Kenya Farm training to be improved

Less Paper Work

Sweeping changes in the organisation of the Ministry of Agriculture, designed to improve the efficiency of field services and training, were announced yesterday by the minister, Mr. McKenzie. He also forecast that a Faculty of Agriculture would be set up in Nairobi soon.

The changes are intended to provide effective co-ordination at all levels and maintain communication from field officers right through to headquarters, to bring agricultural education up to date and to free technical staff from time-wasting paper work.

In a speech read for him by an Assistant Minister, Mr. M. Kariki, at a seminar on agricultural education for the Kenya Institute of Administration, Nairobi, Mr. McKenzie said two new departments of Agricultural Extension and Water Development would come into existence.

A Department of Technical Services would be set up with various divisions covering such areas as provincial crop production, credit supervision, soil and marketing research, home economics, land development, livestock marketing, range management, scientific research, training, veterinary services and water development.

All these divisions would have a unit at head office level and would have representatives at provincial level, probably also at district level. There would be a provincial director of agriculture in every province.

The training division would operate with a National Council for Agricultural Education co-operating with the Ministry of Education and interested in agricultural education, farmers in training, staff training and extension.

Referring to the Water Development Department, Mr. McKenzie recalled that it had stressed the need for sufficient training, special offering, attractive careers, in agricultural education. Agricultural education had to keep pace with agricultural development and the Ministry of Agriculture would be provided to teach modern methods.

Some junior staff in the field had not been on any sort of training course for 20 years and were probably giving advice that was 20 years out of date.

A World Bank loan was being sought for the complete overhaul of the Embu Institute of Agriculture for a new institute in Western Province and to complete the expansion of the Animal Health and Industry Training Institute at Kabete.

It was hoped funds would be available to modernise existing farmer training centres and to build three new ones as well as a pastoral training centre for the Kenya Veterinary Division in Kericho valley Province.

The most important project for which the World Bank help had been asked was the establishment of a new Faculty of Agriculture at Kabete and Chirochi, in Nairobi, "in the very near future."

A new Administrative Department, extending from headquarters to district level, would provide staff to handle administrative matters and free technical staff from administrative tasks which were taking up valuable time and interfering with practical work.

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Kenya railwaymen call off strike after Arusha talks

The strike threatened by about 30,000 railwaymen in East Africa was called off after a meeting between the East African Community's Committee of Ministers and officials of the Railway African Union (RAAU).

The communiqué issued yesterday at Arusha after the meeting said this step had been taken because the country was being sold out by the East African Community.

The communiqué was signed by the East African Minister of Finance and Administration, Mr. Odierwani, who is also the chairman of the Committee of Ministers, the general secretary of C.A.U., Mr. C. S. Lubamba, and the general secretary of R.A.U., Mr. Mwandawiro.

It said it was agreed that a consultation meeting between the unions and their central organisations and the Community would be held at a date to be agreed later.

The railwaymen planning to strike because a date had not been fixed for hearing of a dispute between the Community and the R.A.U. Monday the matter will come up for mention and fixing the date for hearing.

The union's general secretary, Mr. Mwandawiro, had said in Nairobi earlier that the railwaymen were entering an "arbitrary" strike because the office of the East African Community at Arusha has no confidence in workers of the Railway Administration.

Issues in dispute such as a wage increase of 20 per cent, membership in Group B, 10 per cent for Group A, 5 per cent for those on supergrants and a minimum wage of £11 for workers in Group C.

Officials of the Common Services African Civil Servants Union (KASU) have written to Kenya's Minister for Labour and Training asking that members will be called out on strike at midnight on March 6 unless an award of trade dispute is settled.

The letter, signed by the president, Mr. W. N. Ochieng, Mr. C. O. Kubi, and the national treasurer, Mr. J. C. Cira, "unmistakably" declares the manner in which the East African Community is handling industrial relations.

CASE 'FRAME-UP' SAYS SITHOLE

An African nationalist leader, the Rev. Ndabandaba Sithole, told the Rhodesian High Court yesterday that he thought the case against him was a "frame-up".

Sithole, leader of the banned Zimbabwe African National Union, is accused of plotting to murder the Rhodesian Prime Minister, Mr. Ian Smith, and Zulu activities in Rhodesia was sometimes sent out from London by a Mr. George Brown.

The prosecutor, Mr. Brendan Treacy, asked: "Mr. George Brown—who is he?"

Sithole: "He is our contact."

Sithole said he believed that two prosecution witnesses—identified only as Mr. "X" and Mr. "Y"—had conspired to incriminate him.

The prosecution has alleged that Mr. "Y" was a foliage agent for the Rhodesian special branch, who also acted as a courier for Sithole. It further alleged that Sithole asked Mr. "X" to organise the assassinations.

The wood-paneled courtroom was again crowded, mainly with Africans—as Sithole went into the witness box for cross-examination.

Sithole said he was dissatisfied with the proceedings in the case.

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Messages to Egypt from U.S. and Russia

The message in the forefront of which Nasser discussed peace, he said, adding that the problem called for a peaceful solution.

The President said that the United States will seek a new policy in seeking initiatives and explore every avenue leading to a peaceful solution.

The U.S. will give all-out support to Dr. Gamal Abdel Nasser's Middle East peace plan, the President said. It will also support the Arab side in the United Nations, in favour of the Arab position, he said, adding that the United States will support the Arab position in the United Nations.

Police do not know where the book was sent from by Dr. Mondlane, or by what method it was sent.

Mr. Sawaya said police had evidence which would support the contention in a Dar es Salaam newspaper that the parcel had a West German postmark.

It was understood detectives took four fragments of a book from the murder scene at a Mwanani Bay beach house owned by an American gun dealer, Miss Betty King. Miss King, who had been helping the police with their inquiries since Monday, left the police station yesterday.

What is democracy?

What is democracy or, as pronounced nowadays by the cynics, 'democrazy'? So many definitions are tossed around, to make words like 'liberalism' or 'democracy' take refuge under its sheltering branches, that it is time somebody pinned democracy down to a real meaning.

Ask any political meeting for a definition and you may be sure nobody in the whole length of the front row will give anything but a stuttering answer. Democracy began in Greece, if you discard the Judean manifestations.

