

Employment possibilities

The M.P. for Kananak, Mr. Wanji, did a signal service when, speaking on the Presidential Address, he raised the old problem of employment and the increasing number of school leavers in Kenya.

He asked the National Assembly to consider what a balanced budget means to somebody with a hungry stomach, adding "we must ignore the beauty of a balanced budget and adopt a more progressive and expansive monetary policy." Related to immediate and human experience, his fears are justified. But a balanced budget lies in the economic background—a kind of common denominator in the planning. Granted that Kenya must rely on a pay-as-you-go system, his further thinking is justified.

Mr. Wanji argued "we need to be given guidance as to the prices and wages policy." This is a fundamental principle, no less important for employers as to the trades unions and individual workers. A stated wages policy is long overdue, and must come before an income policy divided between rural and urban workers. Since the wage and productivity index is not well delineated, therefore, both Cots and the F.K.E. can refer to the indicator to apportion any fluctuations. Without reference to either of them, it is probably fair to assume Mr. Akumu and Sir Colin Campbell would support this contention.

The development plan for the ensuing five years, drew attention to the widening gap between wages in urban and rural areas, with increased migration to the towns in negation of the President's expressed policy of "back to the land." The conclusion to be drawn is "the standards of living of those with low incomes should grow at a rate faster than average," which is an entirely acceptable axiom in a socialist country. How is to realise this desirable end?

Refer again to the development planning for the next five years: "The key of this plan is to direct an increasing share of the total resources available to the nation towards the rural areas. Only through an accelerated development of the rural areas can balanced development be achieved. Rural development should not be seen as a special development programme, but as the underlying strategy of the whole plan."

Agriculture is the prime motor, but agriculture is accompanied by industry. Make the most of the prime motor and the others must expand, commerce, industry, tourism etc.

Mr. Wanji drew attention to the (apparently) alarming increase in the numbers of school leavers, year by year, saying Kenya will be faced with what to do with 1,000,000 having School Certificates by 1980, and a corresponding 1,000,000 having junior qualifications. This is the price, or the glory, of education. In the years to come school leavers will not be an educational establishment, it is honourable to earn a living by artisan skills in school and H.S. Certificate holders, plus graduates, are going to consider themselves a race apart and will not turn to farming and factory jobs, the wholesome meaning of education, in the wider and more human senses, is lost.

The development plan records that, because wage employment in commerce and industry accounts for only a small proportion of the population of working age, even the most rapid conceivable increase in employment in this sector will make little difference. Most employment will continue to be in rural areas. The target is an increase of 35 per cent in wage-jobs by 1974. There are schemes to extend education, at secondary and technical levels.

By diversification, through industry and tourism parallel with agriculture, expansion is envisaged which will increase output by 75 per cent. This estimate is based on a fruitful partnership between Government and private enterprise. So the estimated increase in the number of school leavers is not so terrifying, given an expanding national economy.

This, then, is the key. There will be deaths, in the natural sequence of events, therefore empty shoes to fill. There will be more jobs as the economy expands. Anything that limits this expansion is detrimental to the country and to individual people. Finally, if the birth rate continues uncontrolled, many of the benefits of the national economic growth will be nullified. Haw is the country going to feed, house, educate and find jobs for an unlimited increase in the population against a predicted economic growth which is insufficient to keep pace?

The tripartite agreement finding temporary jobs for 50,000 people was only an expedient. Something bigger and more enduring is necessary and it lies in the employment found by an expanding national economy.

road for Anastasia

The woman who claims to be the only living daughter of the Tsar, Anastasia, has reached the end of the road in her search for recognition.

On Tuesday, Oct. 20, she received a final appeal by Mrs. Anderson, 67, who claims to be the daughter of the Tsar's daughter, Grand Duchess Anastasia, daughter of Tsar Nicholas II, right heir to the Romanov family throne.

Legal battles over her bid for recognition have been going on in Germany for 30 years.

Her claim spelt Europe's schism and former ruling houses like two camps. Some believed she was a Polish peasant named Franziska Schwanhauer.

The Anastasia dispute had its roots in the slaughter by the Red Guard in 1918 of the Tsar and his family in a cellar in Ekaterinburg, in the Ural, in July, 1918.

For this, it is assumed that the Tsar, his wife, son and four daughters had all perished in the massacre. But in 1920, a young girl, daughter of a canalier in Berlin after a sudden attempt.

After her recovery, she astonished doctors by claiming to be his daughter of the Tsar and had received the massacre for each of her children.

