More troops in Anguilla as anger mounts

More paratroops landed in Anguilla yesterday as the island moved to reconquer its entire Caribbean in the face of mounting criticism at home and abroad.

The Minister of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs, Lord Shepherd, broke the Caribbean tour after a telephone call from the Foreign Secretary, Stewart, for consultations on the new situation in the West Indies.

A French warship has been sent to patrol the French West Indies against the invasion of Anguilla. In St. John's, Antigua, thousands of demonstrators staged an anti-British protest as the latest detachment of 40 British troops flew to the island.

The paratroops were flown from Britain to back up the British invasion force that emerged from the beaches of Anguilla three days ago.

The Antiguan, demanding the immediate withdrawal of British troops from Anguilla, staged a four-day strike around the capital. Some of them carried placards.

The Governments of Guyana, Barbados, and Jamaica are expected to make early statements on the British action.

Official sources in Georgetown, Guyana, however, expressed surprise at the condemnation of the invasion by Trinidad's Premier, Mr. Williams, saying Mr. Williams presided over last month's conference of Commonwealth Caribbean Heads of Government which asked Britain to take all necessary steps to end the crisis.

Jamaican and Guyanese opposition parties have condemned the use of troops. Guyanese and West Indian university students have announced anti-British demonstrations and called on all Caribbean Commonwealth States to sever relations with Britain unless the troops are withdrawn.

The local newspaper *Trinidad and Tobago Express*, published in St. Vincent, which is administered by the Netherlands and half owned by France, posed the question: "What is the British Government's intention in Anguilla already seen to have spread to other islands and there are reports that the Dutch Navy has shot its most modern missile flying carrier, the *De Zeven Provinciën*, off the coast of the Dutch capital of St. Martin."

British newspapers yesterday unanimously reported increasing anti-British feeling in the Caribbean as the Prime Minister, Mr. Wilson, said what many regarded as a "parallel" to the *Daily Mail* article. Mr. Wilson said that if it could be proved that the Government was "deliberately" invading Anguilla, he would not be able to do anything to prevent it.

Peeling to U.N. says Sen. Kennedy

Senator Edward Kennedy has urged the administration to peel away the United States policy on Vietnam at the earliest opportunity.

At a meeting of the National Committee for United States Action on Vietnam in New York, Kennedy said that the history of American policy there has been no more palpably absurd than the position that Communist forces do not exist.

He might have been 50 years old when the American policy was announced by the former President, but Kennedy is not an independent non-partisan committee.

The United States should announce the restrictions on exports of strategic materials to Communist Democratic Senator Kennedy said he hoped to see talks between Vietnam and China and the United States resumed and that it would take place on a basis not under the control of the Communist Government.

Kennedy also called on the administration to meet with the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to discuss the meeting.

Experts examine pilgrim plane wreck

President Nixon yesterday announced that the American Government would stop financial grants to students found guilty of contravening the law.

In a written statement issued in San Clemente, California, he came out firmly against the way of thought in U.S. universities, declaring: "Intellectual freedom is in danger in America."

Mr. Nixon, who is spending the weekend in California where he was born, said "Violence, physical intimidation, physical intimidation, is becoming an accepted element in the clash of opinion within university confines."

This was the President's first statement on student agitation since he assumed office on January 20.

He said: "Increasingly it is clear that this violence is directed to a goal of destroying the American way of life. It is not to be tolerated. It is not to be tolerated in our institutions, but it is to be tolerated in our universities."

"Approve with the least understanding of the history of our nation that has submitted to such force of obstruction and regression, and that has not been able to do so not to strengthen a statement to declare that the way of life we covet begins to die."

But President said university disorders reflected a deep social malaise in the world and society would not solve the problem just by getting tougher.

He therefore recommended that universities review the teaching they do together with their liberal arts structures, highlighting the role of the student in the process of education and reform of teaching methods.

President Nixon said he would like to see the university community support the following principles:

(1) The independence and authority of the faculty on one hand, and the freedom of the student on the other, must not be broken down by the student.

