops to give firm backing to his teaching on celibacy. However, in a move that was sure to have caused great disappointment in Rome, they appear to have decided to support the local demands.

Apart from Holland, the Pope's speech voicing fears of possible genocide in Nigeria, after the end of the Federal-Biafra conflict, provoked strong adverse reactions and criticism from the Federal Government. It also led to demonstrations against him in Lagos.

The Vatican pointed out that the Pope, who has made many efforts and pleas for peace in the world during his reign, did not suggest that there would be genocide, but had simply expressed the fears that had reached him from many people in telegram, letters and delegations.

In yesterday's canonisation ceremony the Pope said of the new saint: "We feel her holiness radiating out all over the world." He added that her life could be summed up in two words — humility and charity.

Mr. Dubcek and his wife left in separate cars with a police escort for the Czechoslovak Consulate in the fashionable Maltepe district of Istanbul.

His arrival had received widespread publicity in the Turkish Press, but there were no demonstrators at the airport.

394 killed at My Lai say Viet Buddhists

The An Quang pagoda, headquarters of the church, said in a statement that investigations were continuing into reports that the total death toll was 770.

So far members of 33 families have come forward to report the loss of 199 relatives in the massacre. The deaths of a further 32 members of 26 other families had been reported by non-relatives.

Another 107 people from 25 families in the adjoining hamlet of My Hai on the same day - March 16, 1968.

The statement said the Buddhist Church was conducting the investigation because it had no faith in measures taken by the Government over the matter.

The Government has denied that 26 civilians were killed at My Lai on an accidental shooting.

On the war front United States troops, entering the A Shau Valley near Laos, at a spot 28 miles from Hue, a U.S. spokesman said yesterday in Saigon.

The spokesman said the helicopter, from the 11st Airborne Division, had gone North Vietnam. He said the helicopter was unable to land on many towers there were on either side of the valley.

Some days ago a helicopter was reported to have crashed in the valley.

While South Vietnamese said armoured vehicles had entered the valley, American intelligence services reported mass convoys of vehicles approaching South Vietnam from the North in the 'Ho Chi Minh' trail.

Booming trade for charcoal in Arabian Gulf

An unprecedented rise in the export of Kenya charcoal reached a new peak in mid-January when two chartered vessels were loading simultaneously at Kilindini Harbour, Mombasa, nearly twice as much between them as the total exports of the commodity for the whole of 1968.

This was the climax of an eight-week period during which seven ships will have loaded a total of over 20,000 tons of Kenya charcoal at Mombasa for delivery to ports in the Arabian Gulf.

Statistics for the year 1968 are not yet available, but the published figures for charcoal exports from Kenya in 1967 to all destinations were 9,000 tons at some stages, over 2,000 tons in 1967.


The two vessels are the Nais K (7,000 tons) and the Ebesina (1,275 tons) like the other five ships loaded at Kilindini since the end of November, their cargoes all emanated from areas in the Kwale and Taita districts, and were railfed to Mombasa from Mwashini Road.



Minister promises same syllabus for all schools

The Minister for Education, Mr. Towett, said in Kisumu that the Government would change school syllabus to cope with the new system of education, so that all students, whether in private, harambee or Government schools, shall be able to learn the same subjects and receive the same secondary school education.

The Minister, who was addressing a parents' association at the Kisumu Social Centre on Monday, said that the Government was aware of the problems that faced harambee and private schools in the country. The Government was trying to do its best to ensure that every child received proper education.

On the question of free primary education, Mr. Towett said that if all *wamachi* learn the age of 10 and above paid a special levy of 40/-, the Government might be in a position to introduce free primary education to all children.

He advised parents to form a country-wide parents' association through which their problems and problems could be presented to the Government.

He said that it was through such organisation that they could be able to discuss their problems and find ways of solving them.

The Minister, who was visiting private secondary schools in Kisumu, paid tribute to members of Luo Union (E.A.) for their co-operation and hard work which enabled them to run Kamogi College since its foundation 10 years ago.

Working wives can be a valuable asset

Working wives. Are they an asset to the nation; the mothers of future juvenile delinquents; partners with their husbands in building a home; unprincipled meanies who are taking the bread out of working men's mouths?

There are just about as many different opinions as there are possible jobs. Opinions depend largely on the speaker's age, sex and circumstances, but in fact the opinions scarcely alter the basic fact. In the seventies, a woman's place is no longer entirely in the home.

Almost imperceptibly during the sixties the climate of opinion everywhere has shifted slightly in favour of the woman who sees no reason why she should not combine a family and a career. There are some countries where women have always worked on a par with men — Russia and Israel spring immediately to mind, but in some parts of Britain, especially places like the Lancashire cotton towns, it has long been accepted that wives and mothers continue working after marriage and think nothing of it.

Just mostly in Britain and to a certain extent in Kenya, since attitudes got exported along with all the other colonial trappings, it was generally considered that unless financial straits were dire there was something a bit off about the woman who popped off and got a job as soon as the children were old enough for school.

This is the attitude that has subtly begun to change — partly because intelligent and educated women are so badly needed in all kinds of jobs, and partly because there is no evidence that the children of working mothers are any

more likely to go off the rails than those children whose mothers faithfully keep the home fire burning.

There are, of course, plenty of domesticated women who want brighter, more than to create a home and sit in it. If their curtains are and their minds as dull as ditch-water, who is to cast the first stone? Certainly not the working mother, frantically hurrying between home, school, office and shops.

Almost all working wives suffer from a curious syndrome that no medicine has ever investigated. When they are working, they may think with longing of being their own boss at home, lary chatty coffee mornings, and the glorious feeling of having all the work under control. Give them this situation and after a few days they wonder what is going on at the office, and how the boss can possibly be managing without them.

Some home-bound wives live their lives vicariously through their husbands and children. From them one hears surprising remarks like "Yes, we've just had a caution put in the works" — though her husband knows perfectly well that she has had nothing at all to do with it.

Luckiest of all are wives who have a skill or a training that enables them to work, or stop working, at will. Patricia Marshall, for instance, is tremendously popular with Donauvi Maafe fans and curvy really knitting small garments, will with the ready approval of

husband Pat Hughes, return to the stage soon after the blessed event. But however arduous the rehearsal and the run of a play, the work need not be continuous and this applies to other jobs, too.

Women doctors take jobs, as locums to keep their hands in; highly trained secretaries are always welcome as temporaries, and in a few other categories it is possible to take an occasional job that does not have to be permanent.

On the whole, though, the average wife must either return to her career and stick at it, or forget about it altogether. An increasing number choose the former course and seldom regret it.

In these days of work permits some expatriate wives have to re-tire before they wish to, but Kenya citizens of all races have the choice before them — a home and family, or a career — or all three together, and why not?

In Holland Het Dorp means The Village, and it is indeed a village like any other — except that its residents are all physically handicapped, suffering from such disabling diseases as cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis and poliomyelitis.

Since 1966 The Village has provided the handicapped with a world of their own, free from what Dr. Arie Klawnski, the founder, calls "the supremacy of the able-bodied".

Carefully selected for their mental and social competence, residents usually work in the village workshop, but a few have clerical jobs in a nearby city.

At present, according to an article in *Medical Tribune*, The Village shelters 256 adults including 14 married couples. Ultimately, the population will reach 400.

