Kenya's Minister of State for Foreign Affairs, Mr. Argwings-Kodhek, died in Nairobi Hospital early yesterday, from injuries received in a car accident late on Tuesday.

President Kenyatta said when told of the death that it had caused an "irreplaceable loss" to Kenya and immediately ordered all flags on public buildings to be flown at half-mast.

Mr. Argwings-Kodhek, 45, was driving along Hurlingham Road, Nairobi, on his way to his home in Lavinton when the accident occurred. He was driving his wife's car.

Apparently he skidded near the corner of Wood Avenue and struck the parapet of a culvert, which caused the car to overturn, ending up on its roof.

People living nearby rushed out to help and found Mr. Argwings-Kodhek as comfortable as possible while an ambulance and police were called. He was taken to hospital but died about seven hours later.

He was alone in the car at the time of the accident and it is understood he was not injured.

A Kenya Police report of the accident issued by Force headquarters said that when Mr. Argwings-Kodhek was taken to Nairobi Hospital it was at first thought his injuries were not serious.

But during the night his condition deteriorated and at 5.50 a.m. yesterday it became critical. His death was announced at 6.30 a.m.

Firemen fight to control £300,000 Thika blaze

Firemen were fighting last night to control a huge £300,000 jute blaze at Thika godown and keep it from spreading to the neighbouring Kenya Paper Mills and Kenya Toray Mills.

More than 2,500 tons of jute at the A.C.I.F. plant in Thika's large industrial area had been burning since about 1 a.m. yesterday.

The firemen, faced with an acute water shortage and hampered by closely packed bales of jute in the warehouse store, found their best efforts making little headway against the flames, and it is likely to take several days to extinguish the fire.

CZECH EXTREMISTS CONDEMNED

The Czechoslovak Interior Minister, Mr. Josef Drobny, yesterday expressed the Government's alarm over a trend towards "extremist" activities of persons previously convicted of anti-Government activities.

Mr. Drobny, who did not name the extremists, said they were trying to exploit every possible situation, using various means to spread disorder and create a work-up to a climate of fear.

He said 18 persons had so far attempted suicide by fire, most of them for non-political reasons. It had been learned earlier that a 17-year-old young set fire to himself last Sunday in Chab, near the border with West Germany.

Reports said he was in hospital with second degree burns on about 30 per cent of his body.

In another instance, the Slovakian Interior Minister, Mr. Egod Perich, in an interview published in the Bratislava Press, implicated a group of "extremist" agitators who he said were "multiplying contacts with persons known to the Government and had taken attitude toward Government matters."

He added: "When you examine the identity of people responsible for anti-Government and anti-party demonstrations, you find usually the names of former active members of Fascist organisations or persons previously convicted of anti-Government activities."

Like Mr. Pelnar, he stressed the need for firm police action. But, unlike the Interior Minister, he abstained from pleading that "we shall not participate in any action against people behaving in conformity with Czechoslovak laws or that there is no danger of return to the unjust practices of the past."

About 60,000 Czechoslovaks left the country after the August invasion in 1968 and 20,000 have returned, according to Interior Ministry figures published in the Communist Party newspaper *Rude Pravo*.

Mr. Jozef Smrkovsky, president of the defunct National Assembly, was elected president of the new People's Chamber, the Lower House of the new Czechoslovak Parliament, in a vote of 185 to 85, with ten deputies abstaining.

Mr. Smrkovsky was himself absent from the session. Mrs. Maria Mikova, who was in the chair, read a terse statement at the opening, saying he "had been hospitalized."

New sny trial in Bagdad soon AMNESTY OFFER

The president of the Iraqi revolutionary tribunal which ordered Monday's mass hangings in Bagdad, Col. Ali Hadi, announced yesterday that a third trial was being organised.

He said the accused at the new trial would face charges of working for "imperialism" and the "Central Intelligence Agency." This was understood to include the U.S.

The names of the accused were not released, but the main witness Mr. Abdelhadi Bachari, the 15th man condemned to death in the two earlier trials and temporarily reprieved to testify in the affairs which still remain to be judged.

Mr. Bachari's accusations of a former Iraqi minister, Mr. Rahman Hazzaz, and a former Defence Minister, Gen. Okelli, were broadcast last month by Iraq radio and television. He accused the two men of having organised a conspiracy against the present régime of President Abdulkarim Qasbi.

Mr. Abdelhadi Rawi, in a speech last week, has held himself out as a Jew.

He said he was planning a world campaign to bring pressure on the Iraqi Government not to carry out further mass executions. A reliable source said in Tel Aviv.

High Iraqi officials were taking place in the Foreign Minister and Prime Minister's Office after the announcement of the new spy trial in the hope of finding means of "prevention of another judicial crime."

It was hoped that the Iraqi authorities could be persuaded to allow the remaining Jewish community in Iraq to leave the country. The Israeli Cabinet has declared today a day of fasting and prayer in memory of the "murder of Bagdad" and for the safety of the Jews of Iraq.

STUDENT STABBED ON EMBASSY ROOF

A Jewish student, Yvi Rondel, was stabbed in the chest yesterday as he and another member of the Israeli Embassy on the roof of the Israeli Embassy in London.

Immediately after the incident a crowd of about 4,000 demonstrators who had gathered in the street to protest at Monday's hanging of 15 alleged spies in Iraq stormed the Embassy building and broke windows before being dispersed by police.

