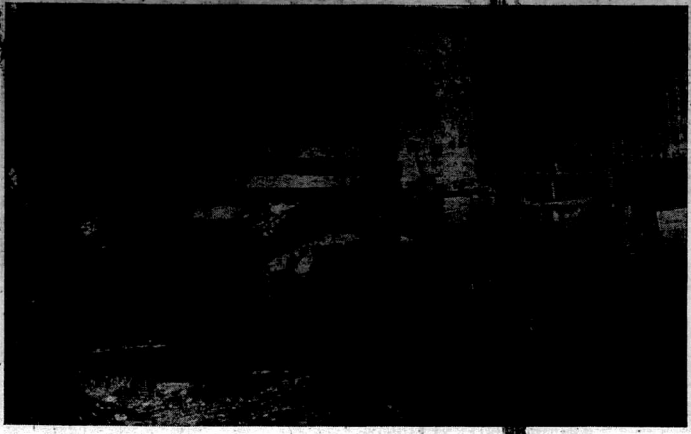

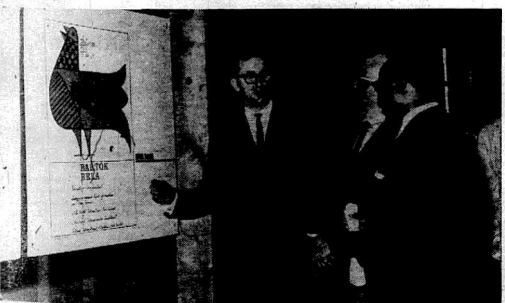

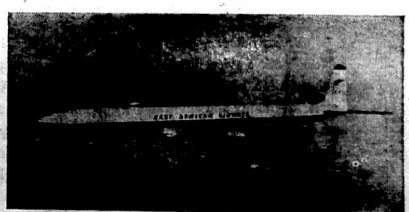

ARABS MUST FIGHT TO END IMPASSE'

The semi-official daily *Al-Ahram* yesterday said that an Arab military initiative was the only meaningful alternative to the present Middle East impasse.

Military action would be the "catalyst" to a political solution, the *Al-Ahram* editor, Mr. Muhammad Hassan al-Hekai, wrote in a leading article.

He urged a negotiated settlement between the belligerents, arguing that the distance separating the parties was too great. Any such settlement, he said, would have to be based on Arab territory being occupied by Israeli troops being surrendered.

Mr. Hekai urged that a negotiated settlement might have been possible immediately after the six-day war if the United Nations or any form of direct negotiation with Israel was excluded, they said.

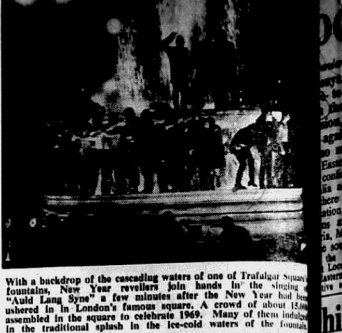
Arab guerrillas mounted a rocket attack on the Israeli town of Kiryat Shmonah, the second within 48 hours, an Israeli spokesman announced in Tel Aviv.

He said several rockets fired from the town landed a few miles from the ceasefire lines aimed at the town when the rockets were launched.

Two of the rockets exploded in the Gailian village of Kefar Gailim, a kibbutz near the north.

There were no casualties, the spokesman said, Israel's ceasefire lines remained at their present positions, the Israeli announcement said.

But the Embassy Secretary told assembled newsmen — who outnumbered the group by two to one — that he was glad to come out as the Ambassador's representative and accept the petition.

Rabbi attacks Pope for raid criticism

Chief Rabbi Yitzhak Nisim launched a broadside at the Pope for his indirect criticism of the Israeli raid on Beirut Airport and for his New Year message.

The Rabbi charged that the Pope's remarks on the raid, contained in a telegram to the Lebanese President, Mr. Charles Helou, and the New Year message constituted a political attack on Israel and the Jewish faith.

Echoing bitter contacts made against the Pope by the Minister of Religion, Mr. Zerah Warshafit, the Rabbi took the Pope to task for keeping silent on the Arab attack against an Israeli airliner in Athens and on the terrorist attempt on Jerusalem's Market Place recently.

The Pope's telegram said he deplored violent acts which could only serve to worsen the situation.

The Vatican paper *l'Osservatore Romano* commented that the raid had harmed a peaceful free-living country which had made considerable contribution to a detente.

In a rebuttal of Mr. Warshafit's criticism, the newspaper remarked that the late Security Council resolution condemning the Beirut raid did not make any reference to the Athens incident.

