SHOULD THE COTTON BOARD CONTINUE?

Association and Chamber
 Think It Should

KAMPALA TOWNSHIP

'STANDARD' CORRESPONDENT.

Kampala, July 19.
 On Sunday last services in all the churches in the Protectorate were held in thanksgiving for the recovery of His Majesty the King. Lives in the remotest districts of the native churches, both C. M. S. and Catholic, joined with the great numbers of Mohammedans, Hindus and Nanyas in offering thanks for the deliverance of the King. The Catholics were crowded with Europeans, Germans and natives and the English Churches in the far centres where they are established, had large attendances.

A Busy Week.

This week has been a busy one on the part of the public bodies. On Thursday afternoon the Uganda Cotton Association met mainly with the object of considering the letter from the Chief Secretary to the Government asking for the Association's comments on the Cotton Commission Enquiry report. After some discussion it was realised that in a full general meeting (there were some 40 people present) it would be impossible to discuss the report with any hope of finality and a Committee of five members was appointed to draw up a memorandum and submit it to a special general meeting on August 6, when it would be discussed and put into final shape for submission to Government. One point was emphasised at the meeting which was that destructive criticism without any counter scheme was utterly useless and the Committee were instructed that, if they disagreed with any particular point, alternative propositions must be submitted. The sub-committee is a strong one comprising of Mr. C. P. Datta (Messrs. Narandas Bajerani), Mr. H. C. Bonny (Uganda Company), Mr. Mujibha (Messrs. Vithaldas Hardas, Junis side), Mr. B. V. Patel (Messrs. Kamplaj-Gemrut agency), and Mr. Bantok (Uganda Commercial Company), and immediately the meeting was over the Committee held its first session to decide procedure. The report has to be in the hands of the Secretary by July 27 and the Committee appointed have all

their work out out to finish by then even if they sit every day.

The Cotton Board.

Another matter was brought up at the meeting which caused considerable interest. The Government was asking for the opinion of the Association regarding the abolition of the Cotton Board. The Board has not functioned for several years owing to a considerable amount of trouble that happened at the last meeting. The formation of the Board was suggested by the Secretary of Agriculture in the last meeting. (1) To relieve the Director of Agriculture of some of the responsibilities he had been in regard to the commercial side of the industry; (2) To afford those interested in the cotton industry a regular opportunity of bringing their views to the notice of the Government, whilst maintaining the principle of Government control; and (3) To bring senior administrative officials in closer contact with the problems of the industry and with persons interested in its welfare. Since the formation of the Board it has chiefly dealt with the following matters—(a) The issue or suspension of seed cotton buying licences; (b) The issue or suspension of ginning and baling licences; (c) Sites for ginneries; (d) Sites for markets.

In regard to (a) and (b) these sessions are covered by the existing Cotton Ordinance. In regard to (c) it is not the intention of the Government to grant any more ginning licences except in new areas of production, for a long time to come. In regard to (d) markets in the Eastern Province have been permanently fixed and surveyed and it is the intention to carry out the policy recommended by the Cotton Commission 1919 in regard to Buganda—which amounts to the same thing. A bone of contention has always been the chairmanship of the Board. The Chief Secretary was the Chairman at first and it was realised that, owing to his position, he was unsuitable. Then the Director of Agriculture was appointed, and, as events proved, he was also unsuitable. Government think, therefore, that a Board composed of six official and six unofficial members together with a representative of the Kambas is neither necessary or sufficiently independent to deal with the questions submitted to it and, in view of the Board's which may be constituted, as a result of the Commission Report, the Association were asked to record its views. Such are the views of Government and a long discussion ensued in the meeting as to whether or not it was worth while to continue the Cotton Board. Members seemed to think that, after all, the Board

was a fact, whereas the Board suggested by the Cotton Commission might or might not be constituted and it was decided to write to the Government stating that the Board should remain, even if it had no meetings, until it had been decided what further Boards would be created in view of the Commission's report.

Chamber of Commerce.

The Chamber of Commerce met this afternoon and discussed these two important matters. As regards the Cotton Commission Report a Committee of three was appointed to make suggestions and recommendations. The Committee consist of Messrs. Mackinnon, S. V. Patel and E. Ryken and the date fixed for the special general meeting to discuss the Commission's Report and that of the Chamber is August 7 at 2 p.m. It was suggested that liaison should exist between the Cotton Association and it is hoped that this may occur.

