ANTICIPATING A NEW LOAN.

Legislative Council Delays Consent to Government Offices.

Committee asked the Legislative Council yesterday to sanction expenditure of £110,000 for Law Courts and £310,000 for central offices from the next Kenya loan, but after hearing the debate, changed its mind.

Committee agreed to the new Law Court scheme only on condition of the Central Offices, especially whether the site should be on the Hill or, for the convenience of the public, in or near the town, will be referred to a Committee. Meanwhile the expenditure has not yet been sanctioned.

Some of the Elected Members doubted whether now is the proper time to discuss expenditure of this magnitude, which has apparently reserved the prior consent of the Colonial Office. The latter, however, refused to discuss at the present time to a new Police H.Q. at £90,000 and £80,000 for certain district offices.

Member for Nairobi South declared that the Committee enquiring into the Central Offices scheme can also ascertain "whether there is not already a building in Nairobi which it would be possible to acquire as very desirable for the use of the Government Departments."

TOWN OR HILL SITE? Should comprise a Legislative Council (Chamber to seat sixty with four large committee rooms, offices and waiting rooms.

CONTROL PRICE OF MAIZE RAISED.

Position of Supplies Still Acute.

DISTRIBUTION CENTERS

The position in regard to supplies of maize meal is still very acute and the maximum price chargeable for the same has been raised by 50 cents per bag.

The following announcement, dated July 16, has been issued by the Secretary of the Food Control Board.

The maximum price chargeable for maize meal is now fixed at 50 cents per bag, making the present price 1/10 per bag of 200 lbs. (or gross weight) a special issue of the "Official Gazette" enclosing a schedule of the maximum price chargeable has accordingly been published.

REDDAWAY FENCING AND CATTLE BELTING BILLS.

Principal Bills.

Minister of Agriculture and Co-operation.

"The value to be derived from the operation of this Ordinance will largely depend upon the attitude and practice of farmers themselves," declared the Director of Agriculture in moving the second reading of the Fencing Bill in the Legislative Council on Monday. He added: "It provides the ways and means for progress and it is to be hoped that full advantage will be taken of it for the better management of pastures areas, for the protection of crops, and... for the prevention and control of stock diseases."

The Cattle Clearing Bill also passed its second reading on Monday. The Director of Agriculture declared that it was a measure which, in combination with the Fencing Bill, was calculated greatly to reduce the incidence of stock diseases and to provide the most effective means of controlling their spread.

LOCAL OPTION PROCEDURE.

The Fencing and Cattle Clearing Bills passed their second reading in the Legislative Council on Monday when it was intimated that the committee stages of the two measures would be taken to-day.

In moving the second reading of the Fencing Bill, the Director of Agriculture (Mr. H. A. H. H.) said that members would recall that the second reading of this Bill was attended by the House at a previous session when it was referred to a Select Committee. The Report of that Committee was laid on the table. On its recommendation the Bill had been reprinted and it was decided to reintroduce it in order to facilitate the business of Council. This unusual step was considered advisable in view of the numerous small consultative character of the amended bills which it will be in Committee. The Committee, however, did not also seriously the principles of the original Bill, though they based on close examination of a complicated controversial measure of this kind that touch agricultural and refracting was necessary to meet the conditions of this Colony.

The Director took that opportunity of bearing testimony to the value of the advice and help given by Mr. Cobley during the period in which he acted as Member for the Bill Valley. He also spoke of the great amount of work that had devolved upon the Hon. a Letter Selector, General (Mr. A. J. McCarty) in making what practically amounted to a draft of the Bill.

In a reference to Clause 2 of the Bill, the Director said that in the definitions of "holding," and "control" native and lease reserve, crown land, railway, road and local authorities, "had" been embodied in order that where applicable they might be brought into force at any time by the Bill without recourse, as far as might be avoided, to separate sections and provisions in the Bill dealing with them.

Local Option.

In Clause 3, the procedure to be adopted in the exercise of a local option is more clearly set forth than in the relative sections of the original Bill. The steps are shortly as follows—
1. The Director of Agriculture, with the approval of the Director of Agriculture, may, in the exercise of a local option, direct the convening of a meeting by the District Commissioner of all the owners in that holding, district, and on a majority of two-thirds of the owners being in favour of the application of the Ordinance, the Governor shall declare such district to be a proclaimed district for purposes of the Ordinance.

It will be noted that owners absent from the meeting are deemed to be in favour of being included under the Ordinance unless they had expressed themselves in writing to the contrary.

Clause 4 sets forth the manner in which advice areas may be brought under the provisions of the Ordinance.