Rondel's companion, whose name has not been released, said later that when they were on the roof the demonstrators began firing shots. He was unable to say whether the shots were directed at Rondel and himself or were fired in the air as a warning. Several demonstrators in the street also said they heard shots.

Rondel collapsed in the street after the stabbing. Doctors treated him in hospital said later his condition was not serious.

Later about 30 students were taken to the Embassy and held where they said they planned to stage a 24-hour hunger strike.

About 10,000 Iraqis demonstrated for two hours around the British Embassy in Bagdad yesterday, according to Bagdad Radio.

The radio said they assembled in front of the Embassy and shouted slogans. They condemned British interference in the affairs of Iraq and other States and denounced what was described as a "murderous" British policy in the Middle East.

The broadcast said the demonstrators included trade unionists, members of the National Union of Students and the Teachers' Association.

They dispersed after about two hours without causing any damage to the Embassy, the radio said.

A three-day "hunger strike" by 12 Arab women, who occupied the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem as a protest against Israeli policies, has ended after the intervention of religious leaders.

Fifteen Arab women who had taken a "hike" at the Omar Mosque for the same reason also called off their protest.

Biafrans face big push by Federal troops

Federal Nigerian troops have launched a massive offensive in the Biafran sector of the Northern Front, Biafra reported yesterday.

The radio said the offensive opened with a heavy artillery and mortar bombardment. Heavy fighting was being waged since a "massive infantry action" supported by armoured vehicles.

There was no immediate confirmation of the radio report from Federal military sources in Lagos, but the announcement coincided with a visit to the Northern Front by the Federal Army Chief of Staff, Brig. Hasan Usman Katina.

The Federal Second Division at Onitsha has been reinforced recently. It is seeking to break through Biafran lines at Onitsha and link up through the Biafran sector with Federal Division troops further east at Awka.

The Federal Government officially denied last week that there had been any military operations in the southern approaches to Annabibi airstrip, the expected Biafran air base.

The first Red Cross plane from Europe loaded with medical supplies and food for the army from Cotoum to Biafra arrived in Cotoum yesterday.

The first plane to go into Biafra was a French 14-ton-capacity Transal, due to arrive in Biafra today from the Equatorial Guinea island of Fernando Po and to take again to Biafra at 5.30 a.m. local time with a cargo of rice and salt.

Yesterday's Red Cross plane from Geneva was carrying ten tons of medical supplies and one ton of baby food. It was originally due to land on Tuesday night, but the severe weather held it up. It landed at Geneva and because airports in Biafra were closed, it was closed during the night. The Transal on charter to the International Red Cross, will take its cargo from stocks already in Biafra. The first flight is being regarded as a "test" of the new route.

The Red Cross is to co-operate with the Nigerian Government in a campaign against malaria and measles in Federal-held areas.

A Biafran loss announcement in Lagos yesterday said field teams had been instructed to give support to the Federal Government's campaign so that people in Biafran areas would not be decimated by the diseases.

Commenting on the Biafran loss, the Red Cross field co-ordinator said: "It remains a significant change of attitude and something which we had been looking forward to for some time."

Russia will lead in Space race, U.S. told

The Soviet Union will probably surpass the United States in space feats in the next few years unless more funds are provided for American space programme, a U.S. expert has said.

Dr. George E. Mueller, associate administrator for manned Space flight in the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, told a press conference in New York that Russia's current programme is "far ahead" of the U.S. per cent greater than ours.

He added: "We were spending some \$6,000,000,000 (\$2,500,000,000 on our Space programme. The Soviet Union is spending \$8,000,000,000 appropriated and appear to be going downward."

"I expect that over a period of time we will find ourselves in a position where we are behind in Space, and probably moving ahead of us."

One killed eight hurt in car crash

One man was killed instantly and eight other people were injured, some seriously, when a car overturned on the Nairobi-Nakuru road yesterday.

The injured people were taken to the Africa Inland Mission hospital at Kiljari. Three were seriously injured and detained there while the others, including the driver and a child, were removed to the Nairobi to Kenyatta Hospital in Nairobi.

Escaper shot near Berlin wall

WEST BERLIN — East German border guards fired a shot which was believed to have killed an escapee who tried to reach the heavily-guarded border wall into West Berlin on Tuesday night, police said yesterday.

The escapee was shot in the chest by police vehicles on the eastern side.

BALUBURU — Immigration and Tourism Minister, Mr. Van der Meer, said he was considering extending the temporary residence permit of the expelled British-born woman, Mrs. Susan Wrenn, who was shot in West Berlin in 1958.

WASHINGTON — The Senate has approved a bill which would allow a foreign-born woman who was married to a U.S. citizen to be tried by special military tribunal. The man, Javier Ibarra, was captured by the North Koreans a year ago, a State Department spokesman has said.

PAMPLONA, Spain — Two young men who recently tried to rescue a Basque nationalist woman from a Spanish military camp were tried yesterday by special military tribunal. The men, Javier Ibarra and Gregorio Lopez, 26, were sentenced to 43 and 30 years' imprisonment respectively.

WASHINGTON — The United States gold reserves fell by \$200 million in 1968, the highest of the previous fiscal years, the U.S. Treasury said yesterday.