The *Osservatore Romano* added that this did not mean that on a moral plane this incident should be condemned as severely as the Beirut attack.

It recalled that the Pope's telegram had directed violent acts "from whichever side they come," which tacitly included the Athens attack as well.

4 killed as Boeing plunges into house

An Afghan Airline (Boeing 727 from Kabul) crashed into a house near London's Gatwick Airport yesterday while coming in to land. According to unofficial estimates 47 people were killed and 16 injured. Most of them are believed to be Pakistani immigrants.

Among the injured were said to be two children, a baby, three men, a woman, a young girl, a passenger and a pilot. The plane was destroyed and the wreckage was scattered over a large area. The plane was the first to attempt to land at Gatwick since it had been closed for several hours because of fog. Dense fog still hangs over the airport, but is expected to clear by 10.30.

The film, 'The Road to Moscow', takes place in an unidentified Western country clearly intended to be England and in Moscow's Lubianka headquarters of the KGB.

The producer, Mr. Savva Kallala, has gone to great lengths to establish an authentic atmosphere in the Lubianka which was shot in London and others in and around Tallin, the Estonian capital and the Soviet Union's most Western-looking city. Curbs on Venezuelan envoys follows Guyana revolt

Guyana has imposed restrictions on the movements of Venezuelan diplomats following allegations that Venezuela was involved in the armed revolt in Guyana's 'wild west' Rupununi hinterland.

The moves were announced as the Prime Minister, Mr. Burnham, claimed that his armed forces had killed about 300 rebels in the sprawling cattle area which borders the coast and part of Venezuela.

Police warned the situation was serious and informed sources said the Government could probably declare a State of Emergency in the area.

SOLDIERS KILLED IN CANTEN BLAST

Thirteen American soldiers and two South Vietnamese civilians were killed in an exploding in a canteen at Camp 4, 19 miles northwest of Saigon.

The explosion occurred during a military exercise and the cause is still being investigated.

The fighting, which began at 08.00 (GMT), was still going on just before noon. There had so far been no reports of any American soldiers being killed in the action.

The ammunition dump was one of many that have been seized by Viet Cong troops throughout the country over the past week during a climactic and unceasing battle on the ground.

Another helicopter was shot down in the Delta, where South Vietnamese troops are gingerly encroaching into the notorious U Minh Forest in the extreme south bordering the Gulf of Thailand.

For years this has been a major Viet Cong hide-out and base for the past week the Government forces have been coming across anti-air caches more and more frequently.

REFUGEE BOOST IN LEBANON

Lebanon was beginning a massive effort to bolster its defence yesterday in the wake of student calls for large scale demonstrations.

In a series of measures announced after a Cabinet meeting on Saturday night the Government will lead up any necessary military operations to suppress any large scale demonstrations.

The uprisings were the concern of Guyana's legally elected Government.

The situation in the entire Guyana-Brazil border area was reported to be under the control of Guyanese troops led by Colonel Ronald Pope, the only British in the Guyanese Army.

King Hussein sees shattered airliners

Lebanon's President Helou yesterday took King Hussein of Jordan on a tour of the debris of the 13 airliners destroyed in the Beirut massacre.

The King, who is piloting the Jordanian Airlines plane, was also seen to re-embark on a recent post-operative treatment for a heart ailment.

But there is speculation among Arab diplomatic circles that he will use the visit to re-emphasize the danger of the present situation.

Leaders in Nairobi on way to London summit talks

Commonwealth leaders passed through Nairobi Airport on the weekend on their way to London for the conference.

They were President Kaunda of Zambia, Prime Minister of Rhodesia, Chief Jonathan and the Southern Prime Minister, Prince Makhosini of Botswana.

Mr. Kaunda said the forthcoming conference was a last chance to bring the Commonwealth "and a last chance to make it what it should be."

He said the Commonwealth still remained as one of those organisations which could bridge the gulf between nations divided by colour, creed, politics and views.

Asked how optimistic he was about the conference, he said it was a question of how the Commonwealth secretary-general handled the situation. A solution to the U.D.C. problem depended on how the British Government handled the Rhodesian situation.

It was not a problem for any Commonwealth to settle, but the difficulties remained with the people of Rhodesia (Zimbabwe) who hoped Britain would consider a better her stand on Rhodesia's situation.

Asked about the Nigerian crisis and whether he thought that this would divide the Commonwealth, the Zambian President replied: "No comment."

Chief Jonathan, whose country was represented at the conference for the first time, could not forecast the outcome of the conference. He was optimistic that some agreements would be made between African nations.

Prince Makhosini of Botswana was asked but said that his country was more economic oriented.