Financed originally by £2,000,000 raised during a 23-hour Dutch television marathon, The Village has a shopping centre, restaurant, gymnasium, a library and even a

Village for disabled New covering for outside walls

A virtually unbreakable material for covering outside walls, with a finish of natural stone, is now being mass-produced in Britain. It is cheap, strong, durable, fire-resistant — and elegant.

Reporting in a B.B.C. broadcast, George Short said the new wall covering is known by the trade name Sienri Cladding. It is being made in Britain for all the world except Scandinavia, and Spain, which have their own manufacturing arrangements.

Sienri Cladding is produced in panels 18 1/2 by 4ft. The panels are 5mm. thick, quite light, and very strong indeed. At a demonstration in London somebody kept hitting one with a hammer to show that it will not shatter like its rival, asbestos. The strength comes from glass fibre. The panels are in fact made by impregnating two layers of glass fibre cloth with a mixture

of powdered stone and synthetic resin. Before this sets, the surface is sprinkled with granulated stone and, by choosing a crystalline kind, the panels are given a permanent sparkle.

At present, Sienri Cladding panels are made in three colours — brown, green and white; but more colours and features will be available later. The panels are fixed by sticking them to the wall or by screwing them to wooden battens. The joints and edges can be trimmed with a variety of aluminium extrusions, which are also made by the manufacturers. Guest, Keen and Nerlie told. The cost of Sienri Cladding panels, in quantity, is about 30 shillings per square yard.

By 1949 her private life could no longer be kept private. Her husband, Roberto Rossellini, who directed most of her pictures in the next few years, and after their first joint film venture, *Stromboli*, she had twins by Rossellini and divorced Dr. Lindstrom to marry him.

She was the only woman film star of the time whose name on a poster would guarantee American success. She had the only need to walk for people to ask, "Who wrote that wonderful film...?"

In Hollywood of the late forties, people said that sort of thing about Ingrid Bergman. She was already a legend in her own lifetime.

Then, suddenly, it was all over. Her affair with Italian director Roberto Rossellini, and the films they made together, was not the sort of thing Hollywood legends are all about. The celluloid cut closed its golden gates, and it has taken 20 decades later, at a still beautiful 52, the city she was in Hollywood to let her over.

Ingrid's gift for languages — she speaks five fluently — was to be useful to her in the next few years in her wanderings around Europe, which came to an end in 1958 when she divorced Rossellini, married the Swedish theatrical producer, Lars Schmidt, and settled in France with him.

The next three years, which she appeared in 11 films, playing a leading role in none. In 1957 she teamed with Greta Garbo, Sweden's biggest movie star, in a new film called *Intimitet*. Along came contracts.

She did a big film in Berlin and she then went to Hollywood to support the late Lucille Howard in another version of *Intimitet*.

Ingrid now married to Dr. Peter Lindstrom, returned to Sweden. They had a daughter, Pia, and two sons, World War II started, Ingrid and Pia managed to see aboard the last ship sailing

from Genoa to the United States. Her life in Hollywood flourished. Indeed she was so in demand that David Selznick, who had discovered her, was forced to loan her to other studios.

Figures disclosed yesterday of the greatly increased volume of work being done at Kenya National Hospital are a cause both for satisfaction and concern. They are clear evidence that despite understandable complaints about the long delays patients often have to endure, and occasional inadequacies of treatment and service, the hospital is performing a great national service.

The advances in social welfare introduced by the Government since Independence, including free out-patient treatment, have been vindicated by the response of the heavy exodus of confidence they have shown in the hospital and its staff.

Nairobi's population has doubled since 1962, but Kenya has more than 200 per cent. This shows that heavy extra work on the hospital is not caused merely by the fact that there are more people in the city but by the greater willingness to seek qualified medical advice and treatment.

The number of in-patients has almost doubled in the same period, even though the total number of beds available, including those in the "filter clinics", is still only 1,136.

This extension of services to greater numbers of people has not been carried out without strain or difficulty. The hospital authorities are aware of the discontent often expressed by patients who have not been able to get immediate attention.

They point out that the hospital is shouldering an "almost intolerable burden" and ask for understanding from the people's complaints should be set against the comparatively few silent people who have been helped back to health.

Ambitious new plans are going ahead to build an additional 1,000-bed hospital, seven stories high. This is the second phase operating theatres, more specialist clinics and other facilities. Completion will take time, and meanwhile the hospital will continue to do its utmost to cope with the sick and suffering as best it can.

As a spokesman has no doubts in need of treatment is ever turned away by the harassed doctors and nurses at the K.N.H. They deserve the nation's thanks.

Calm needed on shanties

But there has been a far greater outcry against last week's Kamburi hut burnings than on any previous occasion.

To the extent that this reflects greater sympathy by officials and public this has been a good thing. But it will not be a good thing for the controversy to continue in a heated atmosphere, or to develop on political lines.

The fact that President Kenyatta has intervened personally should end this danger, and is evidence of the seriousness with which his Government is taking the matter. The Minister for Local Government, Dr. Kiambu, and the Mayor of Nairobi, Coun. Lugogo, had already begun a series of talks with Kamburi, Coun. proposals to solve the problem of those made homeless by the public health in the general context of the need to preserve the need to maintain Nairobi's reputation as one of the world's most beautiful cities need not conflict with the urgent necessity of helping the homeless and the needy. Standards must be maintained and laws observed, or the nation's economy will suffer and everybody will be poorer. Public hygiene is more important than politics.

Priority should be given to helping resettle those burned out of their huts. Meanwhile it might be wise to suspend temporarily further action against shanty-dwellers, without abandoning the City Council campaign, so that the official talks can go on in a calmer atmosphere.

Minister's brother murder case

Njogha yesterday denied having made a statement at Kabete police station to the effect that he killed Mr. Njogha. He has received his defence.

Prosecution evidence, Asst. Insp. Peter Francis Anyo said he saw a dead body on arriving at the scene. The body was cut in several places on the head and hands.

Asst. Insp. Francis Omondi, who took a statement from Njogha, said he did not use any truth or false promises to get the statement.

When the accused was asked by the magistrate whether he objected to the statement being admitted as an exhibit, Njogha asked that the statement be put to him. Afterwards, he said: "I do not believe I signed this statement to the police."

The magistrate ruled that the statement would be allowed as an exhibit for the purpose of the preliminary inquiry only.

Njogha is alleged to have said: "I killed him because he was going about with my wife, leaving children with me."

Const. Philip Langat of Kabete police station, who was on duty at the report office, said that at about 10.30 p.m. an old man came to the station and pointed out the accused.

"This man told me that he had accused had fought somebody called Njogha. He had many blood stains on him. Before the man arrived, we had received information that there was a murder case."

Const. Charles K. Kijochi, who said he was a Kikuyu and spoke English well, told the court that on December 5 at about 9.15 a.m. he was requested by Asst. Insp. Omondi to act as an interpreter when Njogha was interviewed.

He said the statement was made by Njogha voluntarily without any undue promises. He translated the statement to Njogha from English into Kikuyu. Njogha then signed the statement. He said he was correctly recorded.

Industrial Court decides against branch secretary

The court had carefully considered submissions put forward by the parties but could not find any grounds for ordering the reinstatement of the union branch secretary at African Diatomite Industries Ltd. in Gilgil, the president of the Kenya Industrial Court, Mr. Saeed Cockar, said in Nairobi yesterday.