NEW YORK — Somalia said in the U.N. that the opening of a new airline route by South African Airways from Johannesburg to New York via Rio de Janeiro would be a "major step" towards African unity.

CAIRO — About 300 Yemeni students occupied their country's airline embassy in Cairo, told the police of the republican Government in Sana'a.

BEIRUT — Heavy snowstorm swept Jordan, damaging crops, and in Arab refugee camps, and the rain in Lebanon has been evacuated to water ground.

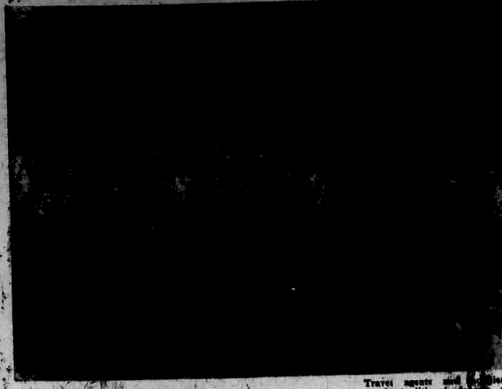

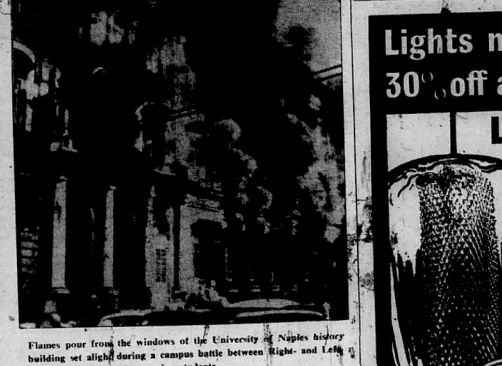

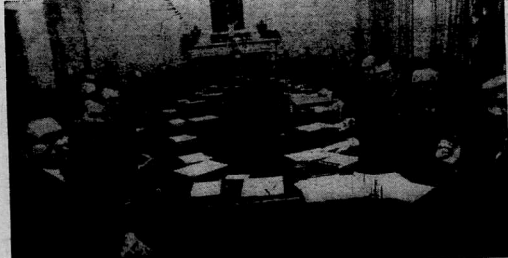

Memorial service in Nairobi before burial in Central Nyanza

The funeral of Kenya's Minister of State in the President's Office, Mr. Argwings-Kodhek, will take place in accordance with Christian and traditional custom at his country home in Yala, Central Nyanza, on Sunday at 9 a.m.

The burial service will take place in the form of a Requiem Mass which will be celebrated at the Holy Family Cathedral, Nairobi, at 10 a.m. on Saturday.

The Minister of the Interior, Mr. J. D. Kariuki, in accordance with the provisions of the Public Health Act, 1951, has ordered that the body of Mr. Argwings-Kodhek should be transferred from the City Mortuary yesterday evening to the Minister's Nairobi home for final rites in accordance with Luo tradition. Tomorrow the body will be transferred to the Holy Family Cathedral, Nairobi, at 7.40 p.m. and will be received by the parish priest at 6 p.m.

The deceased will be placed to rest on the catafalque throughout the night. A Requiem Mass will be celebrated by His Grace, Archbishop McCarthy, at 10 a.m. on Saturday. Distinguished guests and members of the public are requested to be in attendance at the service not later than 9.40 a.m.

The Vice-President of Kenya, Mr. Moi, will deliver the eulogy during the service. At 11 a.m. (approximately) on completion of the Mass, Cabinet Ministers will carry the coffin to the house at Cathedral Drive. A guard of honour mounted by the Kenya Rifles will be in attendance.

Nairobi and Mombasa. It is anticipated that many of the public will pay their respects to Mr. Argwings-Kodhek. The cortege will travel on the Nairobi-Mombasa road through the following morning.

The body will be buried at Yala home at 9 a.m. on Sunday. A public funeral will take place in the cathedral and travel to Yala via Nairobi and Kisumu.

A police band will take part in the burial at Yala on Sunday. Cabinet Ministers, officials of the Government and members of the public will be in attendance.

A condolence book is available for signatures within Parliament Buildings until 4 p.m. next Wednesday. Floral tributes should be sent direct to the City Mortuary, Nairobi, or Yala Township.

The Minister for the country was outstanding and will be remembered. He will be sadly missed both in our Parliament and throughout the country.

The Mayor of Nairobi, Cunn. Isaac Ligonzo, on behalf of the members and staff of the City Council, said: "It is a great shock and irreplaceable loss to this country, his family and friends all over the world. May the Almighty God keep his soul in peace."

The Mayor of Mombasa, Cunn. M. Kumbo, sent a message of sympathy on behalf of the councillors and people of Mombasa.

The Minister for Economic Planning and Development, Mr. Mboya, who is also secretary-general of KANU, said Mr. Argwings-Kodhek's death was a tragic loss to Kenya. He served Kenya loyally and with dedication for many years, and would be remembered for his courageous and selfless service and quick brain."

The Minister for Housing, Mr. Ngugi, said: "We have lost one of the architects of our Government and a staunch loyal KANU man, a dedicated Minister who has in various capacities, headed important

Ministry of Government. We shall particularly miss his humour and comradely spirit. Kenya has indeed lost one of her great sons."

The Minister for Information and Broadcasting, Mr. Ogoyo, said in a personal message to Mrs. Argwings-Kodhek: "The part your husband played during our struggle for independence, and the part he has played after independence to the time of his death, will remain long in Kenya history."