However, he did not expect a decision to be reached on any particular issue at this conference. He said some of the problems discussed at this conference were being prepared for the first time.

He did not see any form of disintegrating out of the conference.

The three leaders were met by Kenya's Vice-President, Mr. Moi, and the Assistant Minister, Mr. Peter Murgu.

Yesterday, Mr. Moi met Dr. Banda, who said at a Press conference he refused to recognise the Southern Eastern State of Nigeria, because taking sides by Britain was not going to help to end the crisis. Taking sides in the conflict only made the situation worse.

He wanted to see a peaceful solution and this could be brought through the Organisation for African Unity, the Commonwealth, or through working behind the scenes.

He believed the latter would have better results. The United Nations could not do anything useful in the conflict.

Chief Jonathan Dr. Banda said his position was still that Rhodesia was the responsibility of Britain, who could find a solution. Other members of the Commonwealth did not have the right to dictate to Britain.

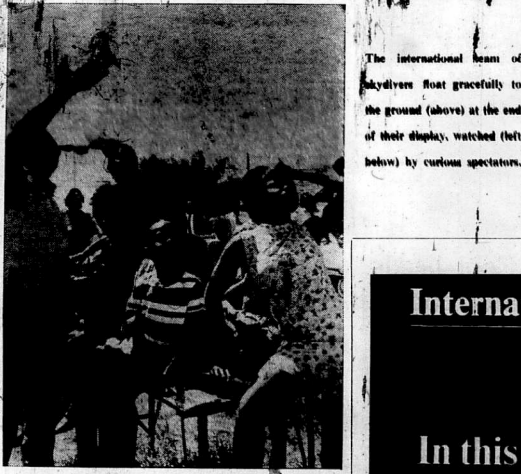
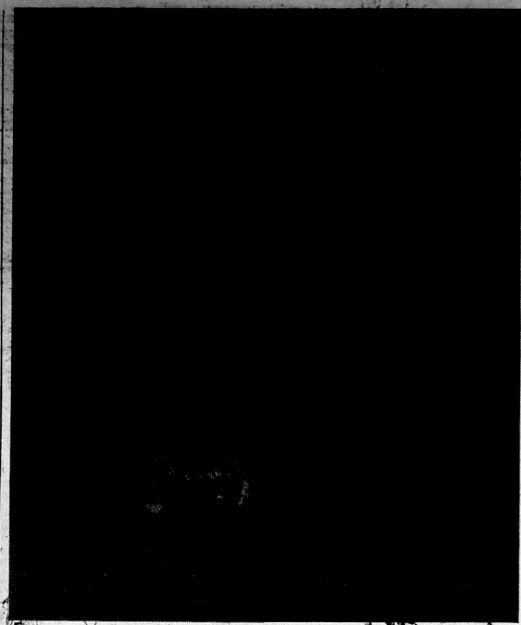

Kenya policeman's lot

One of the post-independence achievements in which Kenya can take most pride, and which has won it a deserved reputation abroad, is the way in which rural and urban police forces have both urban and rural areas. This is largely due to the excellence in training, discipline and dedication of the officers and men of the Kenya Police.

It is vital that the high standard should be kept up, but to ensure this urgent action is needed to improve pay and conditions, and make the policeman's lot a happier one.

There is much justified dissatisfaction almost amounting to bitterness, at the failure to do so until now, although few policemen are likely to let this affect their devotion to duty.

Preliminary action is being taken; a Police Salaries Review Commission under the chairmanship of Sir Ernest Vasey is beginning sittings and taking evidence.

There is additional urgency since a recent announcement by the Attorney-General of the mounting of an anti-discrimination drive throughout Kenya which will spare no personalities in its aim to rid the nation of a rapidly-spreading moral cancer.

The Kenya Police has had a special investigation team set up to seek out and remove it. It has been at work (on six months), but as the campaign is still in progress, the policemen involved will have to face great pressures from people who may be powerful and wealthy.

If a police force is to remain efficient and attract the right kind of recruits it must offer good pay and conditions. Yet the basic minimum pay of a constable is only £12.15s. a month, which is little more than that of the lowest-paid workers in commerce who carry none of the policeman's responsibility.

Officers are as badly off relatively; a chief inspector in charge of a police station gets between £812 and £1,198 a year, which is again considerably less than a man of similar standing in civil employment.

It is perhaps relevant to note that pay in the Armed Services, which was increased after the troubles which marked the early months of independence, is better than that of the Police, especially for officers. An Army captain draws £1,290 a year, a major £1,924 a year, a lieutenant-colonel £2,040 a year, and a major-general £2,850 a year.