The Greek *demokratia* can be translated as 'the rule of the people', but this is not quite what democracy meant then or now. The bedrock may be the entrenched constitutional right of the people, any people in any country, to govern themselves; but somebody has to govern and not all the people can do so even for some of the time.

Democracy can exist within the domains of a monarchy, as at any rate in the British form can. Equally, democracy can exist in a republican capitalist society, as in the U.S. or in that blend of bureaucracy and *democrazia* from the top which the *USA* has produced, but only if the bourgeoisie, *liberté, égalité, fraternité*, the Paris Commune, Napoleon and all that followed it. It was in the U.S. that the first all-round definition was compounded. Theodore Partridge, speaking at a 'Anti-Slavery Convention in Boston, came out with: "A democracy, that is, a government of all the people, by all the people, for all the people; of course, a government after the principles of eternal justice, and a changing law of God; for shortness sake, I will call it the idea of freedom".

But democracy does not give anybody a ticket to shout his mouth off about anything under the sun and defy the laws of an elected Government. Democracy is not licence, degenerating into the anarchy of ochlocracy. In the rule of the rabble in order to govern, a government must be invested with authority, to be directed by responsible persons, and is entitled to the same treatment.

The question as to whether we have a direct democracy in Africa is tricky. I think we do not have democracy as such. All countries, including the so-called democracies, practise a qualified democracy. In America, there is *capito-democracy*, while in Africa we are acquiring *scio-democracy*, a combination of African Socialism and democracy.

NEWS FROM THE PROVINCES

Big part for African contractors

The Mayor of Kisumu, Coun. Samson Oduyo, said that African contractors were playing an important role in the construction of the Kenya Canal.

Coun. Oduyo, who was speaking at a party to mark the end of a six-day course at Kisumu for African contractors from Western and Nyanza Provinces, told them that their work was much appreciated.

This was a competitive world and he called on the contractors to double their efforts in their field.

"This is your golden opportunity and every one of you should do his best to improve the building industry in the country," he said.

He assured them that the Government and his Council were behind them.

Welcoming the guests, the Provincial Engineer for Western and Nyanza Provinces, Mr. James Omondi, praised the African contractors for their contributions towards the task of nation-building.

He thanked the Government for its efforts to arrange for Nettlecote to assist in Kisumu to train African contractors.

It was appreciated, he said, that when those experts left there were many African contractors who were ready to take over the job.

The chairman of the Kenya Association of African Contractors for Nyanza and Western Provinces, Mr. Francis Kidia, expressed his gratitude to President Kenyatta for giving Africans a chance in contractor enterprises along with other races.

The Kakamega County Clerk, Mr. S. Adan, appealed to the contractors to maintain high standards in their work.

He said that during the colonial era Africans were not given much chance to take part in the country's building industry. Now that the Kenya Government had given them an opportunity to participate in the industry, they should show a high standard of skill and work hard.

Extension to children's home opened

On behalf of the Commissioner for Central Provinces, Mr. C. K. Koinange, the Deputy Provincial Commissioner, Mr. John Kituma, opened the new extension of the Calver Children's Home at Ruturiga, Nyeri, built at a cost of about 250/-.

Mr. Kituma said the home had played a great role in improving the lives of children who were taken in while suffering from malnutrition.

Such homes were of vital importance in any country, but it was the duty of parents to provide for their children and not shift the burden on the State.

The District Commissioner for Nyeri, Mr. A. G. Kangebe, who is also the chairman of the home's committee, thanked individuals and groups which had contributed towards the building of the home.

\$25,000 raised for self-help

The people of Maru South, Nyanza Province, have in the last six months raised more than 25,000 for self-help projects.

Mr. S. M. Mbatia, M.P. for the area, said.

As a result of the encouraging public response, ten new housing schemes have already been started in the area.

At a recent public meeting in Maru, Mr. Mbatia urged his constituents to continue their efforts in building their own homes and schools.

He expressed his appreciation to the Government for its business and improve their farming methods.

The Kenya Co-operative Union is trying to work out a system to recover interest on the money lent to the members of the co-operative, Mr. Clement Ombui, said.

The method, which will be put into force with the aid of the co-operative movement office in the district, will help farmers who owe money to societies to pay their debts.

Members of co-operative movements who have been given fertilizers, sprays and other farming materials by the Government societies and have failed to pay back will sign a form which will set out a method of repayment.

The Principal of Kakamega Rural Training College, Mr. J. J. Ombui, said in a report for 1968 that the year showed a 26 per cent increase in student fees in spite of an increase in fees.

The institute had been recognized not just as an educational institution but also as a focus for the development, programme for the farmers.

The college was successful at the Nyeri show, where it was awarded the Kisumu Cup for the champion rural institute for serving the community at the farm and dairy projects.

A total of 921 students attended courses during the year, including 698 women, who attended 71 courses.

The number of courses has increased and the centre is now running double courses.

Crops planted yielded good returns, but some were disappointed because of the late start of the planting of coffee and beans.

A dairy herd was being built in a new, high-quality breeding herd of Guernseys for local farmers.

The Principal of the Maritani Rural Training Centre, Mr. G. H. Mbatia, has expressed optimism over the past attendance of courses at his centre. He said a number of courses had several empty places, but he was hopeful because of poor attendance.

In his annual report for 1968, Mr. Mbatia said only 527 students attended courses. This was a disappointing figure, taking into account the contribution the centre was expected to make towards the development of the area.

Samburu hides and skins trade reopens

The Hides and Skins Office for Northern Kenya has announced that it has reopened the trade in hides and skins which had been closed during the year and business started again.

A continued price fluctuation on hides and skins were a big worry to both buyers and producers.

Many producers decided to sell the commodities for domestic use and others for export.

They had to sell later at low prices.

L. Samburu District has a large number of hides and skins which are being processed at home and preparation is complete.

The district had a large number of animals but a small number of cattle were slaughtered for local consumption while large numbers were sold to the Kenya Meat Commission.

The Baringo District Community Development Officer, Mr. R. M. Githonja, warned in his report that people who take up self-help projects should seek the help of Government institutions if they wanted the projects to be successful.