In Clause 5, it is provided that the principal who laid down the Ordinance should be responsible for the cost of boundary fences and that the cost of the fence should be paid equally to the owner and the local authority. The Committee pointed out that the contribution to be made by owners of the fence should not be as indicated in Clause 4 of the previous Bill, but should be apportioned, with that qualification, that an owner may not be called upon to contribute half the cost in respect of fencing in an "advice" area outside a proclaimed district if he shows that he derives no benefit therefrom.

Important Amendment.

In Clause 12, an important amendment had been made. The Committee considered that compulsory fencing of holdings which were within a "quadrant" should be removed as it was considered that such provisions would become far more operative in their application than was perhaps originally contemplated. The compulsory fencing of a holding in an advice area within a clear area remained, but the term "clear area" which was defined as a holding in the original bill had been removed.

Clause 21 provides that only with the authority of the Governor in Council and under conditions prescribed by him may fences with gates be erected across public roads.

Clause 42 was important. As the Bill now stood the Railway Administration would pay the whole cost and repair of lines whenever a line of railway traversed a holding or part of a holding which had been completely fenced. In a similar case whenever a public road traversed a holding the cost of the fence was to be borne equally by the owner and the Railway Administration. 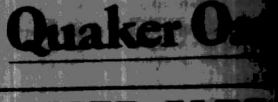

Minister in Nairobi... G. G. Swaine.

It was constantly visiting Government offices and it was very difficult for them to increase business under the existing conditions. He regarded it as of vital importance that central Government offices should be situated in the main town Nairobi. He also expressed the hope that the Government started on this work they would make the fullest use of local supplies and make a maximum number of local people who were in a position to supply goods and materials at competitive prices.

Captain the Hon. E. M. V. Kennedy (West Kenya) expressed the hope that the Government would be unanimously resolved on a (modified) side of the House, and did not express that hope because the work was not necessary, they had not been held where the office were to be situated and small things were to be done. That problem ought to have been solved prior to the introduction of the motion.

"Buying the Hill."

La-Coleman the Hon. C. G. Durban (Kinaya) expressed gratification that provision had been made for a new Government building, because, he said, it had to be admitted that the least that could be said of the present building was that it was dilapidated. On the other hand he felt Government would be entirely wrong to place the Central Offices on a Hill site as had been suggested by the Colonial Secretary.

"Is it Government's intention to buy the Hill?" he asked. "It seems that with £50,000 they could not only make but buy the Hill." The Hon. T. J. O'Shea (Pitanga) thought that Government would be in a better position to a committee before passing it to a final decision. He thought that all on his side of the House were agreed that it was desirable to get on with the question of Central Offices and Law Courts, but it was hardly fair to expect them sitting going further into the matter to vote a sum of £60,000 with the knowledge that further sums would be necessary. In view of the fact that a sum of probably

£500,000 was involved, it was no measure to ask that the member should go to a committee.

Not the Mosaic.

La-Coleman the Hon. J. G. Kirkwood (Pitanga North) while expressing the desirability of Central Offices and Law Courts did not think that the present was the most favorable time for making such a motion. Much more information was required and he would like to know the financial position of the Government. He would like to know the amount involved. In view of the expenditure on famine relief and loans and the effect on the finances of the Colony, he suggested that it would be advisable to refer the matter to a committee composed of all Elected Members and such members of the official side of the House as it might be thought desirable to appoint. They would then clarify their minds on the question.

Captain the Hon. H. E. Schwartz (Nairobi South) proposed an amendment to the motion. He suggested that the Council should sanction the new House of £110,000 on new Law Courts only. He added that the question of site in respect of the Central Offices could then be fully considered by a Committee. He thought that the sum allocated for roads to the Central Offices was out of all proportion to what was necessary.

"The committee could also consider whether there is not already a building in Nairobi which, if it would be possible to acquire it, would make a nucleus which would be used for the central offices for a very large number of Government Departments." He added, in connection with the Supreme Court the site had been fixed by Government and the motion would arise in regard to that site.

The Hon. George Harvey reported the amendment.

La-Coleman W. P. Tucker (Nairobi North) supported Captain Schwartz's amendment. He thought that the value of his own motion in the matter would be that the proposed central offices should be not near the river, rather than on the site which had been mentioned by the Colonial Secretary. He urged that the proposed committee should be appointed immediately if the House accepted the amendment. He recalled, in connection with the motion, a striking firm which was given so long ago as 1920 or 1921 before the Ombudsman Committee.

when it was stated that in addition to the better work and greater work which would be performed by central Government offices, there would also be a large financial saving should it be possible to do so in the number of messengers employed, in fuel and a very great saving in the cost of transport and highly paid heads of Departments. The Wrong Time.

The Hon. E. Perry Cobb (Hill Valley) opposed the original motion and the amendment, saying he could not consider this was the right time for planning the Colony into further large-scale works. A Member Views.