(2) Students and faculty members should not permit violence or threats of violence to influence their actions or decisions.

The Federal Government will take "moderate and justified measures," the President said. He has asked the Secretary of Health, Education, Mr. Robert Finch, to implement them.

These measures, approved by Congress, will "withhold federal assistance from any university or institution of higher learning which is found to be engaged in violent activities, or to have violated fundamental rights."

Mr. Finch in a letter sent to the universities was also made public.

In it Mr. Finch assures them that the financial aid will be applied widely respecting the student's rights to "legitimate and responsible expression."

Mr. Finch calls at the university heads to bring the Government's new measures to the attention of the students as well as the university administrators' plans to implement the regulations. — Agency

Red Guards yell curses across river at Soviets

Red Guards are beating drums and yelling curses and threats from the banks of the Ussuri River, the news agency reported yesterday in a dispatch outlining the Sino-Soviet frontier situation.

The news agency said: "The Chinese frontier is leading a normal life," the agency said. "Trains are passing through as usual, children are going to school, Government offices, stores, restaurants, cafes, the postal and telegraph offices, the printing house and library are all functioning normally."

But recent events, in which the echoes of shots sped across the hills, have left an imprint of sternness on the faces of the Ussuri people," said Tass.

Television reports were also quiet in tone and bulletins were not followed with the keen attention they received from viewers three days ago. The men, in particular, have other problems. There was a generally somber mood yesterday morning because the Czechs beat the Soviet hockey team two-nil on Saturday at Stockholm.

Western observers in the Soviet capital noted that yesterday Moscow Press comments on the Sino-Soviet conflict were distinctly more guarded or not a back to know "everything is as it was before."

As the general public was assured that the frontier area was normal, reports from the frontier area to normal and there was no danger to civilians in the region.

But the reports, which came from Ussuri, contained no new information on the military situation, but they did contain a note of patriotic faith were conspicuously absent from the Press.

There was, one incident in Moscow yesterday when a Chinese correspondent of the New China news agency was holding a group of passers-by on a pavement when several foreign reporters are staying. Members of the public tried to stop him entering the building.

During a 10-minute argument the correspondent accused them of "provocation." He had to make a hasty retreat. Some people said he intended to "kill" Chinese propaganda "to foreign journalists."

A similar incident occurred elsewhere in Moscow on March 12 when three Chinese nationals tried to give diplomats and correspondents the text of Chinese propaganda on the Damansky Island clash. — Agencies

Soccer fans run wild

Football supporters in England and Scotland caused trouble on Saturday. Twenty people were injured when Glasgow football fans charged the gates at Hampden Park, and a London fan damaged two underground stations and injured a railway worker.

South City had its worst outbreak of vandalism on the ground and in Birmingham hooligans took over the flow, creating hundreds of glasses in a hotel bar at Villa Park.

Several hundred people swarmed through the bookies' gate at Hampden Park shortly before the kick-off, discovered on commercial Scottish cup semi-final. Most of the fans were taken to hospital with suspended fractures.

At Nottingham underground station, London, about 100 fans of the Tottenham-Chelsea game "bashed everything made of glass they could find," a London Transport spokesman said. Later several trains had to be taken out.

At Earl's Court station fans stopped escalators, smashed glass, broke the flow, machines and overturned fire buckets. A station worker was kicked in the back and hit on the head. He was taken to hospital with bruises and a suspected broken hand. — A.P.

HERO AWARDS

The highest Soviet military distinction, the title of Hero of the Soviet Union, has been conferred by the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet of the U.S.S.R. on four frontier guards who took part in China's victory over the Damansky Island.

CONVOY AMBUSH AT KILINDINI

North Vietnamese troops have ambushed a U.S. military convoy in the Central Highlands, killing 10 Americans and wounding 30 others, a military spokesman said yesterday.

The army helicopter crashed in the mountainous jungle, 18 miles southwest of Pleiku City, injuring all five people on board.