As regards the abolition of the Cotton Board the Chamber came to the same conclusion as the Cotton Association, namely that the Cotton Board is doing no harm now it is lying dormant and should remain constituted until such time as the Government have decided their line of action in the matter of the creation of new Boards.

The Chamber passed an important resolution in regard to the Kampala Township Authority meeting. That having heard from its representative Mr. Ishmail that it had been decided to delegate to the Executive Officer of the Kampala Township Authority certain powers of the Board, including the power of instituting summary criminal proceedings for offences against the Rules, this Chamber is strongly opposed to such action and it considers that the delegation of powers to the Executive Officer should at least be postponed until the matter considered further. The Chamber reiterates its view that the Laws of the Protectorate should be altered solely through the medium of the Legislative Council. Speaking of the Kampala Township Authority, Mr. Mirza the Town Planning Expert who has recently arrived in Kampala has written to the Chamber asking to meet the body. The meeting to day was enthusiastic in accepting the invitation and it is likely that an early conference will be arranged—probably next week.

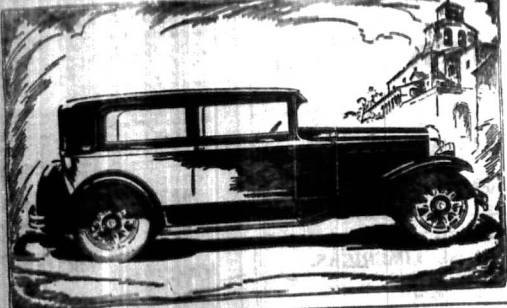

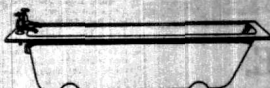

Russia and China.

The world will watch with apprehension and anxiety the development of the situation in the Far East where Russia and China are on the brink of war. At the present moment the Soviet Government has ordered the withdrawal of its representatives from China and diplomatic relations have been severed. The Russian Government in unambiguous language has expressed its opinion that all amicable means have been exhausted in the search for an settlement of the dispute. The Chinese authorities, however, still display a more hopeful attitude. Messages published today indicate that while troops are massing on both sides of the frontier and while the armament factories are working at high pressure and the atmosphere is tense and highly charged, the spark which will inflame the situation has yet to come. China is still negotiating with the object of preserving peace. The present tension between Russia and China originated in the determined efforts made by the new Nationalist Government in the Chinese Republic to stamp out the insidious Russian Communist propaganda which formed a fertile soil in the disturbed conditions in China created by civil strife during the recent civil war. To that end raids were carried out on Russian installations, several deportations occurred, numbers of Chinese and Russian agents were arrested and Russian organisations were dispersed and closed down. There will be no quarrel with the right of the Chinese National Government, which so recently asserted its independence, to extend its position and to protect the sovereignty of the Republic. The great world powers remained neutral in the long-drawn conflict between the

War Lords of China and maintained forces in the foreign concessions. But China was permitted to sell her own opium into the zone since the conclusion of hostilities diplomatic efforts have been directed to the restoration of trade relations on a revised basis. It was at the Washington Conference, China was one of the signatories to the Nine Power Treaty which, among other things guaranteed a policy intended to "stabilise conditions in the Far East, to safeguard the rights and interests of China and to promote, inasmuch as practicable, the amicable relations between China and the other Powers on a basis of equality of opportunity." The chance to "grasp that policy" was taken by the Civil War but the interest of the great Powers remains unimpaired. Japan has been a head in a declaration that the "struggle" between Russia and China will not be allowed to spread to territory in which Japan is interested and there is no doubt that the "stabilising" world powers will take similar steps to prevent extension of the trouble if it materialises. But there can be no doubt of the importance of the struggle which is impending but which all probability will even now be averted. China has challenged the policy of the Communist Party in Russia in seeking to undermine the authority of Government by subversive propaganda and the principle of non-intervention in the Chinese Republic is being invoked. Opposition to similar propaganda has hitherto prevented the British Government from recognizing the Republic as an international body. Behind it all, too, is the vexed question of Mongolia. In 1924 an agreement was signed between Russia and China by which Russia undertook to withdraw her troops from Mongolia as soon as a question relating to the frontier and the law limit of the evacuation has been decided at the Sino-Russian Conference which opened on August 27, 1920, but is now in suspension. Russia had announced her intention of reversing the rights arising out of the Peking Agreement of 1924 and the field of

the dispute is thereby enlarged. It seems unlikely that a war between two such vast territories as Russia and China could ever be fought to a conclusion but the effect of the disturbances would be a serious retrogression of trade improvement in the Far East, which is suffering from the effects of the recent Chinese Civil War.