The Hon. F. A. Benda (Mombasa) said he could not quite see how the question of the Colony's financial position arose. 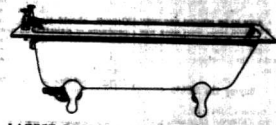

The Tariffs Report.

Although the publication of the Report of the Kenya Tariff Committee may give a fresh impetus to the controversy raging round protection and the principles which should influence the fixing of railway rates, the discussion will at least be better informed than they were in the past. That is no inconsiderable advantage. The protagonists of protection and of free trade are usually so change of traditional belief because of the material provided by the study of a heavy problem in its Kenya setting but we entertain the hope and belief that the Report of the Tariff Committee will foster an East African conception of certain economic considerations which will transcend in their importance the narrow and inherited prejudices of the protectionist or free trader of the orthodox schools. One of the most important services the Committee has rendered is its emphasis on the fact that the industries which have been built up in Kenya and in the development of which the other Territories have assisted through their acceptance of the protection policy, are industries which are suitable for introduction in other areas of Eastern Africa. The Committee has endeavored in its consideration of a difficult problem to take the East African view. It has been handicapped by the absence of detailed statistics of the optimum yields by manufacturing concerns held. There is no doubt that discussion of the subject have also suffered from that defect. In general the committee has tried to be content with declared opposition only, without the enlightenment the reasons for that attitude. Now that the Kenya case has been disclosed in detail by a Committee which included repre-

sentatives of Government, the Railway, commerce and agriculture, a reasonably just opinion of the other territories not only to examine that case but to prepare their own minds. The date of Inter-Colonial Conference has been postponed. The railway problem offers to the territories an opportunity for discussion on a better informed basis; it should also offer to Uganda and Tanganyika a chance to make a more definite statement of their attitude to protection than they have done in the past. It is widely believed that the history of agricultural development in Kenya was one that would offer repeated elsewhere in East Africa, particularly in Tanganyika, when settlement increased and that it is only in partial contemplation we may catch a better appreciation of the value of offering to infant industries an opportunity to develop in an early stage under protected conditions. With the approach to Closer Union and the disappearance for practical purposes of the territorial boundaries, the development of the agricultural industries becomes more and more the concern of East Africa as a whole. It is a reasonable hope that the report of the Tariff Committee will set in motion a study of the merits of the various industries. To put the point more bluntly, unless those industries are organized on business lines it is not to be expected that the community as a whole will continue to agree to the sacrifices entailed in retention of the principle of non-competition for the sake of protection. The methods of protection by the Tariff Committee include not only the imposition of duties but the regulation of capital and other investments of East Africa and any other territories which are to be established. In the case of the sugar industry the point when the local market can be supplied if conditions remain normal and this has been achieved despite the handicaps of several very difficult and abnormal years. On the question of the part which the Railway sys-

"Unqualified Success" at the Port

CHAMBER DISCUSSION.

Retention of Daylight Saving Urged.

At the July meeting of the Mombasa Chamber of Commerce, the Hon. F. A. Bommer addressed the Chamber on the subject of the repeal of the Alteration of Time.

Mr. Bommer said: "I am glad to see that I am not at liberty to speak much on the alteration or suggested alteration of the Bill, because, at the moment, it is only being investigated to find out exactly the views of the whole of the population. The allegation was made, not only by me but by several others, that the Bill, as it is, is not a fair trial from the point of view of the people. That sufficient arguments were not given to it at the time. The Bill was brought in, and it was proved that the farmers had been circumvented over a period of 4 to 6 years and out of 96 or 97 people circulated only two replies, and those two said they did not care one way or another because whatever law was brought in they would go their own way. The difficulties being experienced up-country at the moment are mostly on the shambas, and with these, as I have written in the public press, I have no sympathy—none whatever. The farmers in the past instance, did not take the trouble either to help or retard the movement and now they are complaining because they say their boys turn out with the sun and not with the F.W.D. meaning the Government time. In consequence thousands and thousands of pounds are lost through masters paying for an hour per day without any compensating work."

The Objection.

The objection that I do personally take to the measure is that I consider people were not sufficiently apprised of the time. But it is a fact, and quite rightly so, that several people, under the old conditions would not get the opportunity of daylight for their shambas, but, as we have seen recently, shops in this town are kept open. One of the big points in favour of the alteration of the time was to benefit shop assistants, and now we see in this town, certain shops keeping open until 9 o'clock at night, because they do not catch the trade of people who are walking round the streets and, therefore, you see that the Bill has defeated its object in that the shop assistants do not get the alleged advantage of this time and there is no shop hours act operating in Mombasa. But, as I say, I don't want to press my own views; they are

readily called for from house-keepers, natives, Arabs and Indians. I am intending to press the Committee to come down here and interview everybody and to endeavour to get the views of every section of the community, no matter for or against. Everybody will be invited to the meeting on Monday afternoon, when the first meeting takes place; I shall get a pledge from Major Rhodes and Mr. Conway Harvey that they will come down and I cannot say why others cannot come down here so as to get really in touch with the people concerned. I think no time is to be lost and I will be glad to have anybody for or against the Bill. I consider, before any Bill of any kind is brought in, it should be seriously considered and that is my opinion. (Applause.)