Helicopter gunship and artillery pounded the area for two hours after the North Vietnamese attack on the convoy with rocket grenades and machine-guns. The North Vietnamese finally withdrew, leaving no casualties behind. Damage to the convoy was described as light.

In other action, U.S. skytroopers and tankmen guarding the infiltration routes between the Cambodian border and Saigon killed 53 North Vietnamese in three actions south-west of An Loc, 47 miles north-west of the capital.

Two OH-6 light observation helicopters were shot down in the area last Friday by a North Vietnamese MiG fighter plane when they straggled a mile from their base. A North Vietnamese military spokesman said.

Six militiamen, five revolutionary demonstrators and one civilian were wounded in a gun battle with the Government but were taken back to the Vietcong — and five villages were killed, while 36 others including 24 civilians, were wounded.

As the month-old Vietcong general offensive continued yesterday, observers in Saigon were predicting that U.S. casualty figures would soon equal the toll of the Korean War, in which 33,629 soldiers were killed in the five-year conflict.

Recent U.S. losses have been relatively high as for example in Operation Massachusetts Strike, which began three weeks ago in the Hue region.

The North Vietnamese Foreign Ministry has protested against raids carried out on Thursday by several aircraft on the Minh Hoa district of Quang Binh Province.

A Foreign Ministry spokesman said that the U.S. jets dropped demolition fragmentation bombs and fire rockets on a number of places in the Minh Hoa district, including 100 homes and property to the local people.

In a statement, the spokesman said that the United States is "violating the Geneva Convention for the United States to cease its military and political aggression against the Republic of Vietnam" and for the unconditional withdrawal of American troops. — Agencies

QATAR—JAPAN OIL PACT SIGNED

Four Japanese oil companies have signed an agreement with the Qatar Government for the exploration of oil fields on the seabed between Qatar and Abu Dhabi.

The four companies concerned are Kansai Oily Company, the Tokyo Electric Power Company and the Korea Electric Power Company.

The 35-year agreement covers 4,000 sq. miles of the sea-bed between Qatar and Abu Dhabi, which will be exploited by a new company to be formed in Qatar.

The area was formerly exploited by the American Continental Company under an agreement which was cancelled last year.

The Japanese company has agreed to pay the Qatar Government \$2,000,000 on signing of the agreement, \$2,000,000 more when production reaches 100,000 barrels a day and a further \$4,000,000 when production reaches 200,000 barrels a day.

In addition, the company will pay \$100,000 a year rent for the site and has agreed to invest \$24,000,000 in Qatar during the first eight years of operation. — A.P.

BAUXITE FIND IN NIGERIA

A team of Nigerian Government geologists have discovered bauxite, an important mineral product used in the production of aluminium, it has been officially announced in Lagos.

The deposit, the first to be discovered in Nigeria and the third in Africa, is located near Osohobog in the western state. There was no immediate indication of quantity.

From then on they pressed ahead until midday yesterday when the

final price of essential equipment was delivered at Kilimarnock Road.

Preparations for today's issue were then able to go ahead.

To enable the quick loading of heavy equipment onto low loaders a large hole was dug in the side of the Standard Street building.

The bulk of the East African Standard staff is now installed in the Kilimarnock Road premises, but arrangements have been made for advertisements and editorial services to be issued in Rhokasia House in the building next to the old printing offices.

The telephone number for these offices is unchanged (2421) but that for Kilimarnock Road is 3763.

Some difficulties were experienced by readers and would-be advertisers at the weekend in getting through to the city office and for that we apologise.

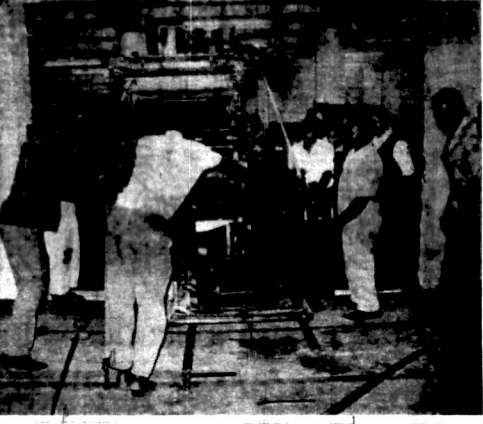
The reason was that the telephones had not been transferred from the Standard building to the offices in Rhokasia House.