Co-operation between Government officers and the public in the district would enhance the success of most projects.

Mr. Githonja urged the residents of the district to diversify their self-help projects so as to cater for different needs.

There were 120 women's clubs, 11 nursery schools catering for 5,200 children and 60 adult literacy classes with an enrolment of 1,500 people.

Mr. Odinga talks of 'chicken-hearted' members

The president of the Kenya People's Union, Mr. J. Odinga, said at the weekend that it was unfortunate that some of his 'chicken-hearted' supporters were leading half-heartedly during the party.

Addressing a party delegates' conference at the weekend, Mr. Odinga said that the Government had worked to plan to destroy the K.P.U.

He alleged that by-elections were conducted in the most crude method that had ever been witnessed. Democracy was cast aside and forgotten.

Reviewing activities, he said the year was rough and difficult because of many obstacles put before the party by the Kani Government and because of some weak elements within the party itself.

A group had emerged which thought they were acting for the good of the party but "when they felt ineffective, they ran away causing the party a great deal of embarrassment", he said.

Party meetings had been badly received. The conference should have been held in a hall by permission had been refused.

Mr. Odinga ended by saying that K.P.U. national officials showed true dedication and "nationalism of the first order" to the surprise of our opponents. He asked his followers to be vigilant in all their work and appeal for unity.

"We cannot afford to have squabbles within our ranks and file," he said. "It is up to you to weed such things out."

Mr. Odinga and Mr. Bilad Kaggia were later re-elected as president and vice-president of the party at the end of the conference.

Mr. Kaggia did not attend, but was re-elected unanimously by

delegates. Other officers re-elected included the general secretary, Mr. J. D. Kall, the publicity secretary, Mr. A. Gikoo, the administrative secretary, Mr. J. B. Othman, and Mr. J. Nihula M.P., the treasurer.

A surprise was the defeat of Mr. J. M. Gwangi, a veteran nationalist, who went down to Mr. Nzele of Machelo for the post of organising secretary.

Proposed resolutions included:

- (1) That "intimidation of supporters be condemned and the Government be urged to stop Kani supporters from using force in such activities."
- (2) That the frequent arrests and searches on the person and property of the K.P.U. leader, Mr. Odinga, be condemned, as they violated the rights guaranteed in the Constitution.
- (3) That the action of the Government in closing the University College be deplored as it was contrary to the University Charter which guaranteed academic freedom.

Outbreaks of courtroom violence in Los Angeles, which reached a climax during the past week with a shooting and an attempted suicide, have prompted judges to seek ways to halt crime during the administering of justice.

But an emergency meeting of judges over the weekend concluded that the only preventive measure, a search of all those in court, would be difficult if not impossible to conduct throughout the entire court system.

All courtroom spectators and witnesses at the Los Angeles trial of Sirhan Sirhan on charges of assassinating Sen. Robert Kennedy, have been searched before being admitted to the court. Plain clothes detectives and uniformed bailiffs line the courtroom walls to watch the public.

This procedure has already cost the local authorities an estimated \$200,000 (about £200,000) and the judges said it would not be feasible on a large scale.

A man accused of murder was shot down on Thursday by the victim's brother as he was being led from the bench by a bailiff in a Los Angeles court building.

Witnesses said the assailant screamed: "I got my brother's murderer" as a bailiff and a lawyer wrested a gun from the brother.

Adolpho Hernandez, 31, who was on trial for slaying the brother to death, was reported to be in a serious condition in hospital with two bullets in his back.

In the same building on Friday, a 21-year-old man seized a judge's mallet and plunged it into his chest moments after a judge sentenced him to 15 years in prison for the manslaughter of a wife.

Similar incidents have occurred in recent years and several attempts to smuggle guns to prisoners awaiting trial have been uncovered during the past year.

In a congressional incident a year ago a singer shot and killed his wife, and wounded several witnesses with a volley in the courtroom hall as they awaited a divorce hearing. — Reuters

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Kwale farmers urged to adopt modern methods

 Keeping cattle for the sake of skins was wasteful and farmers should, as in other cases, use modern methods to raise their herds as a means of increasing the standard of living. Minister for Agriculture, Francis McKenzie said when opening the one-day district agricultural show at Kwale on Friday.

The Minister was speaking at the district agricultural show which was held at Kwale by the National Society of Kenya. Some 4,000 people attended the show which was described by McKenzie as the best so far at district level.

McKenzie said the Government intended to establish a series of training centres at various points in the country, with a view to providing a practical course for urban and rural areas. The Government was also sending an expert to study a plan for the improvement of the main road to enable farmers to transport their products to market.

Kwale District was fortunate, Mr. McKenzie continued, in having a potential for a large variety of crops such as coconuts, citrus fruits, banana, sugarcane and other vegetables. They had a ready market at Mombasa, which was a big advantage of the district.

The Mombasa market had a chronic shortage of vegetables, and if farmers in the surrounding areas could adopt modern techniques, such as irrigation, use of fertilizers and better seed, they would find a ready market for their produce. He said the Government was engaged in the development of the livestock industry which had a bright future in the country.

He added: "We must concentrate not only in the production of milk which is the main dairy product of this district, but also in the production of other types of livestock."

"In order to improve off-peak production, we must eradicate prevalent diseases and improve our husbandry standards."

The Minister said he failed to understand why no cattle from the Kwale district were sold to the Kenya Meat Commission at Mombasa last year, while 2,700 cattle were offered for sale at Marikani.

"This district has a cattle population of some 120,000. Cattle must be kept so that they may carry off money. It is no use boasting about your number of cattle as a drinking party because this does not raise your standard of living," he said.

"Farming is business much as the farmer as keeping a shop. What the farmer should be able to hear about is the amount he has earned from his cattle, the profit made and not merely sit on empty hands."

"In the Ministry of Agriculture, plans very great. We are working on the training and education of the young Kenya farmer, but we must also have the good quality of his agricultural products like wheat, horticultural produce and other types of crops, very good quality to our buyers."

"As I have said before, the farmer should be able to hear about the conditions which prevail all over the world, and to consider and produce for sale to such markets, then our agricultural standards will not develop."