Mr. Cockar was making an award in a dispute in which a union branch secretary, Mr. H. Sabwa, is alleged to have used abusive language to the firm's general manager on a question of overtime on April 3 last year.

Mr. Sabwa told the court that on that day Mr. Mukenyi came to his office to assist him in making representation to the firm's general manager in connection with an overtime claim. He claimed that before that afternoon the general manager had been notified that the claimants' officials would be seeing him in connection with the matter. "When the general manager came in my office he asked what Mr. Mukenyi was there for."

Mr. Sabwa said that after an argument with the general manager he was asked to hand the post box keys to the general manager. He refused to do so.

One witness told the court that on April 3 last year he was called by the general manager into his office at about 2.15 p.m. "The first words I heard was 'Do not call me Hezekiah Sabwa'. The general manager answered, 'You are Mr. Hezekiah Sabwa.'"

He heard the general manager telling Mr. Sabwa that he had suspended him. Mr. Sabwa answered that the general manager could not suspend him. "Whom do you think you are?" Mr. Sabwa told the manager. Mr. Sabwa refused even to leave the office, the witness told the court.

A second witness told the court that he also called at the general manager's office at 2 p.m. that day and when he arrived there he saw Mr. Sabwa pointing at the general manager and shouting. "He abused the general manager while I was in the office."

On April 8, the general manager wrote a letter to Mr. Sabwa terminating his services and offered one month's pay in lieu of notice. The matter was taken up by claimants with the management and the Ministry of Labour.

The claimants submitted that their officials had to be very tough, logical and straightforward to discharge their duties. At the time Mr. Sabwa could not be taken as an employee but as a representative of the union.

Ministry to take over literacy project

Tanzania's Ministry of National Education is soon to take over the administration of the ambitious £2,000,000 Unesco work-oriented literacy project launched in January 1966 in the lake region. It was learned in Mwanza yesterday.

About 228 literacy teachers who attended a three-month course are teaching the classes which include such subjects as better cotton farming, high-ranking officials from the Ministries of National Education and Regional Administration and Rural Development along with experts from Unesco completed a two-day meeting in Mwanza yesterday at which the transfer was discussed.

The assistant director in the Directorate of Adult Education, Mr. P. J. Mhaka, said before leaving for Dar es Salaam that the takeover would be announced soon.

Nigeria's human crisis

Winning the peace looks like being as difficult as winning the war for Nigeria's Federal Military Government. Its leaders are sympathetic to fellow Africans, but the enormous difficulties they are experiencing in the aftermath of Biafra's... Not only do they have to restore law and order and civil administration to the former secessionist East Central Province... they must first supervise the urgent and vital task of getting food and medical supplies to the sick and starving in the bush. This is obviously impossible for the moment...

Federal leaders are having to cope not only with well-meaning but not always diplomatic helpers but with a swarm of journalists and television teams from all over the world, some dedicated and objective recorders of a great human crisis, a few bent on sensationalism. It is not surprising tempers have been getting frayed in the Nigerian capital, and that among some officials there is a mood of occasional slipping or slipping out of the country, and visiting Pressmen have been denounced as troublemakers... Generally, despite the frustrations the Press has had to endure in Lagos from cancelled flights and postponed briefings, accounts of the sufferings and hunger in the bush areas witness hundreds of thousands of Ios are awaiting rescue... They have corrected over-optimistic earlier impressions, put out by official observers such as Britain's Lord Hunt, who made tours — keeping to the towns and main roads, and not going supplies received through the religious network, had run out. Special Representative, Gen. Said Uddin Khan, has given confirmation of reports of starvation and incidents of looting taken to punish offenders and to prevent repetition of these offences.

The general has also pointed to the good relations between the officers of the Federal Army and those of the Biafran army, and to the civilian officials in the province have realigned themselves to the new situation. This balanced report brought an angry response from the Federal Communications Commissioner, Mr. Kano, who flatly denied reports of rape and kidnapping, and despite other official confirmations — and called angrily for any body else outside Nigeria... Allowance can be made for such feelings. But Federal news need outside help with their massive problem. It does give a fairly free hand for a limited period to foreign experts in the medical and social welfare fields... The Lagos Government could help by forgetting, in its hour of victory, the political and economic prejudices it harbours against those who worked in Biafra during the civil war... When the desperately urgent need is to get in relief to starving people, what justification can there be for keeping the aircraft at Lili — near the areas where aid is most needed — closed because it was built by the secessionists? This kind of emotional prejudice leads to charges of bias. This kind of suspicion of compatriots, despite the magnanimity shown by Gen. Gowon in victory and the new relief plans being made by Lagos... There is a sad irony in political developments, too. Though which caused many deaths throughout the years of fighting — the Soviet Union, which gave subsidiary help, is being hailed by Radio Nigeria as the nation's "true friend"...

Moscow Radio has attacked what it called a "disgusting British Broadcasting Corporation campaign" against Nigeria.

In an English language broadcast, a commentator, Alanahy (Gan), said the B.B.C. sought to create the impression that it speaks peace.

"Apparently it is concern for peace that prompts the B.B.C. in its broadcast beamed to Nigeria to speak of plunder, violence and lack of discipline among units of the Nigerian Federal Army on the territory of former Biafra," he continued.

"In reality, however, all these stories about plunder, violence and the crimes of the Nigerian soldiers drunk with their victory are invented at Portland Square or Bush House, thousands of miles from Nigeria."

The aim of this disgusting campaign was exposed by the Nigerian Government, which accused the B.B.C. of malicious slander of the Nigerian Army aimed at causing disorder and confusion, Moscow Radio said.

The B.B.C. speaks not peace into Nigeria. It uses the language of political and ideological subversion. This subversion is aimed at provoking disorder and embittering people and pushing them into new bloody clashes.

The commentator said one could excuse the B.B.C.'s "subversive campaign" because of the House of Commons emergency debate on Nigeria.

"Both are gross interference in the internal affairs of a sovereign country and both are aimed at hampering the Nigerian Government's efforts to eliminate the dire consequences of the war," the radio said.

"The only difference is that the B.B.C. was given the dirtier job, that of lying and slandering in order to mislead the public; not only in Nigeria but in Britain too, especially those days when Mr. Wilson is in the U.S."

It would be "ridiculous" to suggest that only the former Biafran leader, Gen. Yakubu, and the handful of people who fled with him during the last days of the war had been responsible for misleading the people "here, the Federal Nigerian Labour Information Commissioner, Chief Anthony Enahoro."

His statement followed an announcement by the Government of a general amnesty which would cover all those who had been involved in the rebellion.

At a Press conference in Lagos recently, the Nigerian Head of State, Maitse, Gowon refused to answer specifically when a reporter asked him how many people the Government considered had been "misled" and how many it considered had done the misleading and would not, therefore, be eligible for the amnesty.

Radio Nigeria reported Chief

Enahoro as saying that there had been no suggestion that those who misled the "millions of innocent citizens" should not have their guilt brought home to them in an appropriate manner within the limits of the amnesty.

"This time calls for greater patience and tolerance," Chief Enahoro said, adding that "people must think calmly about reconciliation."

Mr. C. Clyde Ferguson, President of Nigeria's special co-ordinator for Nigerian relief, told a Congressional Committee that the whole of West Africa faces the risk of an epidemic unless proper sanitation is restored in the former Biafran enclave.