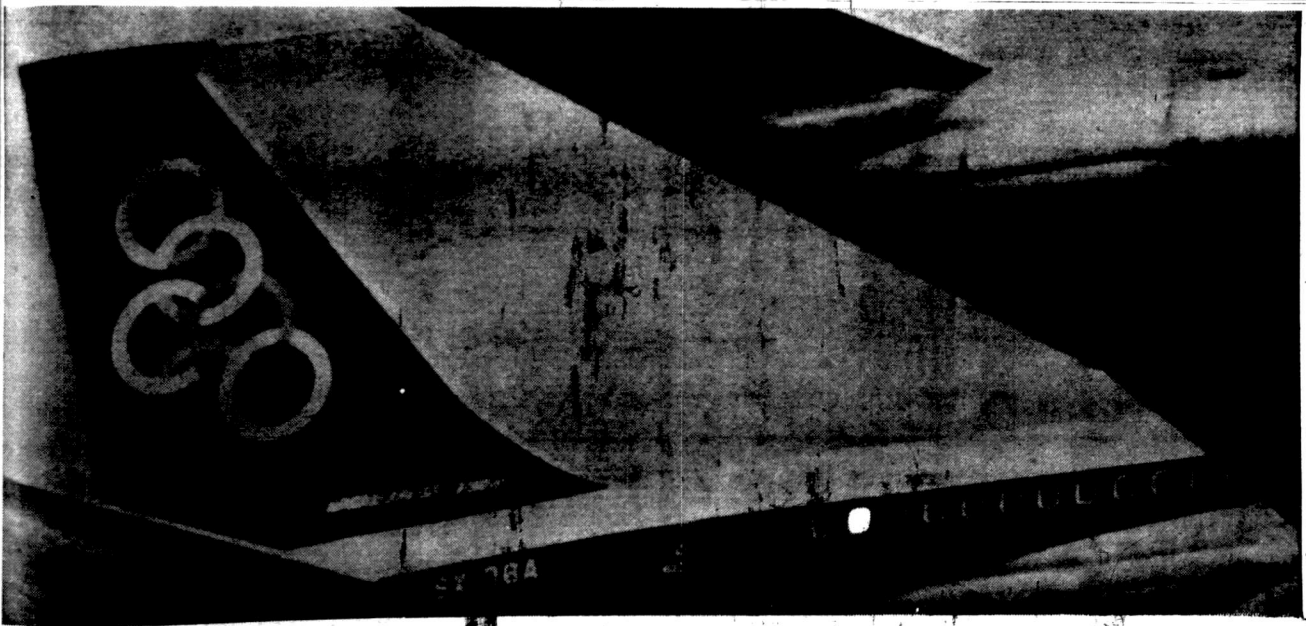

attack — Dr. Kaunda

The Zambian President, Dr. Kaunda, claimed on Sunday night that Rhodesia was planning an attack on Zambia, "any time now."

Speaking at the end of a three-day conference of the ruling United National Independence Party, Dr. Kaunda said: "You must tell the nation to be prepared for an attack by Rhodesia. We must expect an attack any time now."

Dr. Kaunda said he had recently received information that Rhodesia was planning a lightning strike on Zambia on the grounds that she was harbouring and training members of national liberation organisations based in Rhodesia.

He added that these charges were false, Zambia was not listening to members of organisations from countries under minority rule, but allowing them to run offices in Lusaka, so that they could address the world about conditions in their countries.

President Kaunda said he was giving U.N.I.P. members an ultimatum warning that Rhodesia, frustrated by its internal problems, might be driven to attack Zambia. He said: "Go and tell all our people about this, so that they are prepared for any eventuality. The state of preparation must be for all time until there is a popular government in Rhodesia, Angola and Mozambique."