"In order for the farmer to have the development of agriculture, techniques, they must have a market for their products. This information is given in our Farmers' Training Centres."

Young farmers, who would be the farmers of the future, must also join the many flourishing A.K.A. clubs in the district. Mr. McKenzie stressed, noting that there were two young farmers clubs in the district.

Referring to water development, Mr. McKenzie said that the Ministry had been a little disappointed because the people had not shown sufficient interest in water development.

He said that there was a great need for more dams and water projects for the people and their stock, but these could not be developed unless there was more self-help initiative shown and more cooperation with the Government in developing controlled and disciplined grazing schemes which were essential if land was to be preserved for the future.

"If the Government is to spend money on water development in the district, the people themselves must show some interest in these schemes and also be willing to pay for such water in order to maintain and develop the schemes which the Government intends to construct in this part of Kenya," he added.

The Government was also pressing ahead with the development of settlement schemes in the Coast Province to absorb the squatter population.

Date announced for start to new Motor Mart building

 Work will start next Monday on the first phase of the imposing new £270,000 building in the heart of commercial Nairobi. The block — of two connected blocks, in fact — of shops, offices and car parking facilities is being built by Motor Mart and Exchange Ltd., through its subsidiary company, the Motor Mart Investment Corporation.

It will replace the recently closed Motor Mart building on Muiindi Mbingu Street.

Plans and negotiations for the building have been in progress for some time, but they were held up by the fact that a preliminary announcement was made in Nairobi architects Messrs. Marshall and Associates and the company of Nairobi who had been selected for the first phase of development, which consisted of ground-level shops and showrooms on the first floor of the building, designed to house 200 cars.

The shops — in the office phase two of the project — will be built on an open plan and partitioned off later to suit the requirements of the tenants. It is likely that the shops will eventually be divided into 12 or 14 shops.

The entire Muiindi Mbingu Street frontage will be occupied by Bruce Ltd. for a hotel, completely open showrooms.

Phase two of the project — the two towers each on four floors of offices giving a total space of 102,120 square feet — will go out to tender some time between April and June.

Excavations for the building are already completed. The entire project is due for completion by the end of next year.

No name has yet been finally decided for the building as a whole, but it is likely that the towers will be known as York and Lincoln Towers, after the streets they front on.

They will be linked by a central lobby, giving access to lifts, stairs and parking. The building will be served by four high-speed lifts, including one express lift serving the top three floors from ground level.

The new building has been designed to give a maximum of natural light throughout.

E.A. - GHANA AIR AGREEMENT SIGNED

A brief communique issued at the end of the meeting described the talks as having taken place in the spirit of African unity.

On the first day of the talks Mr. Malindi said that whenever there was a glimpse of the possibility of forming a united African airline the venture should receive all possible encouragement. There was already friendly co-operation between Ghana Airways and East African Airways.

"It is the wish of East African Airways that this talks the Ghana Government should have a more spirit of even greater co-operation."

The constitutional status of East African Airways, which is in a virgin situation, was treated as a single unit and no traffic rights could be acquired by another airline within the common market.

Strike threat by five trade unions EMPLOYERS BLAMED

 Three postal unions in East Africa, the Railway African Union in Kenya and the Kenya Local Government Workers' Union may all go on strike if their grievances are not settled by the employers.

The postal unions in East Africa yesterday threatened strike action over delays in carrying out the recommendations of a salary review commission.

A statement issued in Nairobi by the general secretaries of the Unions of Posts and Telecommunications Employees in Kenya and Uganda, Mr. C. O. Opa and Mr. J. B. Mpepeti, gave the East African Corporation 21 days to make up its mind.

The statement said: "A dispute has erupted as a result of the recommendations of the salary review commission and the employers have refused to release and negotiate on the report of a salary review which was completed last September."

"The workers have exhausted their patience and have no trust in their employer. They will no longer tolerate a situation under which employees doing the same work earn different salaries, live in different types of houses and are offered different amenities."

"The union raised the problem of the salary review with the employers on Saturday, 19th, but they have been dragging at 2100 a month. The workers with the Salary Tribunal in 1965 and an award of

a 71 per cent pay rise made in their salaries."

"The Ley Standing Tribunal had also recommended an increment of 15% for this category of employees but this had been obstructed by the Corporation."

Despite this obstruction the Corporation has in the last year said an agreement was reached on a salary review.

Mr. Mpepeti said that the unions in Kenya are still puzzled by conflicting news reports over the possibility of a strike due to start at midnight on Wednesday.

While reports from Arusha reaching the East African Standard suggested that the general secretary of the Railway African Union (Kenya), Mr. J. B. Mpepeti, had agreed to call off the strike, some sources in Nairobi said that the strike was still on, as no firm agreement had been reached in Nairobi with the East African Community.

A spokesman at the headquarters of the union in Nairobi said: "We are as puzzled as you are. Everything depends on Mr. Mpepeti, who is engaged in negotiations with the Community Managers."

Members of the Kenya Local Government Workers' Union will be called out on strike if a meeting of the union staff committee, which was held in Nairobi last week, is called at the weekend.

Mr. Mpepeti called on the Town Clerk, Mr. J. K. Thimba, to convene a meeting of the post staff committee on February 14.

Six hurt in riot at football stadium

 Six people were injured when police used teargas during disturbances in Saturday's first round of the Rubia Cup knock-out football tournament, match between Athabulu and Kisumu Hot Stars at Nairobi City Stadium. Several arrests were made.

The match was abandoned in the 60th minute when fighting broke out between players and police had to intervene. The crowd became hostile and teargas was lobbed on to the field, which was invaded by spectators engaging in free-for-all fights.

During the stampede several people fell and were trampled on. Some spectators showed the police with stones both from inside and outside the stadium. Trouble between supporters of the two football teams later spread to the African stands.

A police officer had to call an end to the match after 35 minutes of utter chaos through the loud speaker. He ordered everybody to leave the ground and to refer to Mr. Jonathan Kibera, head of the stadium.

Trouble started when a scuffle began between the Kisumu left-back, Alan Opiyo, and the Athabulu centre-forward, Aggrey Mwakha. Mwakha brought Opiyo to the ground and the latter immediately retaliated by punching him.