Member said that some of the clauses were based on the legislation now in force in the Federated Malay States although they had been modified to suit conditions in this country. He admitted that some unusual powers had been given to the local authorities and that he was sure that the Hon. Members on the other side of the House would be disposed to give their support to the Bill.

The Hon. Member for the Eastern Districts (Mr. Harvey) said that he had decided to support the Bill and he hoped that it would be sent to a Select Committee. There was one point on which he was not quite clear and that was regarding the reference in the clause and reasons to the fact that it referred to township. It seemed to him the Bill was of very general application and he considered that the local authorities in the rural areas might not be quite ready to be treated with such wide powers as would be given to the local authorities in the townships.

incapacities based on Crown land were mentioned. He thought that all land must come within the operation of the Bill and he referred to a particular case in Mombasa in which a sum of money had been expended on anti-malarial measures and it was later found that the measure was actually carried on adjacent Crown land. Nothing had been done to that land. He welcomed the suggestion of the appointment of a Select Committee.

The Acting Director of Medical and Sanitary Services thought that all the points raised could be dealt with in Select Committee. It was agreed that the matter should be referred to a Select Committee.

LOCAL INSURANCE.
 The Hon. E. F. Fynn Cobb, the member of Legislative Council for the Rift Valley Constituency gave notice at Tuesday's meeting of the Council that at a later stage in the session he would move a motion on the effect that the Council should regret the decision of Government as announced by His Excellency in the matter of insurance—damage by floods and recommodate that a scheme of partial insurance should be adopted and that the legislation necessary should be considered at the present session.

Explosives Law.

BILL TO MEET PRESENT CONDITIONS.

The Legislative Council on Tuesday passed the second reading of a Bill to consolidate and amend the law relating to the manufacture, storage, sale, transport, importation, exportation, and use of explosives.

In proposing the second reading of the Bill the Acting Attorney General said that up to the present the law was contained in the Indian Explosives Act of 1886. It was now thought desirable to consolidate the law and to insert new provisions with regard to the classification of explosives, as the amendment of the law and the revision of licenses. For the new Bill the South African Bill had been taken as a model although as that was made in 1913 the present Bill brought it up to date.

One of the new provisions in the Bill in clauses 12 to 16, was for the application to be an offence to be known as the Director for the grant of licenses for the purpose of establishing or erecting explosives factories. Under the Indian Act the application for such licenses had to be made to the Governor in Council and an enquiry had to be conducted before a Magistrate. The old procedure was suitable for India but not suitable here. The Government in Council was much overburdened and it was thought that they would agree that it was advisable to take as much work as possible from that body.

Clauses 18 to 20 enabled the Director to amend, transfer and revoke licenses. Clause 8 provided for the appointment of inspectors and other clause gave them powers. The last clause empowered the Governor to make Rules under the Bill.

The Director of Public Works seconded and the Bill was read a second time.

Civil Procedure Ordinance.

EFFECT OF AMENDING BILL.

On the proposal of the Acting Attorney General the Legislative Council on Tuesday passed the second reading of a Bill to amend the Civil Procedure Ordinance, 1924.

In proposing the second reading of the Bill the Acting Attorney General said that it was now considered desirable to amend certain provisions of the 1924 Ordinance. Section 25 of the Ordinance stated that the Court, after a case had been heard, should pronounce judgment, and on such judgment a decree should follow, provided that if the defendant did not make such appearance as might be prescribed the Court might give judgment for the plaintiff in default. It also provided that it should not be necessary for the Court to hear the case before giving judgment. Under the present Bill it was proposed to extend the scope of the section so as to render it unnecessary for a Court to hear evidence in the cases mentioned above.

Clause 3 had been included for the Official Receiver. Under the present law it was obligatory on a Court to return a judgment in favour of the plaintiff who had been arrested and he might apply to be discharged, in which case he was entitled to be released from arrest. The present Bill changed the word "shall" to "may". It was thought desirable to include this in the interests of justice.

In addition the new Bill made certain other provisions to enlarge the facilities for arrest and attachment.

The Acting Chief Justice had asked for this law to be altered and he mentioned that the Law Society of Kenya had also been consulted and were in entire agreement.

The second reading was passed.