In Salisbury, a Rhodesian spokesman said Dr. Kaunda's statements were "a wild flight of fantasy."

The ruling Rhodesian Front's 110-member executive committee will hold a closed-door session yesterday to give its formal approval to the new emergency legislation designed for the country, sought by the Premier, Mr. Ian Smith.

Approval by the committee — representing the Full Parliamentary Assembly — is a necessary condition for the final step before the Constitution is put to a referendum in a national referendum due in May.

The new Constitution was drawn up a month ago and the Rhodesian Front leadership has already given it wide support.

It provides basically for a complete separation of Rhodesian Africans from the Whites, Coloureds (mixed race) and Indians.

Initially Africans will have 16 representatives in the 66-seat Parliament which will only get more than 24 per cent of the total franchise.

The African share of the tax is only about 1 per cent, and only about 1,000 Africans have a slight enough income to qualify for pay income tax.

According to the political observer, the new Constitution means that African political advancement in the country will be a long, slow process.

Expel rioting students says U.S. President

President Nixon's long-awaited statement on campus riots was interpreted by observers yesterday as a clear warning that the Federal Government would not stand idle while students disrupted American universities.

In the statement, delivered as Mr. Nixon wound up a weekend visit to California, he said militants were trying to turn student bodies and college administrations into political organs.

"It is not too strong a statement to declare that this is the way our nation begins to die," he added.

Mr. Nixon called on college administrators to expel rioting students and said his administration would move to cut off financial aid to students convicted of violating laws.

Newspapers in California, the scene of some of the country's most violent student demonstrations, gave big displays to the President's statement.

Mr. Nixon stressed that violence should never be allowed to influence the actions or judgments of a university community.

But the President's warning was coupled with a call for university reforms and experiments.

Without actually giving his blessing to demands by militant students for programmes on Negro studies, Mr. Nixon recommended that university administrators should consider setting up "ethnic study" programmes.

He also asked administrators to consider giving students more authority and to move more faculty members from research and writing into teaching.

U.S. bombers hit back after Vietcong rocket raid

American B-52 bombers were diverted from their scheduled assignments to bomb Vietcong positions near Saigon following a Vietcong artillery attack against the U.S. Headquarters at Long Binh, less than 20 miles from the capital.

The Vietcong hurled 14 107 mm. rockets on the Long Binh Headquarters, which is close to the Bien Hoa airbase, as part of a series of bombardments against 25 civilian and military targets.

Six other formations of B-52s dropped more than 1,000 tons of bombs over Vietcong and North Vietnamese troops concentrations west and north-west of Saigon.

The American High Command reported that 135 Vietcong were killed in clashes with U.S. forces.

A spokesman for the Defense Department said the Vietcong seizure of a Vietcong cache close to Saigon containing more than a ton of arms and ammunition.

A U.S. spokesman said that U.S. troops on operation in the Delta Region had freed ten people held prisoner by the Vietcong near the town of Ben Tre. He said the prisoners were chained and divided into two groups.

A U.S. artillery battalion had started turning over its guns and equipment to the South Vietnamese in the first step towards a handover of the Republic's forces, an American military spokesman said yesterday.

The move follows President Nguyen Van Thieu's request to U.S. and South Vietnamese military commanders last January to draw up contingency plans for possible withdrawal of American forces.

PAKISTANIS UPSET BY AUTOBIOGRAPHY

In Manchester, England, 500 Pakistanis burnt a sixth and seventh copy of Mr. Leif King's autobiography, they say comments in his autobiography insult their national honour.

Mr. King, the former chairman of the huge International Publishing Corporation newspaper and magazine group, has had his autobiography serialised in the Sunday Times newspaper.

It was outside the northern offices of the Sunday Times in Manchester that the demonstrators burnt the copies of the newspaper on to the blaze. The Pakistanis said they objected to comments made by Mr. King about the founder of Pakistan, M. A. Jinnah.

A spokesman for the Sunday Times group said: "We pointed out that the views Mr. King expressed were his own and that the freedom of the Press had to be safeguarded."