The Minister for Co-operatives and Social Services, Mr. Ngala, said that he heard the news with great sorrow. "The Government had lost a capable man who was a friend of everybody."

The Minister for Local Government, Mr. Saitoti, revealed Mr. Argwings-Kodhek's part in the fight for independence in the 1950s. "He will be sadly missed by all the people of Kenya, especially in Parliament where he worked with devotion for the good of his country," he said.

The Minister for Power and Communications, Mr. Nyapunya, said Mr. Argwings-Kodhek was a true and a dedicated servant of the people of Kenya. His memorable service and sacrifice to the country and the people of Kenya even at the most difficult times would be remembered."

The Permanent Secretary in the Office of the President, Mr. G. K. Karitibu, who is the head of the Civil Service, said: "Faced with heavy odds, he rose to his latest position through distinguished service to Kenya. He placed interest of the Republic and the cause of nation-building above every other consideration."

"As a lawyer, a politician and a Minister of the Government, he proved a relentless fighter for freedom and for human dignity. His charm, his wit and razor-sharp mind aided him a great deal in discharging his duties of State with

great effort and distinction. "Kenya has lost an illustrious son who served her well. All those who knew him are the poorer for the loss of a radiant personality."

The secretary-general of K.P.U., Mr. J. D. Kariuki, described Mr. Argwings-Kodhek as a man who had very few political enemies and many friends.

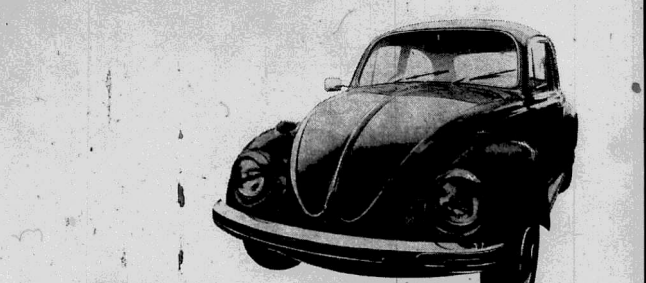

Saigon sceptical of Vietcong plan for seven-day ceasefire

The Vietcong yesterday announced a seven-day ceasefire for the Tet Lunar New Year next month. But they violated last year's truce with the biggest offensive of the war, and South Vietnam has reacted cautiously to the announcement. A spokesman said Saigon would delay a decision on its attitude because of the experience of last year, and any ceasefire by Government forces would certainly not run as long as a week. The South Vietnamese are already preparing full defensive precautions, in contrast with last year, when units were caught with many of their troops on leave. There was no immediate comment from U.S. sources. The Vietcong announced their intention to observe the seven-day truce in a broadcast over their liberation radio. The radio statement said: 'The South Vietnamese liberation armed forces will stop their military offensive for seven days during Tet. The entire people's liberation armed forces have a duty to help and protect the people to greet the New Year.' The radio said the ceasefire would be in effect from 7 a.m. on February 21 to 7 a.m. on February 22. Last year the North Vietnamese and Vietcong attacked Saigon and a city on the night of January 31, during the Tet holiday. In some cases South Vietnamese units had allowed half their men to go on leave. The Vietcong declared three-day

Three held after hijacking

Three Negroes, one with a beard and another wearing a black hat, were escorted by Cuban Security guards from an Eastern Airlines plane early yesterday after it had been hijacked and flown to Cuba. The aircraft, a DC-8, was on the second plane to be hijacked to Cuba. Less than 12 hours and the aircraft was diverted to Havana this morning. The Negroes were interviewed by Cuban security guards in an airport room as passengers walked through the room nearby. The plane was carrying 101 passengers and 10 crew members. 'U.S. imperialism,' it declared, 'is on its last legs,' and total victory for the thoughts of Chairman Mao Tse-tung will be won by the year 2001. American sources thought Vietcong had probably set up army caches along the whole of route 4, which leads into the capital, Hanoi. In Cam Lo, a village south of the Demilitarized Zone, other American sources found an other arms dump. It was described as a 'small, heavy machine-gun'.

NEW POLICE RAIDS IN SPAIN

Madrid, police have ordered the 'deportation' to the provinces, far from any university centres, of students they regard as suspects, jailing only those listed as 'dangerous'. Effectives of the so-called Social Brigades (political police) are being bolstered with all available inspectors to speed up the big clean-up of Madrid University. Life in Spain seemed unperturbed by the large-scale police operation. There was no unusual police strength in evidence anywhere. The Spanish Press, which has been placed under the control of the Ministry of Education, has published many individual and collective messages congratulating Gen. Franco on his decision to put an end to student agitation. — A.F.P.

First Australian open big financial flop

The first Australian open tennis championship, which ended in Brisbane on Monday, proved a big financial flop. Only 15,300 spectators watched the championships, nearly half those attending the night sessions, and the lawn tennis association of Australia showed a loss of more than 15,500 Australian dollars (\$26,300) on the championships.

Since the introduction of open tournaments in world tennis last year, the appearance of top professionals in tournaments has been held in a big book to gate receipts, but why the deficit in Brisbane?

Mr. Leahy, the tournament committee chairman, explained that 12,000 Australian dollars (\$26,300) had been paid to professional players to allow their players to compete. The loss would have been minimal had the same players appeared without promoters being paid, he said.