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard"—Sir—In view of the recent articles that have appeared in the East African Standard and the latest display in the Legislative Council of the enormous powers of the self-elected Indian Member, we are obliged to issue the following statement, to the press—

1. Time and again the Indian community have made it absolutely clear that the present movement for the securing of a common franchise is not based on non-co-operation which is essentially and fundamentally different from non-participation. Improperly considered bodies.

Their case will not be put before the Imperial Government until they have not yet given any decision. The consensus for reviving the decision of 1927 has not yet been reached. That will come as soon as the Imperial Government have finally decided their policy.

4. We all hope that that policy will fall into the lap of the Imperial Government. All leading Indians whether on the Executive of the K.C.I.A. or outside are doing their best to establish points of contact both with the European community and the government in all departments of civic and political life. It is ever anxious that the harmonious relations which exist between the Indians and Europeans in trade and commerce should develop further. There are no real or political differences of opinion between us and you, that as soon as the Imperial Government have given their decision on the question of franchise and other outstanding matters, the Indian community will consider the whole position afresh from the point of view of the decision of the Indian and European in trade and commerce. Most of course will depend on the nature of the decision adopted by the Government. Meanwhile every Indian is co-operating with the other communities in the Colony and will do the same with the British in view of it is the height of imprudence to say

that the Indians are non-co-operating.

5. The variety of the allegations made in the course of the vapours of the articles and the statements made by the writer must be regarded as follows:

(a) The K.C.I.A.'s mandate has been faithfully observed and carried out even by the alleged unwilling consideration by Mombasa and Eldoret as admitted by this self-appointed advocate of truth and the Hon. Mr. O'Shea.

(b) There have been no deflections from the K.C.I.A. and those who are not on the Executive at present have never been looked out or repudiated. The K.C.I.A. and its Executive meetings has never at any time repudiated the Indian Member, and they have not severed their contacts with either the K.C.I.A. or the Indian Association. One of them, Mr. M. H. MALLS (Advocate) has been elected to the Legislative Council, the deputation shortly will be held.

7. Finally the gentleman alluded to above, who has been represented as an Indian, except by his own self and by the majority of the informed observations are calculated to complicate the situation rather than help in its solution.



 PLANTING AND GENERAL CULTURE OF THE ROSE.

(Continued from last week.)

There are three outstanding "Don'ts" relative to this operation—Don't let your over-planting—Don't let your water table get too high—Don't let your soil become too dry.

Should you be planting standard or half standard roses right up to the bud the moment planting is finished. These roses have a likelihood of rain or not, wise all your newly planted trees in soil. This does all the air spaces that may have been left and settles the soil round the roots.

It seems somewhat strange to talk of shade in connection with rose planting seeing that all good gardens at home see to it that all their rose planting is done about the end of October and November, but our climate is very different, and if there is any strong sun at the time of planting, I am in favour of a light shade for a few days which can be removed when it rains and at night.

General Culture.

There are certain three essentials in general culture, growing of roses that the position, position, soil, etc., have been given best to. Care, water and cultivation, and the greatest of these is care, since practically everything is included in that one word.

Perhaps there is no real necessity to have books, but one cannot help but put in a reminder just here, that our Quass does not mean to say that she iron, thinks, grows, heathens, and respects her, but that she iron, thinks, grows, heathens, and respects her. The association link between Humanity and the Rose is too indelible to establish that between Horse and Man or Dog and Man.

I dare say it shall be assessed in some quarters of putting in "no staff," but I speak because I have found and felt the power of the rose, and not all the logic in the world can take that knowledge away.