French officials in Djibouti yesterday lifted a high security cordon around the residence of the administrator's home at Aissabou about 70 miles from Djibouti.

These were the first attacks against Europeans in the Afar and Issa territory — formerly French Somaliland — since a French soldier was killed in a French plane crash last year in Africa.

M. Pouchardier, administrator of the territory, said he had been informed of the attacks on Tuesday night. He announced that a 27-year-old Issa Omar Fikri Khare, had been held in connection with the attacks.

The man carried a revolver and grenades when he was arrested, the police said.

Police added that Khare was nicknamed the "Twisted One" because he was a man thought to be connected with the grenade attacks.

Four of them seriously injured a number of the crowd on Saturday night.

These tracts were signed by the "Somali Liberation Front."

There is speculation that the creator of the secret committee for the grenade explosion, was responsible for the attacks were distributed on Saturday, tracts were shown in Djibouti's main square, African quarter, calling for violence.

New U.N. attempt to act on S.-W. Africa

The U.N. Security Council's three African members were to ask the Council in urgent session yesterday to condemn South Africa's refusal to hand over administration of the South-West African territory of Namibia to the U.N.

Burundi, Sierra Leone and Zambia were also to ask the Council to label the South African "challenge" as diminishing the U.N.'s authority.

The resolution demands that the Secretary-General, U Thant, set up a nine-member committee of independent South African mandate territories for the former German territory — known in U.N. documents as "Namibia" — which does not accept the decision, calling it illegal.

The Council was called into urgent session earlier this week by a group of 48 Afro-Asian countries. It is meeting under the presidency of Mr. Terence Nkomo of Burundi.

Mr. Nkomo, who has not had a permanent member of the Council by the General Assembly at its last session. It will be Mr. Nkomo's first appearance in the role of president of the top U.N. executive body and representative of Burundi.

Informed sources said that the U.S., which has always opposed the use of force or the introduction of economic sanctions against South Africa, would probably vote in favour of the new proposal, despite more realistic compared to previous documents. Britain will probably abstain, sources said, but the other members of the Council should approve it.

The Security Council last met on the South-West Africa issue in August 1967, when a resolution ordering South Africa to withdraw before October 4, or face unspecified measures.

The big Western powers, which all have veto power in the Council, oppose any military adventure to impose the Council's will.

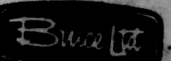

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Bill pushed through after walkout

The Zambian Government has pushed through Parliament a Bill to keep defence and security costs from public scrutiny after a complicated legal wrangle and a walkout by the Opposition.

The Opposition did, however, manage to force the Government to postpone Budget Day by 24 hours to comply with procedure under the Constitution.

The Government Chief Whip, Mr. Joseph Wina, told reporters he presented on Saturday.

Before a Bill can become law it first has to be passed in three clear days following the Third Reading.

Some Opposition Members greeted this move with scepticism, claiming that under Parliamentary rules the House could not sit on Saturdays.

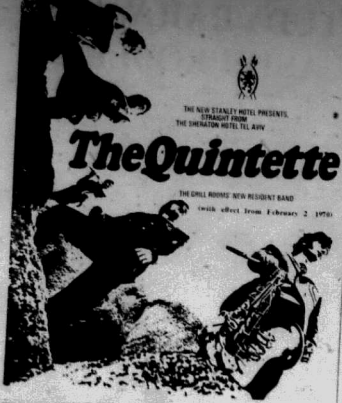

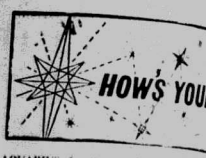

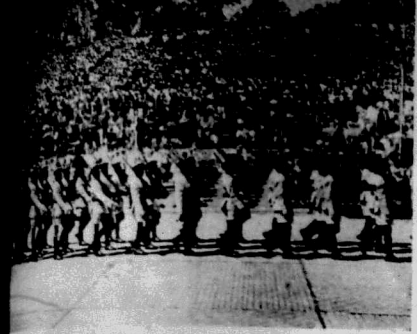

The ceremony was a grand affair, with traditional dances performed by the Kenyan people. Mr. Kenyatta addressed the crowd, expressing his gratitude and his commitment to the welfare of his country.

Thousands see solemn and colourful ceremony

A crowd of thousands, including a distinguished array of leaders of every facet of Kenyan life, cheered President Kenyatta yesterday at one of the biggest occasions Nairobi has known.

The Vice-President and Minister for Home Affairs, Mr. Moi, Cabinet Ministers, the heads of the Armed Forces, the Police Commissioner, Mr. Bernard Hinga, Chief Justice Sir K. Robinson, Kenya High Court judges and judges of the East African Court of Appeal, were present at the ceremony.

The President, with Mrs. Njira Kenyatta sitting smiling next to him, wore a dark suit and had his hands clasped in front of him. He was in good spirits and drew cheers from the crowd with his jokes.

It was a colourful occasion. The flag-draped arena was virtually filled to capacity an hour before the Presidential motorcade arrived.

And traditional dances were in action early to entertain the crowd. The day from which the President addressed the nation was the centre of attraction for the judicial display provided by the judicial gowns and wigs, the ecclesiastical attire worn by the religious Cabinet Ministers, many of whom held the Order of the Golden Heart of Kenya.

Heads of the Armed Forces and Forces commanders were impeccably turned-out in their uniform and medals.

Applause and cheers greeted the President's arrival at the State Palace, escorted by the Chief Justice.

The Registrar of the High Court, Mr. M. Mathew, placed the decorated oaths of allegiance and office before the President.

Mr. Kenyatta raised the Bible in his right hand and read out the Presidential oath of allegiance in Kiswahili. On completion of the oath he replaced the Bible and signed the oath of allegiance.

The Chief Justice counter-signed the oath of allegiance and the Registrar turned the page of the State Manual of oaths.

The President raised the State Bible and read the oath of the President, in Kiswahili, again. He signed the oath of office, which was again counter-signed by the Chief Justice. The President signed the oath of office to each other and the President was escorted back to the ceremonial rostrum.

The Vice-President, Mr. Moi, then took the oath of allegiance, followed by all Cabinet Ministers, the secretary to the Cabinet and head of the Civil Service, Mr. G. K. Karithi, the Chief of Defence Staff, Maj-Gen. Ndolo, and Mr. Hinga.

After the oaths, the Archbishop of East Africa, Dr. L. J. Reicher, and other religious leaders offered prayers in Kiswahili, wishing the President, the Government and the country a bright and prosperous future. On behalf of their churches they pledged their loyalty to the Government.

Then followed the parade commemorating the President's installation for his second term of office.

FIRE DESTROYS PUMWANI HOUSES

Hundreds of people in the Pumwani area of Nairobi were sleepily homeless as a result of an accidental blaze which gutted more than 200 temporary dwellings. The fire, which started at 3.30 p.m. yesterday afternoon, took about two hours to extinguish.

Residents of the area along Digo Road were last night trying to find shelter with relatives while others slept in the open with their families and belongings. Policemen were sent to the scene when residents complained of looting by a section of the large crowd which had gathered to watch foreign struggle with the blaze.

One woman, Mary Wanjiru, told reporters that the cause of the fire was not known while some residents thought it might have been caused by children.

The fire started in one house which was locked and rapidly spread to nearby dwellings before demonstrators who attempted to stop demolition lines were pushed back by the soldiers.