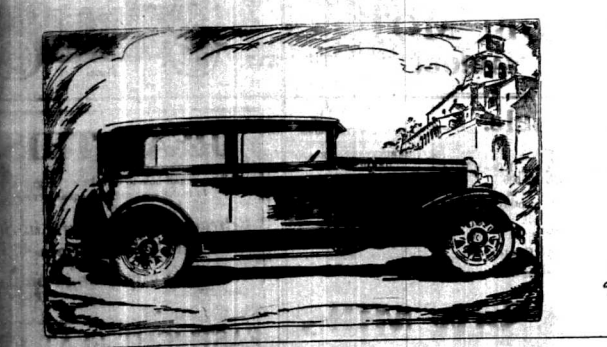

IMPORTATION OF MAIZE INTO KENYA.

(Continued from page 1.)

ferred powers on the Board to purchase outside the country so to import such stock as may be in the opinion of the Board may from time to time be required for supplies. It was to be admitted that some Government-owned stocks in the Board, no reference was made to the House to the possibility of those funds being used for the purpose stated in the Resolution. Government advisers considered a right that the matter should be recalled in the matter.

Figures Asked For.

The Hon. T. J. O'Shea (Pleasanton) asked whether the Director of Agriculture could provide figures which would justify the motion. The Director of Agriculture said that the information which he regarded as being very accurate and based on returns collected by the Board was estimated that the whole maize supply was only about 100,000 bags for the year. Of that there were contracts in respect of advance deliveries for 20,000 bags. This was a deficiency of 80,000 bags. Adding the proposed 30,000 bags to the 50,000 bags it was calculated by the Board that there was just sufficient food to begin the year until the beginning of September. The Government was expected to come into the market in the second week in August and the maize crop later but it must be understood that those would not be fully dry and would only be used to a limited extent.

Preliminary Methods.

Colonel the Hon. C. G. Kirkwood (Pleasanton North) said that when they had heard merely proved how little it was to interfere with economic conditions. He mentioned that maize supply had been bought locally at a cheaper price than it imported. He said that there was sufficient maize in the country and mentioned that the Kenya Farmers' Association and Messrs. Dalgety and Co. were inviting people to go to them for supplies.

Railway Rates.

Captain the Hon. E. M. V. Kennedy (West Kenya) said that he was opposed to the motion.

He asked why the natives in the country were to receive the maize in their reserves when they were in a position to convert maize into meal themselves. He raised the following resolution which had been passed by a number of his constituents—That this public meeting of Nyeri district residents protests against the manner in which the maize supplies of the district have been depleted without the knowledge of the Food Control Board and also protests against the continued increase in the maize price. The meeting also urges that the Food Control Board should press for an immediate assessment of railway rates to meet the resulting maize conditions. If necessary, as said, the railway should have been a little more rather than have some money out of the districts of the country. He also referred to the fact that the J. J. Collins Board had determined not to reduce the price of maize. He stated that the whole of the maize was to be imported in the form of meal and not as maize meal. He said that he had seen the report of the railway rate but for probably very good reasons that had not been done.

Insufficient Information.

The Hon. T. J. O'Shea (Pleasanton South) thought that the figures supplied had not been very helpful, and he pointed out that the deficiency between 55,000 bags and 78,000 bags was in reality 15,000 bags and not 28,000 bags as stated. He did not think that the House had been satisfied. He also said that he had entered into the forward contracts. Was the Government importing maize to allow private interests to fulfill their contracts. He asked if Government had taken steps to ensure that the new crops expected shortly were not harmed so as to keep up the present prices. He also asked his protest against the announcement of the increase of price in advance and said he would like a statement from the Director to justify that action. In the district it was impossible to buy a bag of maize from the day the announcement was made until the price was increased. He asked if Government was aware that maize was being sold considerably in advance of the price laid down. He believed the price of maize.

Alternative Products.

The Hon. E. Poyas Cobb (Hill Valley) was of the opinion that the Food Control Board had not worked in an efficient and economic manner. He asked whether the Director of Agriculture had considered the existence of exportable wheat. He believed that the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services had carried out experiments and found that a mixture of wheat meal and maize meal was excellent as a foodstuff. It was therefore to neglect the use

was, to use the enormous phrases of the Director of Agriculture, an unworkable gamble with public funds as it might, except in so far as maize may be necessary for mixing in the breadstuff exportable wheat.

Colonel the Hon. J. G. Kirkwood seconded the amendment. Colonel the Hon. W. K. Tunley (Nairobi North) said that when he was in the Food Control Board he knew that he was under-estimating one of the most important tasks if a Government could call an unofficial member to do. But he did not know that he would be present in the House when the actions of the Board were discussed. He suggested that it was only the duty of the members of the Board to state their views as members when their work was finished. He thought that history would show that they had not done anything contrary to the interests of the community as a whole. He stated that the whole of the maize was to be imported in the form of meal and not as maize meal. He said that he had seen the report of the railway rate but for probably very good reasons that had not been done.