"This payment to promoters did not work out as a calculation when Australian officials at first supported open tennis," Mr. Leahy commented.

Already top tennis officials from Britain, the United States, France and Australia have made moves to loosen the promoters' grip on professional events.

A survey by Reuters at Brisbane's Milton Courts found that antagonism to payments to promoters, if running deep among most officials and some players.

There were suggestions that some leading players might withdraw if the contracts expired. If this were done, the players would be freelance, open for prize money in open tournaments and hiring their services to promoters who needed them for specific international events.

Mr. Leahy admitted that professional players did not account for the small attendance during the championships. At the recent New South Wales Championships, which made a profit of 5,000 Australian dollars (\$22,533), the attendance over the last two days was greater than for the whole event in Brisbane.

Mr. Leahy's explanation in Brisbane was that it was the poor attendance during the tournament, the lack of sufficient publicity for the tournament, the weather, the televising of the championships over the last two days and Brisbane does not have a big enough population to support an event of this size.

Australians were again the leading buyers, contributing more than half the total aggregate of 1,138,500 dollars (\$24,693) for 370 yearlings. The total sale was the second best on record.

The Wimbledon tennis champion, Rod Laver, picked up almost 3,000 Australian dollars (\$24,200) for two weeks' work on a visit to his home country.

Laver, 30, won the Australian open singles championship in Brisbane, and a week earlier was runner-up to fellow Australian Tony Roche in the New South Wales championships in Sydney.

With two doubles wins with Roy Emerson, Laver earned a total of \$275 dollars (\$2,181). Roche earned 6,375 dollars (\$24,600) for the two tournaments. Last year Laver earned about 70,000 dollars (\$232,660) and Roche about 65,000 dollars (\$230,270).

This feature is intended to help the new African businessmen with explanation and advice. They receive an involved and can be governed privately or through public limited and can be approved by the "Business Training" in Kenya.

As many new businessmen as possible to take the place in the commercial sector of Kenya's economy, they must be provided with the means to solve the problem of choosing their own business to set up.

The basic choice facing them is whether to set up their own, or partnership, or a limited liability company. Each of these possibilities has its own advantages and disadvantages, which have to be taken into account.

The easiest way to start is as an individual trader, working on his own. The main advantage that it allows a man to have is his own master, gives him freedom to act independently, quickly and without having to refer decisions away to his partners.

Also allows him to keep his accounts secret and gives a greater personal control with his own business.

The drawbacks are mainly financial. The lone trader is personally responsible for all his business debts, and may find it difficult to raise capital for his business since he is limited by the scope of his personal resources.

Partnerships are governed by the Partnership Act, which extends the ability of partners to act for the firm, the individual liability of partners and the amount of work done by each partner.

Partnerships generally have better borrowing power than individuals but there is no limit to the scope of the partnership's liability. Also profits may be divided according to the amount of capital contributed and the amount of work done in the business.

Partners may have the chance to maintain personal contacts with customers, and are able to withdraw if he disagrees with the policy or conduct of the firm. New partners can be brought in by agreement to support the business.

Partnerships have the disadvantage that control is shared between the partners and the possibility. It is also easy to end

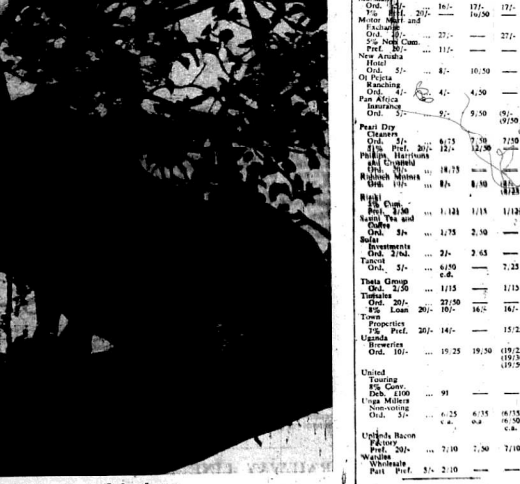

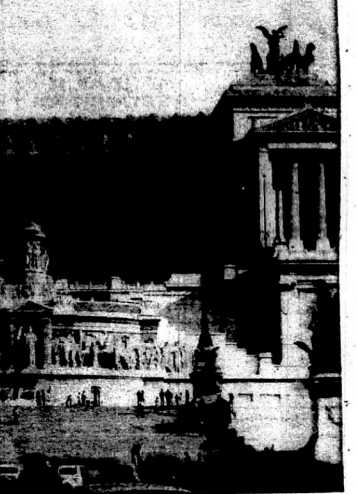

Jet-age agriculture

When Mr. McKenzie reviewed the state of Kenya's agricultural industry during 1968, with some observations on future trends, he said the country was in the 2nd of its second agricultural revolution. The first, of course, was the change-over from European to African farmers immediately after independence.

The second is related to the new problems which will have to be overcome in marketing the surplus products, now that Kenya has moved from being self sufficient in food production. The third is the competition from foreign products sold last year which reached 77,000,000 an increase of about £5,000,000 over 1967. In all agricultural respects, 1968 is expected to be a bumper year, the monetary figures are showing a 10 per cent increase of 5.5 per cent over the previous year.