Play resumed with a free-kick against Athabulu, but fighting again started when Alan Opiyo's brother, George, attacked Mwakha. A free-kick developed between the players and the police were called on to the field to intervene.

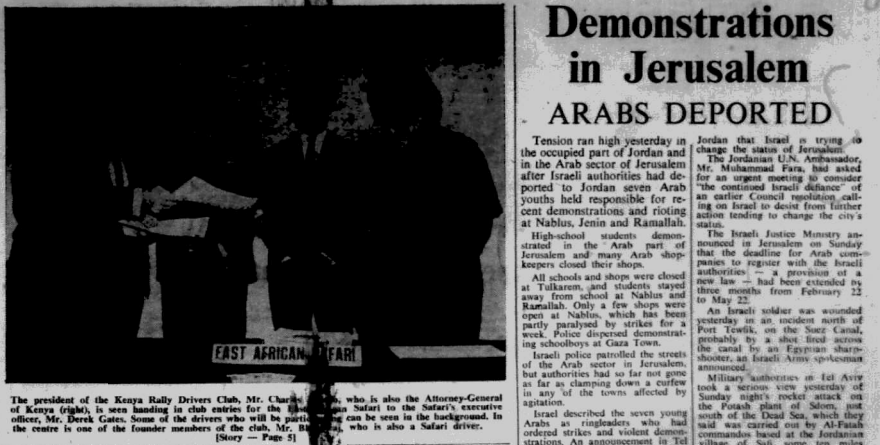

Chogoria Hospital appeal

If ever there was an example of self-help in a big way, it is the Chogoria Mission Hospital project, to which the people of Eastern Province, and Meru in particular, have set their hands.

At the centre of the planning lies the modernisation and extension of the hospital, but other amenities are included. Travelling along the old road is almost impossible during wet weather, so making up the surface to all-weather standards is a necessity in order to provide access to the hospital. There seems a strong likelihood that a start will be made on tarmac for the Embu-Meru road in August or September.

Then there is hope of constructing an adjacent airstrip which can be used by the patients to Nairobi in emergency. Electricity and telephone links are essential services for a modern hospital. Apart from the hospital itself, therefore, the completion of the project will greatly facilitate the development of the area's economy as a whole.

The Chogoria Hospital scheme, in all, is estimated to cost £200,000. This is an ambitious total, but the P.C. of Eastern Province, Mr. Mahabu, has explained that £150,000 has been assured by the Provincial Government.

Community's industrial relations

Five unions have been threatening strike action over disputes with the Corporation Community, or East African Community, or the postal unions of the three member States, the Railway African Union in Kenya and the Common Services African Civil Servants' Union (Kenya).

There has been some confusion over the outcome of the action called by the railwaymen. It was reported that the union's General Secretary had agreed to call off the strike, but subsequent reports said Mr. Mwandauro was still negotiating with the Community's Ministers.

Resentment was caused, as stated here last week, because the unions felt they were left to negotiate industrial relations with the Community in a vacuum. Weeks passed fruitlessly after the Kenya Government referred the railwaymen's claim, quite properly, to the Community's headquarters in Arusha. The East African Industrial Court, which the Community set up under the terms of the Arusha Agreement, was convened only yesterday.

Why has there been such uncooperative delay in setting up the machinery to deal with legitimate trade union ap-

proaches? Such poor industrial relations, leading to frustration on the part of the workers and possibly grave inconvenience to the public, with damage to the economy if strikes materialise, would never be allowed to pass unremedied for so long in the private sector.

The Civil Servants' Union expressed growing intolerance in these terms: "The union categorically deploras the manner in which the E.A. Community is handling industrial relations. . . This union maintains that the imaginary E.A. Industrial Court must be part and parcel of the E.A. Community." That was certainly the understanding.

If no industrial court is functioning, how can the unions get a hearing for their grievances? How can decisions be given, binding on both sides? After too long a delay Arusha headquarters has broken its silence on this serious situation, having implications not only for the present but for the future of industrial relations with the Community which must, overall, be one of the biggest, if not the biggest, employer of labour in East Africa.

Delayed though it is, the decision to convene the court is most welcome.

Arabs' African image

Arab States are making a renewed bid for greater African support for their campaign to regain their lost lands from Israel.

This is part of a worldwide diplomatic offensive of which details were given in the report of the four main countries affected—Jordan, Syria, Lebanon and the U.A.E.

Jordan's Prime Minister, Mr. Bahjat Talhouni, expressed optimism that greater support would be forthcoming from Africa during an interview in his office in Amman.

He said: "It is true that the Israelis have penetrated into Africa to a greater extent, but since the June war greater efforts have been made through Arab States in Africa and through Afro-African organisations, to bring more support for the Arab cause. Some success has been made and we are hoping for more success."

The Prime Minister also said that Palestinians on Jordan's West Bank were suffering "the worst occupation in history", and added: "Similar confidence in increased African support was expressed in neighbouring countries. It coincides with a massive Arab propaganda campaign in major world centres in an attempt to gain support."

In New York the Arab States have set up a publicity office using the latest media techniques—such as distributing posters and stickers reading "Wanted, a Boycott Declaration on the rights of Palestinians in their National Home."

In London Jordan has set up a

Public Relations Office staffed by its top-ranking officials.

The position has dawned on Arab leaders that even before the tide of war which brought many defeat and humiliation they had lost the peace

Butchers rush to change their scales by Saturday

Standard Staff Reporter

With only three days to go to the metric deadline for Nairobi butchers, weighing machine mechanics were busy yesterday converting scales.

The city's 150 butchers must "go metric" by Saturday. The sale of meat in units of weight other than metric units is prohibited after that day.

Some city butchers had expressed fears that their scales would not be converted in time because of a lack of spare parts in local factories.

But the parts arrived in Nairobi from Mombasa on Monday and yesterday the factory affected by the shortage, the Kenya Scale Co. was in full swing converting scales from pounds to kilos.

A spokesman for the company said: "I think we shall have converted the scales of all our butcher customers by Saturday. At the start of converting a set of scales, in good order, to metric was taking our mechanics about four hours or so. But they had never done such a job before and now with a bit of practice they can manage one machine in about two hours."