The Acting Director of Medical and Sanitary Services said that so far as his department had gone the addition of wheat meal to maize had been found advantageous.

The Director of Agriculture explained that on the Board there were members who were highly skilled in commerce and trade and who were able to give wise counsel. He disagreed with the statement that the Board had been formed to supply food to feed the people to supply food to feed the people.

Regarding forward contracts he said that the Board had found it necessary to set certain firms to release their reserve stocks to be used as a buffer to meet the Board had hoped to avoid importation but owing to the sudden stoppage of the maize supply the Kikuyu Reserve the situation had become such that 30,000 bags had to be imported. The Kikuyu Reserve had been supplying about 2,000 tons a month outside the Reserve. He sympathized with the residents of the Nyeri district but considered that the Board had done everything that it could.

We regard to the publication in advance of the increase in price the Director said that there were representatives on the Board who were well informed on matters of this kind and whose judgment should be relied upon. The Board believed that the increase was no more than sufficient to cover the actual extraordinary cost and was not sufficient to induce people to hold up stocks.

With regard to the statement by the Hon. Member for Pleasanton South regarding the sale of maize at prices above the controlled price the Board had invited the public to help them. There were officers at Eldoret to take action in such cases but they could not act on heavy evidence.

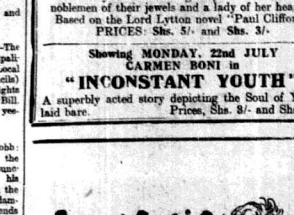

The last instruction to the board, however, was to consider any objection which might have been left for the possibility of people seeing the films which was worth looking at. It stated that no film should be shown which depicted industrial unrest, criminal cases or crook, high life or other scenes, or anything which the board might consider undesirable.

What would they not see scenes of violent industrial unrest? Or of drunkenness? Many pictures were provided by many people. Was it suggested that they were likely to get drunk more often than they did to-day on account of such pictures more than they would be when they were drunk.

Daylight Saving.
To the Editor, "E. A. Standard."
Sir—It was unable to attend the National meeting on the subject of Daylight Saving as I should much like to have heard the arguments put forward from both sides.

As far as I am personally concerned, it makes no difference at all but I venture to suggest that though no health statistics are or can be available which can be interpreted directly to the introduction of this Ordinance, one factor is individual and another is the pressure in that not only is this Ordinance detrimental to the health of the Native and Indian community but that European suffer also.

One must not overlook the fact that the physical condition of the race and irritability are easily developed and a factor which contributes to this more than anything else is sleeplessness and interference with the physical and mental health of the race. The early hours of the morning is the time when one sleeps more peacefully and to curtail this time is to my mind injurious to health.

It is a well known fact that though Daylight Saving has been introduced people do not desire it as much earlier hours than previously, but they have to get up at an earlier hour and thus lose a valuable time of rest which makes all the difference between a placid and an irritable temper in the morning.

I cannot help feeling that the stress for exercise may be capable of removal. It is not all the exercise for serious illness to develop after over-exercise in strenuous exercise, and I would assure those who feel the need of exercise that an hour or an hour and a half, daily or even twice a week is ample to avoid this loss of lack of exercise. Even before the introduction of the Ordinance most of us were able to indulge in a game of golf, tennis or football when we felt so inclined. Why then should the farmer who still has all the backbone of the country be put to any inconvenience and possibly financial loss by the introduction of Daylight Saving?

Sir—I am glad to see that you are inviting opinions on the question of Daylight Saving.
If the object of the measure was, as I believe, to help people to work earlier in order that they might have time for recreation when their work was done, few will quarrel with that object.

But the means adopted to gain that object are peculiar. The people who are regulated in their hours of waking, working and going to bed by the arbitrary statements of a clock are a minute fraction of the population of Kenya and most certainly a minority of those inhabitants of Kenya who use clocks. The majority use their clocks as substitutes for the sun and as guides, more or less accurate, to the probable movements of the sun, of banks and of railway trains.

CORRESPONDENCE.

I have never been able to understand the reason for the decision of Daylight Saving in Europe. It is an experiment in favour of the shorter clock on the Continent. In high latitudes the hours of daylight may be longer in winter and shorter in summer. It is very desirable to start the day's work at whatever hour in summer than in winter and it is obviously easier to combine when the clock is the only guide, within limits, to the time of day, to alter the clock than the time of day, to alter the clock to make advance or to alter its time table. In high latitudes the question of taking an advantage of the change of seasons. On the equator the problem is whether to start the clock at 11 or 12, to start and to finish work earlier all the year round in winter and later in the summer, to pretend, and to alter the clock on that basis, or to appear to the European townsfolk and to them allow to be as they were?