His review stated that the sales of maize, wheat and rice are expected to be the highest achieved by Kenya, while tea, pyrethrum, cotton and sugar are also expected to increase. Apart from pigs, the return on the other farm products is higher than in 1967, as also dairy produce.

Some difficulty has been encountered in the disposal of wheat and maize, which caused the Ministry to make arrangements for selling the surplus towards the close of the year, and thus in shipping the product to other countries offering incentives and discounts.

All in all, prices have remained sufficiently remunerative. Mr. McKenzie felt, to encourage higher production, the exceptions are sisal, tea, pyrethrum and beef. Excluding sisal, which has long been one of the weaker marketing propositions for Kenya and it is disappointing, in view of the scope for growers, to find the price of sisal dropping to the level of the adverse effects of the 14 per cent devaluation of sterling, and fruit and the delivery to wholesalers at, for example, Covent Garden, though there are also valuable markets to be exploited in the African continent and in the Near and Middle East.

The signs are clear enough that a breakthrough will come for those market gardeners who specialise in high quality produce, available for delivery at times of shortage in home supplies, e.g. runner beans at Christmas in the U.K. or Germany.

TUBERCULOSIS IN KENYA

Stepping up the battle against a killer disease

By PRAVIN BOWRY

The statistics of diseases issued by the Ministry of Health show tuberculosis as being the third major cause of death in Kenya. Bronchopneumonia and diarrhoea are the two diseases resulting in a greater death rate.

What, then, is Kenya's progress in combating the least one killer disease — tuberculosis?

The head of the Tuberculosis and Chemotherapy Division in the Ministry of Health, Dr. James Ang'wa, outlining the achievements of his division, said: "Our major aim is to eliminate the disease by finding new cases in the rural areas of the country, the second by raising the health education and by the provision of free medical services to the rural population. The success of this programme will depend on the extent to which the rural population is reached."

With modern methods of diagnosis and the discovery of extremely effective drugs for treatment, the prospects for the cure of tuberculosis in Kenya are now bright.

A generous gift from Unicef has been the constant supply of B.C.G. vaccine. This is the most effective method of raising bodily resistance against tuberculosis. B.C.G. vaccine which protects for a period of up to ten years, is essentially a preparation of dead tubercle bacilli from a permanent cure and used hand in hand with other elimination measures, leads to rapid reduction of the disease.

The fight Unicef has put up against tuberculosis is amazing. It has supplied 250,000 children with B.C.G. vaccine, which has protected a slightly over two feet apart, the progression would reach around the world at the Equator.

Out of 5,000,000 children under the age of 16 in Kenya, there have already been B.C.G. vaccinated by 47 teams of highly trained health workers. This is a significant achievement. In addition, 11,000 children have been vaccinated in the country in 1968.

There are 13 B.C.G. mobile units, which are equipped with vans and staffed with health workers. These units are working in the rural areas of the country, and are helping to bring the disease under control.

The treatment phase involves chemotherapy, which is a long-term process. It is essential that patients should be treated by means of an anti-tubercular drug, which is a bactericidal effect against tubercle bacilli. A pilot project for the National Tuberculosis Centre has already been set up in Muringa District, where the results of the experiment are being watched with interest by the country as a whole.

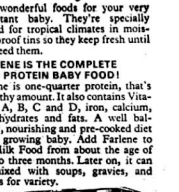

Young Somali students studying at Nairobi University in a very different kind of house to go to during the week. They will be going to Tussock-type houses which will be built up in the Grifta area when Kenya's \$200,000 rehabilitation plan becomes a reality.

This amount, which is part of a World Bank and Swedish Government loan to Kenya, will be largely spent on utilizing 20,000 acres of rangeland in a 60,000-square-mile zone inhabited mainly by nomadic Somalis.

The main development and overall planning scheme will be based on distribution of grazing, the control of disease, improvement of stock routes and holding grounds, the market provision of water supplies and the general improvement of the people in better livestock husbandry methods and range management.

The Provincial Range Officer, Mr. John Newbould, who has been partly responsible for implementing the plan, has had experience of dry areas and has travelled widely in Morocco, Zambia, S.W. Africa and Botswana to study range conditions. Of North-Eastern Province he says: "This is neither a high potential area nor a desert as many people thought. It is a grassland area suitable for beef cattle."

He thinks the province is as good a place for ranching as any other major beef-producing area of the world. The soil contains a high percentage of minerals and there are no health problems.

According to the Provincial Veterinary Officer for the North-Eastern Province, Mr. G. G. Kamau, measles is a fairly rare disease in the area. It is the major disease of the children in the area and is found along the coast and inland.

There is also the occasional outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease, but it is not a tick-borne disease.

It is intended that stock and range officers will be undertaken in the development plan.

At the moment the Somalis are all over the province with regard to protection of their grazing areas. In each district in such areas all will have access to water and sufficient grazing.

The grazing associations which will cover thousands of acres in the traditional grazing areas will be under the management of the Provincial Range Officer established in the province.