Rhodesia warns Zambia on raids

The Rhodesian Prime Minister, Mr. Smith, yesterday warned Zambia that his Government could not ignore its continuing assistance to guerrilla bands.

His statement came as Rhodesian forces continued their battle against small guerrilla groups in the Zambezi Valley near the border with Zambia.

Mr. Smith told Parliament that the Rhodesian Government would not accept responsibility for incidents which were a direct result of its cooperation with terrorists.

"The Rhodesian Government has at all times declared that it has no aggressive intentions towards any other country. Proof of this is provided by the maintenance of essential power and transport services to Zambia in spite of that country's provocative behaviour in harbouring and assisting terrorists," the Rhodesian Premier said.

The Prime Minister said that information provided by captured terrorists proved conclusively that the Zambian authorities were not only well aware of the activities and intentions of guerrillas but had actively assisted their incursions into Rhodesia.

Mr. Smith recalled that recently a Rhodesian police patrol had been vilified for an "unprovoked" attack on a trading post and small arms base from the Zambezi bank of the Zambezi River border. This was followed by incursions from Zambia, Mr. Smith added.

"Our policy is to live in amity and peace with all our neighbours, but I wish to make it clear that the Rhodesian Government cannot ignore the continuance of assistance by a terrorist incursions from Rhodesia."

£4,000 reward in murder hunt

The Uganda Government last night announced a reward of \$4,000 for information leading to the arrest of the person or persons responsible for the death of a senior army officer, Brigadier Palino Okoka, and his wife. Both were found shot dead outside their home at Gulu, Northern Uganda, late on Sunday night.

The Ministry of Internal Affairs announcement said the investigation is continuing.

Uganda to make light bulbs

Work has started at Jinja on Uganda's first factory to manufacture electric light bulbs. It represents a capital investment of over £50,000 and is sponsored by the Madhav Group.

At a later stage, it is intended to add equipment to make automobile bulbs and fluorescent tubes.

This is a truth that nobody in office can afford to forget. In too many African countries, in recent years we have seen popular leaders rise to power but then become too ambitious, move away from the people who elected them, and eventually be swept into oblivion. In Kenya this has not happened, and it is not likely to if the President's call for renewed co-operation between Government and people is heeded.

It would be foolish to pretend that the next five years will prove a period of unmitigated blessings. With economic pressure on land growing as the population increases, there is no room for false optimism.

But at least it can be claimed that, having emerged from the testing early years, Uthuru with its national stability intact, Kenya is mature enough to face the severe trials that lie ahead. The tasks now facing Kenya, as the President has outlined, are the re-education, the maintenance of national unity and the acceleration of development for full economic independence. These are dependent on each other.

The value of unity has been proved, not without cost, since Kenya won its freedom in 1963. Could war tensions marked the first few years, and even when these were overcome, internal political tensions were made in every sector of the country.

The turbulent events of last year put the nation through heated, but out of the elective wounds which have not yet a new Government and Parliament have been formed which hold high promise of improvement. There has been a big infusion of new men of high calibre and administrative experience.

With unity the paramount need, the lesson is clear that one-party rule does not stifle freedom of expression. It is doubtful whether the elections would have been so democratic differences must come within the framework of a single national purpose.

In his statement on re-inauguration, President Kenyatta emphasised that better living standards depend on Kenya's economic development through working in co-operation; he urged parents to turn more to technical education for their children, so as to replace foreigners in essential jobs, and he gave his assurances to investors and tourists.

Africans must rule in their own country, and those who try to be *homo mabianus* will not be welcome. These structures appealed to a small minority, and the President equally appealed to Africans to respect foreigners and tourists.

The keynote of his speech was the economic challenge facing Kenyans, to build on the achievements of the past and statistics are the ordinary man to follow, but, as Mr. Kenyatta explained, their purpose is to provide social justice, which have lacked it.

In carrying out the plans that can achieve this, officials and leaders "must never lose sight of compassion, or the aspirations and which they do it all in unity for national integrity".

The danger in writing of such men is of assuming that Kenya no exception. Mr. Kenyatta's case it serves no purpose, unclouded. He is a phenomenon of our time, a man who is part of Africa's history and is still making it.

If sufficient funds flow in for the proposed project, the Kenya Wildlife Service might have a tourist lodge accommodation for road-side or band-type to stay in the area.

It might well have an alpinist and a series of good all-weather roads to become a vital link with the Kikuyu area and to Samburu through Meru or east to the large undeveloped areas of Tavua north of the Yatta.

All this, of course, will take time and will be subject to enough interest groups. But the fact that the Game Reserve, but the fact that the sanctuary means that there is a chance of eventually take place there.

Mr. Mwangi said that the Kenya Wildlife Service has recently appointed chief licensing officer in the field. The Department has worked in the field of game reserves and as game warden at Kikuyu came to know the proposed area well.

He said that the proposed area will be divided into two parts, one for the Masaku reserve's suggested boundaries, and an area of 100 square miles or more between the main Thika-Garissa road and the Yatta River to the north. Its western boundary is the stretch to Kindaruma and to the north, it is bordered by a number of rivers, running south from the confluence of the Tana and the Kikuyu Rivers.

In the south of this area, which is roughly the shape of a triangle, are the Thika Hills which the Yatta and the Kikuyu Rivers flow through. It is nearly 5,000ft, and overlooks the plain that sweep down to the Yatta, and the Yatta River to the north.

From this point you get a commanding view of the reserve and the magnificent view of Mount Kenya. Mr. Mwangi says:

"I believe the Masaku Council has sent a copy of the resolution agreed to the setting up of the reserve to the Commissioner of Lands and Survey, and subject to his approval it will be forwarded to the Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife for technical guidance."

Mr. Mwangi then moved in to clear the boundaries, set out roads, and generally develop the area for the Game Warden, explained the Chief would turn the reserve for the council until it became a paying concern.

Mr. Mwangi feels that the area has much potential. He believes that more people will want to visit Kindaruma as the dam grows. The Thika-Garissa road will eventually be bi-modal, and it seems likely that the Kikuyu-Kisumu road will also be improved.

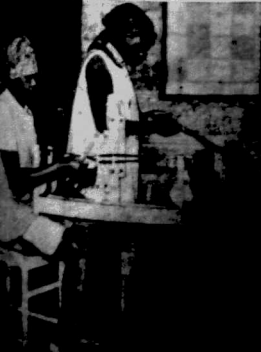
New unit means better care for handicapped

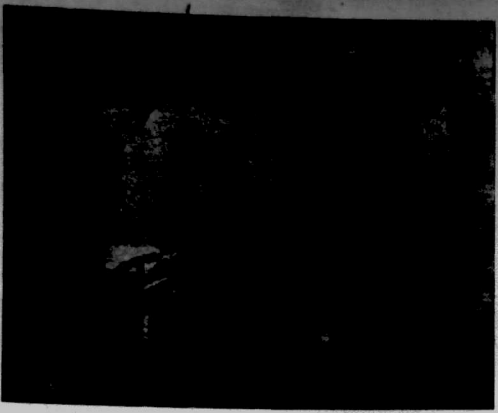

His left arm has gone and his right is stiff. An operation will bend it so that he can perform simple tasks with his remaining hand. He is now walking.
...The unit insists on trying to get patients walking with canes as soon as feasible. This is important psychologically as well as being necessary to enable their internal organs to work well. However, walking in canes is difficult, often painful and nursing staff have sometimes to browbeat patients into trying.