But besides direct irritations there is a danger that if the common sense of the thoughtful Europeans may come to regard it as approximately true. There may be no wrong in "speaking disrespectfully of the Equator" but it is certainly right to set disrespectfully to work. Some of our sportsmen who regard it as a disgraceful thing to do at any hour of the day, are a poor set of sportsmen. Two of them have died young.

Breeding the Rhode Island Red.

Recently I have been reading a most interesting article by Richard Owen, in the "Poultry World," on the breeding of utility Rhode Island Reds.

As these birds are very popular again in this country, possibly a few notes on the subject will be of interest to my readers.

Mr. Owen states that his policy of breeding is dictated by the commercial man; for a poult breeder has to live mainly by them, and therefore he must try to anticipate their needs and demands. Male Influence on Egg Size.

The demand at present is for cockbirds of big egg pedigree, and whilst the principle is sound enough, as practice the influence of the sire is not exerted to any considerable degree in the first season so far as egg size is concerned, because to fix this permanently in a strain means continuous selection, and proof against regression is only obtained over a number of years. Even then no one is certain. The use of big egg cockbirds two years in succession should show marked improvement in a commercial stock. The Red eggs are of good nearability, but in the past before the breed had attained its present productive state hatchability gave some trouble. This is an unfortunate feature, as it is dark brown egg producing breeds until they become bred up to a certain level of productivity. Once that level is reached the hatchability compares very favourably with that of the white-shelled breeds. In the author's own case with Leghorns and Reds, the Red eggs take less hatching nowadays than they did some years ago. This is due to the fact that in the incubator a good twelve hours before the Leghorns to get an even clean up of the hatch.

Egg Colour.

The shell of a dark brown egg is usually thicker. One in heavy production the shell becomes thinner and the colour begins to fade, just as other loss of pigmentation elsewhere on any high-producing hen. There are many lines which, despite good egg colour, always lay a dark brown egg, and these eggs hatch well, which seems to disprove the theory that colour is a drawback to good hatchability.

Provision to Meet Early Interest on Loans.

SAFEGUARDING TRIBAL LIFE. (THROUGH SEUTER'S AGENCY.) London, July 17. In the House of Commons today, Mr. Lumsden said that in the Colonial Development Bill, the Government would not insist on the use of forced labour in any scheme under the Bill. All possible precautions would be taken to ensure that no source of labour would be dried up and that the native population would not be affected in any way.

Private Enterprise. While the great majority of schemes being considered were purely governmental undertakings, the Government would not hesitate to assist private enterprise in any form for a purpose of public interest.

JOINT EAST AFRICAN BOARD.

Fourth Annual General Meeting.

FINANCE QUESTION.

Convention of Associations to Pass Res.

(STANDARD) (OVERSEAS) London, June 30. The fourth annual general meeting of the Joint East African Board was held in Westminster House, Old Broad Street, yesterday. It received and considered the fifth annual report of the Executive Council and the balance sheet as at December 31, 1928 (with the Auditors' Report thereon) and the Income and Expenditure Accounts, to transmit any other ordinary business of the Board and (as special business) to consider and to recommend to pass (A) the following resolutions as (Ordinary Resolutions:-

(1) That Sir John Sandeman Allen, J.P., M.P., who falls to retire at this meeting be and is hereby re-elected an Elected Member of the Executive Council of Joint East African Board. (2) That Messrs. Goddard, Fryer and Mellish, Chartered Accountants, be and are hereby appointed honorary auditors of Joint East African Board for the year 1929. (3) The following resolution proposed as an extraordinary resolution with a view to its subsequent confirmation as a special resolution:-

"That the Articles of Association be altered in manner following such alterations having been submitted to and approved by the Board of Trade in accordance with Clause 5 of the Memorandum of Association, that is to say:-

(1) By inserting in Article 9 immediately after the words "Member of the Board" the words "the sum of five guineas" (2) By inserting in Article 46 immediately after the words "presented appointment or appointments" the words "provided" always that when a Corporate Member is empowered to appoint more than one Member of the Executive Council all the annual subscriptions payable by such Corporate Member shall be not less than the sum of five guineas in respect of each Appointed Member of the Executive Council."

Mr Sydney Haan, K.B.E., was in the Chair, and opened the meet-

ing by reading letters of apology for absence: Sir John Sandeman Allen, M.P., was unable to be present owing to the fact that he had been ordered by his doctor to take complete rest. Major Crowdy also telegraphed an apology, and Sir Philip Richardson was not due back from Spain. At the meeting Mr. E. St. Walsh, Mr. H. B. Taylor, Mr. A. G. Auger, Mr. A. Dorley, Mr. A. W. Wiggin, Mr. Col. Hartigan, Major Conrad Walsh, Sir H. Langford, Mr. Campbell and Mr. Haan were present.