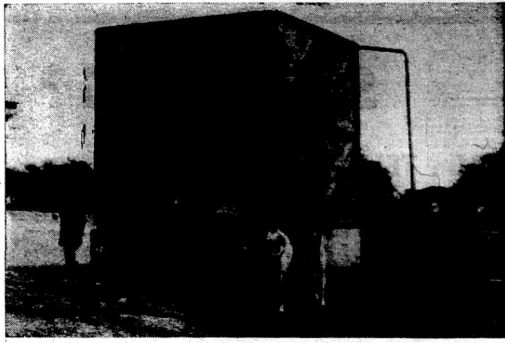

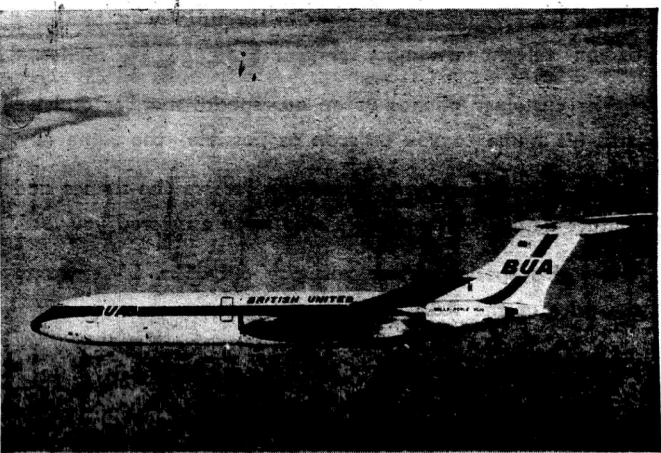

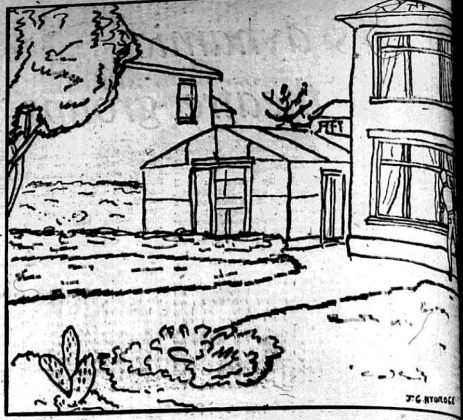

The chequered history of Rhodesia

Rhodesia in 1947, gives a colourful yet scholarly account of Rhodesia's chequered history from King Age times to the 20th Century — but he stops short at the referendum of some 45 years ago.

By doing he might have given a first sight to his readers of the way in which the Rhodesian Government has established its own "white" history, which he has written as "objectively as possible".

There is a little reason to doubt that his painstaking presentation of the facts is honest and accurate. One gains the impression, even, that he is somewhat biased against the Lobengula, war-king of the Matabele, Dr. Randolph writes in a somewhat unbalanced manner.

Despite this, it is clear from the introduction that all this objectivity is nullified by being set in an artificial ideological framework. The author states openly that in dealing with the Bushmen of early times, the Monomotapa empire which produced Zimbabwe and its history, and the Portuguese conquest, the author then "introduces his main theme that throughout the history of Rhodesia has been governed by minority elites".

but it does not make a man for rule by a racial minority in the Rhodesia, when most other African countries have exploded the fallacy.

In an epilogue, Dr. Randolph warns of an attempt to impose a minority rule, by the Commonwealth, ignoring the fact that similar fears were expressed in many African States which are now not only independent but anti-Communist.

Well written as his book is and valuable to those who can absorb the facts and figures he relates, it needs to be regarded with reserve. Sir Robert Tredgold's roots are even deeper in Rhodesia. He was born in Bulawayo, a third generation settler, and gave a lifetime of service as lawyer, M.P., Minister of Defence, Federal Chief Justice and Acting Governor-General.

Politically he has always been a "liberal", but in recent years found himself increasingly at odds with the new militant White leaders and resigned in protest at the introduction of the Law and Order Maintenance Bill, claiming that it was a negation of justice to expediency.

Dr. Randolph's book is not so well written as Dr. Randolph's but it is a little. Chiefly autobiographical, it sets against the rapidly changing political and economic scene of Rhodesia, and does not stop at the 1933 referendum but goes on right up to U.D.I.

The author is, of course, an unashamed product of a colonial era which he unflinchingly and courageously defends, while admitting that there was much in it that was a decade ago in much of Africa, yet it would be a welcome advance were it to be adopted by the more militant of the modern Rhodesian Whites.

He believes that the English have fulfilled their "special purpose" in Africa but that now that the Empire has gone the Commonwealth may go also and Rhodesia, "the last and most typical colony, can never be the same again."

Representatives of 17 African nations met in Nairobi in 1967 to discuss the problems of development in Africa. The papers and conclusions of the conference have been published in a book, *The Challenge of Development* (East African Publishing House, 15s.).

Among those who contributed papers were Arthur Wino, Minister of Education in Zambia; Mr. Mwingira, Permanent Secretary in Tanzania's Ministry of Education; Mr. Mboya, Kenya's Minister for Economic Planning and Development; and Dr. Elhad Maliki, now in Kenya's Ministry of Foreign Affairs. The conference was opened by Mr. Nyamwaya, then Minister of Education in the Office of the President in Kenya.

The papers covered four broad areas: economic growth and foreign investment; social and technical education; African Socialism and the movement to the co-operative movement; and culture and education.

The ultimate American dilemma

When Mr. Nixon was inaugurated as President of the United States last week the change-over from a Democratic regime to a Republican one was said to have been the smoothest in the country's history.

Mr. Drury's new novel is about a change-over that is quite opposite. Chaos reigns when the U.S. President is killed in a plane crash leaving his country without a Vice-President and his party without a successful method of selecting a candidate.