All first they were sceptical, but the girl appeared to be familiar with the names and ceremonies of the Tsarist Court, the lives of the royal children and the names used by the family.

Then in 1925, she was seen by the press in London before the massacre. The Tsar and his children had been deposited five miles from London, but she was in England.

The total amount, said to be worth £10,000,000, was reported to have been deposited by the Tsar in the Bank of England—but the bank still has denied this.

The girl said she saw her father shot before she herself was wounded and lost consciousness. She said a Polish doctor rescued her, and took her to Kumanak.

The last incident began with a decision by a Berlin court in 1933 to transfer the girl to the custody of Mackenburgh as the nearest surviving relative of the Tsar and rightful heir to the family fortune deposited in Berlin.

Fort 20 years, Anna Anderson lived as a hermit in the Black Forest in Germany.

Then in July, 1968, she moved to the United States where she married an American history professor, Dr. John Manahan, 49.

She lives in Charlottesville, Virginia.

After devoting more than half her life to the struggle to establish her identity as Anastasia, Mrs. Manahan has said her only interest is to "be recognised as the person she was born."

"Among supporters of her claim is Marie Perle, daughter of the 'Mad Monk' who was a favourite of the Tsar and established his influence in the Russian court at St. Petersburg (now Leningrad) until his murder in 1916.

"After meeting Mrs. Manahan in 1962, Mrs. Perle was quoted as saying: 'Yes, she has something which has nobility in her. In her gestures, in her voice, I think she is Anastasia.'"

to LESOTHO

Lesotho's opposition Congress Party has asked Britain to withhold all aid from Chief Leabua Jonathan, a party spokesman said today. He said the request was made to the British Government by the party's London representative.

Chief Jonathan said on Tuesday that he was awaiting with interest the British reply of Innes-Smith's statement. The Congress Party and agreement, worth about £1,000,000, would be expected to be accepted before Britain was not expected to be invalidated.

The Congress Party statement criticized Jonathan's new government, and it could mean that peace and stability could prevail under such circumstances.

Jonathan said that he was not of South African but of international interest and would be severely handicapped if the control of the Indian Ocean and the sea around the Cape passed into hostile hands.

Lord Fraser added that the dispute over the Simonstown Agreement was an old story and most of us are sick of it.

Kenya given \$2m. loan to boost education

Asked when the development loan would start, Mr. Towett said: "They started when I left Washington. And they go on for the next 50 years. Actual construction could start as soon as we are ready."

He was speaking at an airport press conference on his arrival in Kenya, where he accompanied a Kenya delegation to the World Bank and London.

Despite the cold, wet and windy weather in Washington, the Kenya team's talks with the World Bank were most cordial. The team included the Permanent Secretary for Education, Mr. Peter Gachathi, and included officials of the Ministry of Education, Agriculture, Finance and Works, with the Principal of University College, Dr. Arthur Porter, and two professors.

Mr. Towett had "useful" discussions with the president of the World Bank, Mr. Robert McNamara, and other officials and with African Government and A.I.D. officials.

Projects covered by the loan fell into several categories:

Expansion of existing institutions: 11 primary teachers' training colleges, four secondary schools, two farmers' training centres and two agricultural institutes.

Equipping three secondary technical schools, one technical institute, one secondary teachers' college, and one secondary school.

Converting one primary school into a secondary technical school.

The World Bank will assist the Government in preparing a comprehensive education development plan, within the framework of the current national development plan, and in carrying out a study of curricula and content in primary and secondary schools.

Finance has also been made available to provide essential technical services to the Ministries of Education and Agriculture and to University College.

Mr. Towett said the loan was offered as very "soft" terms involving a service charge of three-quarter per cent with repayment over 50 years' instalments in ten-year moratorium.

Negotiations on the loan were completed about a year ago and it was the second in a series of educational credits which Kenya hoped to arrange with the World Bank.

The first was received in 1966.

Mr. Towett said he took the opportunity to meet Kenya's leading businessmen and to have lively meetings with them in Washington. Now in Kenya, he also met members of Kenya's diplomatic missions in this city.

Everywhere he met and President Kenyatta and other officials and Kenya's interest in Kenya's development.

Eight Asians freed on forged documents charges

Absolute discharges were given to eight Asians from Kenya by a magistrate at Uxbridge in Southern England yesterday. They had been charged with entering Britain with forged entry documents.