Assembly dispute liable to split Czechoslovakia

Czechoslovakia's top Communist Party body has strongly appealed for an end to the disquieting and regrettable campaign sparked by demands that the president of the National Assembly, Josef Smrkovsky, be replaced by Slovak at the head of the new Federal Assembly.

The president of the Party Central Committee in a clear and pointed statement today denied all rumours that the widely popular Assembly President was being "sacked from his high party and Government offices and eliminated from politics."

At the same time it issued a strong denial of "allegations" that the Slovak Communist Party chairman, Dr. Vozniak Havel, was also responsible for the demands that the new Federal Assembly president should be a Slovak.

In a statement issued after a meeting in Prague at the weekend, the President warned that the campaign for the replacement of the Federal Assembly was "plunging our society into conflict, the consequences of which cannot be imagined by its instigators."

"We consider it necessary to call the people's attention to the seriousness of the situation and the consequences which may result from any inconsiderate action," the statement said.

"Such actions, while appearing to support the post-January (1960) possibilities of applying it and may even make this impossible."

The statement, which said the campaign involved "very serious" matters, must also be a strike test for the new Federal Assembly President.

The agreement ending Spain's 106-year occupation of Ifni, was signed by the Moroccan Foreign Minister, Mr. Ahmed Laraki, and the Spanish Ambassador, Mr. Eduardo Izquierdo.

The deal covers not only the island of Ifni but also the Spanish-held enclave of Ceuta and the new Spanish territory of Melilla.

When Morocco asked Spain to return Ifni, Spain refused to do so. Spain then captured the territory by force in 1958 and a year later. Finally, a United Nations resolution in October 1967 and recent Spanish refusal to give up its rights in Moroccan territorial waters and the continued use of its installations at Ifni.

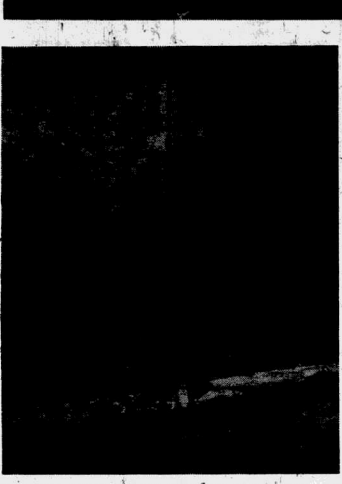

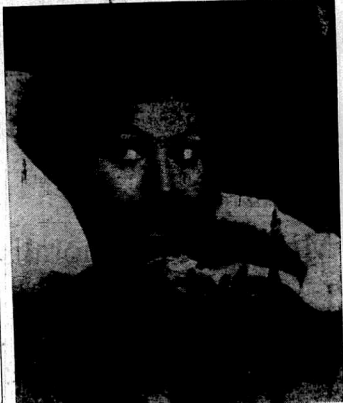

SPOTLIGHT ON RHODESIA

African leaders in London 'spoiling for fight'

By ARNOLD RAPHAEL, Standard Staff Reporter

There is no question of Rhodesia being relegated to the bottom of the Commonwealth conference agenda. As they assembled in London over the weekend, African delegates emphasised that they insist on a simple time for the fullest discussion.

As a senior African diplomat pointed out, there is no point in African travelling all that distance if Rhodesia and Southern African white-minority leaders, with their right to appeal British and Commonwealth membership.

African leaders said that while Vietnam and Middle East problems are obviously of great importance to the Commonwealth, the most important Commonwealth problem is Rhodesia, with Nigeria running a very close second.

There, he said, would be no question of Rhodesia being relegated to the bottom of the Commonwealth conference agenda. As they assembled in London over the weekend, African delegates emphasised that they insist on a simple time for the fullest discussion.

Citizenship barrage

Citizenship, its rights for the individual and obligations to the State, is the major subject for the Commonwealth conference. The Secretary-General, Mr. Arnold Smith, is reported to favour the idea of site-tracking the issue with a working party to present at an unhappy conference confrontation.

Even if the conference is site-steered past the dangers, there are bound to be pressures in the lobbies. The British Prime Minister, Mr. Wilson, has a plan of his own, which, applying Wilsonian tactics, he will hold back to present at the crucial moment.

The British Government has not initiated whether 15,000 vouchers allowed in Kenya last year for immigrants of Asian origin having difficulty in getting their citizenship papers in 1969 or, indeed, what the figure will be. One difficulty is the impossibility of making a reliable estimate of the numbers wishing to leave. Mr. Wilson's reports are considering a substantial increase in the number of vouchers allowed, but the suggestion that an increase to the order of 5,000 would be made, perhaps, to a year freeze except for dependants of Africans already in the U.K.