The moment you see that the buds you are looking for are showing signs of plumping up—it's really wonderful that a marvellous rose is contained in those few buds which—begin to curl and save leave off, not even when you're tired! A good stirring of the surface is almost as good as watering any day but water and the two together are a legion for strength. When your first flower buds begin to show manifest signs of plumping up, especially if it is a bush rose, it is a sign that the soil is getting too dry.

Pruning.

Take particular note that any rose, or rose tree is not blown about by wind. "A little time" may not only save nine but ninety-nine roses, if by so be that it is just in the shape of the "Best Bloom."

Therefore I give you the recipe for Pot-pourri. If you will, take a quantity of fresh rose petals and dry them in a warm, sunny room, constantly turning them so that they become dry and crisp. Add leaves of sweet scented geranium, lemon verbena, lavender, and orange flowers, all of which must be equally dry. Depper the leaves with powdered cloves, cardamom, cinnamon, and bay salt, using about a tablespoon of each. Then add twenty-five drops each of oil of cinnamon and oil of musk. Stick a few shavings into a bottle of glass and dry it very hard. Then pour it to a powder and mix everything together thoroughly. It is important that the rose petals should be dried when free from rain or dew, and should be laid blown but not over-dried.

Manuring and Feeding.

Whilst the many manures advised for roses are good, there is little doubt that a combination of all farmyard manures is about the best, and happy is the man that has a barn with horses, cows, sheep, pigs and fowls. A good mulch of this, when your beds appear well, will help your trees to prosper.

Pot-pourri.

All the fading roses have their use. The other owners of our garden go back quickly to Mother Earth, but—Sweet! Roses do not so, of their sweet deaths are sweeter odours made.

I have handled only to-night a lot of roses made at the end of June 1924, and am assured that it will last for five more years easily and probably a good deal longer. I am not a bit sure as to whether I hold to the idea of embalmed bodies, but I do know that I would cling with joy to the old petals of my twelve roses, that took premier place, at some past show, especially if it

Weights and Measures.

CHAMBER AND GOVERNMENT MACHINES.

Nairobi Chamber of Commerce discussed on Thursday afternoon the proposed amendments to the Weights and Measures Act which have been introduced by the Government and which will provide for the standardization of all weights and measures used in the Colony. Mr. T. A. Wood stated that considerable trouble had been experienced in the past in connection with official weighing machines. At one time the railway—reference was made to their machines examined, despite the fact that they had been known to be as much as two long out in weight of a truck load of wheat.

Mr. A. C. Tomlinson recalled that the Chambers of Commerce in the country had always taken a close interest in the question and he thought the Chambers as a whole were responsible for getting the Ordinance put into effect by the appointment of an official.

BILL to Bring Law up to Date.

A Bill to amend the Weights and Measures Ordinance passed its second reading in the Legislative Council on Thursday.

The Acting Attorney General proposing the second reading said that Mr. Murray, the Deputy Inspector of Weights and Measures, came out from England two years ago and took up his work. He had found that there were various defects in the Weights and Measures Ordinance and the present Bill was to amend those defects.

The Bill had been designed to bring the scope of the provisions of the Principal Ordinance modern weighing and measuring instruments. At the same time the opportunity had been taken in bringing the Principal Ordinance into line with the Imperial Weights and Measures Act. Provision was also made for the control of weighing and measuring instruments used by Government Departments. This had been the practice, but it was thought better now to bring it into the Ordinance. The definition of a weighing instrument had been altered in this Bill and certain self-indicating instruments. The Bill also dealt with petrol pumps of which there were now some 250 in the Colony. There were also

Country Roads and Weather Report.

Local Councils.

MEMBER OF ASSEMBLY BILL.

The annual meeting of the Local Government (District Councils) (Amendment) Bill was passed in the Legislative Council on Thursday.

In introducing the second reading the Acting Commissioner for Local Government, Lands and Settlements stated that the reasons for its introduction were the same as those which he had put forward previously in the Local Government (Municipalities) (Amendment) Bill. The Bill provided that if a District Council was constituted for the rural areas of the administrative divisions of Kiambu, Lunenburg there should be in addition one elected member. A member had not been elected in that area and this provision was necessary to safeguard the position.