...One item of equipment sorely needed by the unit is a motor van, wagon or truck. They have no transport of any kind and depend on well-wishers and friends for help in this direction.
...Swimming gives paraplegics a tremendous sense of freedom and high on the list of things for the unit to achieve is the building of a swimming pool. There are plans to launch an appeal for funds for a pool.

...One of the saddest aspects of this kind of nursing, especially in Nairobi, is that patients are loathe to leave when everything that can be done for them has been done. Although they have to pay a high price for it they find love, care and an end to loneliness. They also receive good and regular food, high in protein, which is a definite aid to recovery.

...With the Rotary-sponsored Valentine's Day Ball focusing attention on the unit and a number of other means in hand to raise money, 1970 could be a rewarding year for Mrs. Atkinson and the unit's dedicated staff.

which Malindi is more than a fishing port. Most of the trophies were won by Malindi's fishermen, including K. Marson, the Nairobi sportsman and racehorse owner, and H. B. Swann, the Malindi fisherman, in the three-day billfish competition. The biggest fish was a 148lb. marlin and their total catch over the week was 4642lb., nearly twice as much as their nearest rivals, who incidentally were separated themselves by only 1lb.

In addition they won the three-day marlin competition which made up the first part of the tournament, and the three-day billfish competition when sailfish as well as marlin were counted — in a clean sweep of the major trophies.

The formula competition — when lines of smaller breaking strength were used — was won by Mr. Riccardo and Mr. R. Elliott, fishing off Samaki.

Altogether 24 boats turned out in the billfish competition, 18 in the marlin and 16 in the formula, a number which well pleased the organisers, especially as some overseas visitors took part. Prominent among them were Mr. A. Killen and Mr. Clarke of the United States, who were on holiday in Malindi.

They should go back with glowing reports of the fishing at Malindi and help to increase the overseas entry next year — a field in which the organisers themselves have not been idle.

They are arranging to have posters sent all over the world, through East African Airways, in April this year so that would-be overseas entrants will have plenty of time.

The top prize was the two return air tickets to Britain, donated by Coca-Cola and East African Airways, but the winners in all classes received trophies donated by Coca-Cola. In addition, the winners of the first three prizes have received replicas of the trophies.

The conditions for fishing were ideal throughout the week with winds variable, but rising to average sea temperature for the time of the year was thought to account for the preponderance of marlin at the expense of sailfish.

Most of the Mombasa fishermen, believing the story of Malindi and marlin made straight south to get as close as they could to home waters, where they believed the fact marlin would be found. But in fact most of the marlin were caught north of Malindi.

There was plenty of smaller game to entertain the fishermen, including tetra, kingfish, bonito and a mako shark, believed to be the first caught in Malindi waters. The total of fish landed did not that got away — believed to be 48th each, and nearing a record for the East African Coast. These included the other hard-luck stories too, out of bait just as a big marlin surfaced near his boat.

The tournament started and ended with a celebration provided by Coca-Cola, a cocktail party to start with and a supper dance to end with, at the Malindi Sea Fishing Club who organised the event, also provided cooler bags full of soft drinks for the fishermen, and cases of Coca-Cola for the winning crews.

Mrs. Barbara Brown, secretary of the Malindi Sea Fishing Club, received a Marlin Replica from Mr. Jack Gibbons as an expression of appreciation from the Coca-Cola Company for her work during the tournament.

Mr. Philip Beverly, chairman of the Sea Fishing Club, thanked the Coca-Cola Company for its assistance and sponsorship. Coca-Cola have already decided to sponsor the event each year, especially as they hope the next year will be more international than this.

At the supper dance at the end of the tournament, the District Officer for Malindi, Mr. K. Mugge, expressed his appreciation of the fishermen's efforts and said he was glad to see so many African crews at the event.

The African crews came in for some praise from the fishermen and from the Coca-Cola representative, Mr. Jack Gibbons, who referred to their skill in manoeuvring the boats. On two occasions they had saved two fish from being lost to the winning boat by their skill in manoeuvring when the fish pulled the line under the boat.

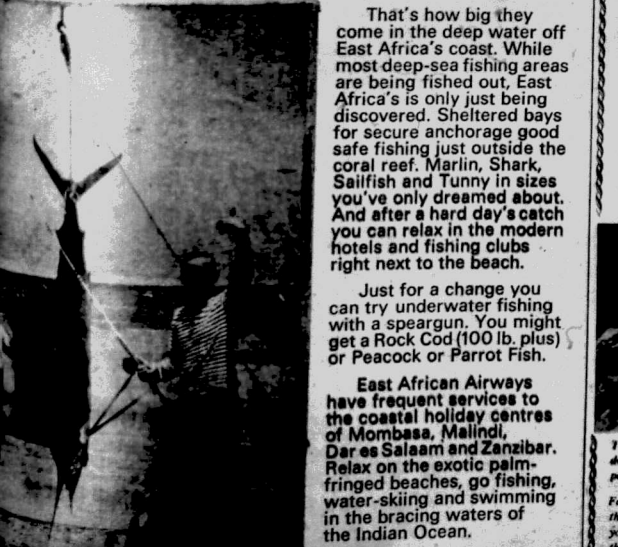

The team of Mr. Dyer-Nelville and Mr. Gayner landed one blue marlin of 145lb. They hold the competition.

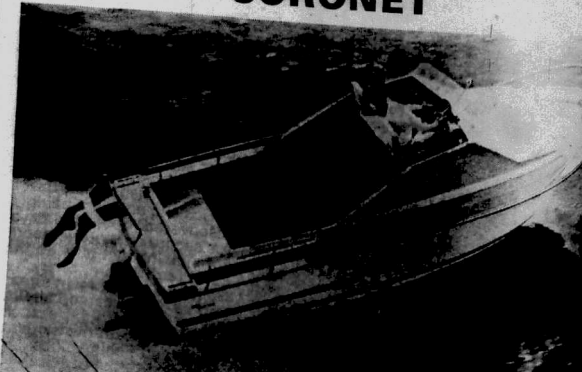

March: Billfish still running, kingfish starting. Calm seas, fishing off, but plenty of kingfish, pelusi and barracuda. The S.W. Monsoon begins, some rain getting cooler; sea a little rougher.

Mid-May - July: Fishing limited to the sheltered inshore waters; kingfish, barracuda, runner. Heat of the S.W. Monsoon; sea often rough.

August: Deep-sea fishing possible again, runs of big kingfish. S.W. Monsoon weakens, but sea can be rough; weather still cool with the odd shower.

New premises of the Malindi Sea

Fishing Club have been built on the front near the fish market and the fish weighing equipment. A body of information concerning fish and fishing is being accumulated, and all fish caught by members in Malindi waters are weighed and recorded. There is daily or monthly membership.

The club is affiliated to the International Game Fishing Association, the Game Fishing Union of Africa and the Kenya Association of Sea Angling Clubs.



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before it's too late

Dress: very informal (a kikoi will do). This instruction was appended to a weekend invitation. Intriguing — but it was not really that kind of weekend.

I turned out to be an invitation to a highly respectable but none the less enjoyable weekend at the most of Lake Rudolf. Fishing Safaris and Kenya Air Charters at Lake Rudolf.