About 1,000 Indian immigrants from all over Britain staged a protest march in the Midlands city of Birmingham.

The secretary of the Indian Workers' Association of Great Britain, Mr. Surjit Singh Mehta, said the march was particularly aimed against recent legislation which would restrict young Indians from bringing their fiancées into Britain.

He said this law could upset the traditional system of arranged marriages.

TO THE MOON— UNDERGROUND

Three young Frenchmen making a simulated space flight 230 feet underground near Nice, were said to be "biting the Moon."

The men, all experienced pot-holers, were undergoing their longest working day — 48 hours — in a simulated Moon voyage, following an American flight plan.

Coped up in a box the size of a space capsule, they ate in constant communication with the surface and must carry out flight manoeuvres on an electronic console.

Pope's new peace move expected

The Pope may make a new initiative to end the Nigerian war during the visit to Uganda in July, according to a high Vatican official.

This conflict pains him, writes him continuously. Mr. Sergio Pappalardo, secretary of the Vatican Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith, said in the Italian newspaper *L'Espresso*.

He said he will try in some way to help the two sides to bring about a peaceful settlement.

Mr. Pappalardo said it was inevitable that missionaries in Nigeria or Biafra would be accused of taking sides because they had to share the sufferings and worries of the people among whom they lived.

"There may be some rare cases of a missionary who has been imprudent, but the Church as such has never entered into political questions in the internal struggles of parties and tribes or of African and non-African nations."

He added: "I absolutely deny that we have supported the colonialist policies of non-African nations that have interests there."

DEER U.S. 'SUPER JET' CALL

The Secretary of the U.S. Treasury, Mr. David Kennedy, has said he would recommend to President Nixon that the building of an American supersonic airliner as a rival to the Anglo-French and Soviet planes should be deferred.

An 11-member committee appointed by the President to study the supersonic transport project, and there have been reports that a majority is opposed to pushing ahead with the construction of the 1,800 m.p.h. aircraft.

Mr. Kennedy said on television that he would favour research continuing on the project, "I would recommend that it be deferred," he said.

The project was initiated by President Johnson. The schedule calls for two prototype planes by early 1972, two prototype planes in flight 100 hours of test flight.

Crucial talks on Nigeria's future.

Nigerian and foreign economic experts opened a major five-day conference yesterday to discuss the four most crucial years of the war-torn country's development.

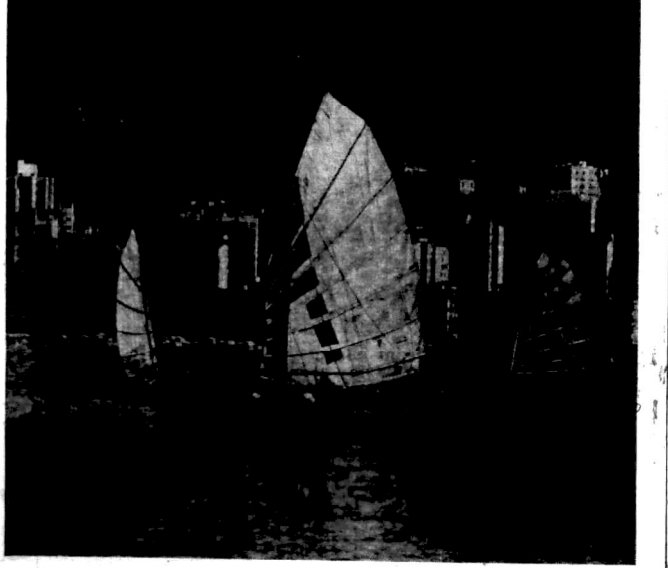

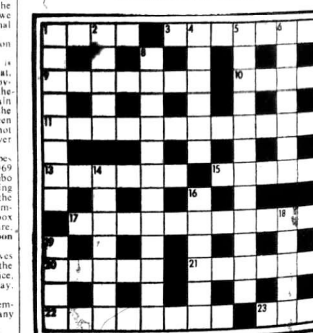

Const. Oloo said he had received many complaints that certain landlords were reluctant to let their business premises to African tenants.