Such a deferment would be unsatisfactory to Asian British passport holders who have made considerable investments either because their entry (work) permits expire or they are losing their trade licences, made arrangements in advance.

One aspect needs immediate clarification. The Government is entitled to make arrangements for the wider participation of Africans in trade and commerce, which in every way has obligations to all citizens, no matter what their ethnic origin. Certain citizens of Asian origin have been told their trading licences will not be renewed.

Various reasons can be given for refusing renewal, though these appear to be under the restriction of trade to Africans. By virtue of the words "no persons", Section 26 of the constitution can be held to protect anybody and everybody against discrimination on racial grounds, and particularly citizens, who are entitled to equal treatment before the law.

Possibly, an administrative mistake has been made in refusing certain citizens their licences. Others, and falling under the same category, are powerful indeed in the High Court, as in the case of the Nairobi market stallholders, and some of the citizens concerned are meeting today, hoping to form a Civil Rights Association. Attention will have to be given, also, to the legal implications of closing down a business in premises subject to a lease enforceable in law.

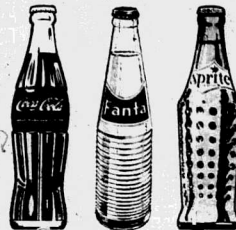

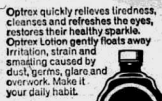

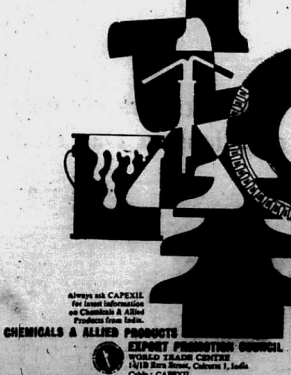

When 'Angie' takes over at United Nations... over at United Nations... year of peace

This year an African woman will be elected President of the United Nations for the first time. She will be Miss Angie Brooks, of Liberia. A United Nations correspondent, KEITH IRVINE, reports that she has built up a formidable reputation in the 14 years she has represented her country in international affairs.

When the United Nations met for its 24th session in September next year, an African woman will be sitting in the President's seat for the first time. She is Miss Angie E. Brooks of Liberia - known to all her friends as 'Angie' - who was nominated by the Organisation for African Unity at its Algiers meeting last September.

Ghana on road to civil rule

AFRICA's Ghana's Head of State, Lt. Gen. Ankrah, on Monday opened the country's Constituent Assembly, entrusted with drafting a new Constitution. It will replace the republican one imposed by former President Nkrumah in 1946.

The President told the soldiers that their mission was to guarantee national territorial integrity and co-operate in maintaining law and order. He warned them against involvement in tribal or religious feuds.

The 150-seat Assembly must approve a new constitution based on a 172-section proposed draft drawn up by a 17-member Constitutional Commission.

They complained to the Nigerian Federal Government about inadequate police protection, urged that adequate safeguards be taken in the event of further trouble, and reserved the right to claim compensation for Saturday's damage.

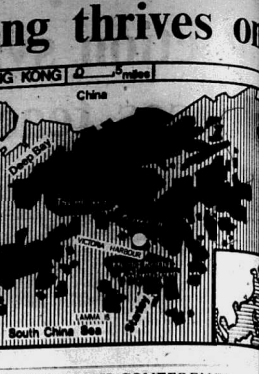

TEST CRICKET

West Indies facing head-on financial disaster

The West Indies cricketers, on the brink of another heavy defeat in the third Test at the Sydney cricket ground, are facing a grim struggle to finish their Australian tour with financial success. Unless the Sydney weather bureau has predicted a completely favourable forecast for the fourth Test, the West Indies will move on to the fourth Test in Adelaide later this month knowing that another Test defeat will certainly spell a financial disaster for them.

When they played on the fourth day yesterday, Australia were 15 for no wicket in the second innings and require another 23 runs with this morning's Test and go on up to the fifth. The West Indies currently hold the Sir Frank Worrell Trophy—a symbol of cricket supremacy between the two countries—even a draw in the fourth Test and final Test in Sydney is a virtual disaster.

It should Australia win the fourth Test, then the series would be decided and the West Indies in Sydney would almost certainly have a financial flop. The West Indies treasurer, Mr. Keith Walcott, admitted yesterday that his team needs a further \$82,000 Australian (£33,000) to cover expenses on the Australian tour. The touring team's share of yesterday's gate takings of \$10,000 Australian (£5,000) will trim some of the deficit but there will be a charge made for today's play, which should take no longer than 45 minutes.

After this third Test the West Indies will have to play against Tasmania and Victoria and a three-day match against a first-class team in Melbourne, in addition to the two remaining Test matches.