The major firm involved in converting scales, Gately and Roberts Ltd., has not suffered any shortage of parts and has been busy for some time converting.

An official at the factory commented yesterday: "We are coping well with the rush but we are fully extended although we have not yet had a breakdown of any kind."

Butchers were said to be giving every co-operation to officials of the Weights and Measures Department.

A department spokesman said yesterday that it appeared that all butchers in Nairobi would be ready for the start of metric system. He explained that it would be an offence for anyone to continue trading in Imperial units of measurement after the respective deadlines. Butchers are the first retailers to be affected by the new laws.

Next will come Nairobi dressers who must convert by February 21.

Col. Odumegwu Ojukwu has accused Britain of participation in genocide against Biafrans and warned that all British interests in the territory will be forfeited. The Biafran leader made the charge in a radio address to a joint meeting of the Council of Chiefs and Elders of the Constitutive Assembly of Umuahia.

Col. Ojukwu told the Assembly that he was now totally convinced that nothing can turn the Biafran people from their path of genocide against the British and progressive forces.

He said the British Prime Minister had "frustrated the known will of the Biafran people during their recent conference to try to find a means of ending the current tragic war of genocide against our people."

Referring to a statement by Chief Awolowo, the Federal Nigerian Foreign Minister, he said that the Biafran people would not give up one side of the war for a peace which would mean their death.

The Economic Commission for Africa has recommended changes in its institutional machinery aimed at giving African States more political control over the Commission.

It also recommended establishment of a technical committee of experts comprising full member States and an executive committee.

The Commission of Ministers will consider matters of policy and the priorities to be assigned to the programmes and other activities of the Commission.

The resolution was introduced by Mr. Tom Mboya, Kenya's Minister for Economic Planning and Development, on behalf of a group of countries who had proposed four communique resolutions on the occasion of the 10th anniversary of the E.C.A.

Another resolution called on industrialized countries to re-examine the content and volume of aid they offered to African countries.

S. AFRICA DENIES TAKE-OVER MORE

The South African Interior Minister, Mr. Lourens Mulder, has said that a Government measure allowing the transfer of some powers from the South West Africa administration to South Africa was not aimed at a take-over of the disputed territory.

Speaking in Cape Town during the Second Reading of the South West African Affairs Bill, the Minister said the changes were legal and accorded with the spirit of South Africa's League of Nations' mandate over the territory.

He added that there was no question of disintegration or a change in the territory's present international status.

The Prime Minister rejected his suggestion that it would give the South African Cabinet a free hand in the territory.

Sir de Villiers said it would put the clock back for the White South-West Africa as far as their constitutional development was concerned, effectively remove financial control from them and they would have to watch non-White groups attain greater and greater powers.

Mr. Vorster said that the legislation was at the request of the Whites.

He added that there was no question of disintegration or a change in the territory's present international status.

A Louisiana businessman, Clay Shaw, was identified in a New Orleans court as one of three men who conspired to assassinate the late President John F. Kennedy.

Mr. Perry Russo, star witness of the District Attorney, Mr. Jim Garrison — the man who challenged the findings of the Warren Report on the presidential assassination — told the court that two months before the killing he had been present when Shaw, Lee Harvey Oswald (the presumed assassin) and a pilot, David Ferrie, discussed ways of shooting the President.

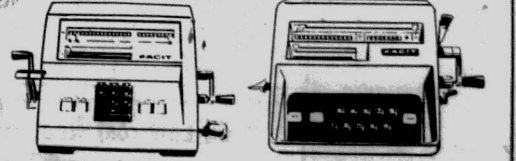

Welcome to Kenya

Through President Kenyatta and his wife, Kenya today welcomes the Chairman of Ghana's National Liberation Council, Lt.-Gen. Ankrab, for Mrs. Mildred Ankrab, for their State Visit.

Almost exactly three years ago, on February 24, 1956, the army deposed Dr. Nkrumah on his way to Hanoi, U.S.S.R. Ankrab, already a national hero, returned from retirement to steer his country out of the accumulation of political troubles and financial chaos.

In 1957, Ghana had been the first British colony in Africa to attain independence, setting out with pride and high hopes. Originally, Dr. Nkrumah had been an imposing nationalist leader. Gradually, he submerged Ghana under his tutelage.

Assets were wasted in a régime of squandered mania and corruption. As the special articles in our supplement clearly demonstrate, Lt.-Gen. Ankrab and his colleagues grimly set about the massive task of wrenching Ghana out of bankruptcy, rebuilding the economy and founding a new order on social justice.

At times, their efforts have been hindered by the propaganda emanating from Guinea, where Dr. Nkrumah was given asylum. Once, there was an attempted coup by a small section of his army unit. After this attempt had failed, Lt.-Gen. Ankrab addressed a Press conference, saying "the Ghana armed forces as a whole remained loyal to the Council and there is no cause for alarm". His confidence has been justified.

The new order has grown in strength and popularity, passing from one reform to another, to recover Ghana's financial stability and liberalise its institutions. Lt.-Gen. Ankrab proved the right man in the time of national crisis. His acceptability stems from his air of friendliness and personal record of courage and integrity. This was the stature of the man set against the rejected régime of Dr. Nkrumah, who had endeavoured to create a Messianic image which shrouded his misdeeds, whose downfall gave rejoicing to the great majority of Ghanaians. He was universally commended in Africa. The achievements of the National Liberation Council, with Lt.-Gen. Ankrab at its head, have fulfilled the hopes of many supporting nations who doubted the doubtful.

Of this or of other military regimes, the question has often been asked: "What is better, to return to civilian rule? Let the Chairman answer in his own words: 'Officers and men of the Ghana Armed Forces and Police are neither interested in politics nor in wielding political power. Our main objective is to help rebuild the shattered economy of the country, remove bribery and corruption and bring about a new régime of power characteristic of the former Government. After achieving this, we will gladly hand over power to a democratically elected Government as soon as possible.'"