The time is therefore at hand when with the disclosure in the Report of the views of the Hilton Young Commission, the East African views should be compared with the views of the Board in bringing about a settlement.

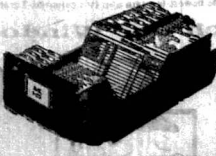

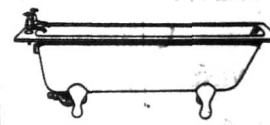

The Government might desire. This province is divided into the four parts of leaving open the door to Indians since, without it, any unincorporated Indian would be nominated for a period of three years in accordance with the provisions of the present Ordinance. The Commission also explained that the representatives who have taken part of repeating that section of the principal Ordinance which required that all nominated members should have the same qualifications as elected members. One of the reasons in favor of including elected and nominated unofficial representatives in the constitution of a Municipal Board was that there would probably be residents who, as least managers, would be able to stand for election whereas those who would be of great value. It happened fairly frequently, however, that persons and others of the kind contemplated were transferred by them from time to time without the Colony act, on going to a new station, or being transferred to a municipality where, as the law stood, deferred from appointment to a board for 3, 6, or 12 months, during which time they were fulfilling the residential qualification.

Mr. Conroy Harvey (Lala) said that in view of the revolutionary character of the amendments which constituted the introduction of the new bill would meet with the unanimous approval of the Council. He seemed to him that it was a perfectly proper proceeding on the part of the Government to introduce a bill of this kind.

He thought that the article leading up to the present situation required explanation on behalf of the masses of Indians who were affected. He referred, in particular to the attitude of the leaders to the masses of ignorant Indians and divided them into two categories, he said, was the institution of justice, fair play and reasonable demands and the other, that of selfish motives in which power and not the good of the masses was the primary object.

Political agitation. But these people are likely to appeal to the sentiments of the masses were followed by the masses and created sentiment and excitement. Political agitation was extensively carried on in India in the name of religion; in this country it was carried in the name of self-respect. In this country, the leaders of the Indian Association have been carrying on their agitation by appealing to the masses and saying that Government and the white community neglected the Indian community as inferior.

He said that they should maintain their status as a community. About two weeks ago a book Indian paper, in dealing with the question of the Indian community of an article—'The old-world in a message of the day'—said to the new of the Indian and European East to the materialistic means by which India will liberate herself. He said that he could prove that non-operation was not the outcome of any of the religions of India. From the scriptures of the Mohammedan, he stated that he had never read any of the words of the Prophet and the ruler (whatever the name) of any of the religions of India. Amongst passages from the Koran—'Honoured and superior from among men in the eyes of God, he who is best behaved of you.' He said that he could prove that what you are not because that will not help you.

The unfortunate attitude which had been adopted by the leaders of the Indian Association was that they would not admit the truth of the facts. They had been misled and unjust and did not play the game. Mr. Malik passed a message on an address given by His Excellency the Governor Sir Edward Grigg in the opening of the East African Indian National Congress at Nairobi in 1927. He said that on that occasion said—I hold that there is only one principle upon which the present position of privilege and political power and privilege, that is, by the general level of education, the standard of living and the position which each community is able to make to the progress of the country.

He believed that when His Excellency had said that, he had in mind the Indian community to be the country's biggest friend. He said that he had thought that the leaders of the community would have taken into account the fact that Indian meetings were called one after another and that the Government was not interested in the Indian masses were told.

Mr. Representative Leaders. On the question of Indian representation, Mr. Malik declared that the Government did not represent the views of the Indian community as a whole, nor did the Kenya Central Indian Association. He said that he had been surprised to find that the four Indian representatives came to an agreement and everybody believed that as a result of the deliberations, the Indian question as far as it related to municipal representation had been a happy ending. But they had heard that morning that when the principal Ordinance was about to be presented to the Indian Association, it was stated that a large mass meeting of Indians, the programme members agreed to at that conference had been open. Had it not been for the good sense of those Indian representatives who attended that mass meeting, he was sure that it would have ended with very unhappy results. They were called blackguards and traitors and were booted off the platform. They were sure to have sold-battered the Indian community into the hands of the European community. After that those gentlemen severed their

relations of the "new" continued Mr. Malik. 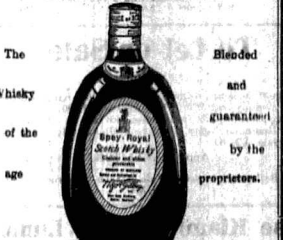

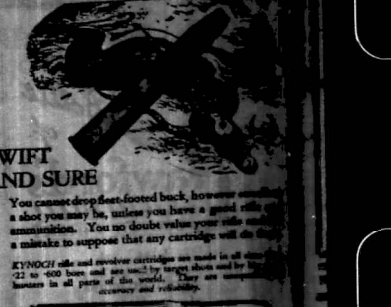