The men were Madhav Katchias, Gulabchand Katchias, Rajkumar Katchias, Arjan Khany, Lubban Khany, Abdul Nazim-din and Rameshobhai Patel.

The magistrate accepted a plea of "Not guilty" under the Forgery Act and the case proceeded on the lesser charge under the Commonwealth Immigrants Act.

Evidence was given that the eight men had presented forged passports at Gatwick Airport on November 27, 1969. Counsel for the men submitted that they had no knowledge of the forgery and that as dishonesty was involved, the magistrate had to be satisfied that the men were not guilty of the offence.

The prosecutor referred to the hardship experienced in Kenya by Asian immigrants who had been refused entry to the country. He said that the Government in U.K. "now that the Government in U.K. has notified the entry of Asian U.K. passport holders" he explained working procedures to the magistrate and told him that it might take several years to reach the top of the list.

Defending counsel for the Katchias and Khany, pointed out that they had been detained in Britain from November 27 to December 9, 1969, being given bail by a High Court judge. He also said that they had paid fees of £180 for the forged vouchers, apart from air fares, and that they would adopt a sympathetic, practical attitude to these unfortunate people.

"You cannot give a passport in this way to someone who is not a citizen and fail to accord to him the rights of a citizen on the grounds that I am a mere passport-holder," Mr. Akana Adoko added.

Play for D.M.

With theatrical people all over the world making a point of remembering Noel Coward's 70th birthday recently it is not surprising that the "D.M." should choose to revive one of his plays.

A new production by Kenneth Mason, of *Present Laughter* opens at the theatre. It is the second time this play has been staged in the present "D.M." and it has also been seen at the Old Studio Theatre in Government Road — but the last production was a long time ago.

Present Laughter was not only written by Coward but also directed by him — a fact which is not surprising in itself. It was one of two plays, both written in 1939, both containing comedy, but highly contrasted, parts for early in the time.

It was intended that they should go on tour and end up in London. They went in rehearsal in August, 1939, and believe that one dress rehearsal was scheduled for September 3.

At which point Coward's plans were overtaken by the activities of another, rather less humorous, showman, Adolf Hitler.

However, Coward's "war babies" eventually came before the public as a great success. *Present Laughter* also had a famous revival in London in 1947.

For those who, like me, enjoy remembering Coward's plays but have only a faint memory of the length of time, this one is about a light comedy star, Gerry Esmond, who is about to start off on a tour of Africa.

It is a comedy about the lives of theatre people and of people of the world half world of theatrical hangers-on.

Esmond's impending departure precipitates all manner of crisis and hysteria in this larger-than-life arena.

Taking part in the play are James Ward as Esmond, and Gerry Esmond as his secretary and Katharine Stuart as his wife — separated from him but still part of the picture.

Also in the cast are Vicki Lally as a debutante type, Tim Welsh as Peter Van Dussell as partners in the team, Heather Bell as Esmond's old-fashioned friend, Charles Waite as a would-be dramatist whose name, by coincidence, is Ronald Maule, John Scapheron, Ronald Alexander and Dorothy Gibbs.

Two Presidents condemn acts of international aggression

Kenya backs 'third world summit call'

Kenya and Yugoslavia yesterday urged the non-aligned nations to harmonise their activities and declared their support for a summit of non-aligned countries to be held before this year's 25th jubilee session of the United Nations General Assembly.

In a communiqué issued at the end of the State Visit to Kenya of the Yugoslav President, Marshal Tito, he and President Kenyatta stated their determination to promote the policy of non-alignment in the interests of world peace, justice and understanding among nations.

The two Presidents condemned neo-colonialist practices and expressed grave anxiety at the fate of millions of Africans "condemned to colonial domination by the so-called Portuguese territories in Africa".

They resolved to "take all measures necessary to restore to the colonised people their inalienable rights to freedom, justice and humanity".

In their wide-ranging discussions on international affairs the two leaders noted with regret that "instances of aggression, intervention, carving of spheres of influence and doctrines of political and economic subjugation occur with disturbing frequency."

They affirmed their unqualified support for the U.N. and urged the adoption of peaceful methods to solve disputes between States.

They welcomed the end of civil war in Nigeria with great satisfaction and emphasised the necessity for African disputes to be settled in an African context in accordance with the aspirations enshrined in the O.A.U. charter.

They were confident that complete normalcy would be achieved by strict adherence to a serious threat to peace and order in the area.

They recognised that a lasting and just Middle East settlement could be achieved by strict adherence to the Security Council resolution of 1967 and felt that recent escalation of military activity posed a serious threat to peace and order in the area.