September of this year has been set as the target date for the establishment of the democratically elected civilian Government to succeed the National Liberation Council. A Constitutional Commission has finished preparing a new constitution and presented its report to the Constituent Assembly for debate. The proposed constitution provides for a President and a Prime Minister for the Executive, a Legislative Chamber of 140 Members elected by adult suffrage and guarantees the independence of the Judiciary. Advisory to the President, the report recommends, there should be a Council of State composed of prominent citizens of proved worth, the one means of helping to deal about modernisation and the element of any differences compromise. Additionally, it is recommended that the Leader of the Opposition should join the Council of State, together with the Prime Minister, Chief Justice and General Officer-Commanding the Armed Forces, a notable array of combined talent and authority.

Lt.-Gen. Ankrab and his wife are assured of the warmest welcome to Kenya. Let them see the sights and meet the people, partly in a holiday mood, partly in their official positions, on a State Visit which will help to draw the two countries of Africa closer together in mutual respect and understanding.

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Ghanans react to Lt-Gen Ankras' modest man who was forced to head nation

Lt-General Joseph Arthur Ankrak, Chairman of the National Liberation Council, arrives in Nairobi today on a State Visit, bringing with him a tremendous fund of goodwill from the Government and people of Ghana.

He is also bringing to Kenya his charm and personality that have endeared him to Ghanaians.

But above all, he is here to cement the cordial and fraternal relations between Ghana and Kenya that have long existed, especially during President Jomo Kenyatta's days in Manchester where the struggle for the total liberation of the Continent of Africa was launched.

But who is the man that rose from enforced retirement to lead that political machine which was saddled with the unenviable task of restoring order and confidence in Ghana?

Lt-General Ankrak was born in Accra on August 19, 1915 — the eldest son of Samuel Paul Coffie Ankrak, overseer for the Co-operative Wholesale Societies Warehouse near the old surfboat port of Accra, and the only son of Beatrice Ababio Quayson, described as "a very modest Christian lady" who took care to see her only son trained the Christian way.

Childhood was rather typical of Accra in the middle colonial period. Life centred round Accra port where his father's job of dealing with cocoa and timber exports was a highly responsible one.

Being staunch Methodists, the parents saw to it that the boy "observed his Christian obligations" — an upbringing which persists to this day. The Lieutenant-General began his education at the Methodist School (formerly Wesleyan School), Accra, where he soon established a name as "Ankrak Patata" — the dating one — for he was forceful in argument.

He always insisted on leadership, even of boys older than himself, and had ever ready for a "fight" to defend his stand. His father's death in 1927 ushered in a period of uncertainties and difficulties, brief sojourns with relatives, until his supervision was taken over by his uncle, Mark Codjoe Ankrak.

It was in 1927 that he finished his secondary education at Accra Academy, at an age not far above most of his contemporaries. On joining the Civil Service, a fashion-

able career for all young educated boys, he found himself, to his dismay and that of his family dragged to the Army as a Second Division Cadet.

There followed frantic family manoeuvres to obtain his transfer to a civilian department until the Colonial Secretary hit upon the excellent plan of posting him to Tarnale, 400 miles away, and out of sight, as it were.

At that time, of course, a military career was not looked upon with any favour — almost an admission of failure and inferiority. His own efforts to leave the Army were futile in 1939 when war was declared and he was mobilised willingly.

However, while on a furlough to Accra a few months later he admitted to a cousin that he was getting used to the Army routine and particularly relished the physical training as useful for keeping fit; he might as well stay on and make a headway. The family had to drop its efforts.

In 1940 when the Brigade went on to East Africa, which he is now eagerly looking forward to re-visiting, he was transferred to Accra to the Records Office of the Army. He did not find the job particularly attractive in spite of early promotion as Warrant Officer Grade II and second-in-command.

After a four years' stint at this dead-end job for something more exciting was irrepresible and he applied for training as an officer. This turned out to be quite a fight, for the officer corps were in those days a highly closed preserve.

The young Ghanaians officers of today have had their pioneering work done for them by men like the Lt-General who saw the daunting obstacles that were put in their way as only meant to be got over or got around.

The very idea of an African officer in those days, a highly closed preserve, was almost unthinkable. Fortunately, as the saying goes in the vernacular, "one child of God happened to be around".

A Brigadier Danquah supported the young African and later in 1946, having gone through the preliminary examination, Kumasi and Teshe, he speak

of many frustrations and trying episodes, arrived in Britain at the Officer Cadet Training Unit at Maresfield, and passed out in February, 1947.

Lt-General Ankrak's military career may be divided into four periods. The first included his drafting as a civilian army clerk, life in the ranks, and the officer cadet training unit until his commission in 1947. It was a difficult period which saw the development of determination to succeed. when he took over command of the 1st Battalion and Garrison at Lieutenant-Colonel. This period was distinguished by the Congo crisis, in itself a major event in African history not to speak of its repercussions in Ghana and West Africa.

It was also, in a sense, the climax in the General's military career. Colonel Ankrak, in common with other Ghanaian officers, found their military resources stretched to the limit; but during this time, in a highly explosive incident involving Prince Lumumba, who was then Prime Minister in an fast deteriorating country, Colonel Ankrak became the first and only Ghanaian to wear the Military Cross.

The citation to the award stated: "With great common sense, maturity and tact, this officer handled a delicate situation which otherwise would have created grave consequences in Leopoldville and many parts of the Congo. Colonel Ankrak with complete disregard of his own life disarmed an A.N.C.

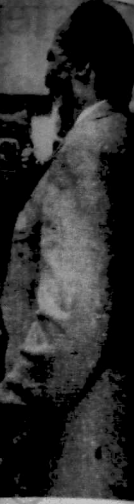

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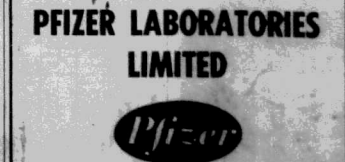

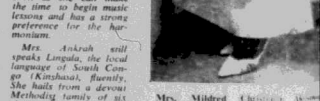

BACKGROUND TO THE NEWS

Russia may ignore Moon and concentrate on Venus

Of the dozen or so rockets that are in various stages of readiness in the silos of Russia's Baikonur launching grounds, how many are pointing at the Moon?