Apparently had been taken in the Bill to provide for three small municipalities. It proved it was only provided that a voter should have the power to vote once in each ward. It seemed clear that in many places there would be more than one voter. It could well and therefore provision was made for a voter to exercise a vote for more than one candidate.

Clause 4 of the Bill provided that an amendment of a vote should take place between the date of notice of an election and the holding of the election, while clause 8 made provision for the future, in that the Governor in Council was given power to make rules providing for the filling of vacancies in District Councils by nomination in the event of failure to fill such vacancies by election.

The Acting Attorney General announced the motion which was passed without further comment.







There is no doubt that the time has now come when primitive methods must be superseded by systematic and scientific dairying, and local farmers are always highly appreciative of any instruction which the Agricultural Department can give—in the form of lectures. After heavy losses lately through drought etc., Mr. Jardine's remarks proved most helpful.

Much satisfaction is expressed in the district at the arrival from India of a resident landowner of Colonel Abbey, who has bought a small property on the Outfalls River. During his short tour of the colony Colonel Abbey has already acquired a reputation in Nanyuki as a keen sportsman, notably in connection with his invaluable services as starter at the last race meeting. Fishing is good and roads dry. Yesterday well known Nairobi business man crested 17 rainbow trout in the afternoon. Excellent progress is being made on local roads. Rainfall 23 only.






After every T.T. race a certain section of the trade goes to bed to tell the world for the following year. This body of opinion includes those who never race, those who have raced and lost, and some who, having raced not successfully, doubt whether the influence of the T.T. is any longer beneficial. It is an open secret that there would have been no more this year had it not been for the extremely stiff-necked attitude of some vital motor concerns, whose prospectus is simply handed out to no small half-dressed crowd who are hastily judged. Let the pros and cons be set out.

(1) Cost. This category is estimated, but it is always enormous. It is paid by the ordinary motor cyclist, being added to the price of his machine in the form of "over-heads." Of course, it is not all dead weight, even when a firm fails to finish with even one of its machines in the race, but it is a heavy burden.

(2) Danger. Post-war has been killed since the War, and many others injured. The T.T. tends to develop a bad type of machine, dangerous in character as a "sports" machine. Other types are indeed built, and, except by other means, but the T.T. has become a magnificent advertisement for the worst conceivable type.

(3) Psychological. Baudouin Young riders are led to think of motor cycling in terms of speed, noise and risk. The true emphasis should be on economy, safety, silence and comfort.

Daylight Saving.

To the Editor, "E. A. Standard." Sir.—Those who wish to revert to our old time must be familiar with the scheme known as "Sun-time." Even at Mombasa it is nearly 15 minutes in advance of the time shown on the clock at the same time during the year. In Nairobi I have known it too dark to play tennis ten minutes to six. How could that be called sun-time? We have then always kept a man-made, artificial time as the official time of the country. But the farmers, all these outside towns have always kept their own various times without the slightest regard to official time. Before the war advanced the clock 30 minutes, it was 20 minutes, and now the clock 25 minutes fast during the darker days. Without knowing it, they had already adopted "Day Light Saving." But when it gets lighted the sun will be 15 to 20 minutes past and within their rights!

Who who wish to revert to our old time must be careful not to mention the clock. In the afternoon. Once upon time Uganda kept "Sun-time." When the Railway came they put forward their clock 30 minutes and have kept railway time ever since. The alteration in 1918 brought Nairobi into line with the Uganda and Tanganyika, making the hours of daylight in Nairobi identical with those in Kampala. I should submit that a clock of half-an-hour earlier would cause just 80 minutes in convenience to the farmer while it comes to long by moving the time 30 minutes forward over the whole country. If the shops open at the customary hour, and has an hour extra to reach home before dark.

To the Editor, "E. A. Standard." Sir.—At the meeting recently held in Nairobi and reported in your issue of July 15 I notice that Mr. Schwartz says that he wants to lose arguments for the repeal of the Ordinance. Certainly he is entitled to hear and to state his own time compares them with those in favour of it.

The chief argument to say mind against the Ordinance is that it makes it necessary for the farmer and other employer of outside towns to keep two times, first of all sun time for the work as this is the only time which is understood by their employees and the only time which can be depended upon and which cannot be dispensed with, secondly the new time, approximately half an hour earlier but sometimes as much as 45 minutes earlier, which he has to use outside town.