This is one of the comparatively few places left where it is still possible to get away from it all in reasonable comfort. A few hundred yards walk up the beach from the fishing club will take you to a shady palm tree where you can relax with nothing but a fly (baited) for company and imagine yourself a thousand miles from anywhere.

If that fails it is comforting to remember that you are still only a few hundred yards from an excellent beer.

On the other hand, you prefer your relaxation to be more active, there is fishing, sailing, or swimming, all readily available.

The Lake Rudolf Fishing Safari Club was founded about 18 months ago by a group of Nakuru farmers, but the expenses ran a little high — including the Duke of Edinburgh who stayed there last year — so one thing led to another and it became a miniature holiday town.

At the end of last year African Tours and Hotels Ltd. acquired controlling interest in the club and has plans for expansion — though likely to become crowded — through its present capacity is 14 beds, and A.T. and H. is building a new dining room and bar with the intention of adding ten more beds. There is also a camp site for the club for the harder traveller.

The club owes its position to

the Elye Springs — one of the very few sources of fresh water around the lake. It bubbles out of the rock and sand only a stone's throw from the shore, giving rise to the only patch of green grass in the area — for the benefit of it, just as it is for the benefit of the tourists — you can drink it.

Or if you prefer something with host Tony Partridge will dispense liquid refreshment, fishing stories and local lore with equal facility.

For the fishermen the attraction of Lake Rudolf is the gigantic Nile perch, particularly the monstrous lot, somewhere in its waters.

Above the bar is a record of all the Nile perch over 100lb. caught from the club's boats. So far the 200lb. caught by a Turkana fisherman close inshore using a harpoon — and his photograph is there to prove it. But the 150lb. fish was caught by a 14-year-old boy.

The best fishing ground for the big ones is off the north-eastern shore which means a boat trip of more than an hour, but time diminishes rapidly in importance in this part of the world, and for the out-of-luck fisherman there is always the chance to watch the game that abounds on the shore — where a national park will probably be established one day.

For those who do not want to make the trip across the lake but still like a bit of fishing, there are tiger fish in plenty off the shore along the club. These lively small fish romp happily around swimmers

bathe in the lake and if they do not exactly leap into a fisherman's basket they can provide him with a few contented hours.

Back at the club the talk is inevitably of the ones that got away. The fish get bigger as the fishermen lose the lodge's deep-freezes prove that there are plenty of fish to be caught.

With a little encouragement Mr. Partridge can be prevailed on to tell a few crocodile stories as well. There are no crocs at Elye, having so many humans around, but they abound at many parts of the lake.

Experts are insistent that the lake in one anybody feels diffident about swimming off the Elye beach there are plans to put in a swimming pool.

After the day's exertions there is dinner under the stars. In most parts of Kenya this would carry the risk of insect-biting, but Elye is remarkably insect-free after dark. I saw only the occasional bat fluttering round the lights, and the main problem for the visitor is one of distance. Elye is some 450 miles by road from Nairobi — 100 miles less by air — and the last 40 miles from Lodwar are pretty rough.

To go by road is a major operation, since from Kisumu the journey takes about eight hours and although it can be tough. The fort-nightly round trip to Kisumu for

supplies runs up a heavy bill in vehicle maintenance.

Flying is also costly but more comfortable, and it leaves more possibility that regular trips may be run in conjunction with Kenya Air Charters — a comparatively new firm in the charter field, run by Mr. John Falconer-Taylor, who has already made several excursions to the club.

Mr. Taylor is an ex-R.A.F. pilot and was a founder-director of Wilken Air Services before branching out to build up his own charter business.

Despite the transport difficulties it has become a place where people "drop in", by both road and air. One day recently there were 50 people for lunch, and last Saturday three visitors turned up for a late breakfast.

Chance meals, are possible, but for accommodation it is better to book in advance — the charge is £9 a night double, which considering the difficulties the lodge faces in preparing supplies, and having to be unobtainable.

The accommodation is a little rough and ready, but each bed has its own shower and toilet and the bar prices are lower than at a good many establishments.

As I said, it is a good place to get away from it all — but it may be as well to do so soon. The way things are going, Lake Rudolf may well be quite a busy place in a few years.

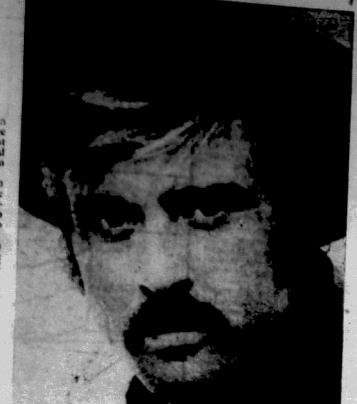

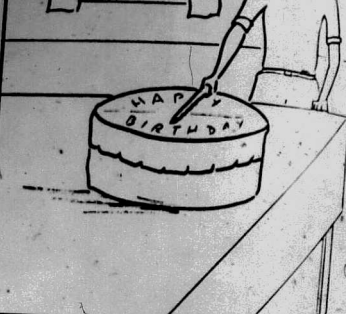

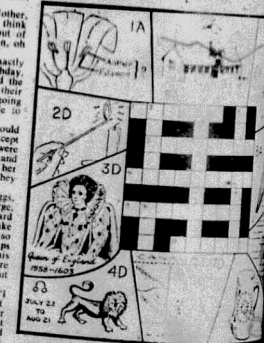

Culture Wins on TV

For half an hour a few weeks ago, an education television programme in Chicago — for the first time — was voted the most popular of its kind in the city's viewing stations.

In libraries across the United States there is a run on John Galsworthy's novel "The Forsyte Saga" and the television series "The Forsyte Saga". The best known children's television personality in America, Fred Rogers, a gentle, self-proclaimed "Mr. Clean" who does not play games or sports.

The giant National Broadcasting Company (NBC) has announced a special children's television project.

All these developments result from a growing phenomenon in the emergence of non-commercial television. Networks woken to the fact that the non-commercial stations, whose audiences are usually so small no rating survey bothers to count heads, are currently screening three distinct endeavours of the success of Mr. Rogers' "Neighborhood" and the CBS (Columbia Broadcasting System) and ABC (American Broadcasting Company).

Significantly, "Street and Rogers' Neighborhood" are sharply with the commercial networks' usual offerings of obesity-made cartoons, often gratuitously violent, or sponsored product shows.

There are no sponsors on these two shows. "Street" lives on performers, animation and hand-drawn puppets. "Neighborhood" is financed by the Carnegie Foundation, the Ford Education and Welfare Department, and the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. It has drawn a regular viewing audience of 3,000,000 children.

When I visited Japan it was not whether it applies to the usual tourist's picture of a land as ablaze with white and pink cherry blossoms. So it was not until I read this book that I realized that the ornamental cherry trees are cluttering in Tokyo and the other big cities. They are being steadily killed by petrol and diesel fumes.

As far as small-scale concerns, the 1969 figure for the same period was 56,317 head compared with 28,248 head for 1968.

Thirty-five per cent of this production went into canning and 65 per cent was sold in carcass form and as cut beef. With jumbo jets in mind, air shipments will expand exports, particularly of chilled beef cuts, to where land and sea transport is a problem, but the K.M.C. view is that air freight is an expensive way to transport meat and, therefore, the volume of air freight business will, to a certain extent, be restricted.