Like-wise they agreed that the crisis in Vietnam should be resolved only through a political negotiated settlement on the basis of the Geneva economic issues.

On international relations, they noted with concern the deepening gap between the developed and developing countries. They advocated more trade among developing countries and supported their endeavours to accelerate economic development.

Co-ordinated efforts should be made to improve terms of trade and conditions of economic cooperation between developing and industrialised States. International agencies could play a vital role in effecting the desired changes.

On bilateral matters, the two Presidents expressed their readiness to intensify trade, economic and technical co-operation for the mutual benefit of both countries. The framework for economic co-operation already in existence in the form of trade and technical co-operation agreements concluded between Yugoslavia and Kenya after independence.

The two countries could cooperate fruitfully on a long-term basis.

Non-aligned nations

Probably as broad as their vision Kenya has been in search of the country as President Tito accompanied by his wife, he has attended several official functions, visited the industrial and agricultural areas and seen the unspoiled attractions of scenery and wildlife. In addition he and his companions took part in several receptions of talks with President Kenyatta, Kenya's Ministers and senior officials.

This was a strenuous enough visit in all conscience for a man in his late 70s, but President Tito was sprightly to the end. He left to continue his African tour in the Sudan, carrying the good wishes of the Kenyan people with whom he and his wife have formed cordial relations. Yugoslavia and Kenya are both non-aligned, as is the latest communist emphasis, leading much in common. The official talks laid stress on the furtherance of bilateral co-operation.

Agreements exist covering trade and technical co-operation but much more can be done, as the communiqué recorded, on a long-term basis in the promotion of small-scale industries, electrification projects, agriculture and irrigation, telecommunications and other matters.

In the international sphere of economics, Yugoslavia and Kenya share an identical outlook in viewing with concern the widening gap between the old established and, therefore, developed and the new, and therefore developing, countries. Concerted efforts should be encouraged to extend trade among the developing countries, to their mutual advantage. When it comes to trading with the industrialised nations, the two Presidents reiterated a salient point which, if adopted, could do more to assist the developing countries than any number of aid schemes.

It is based on the axiom that the best aid is through trade. International agencies, the communiqué says, could play a vital role by improving the terms of trade and conditions of economic co-operation between developing and industrialised States. G.A.T.T. could help here; so could the World Bank. The F.A.O. has been told repeatedly by Kenyan delegates that a young agricultural country is hampered by fluctuations in world prices. While the cost of the machinery which the developing countries must have to develop are constantly rising, the prices obtained for produce often dip. It is unbelievable that the experts in U.N. agencies and elsewhere cannot accept the importance of price stabilisation and to the best to work out a structure agreed which will help the "poorer relations".

Posters such as "Cats should be kept indoors at night - not outside" and some sayings like "Bears should be given a wild life" are displayed in different towns. TV shows are also arranged in which K.S.P.C.A. officials show viewers the work done by the society.

The society arranges plays and concerts to raise money. This money is used to look after sick animals.

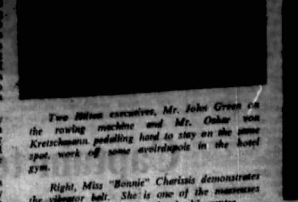
Bishop blesses new church

Gerald Battrick fined £100
 Gerald Battrick, the British Davis Cup tennis player, has been fined £100 for two incidents during his recent trip to Australia. The fine has been imposed by his sponsors, the British Petroleum International Tennis Fellowship.
 The 27-year-old Wimbledon was reported on December 27 for using bad language during a match with the Australian Davis Cup player, Ray Ruffels. He was reported again on January 6 after he had been charged during the Tasmanian championships that the ball-boys did not know their job.
 After the first incident Battrick was quoted as saying that Australia tennis was "in a state of shambles".
 Mr. John Barrett, director of the B.P. Fellowship, said: "Gerald Battrick is fully aware that all members of the Fellowship should behave properly wherever they play. We are imposing this fine as a result of an official complaint for the two incidents both of which Battrick himself confirms, and not for his other remarks." Battrick commented after hearing about the fine: "I suppose this was to be expected. In fact I have already written an open letter to the two incidents and I hope that the matter will now be forgotten."
 Battrick earned £81,198 (about \$1,523,875) in his first year with the B.P. Fellowship and his current earnings for 1969-70 amount to £107,795 (about \$1,823,350). - Reuter