The problem is aggravated by the climate of violence current at the time of the book, which is set a few years before the present. Mr. Drury takes over as interim President and is joined by two politicians for the candidacy.

By now the Vietnam war is over but America is embroiled in other crises. The recurring trouble in Panama has come to a truce — this time in Central Africa where American troops are putting down

a Communist revolt in the face of world opinion.

One of the candidates is a "black" from these two issues, the other is a "white".

The "black" is a young millionaire with the "progressive" Press on his side and bounding faith in his own talents. This includes a habit of using the force of violence in the country in the belief that he can stop the violence when it has achieved its objective.

Mr. Drury, whose first book in this political trilogy, *Advice and Consent*, made such a stir when it was published, winning the Pulitzer Prize for 1963, has lost nothing of its cunning. It is absorbing even in the hands of those whom American public are still something of a "middle in a mystery in an enigma."

His characterization is superb and it is always intriguing to try to put the real names to his protagonists.

However, Mr. Drury obviously inched about how professional liberals have got such a hold on

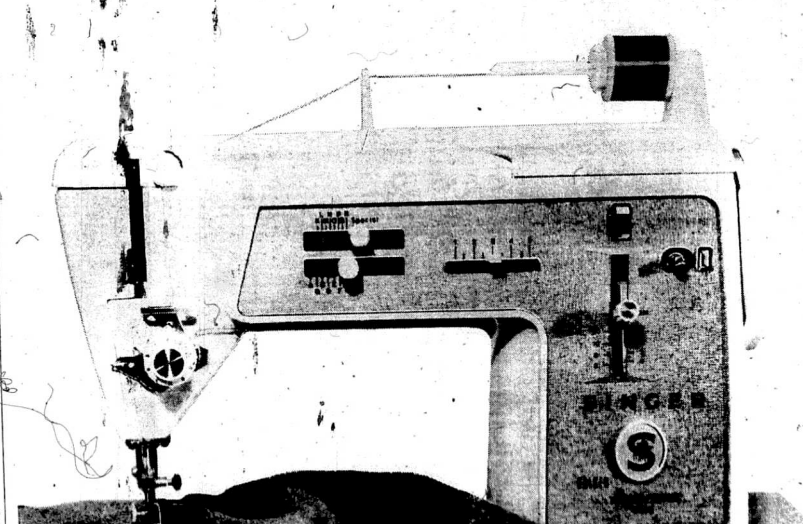
the mass media of communication in his country and he becomes too involved in exposing their twisted thinking, a double standard, and exploitation of violence as a means of gaining their "personal" objectives. One can sympathise with his own country where "progressives" think that violence is justified as an end in itself. But he might have carried more over if he had written about the "progressive" Press and television freedom in a more objective manner.

He certainly succeeds, though, in warning that what is now only a troublemaker in the political behaviour and reportage could become the major factor in the running of the nation. This is a warning that many other Western States would do well to heed.

The book, in fact, ends on a note of violence. It is an inescapable climax to the story but it leaves the door open for the next volume, this penetrating and powerful series.

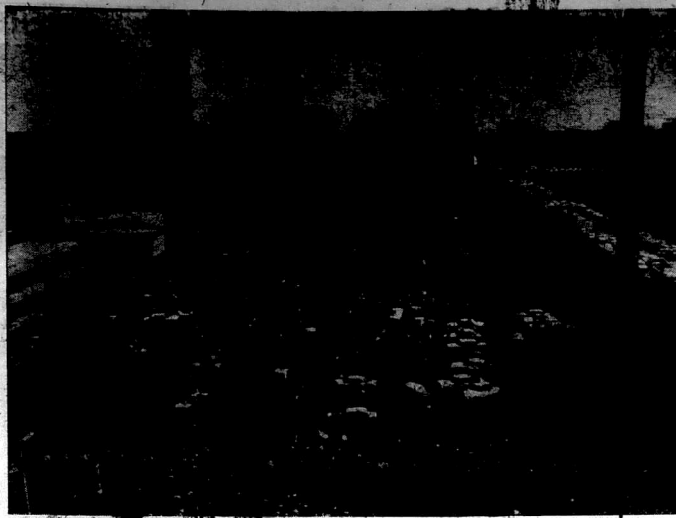

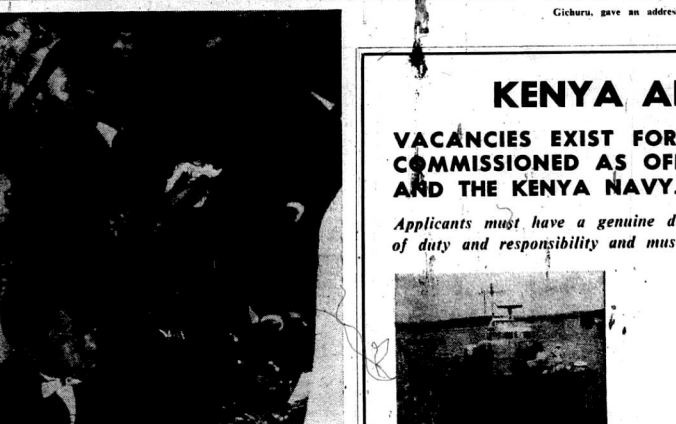