It is cut beef which has the most obvious potential for air freight and in this respect it is worth noting the average weight of beef bones and by-products are variable depending on the age, breed and weight of the animal. Grant aid will rise from about \$40 million to about \$80 million this year, while capital aid will rise from about \$400,000 to about \$800,000, he said.

Technical assistance covers costs of Canadian experts and teachers working in Tanzania and the training of Tanzanians in Canada, while capital aid is in the form of an interest-free loan over a 30-year period with a 25 per cent margin loaned for approved projects.

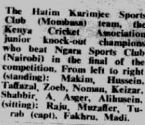

Police were called to the scene after complaints by some residents that a section of the large street which had gathered to watch the firemen fight the blaze had been involved in the looting of property removed from the burning dwellings. Police later reported that no arrests had been made in connection with the allegations.

The Ministry of Housing has convened a one-day conference of local authorities for February 27 to explain the implications of the Government's housing policy, as laid down in the Government's development plan for 1974.

In general, it is the Government's policy to concentrate its efforts on solving the acute housing shortage in the country and on the provision of houses costing not more than £1200 per unit.

It is hoped that people wishing to buy or rent houses costing more will do so on their own, although Government assistance will be available.

The Government's intention is to provide houses and accommodation for the low-income group, as they form about 70 per cent of the population.

A concentrated drive will also be made on rural housing to improve standards of construction and maintenance. — K.N.A.

NON-CITIZEN FINED £5 AT MOMBASA

A man said to be destitute and dependent on his friends to support him and his family was fined £5 by a Mombasa magistrate, Mr. J. J. Jishi, yesterday after pleading 'Guilt' to being in Kenya unlawfully.

Kapovochand Ganes Anandji, who claimed to be a citizen of Tanzania, married with five children, was described by the magistrate as an "unfortunate case calling for leniency."

The case against him stated that on January 24, at Mombasa, he was unlawfully present in the country. An immigration officer, Mr. P. K. Amdani, said Anandji came to Kenya in 1950. He had been employed by City Bookshop, Mombasa, as a machine operator but was discharged as he had no work permit.

The Immigration Department had granted an application by the bookshop for a permit, but the fee had not been paid. The Department was willing to give him a one-way travel document to go to Tanzania.

Coast call for clamp-down on badly-planned harambee work

The Coast Provincial Community Development Officer, Mr. Solomon Murgu, yesterday stressed the need for planning before initiating such projects as the harambee work involving the people in schemes which turned out to be unbeneficial.

Mr. Murgu was addressing a meeting of the Provincial Community Development Committee, which had not yet held its National Road office.

The meeting, attended by 26 delegates from the six districts of the province and presided over by its vice-president, Mr. Jimmy Jeremiah, agreed on the distribution of a total of £7,900 in Government grants towards the province's development projects for 1969-70.

Mr. Murgu suggested that only economic schemes which would quickly give returns to their initiators should be aided by the committee.

The meeting unanimously resolved that all district development committees, which had not yet carried out their election of officials for this year should do so before the end of next month.

This year's grant of £7,900 was passed last year's Government grant to the province by £200, when each of the six districts also received lesser sums than those recommended yesterday.

Tana River, Taita-Taveta, Lamu, Kwana and Kilifi Districts will each get £1,600, and Mombasa District will get £900. The remaining £2,000 will be shared by the headquarters as a reserve fund.

The meeting, attended by all District Community Development officers, Mr. Francis Tuna, and the M.P. for Mombasa, Mr. David Kikio, noted with pleasure the achievements of the development projects initiated during the past year.

The progress report, Mr. Murgu said, development committees had been established from the grant. The very success of the projects undertaken by the people and aided from the grant was very encouraging.

However, he knew of projects which had not got off the ground because of lack of consultation and proper planning. This time had come for the harambee work to be planned properly.

During the past financial year, the grant for the harambee work was £2,000 spent on aiding food projects of each of the six districts, £1,300 for the Lamu sub-district, £1,300 for the Taita-Taveta on the Tana, £1,300 for the Kilifi, £1,300 for the Kwana and £1,300 for the Lamu.

Hands tied on teachers' pay, says counsel

The Kenya Industrial Court could not make any award in favour of the Teachers' Service Remuneration Committee unless the Minister for Education made a legal notice when he received recommendations from the committee, a State Counsel, Mr. J. F. Shields, told the court yesterday.

The president of the court, Mr. Shoo Cockar, was hearing a dispute in which the Kenya National Union of Teachers is asking the court to award the salary structure recommended in July by the Teachers' Service Remuneration Committee.

A Nairobi lawyer, Mr. S. M. Otiemo, representing the claimants, said the claimants had the correct background of the dispute. The court had accepted the salary structure recommended and gazetted by the committee. The Industrial Court had the right to investigate whether legal procedure had been followed.

The committee was formed in July with officials of the K.N.U.T., and two representatives from the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Local Government as members and headed by an independent member, Mr. H. C. Warishi. The committee made its recommendations on a new salaries structure and presented them to the former Minister for Education, Dr. Kiara.

The Minister was expected to make a legal notice when he received the recommendation. Instead it is claimed that he changed the salary structure before it was recommended by the committee.

The union complained to the Minister and finally went on strike because the award they wanted to see implemented by the Minister did not materialise.

The Government, which is the employer in the dispute, claims that the Industrial Court had no right to award the recommended salary structure before it was finally recommended by the Minister responsible.

Mr. Otiemo told the court that such disputes could be settled off by the Industrial Court, which was set up by the Government to settle disputes to help the smooth running of the country.

The court resumed its ruling.

Time to cross-breed bulls, farmers told

The time of the relatively unproductive stock which had long symbolised status within African society had gone, and there was a need to cross-breed place them through cross-breeding, using semen from proven pedigree bulls from other parts of the world, the Coast Provincial Director of Agriculture, Mr. Mosew Mulokwe, said yesterday.

Mr. Mulokwe said Kenya was already ahead by having the Central Insemination Centre at Nairobi to serve the farmers and it was the duty of every farmer to use artificial insemination on native or indigenous cows to lift their grades to the desired standard.

By so doing, milk production would be stepped up from the present one or two bottles per cow per day to between 12 and 16 bottles and even more.

This total was already being achieved by small-scale African farmers who had used cross-breeding by artificial insemination. Mr. Mulokwe said protein-containing foodstuffs were necessary for body-building, particularly for children, whose growth and development should not be impeded because of a lack of commodities like milk.

The nutritional value of milk and dairy products is the highest assured of any of their products. Dairy had been and should continue to be, one of the most stable and profitable of the specialised types of farming, it could combine very well with crops. The value of the maintenance of soil fertility could not be over-emphasised.

Dairy farming could be a constant earner if the farmers worked vigorously in areas like Taita. — K.N.A.

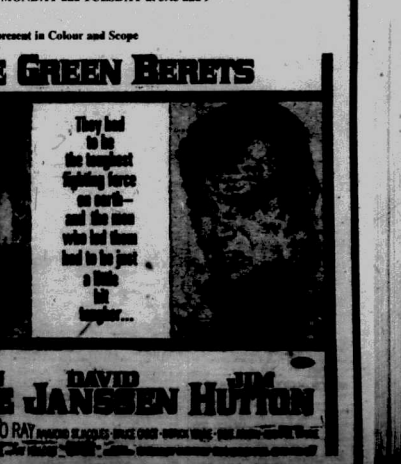