Has Russia accepted the fact that America will be first to make a manned landing - probably in July or August? And is the most particularly interested in the Moon anyway?

Both surmises could be true. Western experts are increasingly convinced that Russia's main space interest is no longer the Moon, but the planets beyond it - and that she is currently spending nearly three-quarters of the money allocated to space research on preparing for a manned orbital mission to Venus in 1975.

Certainly, the experts say, Russia's last space spectacular - the link-up between Soyuz 4 and Soyuz 5 - had little relevance to a Moon landing, but a great deal of bearing on a longer multi-stage flight to the stars.

Indeed, there are some space scientists who think Russia will bypass the Moon altogether, preferring to concentrate all her energies on the 160 million mile trip to Venus which would turn America's lunar expedition into something of a long-term project.

Until quite recently, the Americans had all geared up to take a slow look at Mars and Venus with the aid of an ambitious leap forward in space known as 'Project Voyager'.

The project envisaged the launching of a series of highly advanced unmanned space-probes towards Mars and Venus, soft-landing on the planets and transmitting back a wealth of information.

But it was revealed that the probe which was in the order of 45,000 miles from Venus at the time of the first launching was abandoned from 1969 to 1971 - and the whole future of the project was in jeopardy.

Prof. James Van Allen - the scientist whose name was given to the belts of radiation that surround the Earth - declared that America was allowing its competence in planetary exploration to decay and was great danger of being overtaken by the Soviet study of the planets to the Soviet Union.

This was particularly frustrating in view of the fact that the Americans had already proved that their probes were more accurate and technically advanced than those of the Russians.

It was the Americans who, in July, 1965, achieved the first reliable interplanetary space success when their Mariner IV probe passed Mars at a distance of only 5,500 miles and transmitted a series of 22 historic close-up photographs of the planet's surface.

The success of Mariner IV was both a triumph and a relief - an earlier Mars probe, Mariner III, which had been launched in November, 1964, had failed.

So the Russians had never to land on another planet. The next Soviet attempt, Venus-4, represented the crowning triumph: on October 18, 1967, it spotted the planet on Venus, and it passed, equipped with a special parachute, down through the planet's turbulent atmosphere to make a soft landing on the surface.

Astronomers and scientists were kept busy for months analysing the information it transmitted. Information that enabled them to write what was the most favourable launch period will not be until August next year.

As far as Mars is concerned, instrument plans for sending two more Mariner probes on a fly-by later this year. But that, too, may be thrust to one side in the all-out bid to get a man on the Moon this summer.

To many leading American scientists, it is beginning to look as though the Russians may be willing to leave the Moon to the United States, so that they can concentrate on building a Space-station in orbit around the Earth. This would be an ideal platform for a manned planetary expedition.

Ghana's water of life

East and Central Africa have outstripped most regions on the continent in hydro-electric power development. Muchison and Owen Falls in Uganda, the Hale Scheme in Tanzania, Kindarua Station in Kenya and the Kariba Dam in Central Africa have all opened up their respective areas to various fields of development.

Just as East and Central Africa have placed considerable emphasis on this aspect of national development, countries in West Africa have also come to realise that hydro-electricity holds the key to their development programme.

Two of these countries that have taken up the challenge of hydro-electric development are Nigeria and Ghana. In the former, the Niger Dam Authority has recently announced that the entire flow of the vast River Niger had been cut off to commence the formation of a lake which will turn the turbines of the Kainji Dam project.

In Ghana the Volta dam and power station were completed in September, 1965, many months ahead of schedule. The three main features of the Volta Project consist of the construction of a dam and a power station on the Volta River at Akosombo in the Eastern Region for the generation of electricity, the creation of an aluminium smelter at Tema, near Accra, which uses electric power from the station for processing bauxite for export, and the building of a harbour at Tema, which, with its ancillary road and rail facilities, handles the increased import and export trade generated by the smelter and the many other

industries springing up in the country. The power project itself comprises a dam to retain 120 million acre-feet of water, a powerhouse containing four turbines which drive four generators to produce a total of 512,000 kilowatts, 16 substations connected by 500 miles of 161,000 volts transmission network. Each generating unit is capable of producing 18,000 kilowatts, plus an overload capacity of 15 per cent. Each unit therefore represents three times the total amount of installed capacity of diesel generating stations which were supplying the country before the Volta project was commissioned, thereby decreasing the cost of electricity in the country by 300 per cent.

At present power from the project is being used by all the mining companies in the interior of the country, by the aluminium smelter and by the Electricity Division of the Ministry of Works and Housing at its various centres of distribution.

The availability of this large block of electric power has resulted in a saving in foreign exchange on imported fuel oil which used to provide the principal motive power for generating electricity in the country and it is expected to attract new industries and stimulate the expansion and modernisation of the surplus power to the manufacturing countries has been considered and many meetings have been successfully held with these countries regarding, among other things, the construction of the township with modern amenities.

The project, as a whole, is a shining example of international cooperation. Of the estimated cost of 70,000,000 the Ghana Government invested up to 25,000,000 in the project, the remaining half was obtained from long-term loans from the Export-Import Bank of the United States, the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development and the United Kingdom Government.

Although the Volta River Project is by and large a hydro-electric scheme, it opens up possibilities of development in many other fields such as transportation, agriculture and fisheries. The dam at Akosombo is creating one of the largest man-made lakes in the world.

The lake, when fully formed, will cover an area of 3,275 square miles and have a shoreline of 4,500 miles, representing more than four per cent of the total surface area of Ghana. It will provide facilities for a fresh water fishing industry. It is estimated that about 200,000 tons of fish could be obtained annually from the lake.

The lake will also provide a waterway for transport between the north and south, and facilitate the carriage of goods and cattle. A tremendous human problem has been created by the dam - the artificial lake is some 80,000 acres in area and will inundate some 10,000 people who have been living in the area.

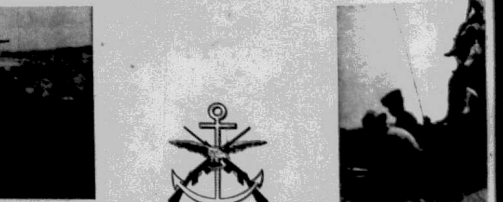