LOSING CITIZENSHIP WILL BAR M.P.

Standard Staff Reporter, Dar es Salaam.

The National Assembly (Qualifications of Members, Forms and Procedure) (Amendment) Bill, which explains the procedure to be followed by a Member who loses his Parliamentary seat, was introduced by the Second Vice-President, Mr. Kawawa.

Mr. Kawawa said that section 15 of the interim Constitution of the Republic outlined what would cause a Member to lose his seat. His sub-section (A) stated that a Member lost the seat when he contravened the qualification he had before his election.

For example, every person should be a Tanzanian aged 21 or more and should be a member of Tangi. If such a person loses his citizenship membership with Tangi, he will also lose the seat subsequently.

Some of the reasons which would lead to an M.P. losing his seat were minor, others were serious with legal technicalities involved.

When a Member is involved in a matter which might affect the close observation of the law, his seat should be vacated until the matter has been referred to the High Court. Matters falling under this category include losing citizenship, having liability to another country, having some interest in a Government contract and the violation of the leadership code.

Magazine ban lifted

The Vice-President, Mr. M. M. Kariuki, has lifted his ban on the magazine, U.S. News and World Report.

Mr. M. M. Kariuki declared the magazine a safe publication on February 1951. At the same time he lifted his staff reporter on the magazine.

Mr. Albert J. Meyers a prohibited immigrant when the periodical was first published in Nairobi expressed surprise and claimed they could find nothing in it offensive to Kenya. The reasons for the ban were never made known and no explanation for the lifting of the ban was given in yesterday's statement.

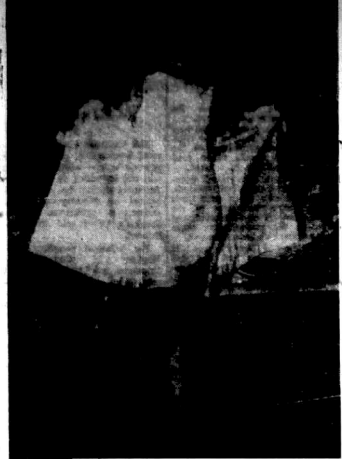

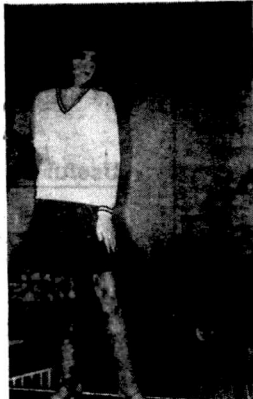

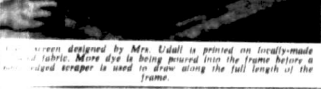

The woman who waits for her son's freedom

GILLIAN FRASER meets the mother of Anthony Grey, the journalist held by the Chinese in Peking.

They are a slim bundle of letters - not much on which to build any hope. But to the grey-haired woman in the serene light of her eyes...

"I find it so good talking about a possible release. They are doing everything possible, I suppose."

Mr. Grey makes periodic visits to the Foreign and Commonwealth Office to see Lord Shepherd...

"The letters," she tells people, "look like a little boy's. Anthony's spidery, and everything is written on what looks like a page from an exercise book."

She explains: "Anthony was put under house arrest at Nan Chai, Peking, 20 months ago. I know his chances are not too good, but he is writing me up hope."

Lately, though, hope has been replaced by feelings of anger. Early this month she was told that her son had been physically ill-treated - but she refused to believe it.

"What is being done about this?" she asked. "There is nothing I can do, Mrs. Grey." "I would see that Anthony is allowed out his room for one hour a day," Mrs. Grey said.

"During the fierce summer they boarded up his room for two weeks, but he became almost unbearable."

In the winter, the guards kept her letters to despair. "I am very proud of my son - he has written up his list of letters and I have written a letter to the British journalists..."

"But I admit that very often I am going to despair. The nights are the worst time of all, lie awake and think of Tony..."

Mr. Grey explains that her son sends letters alternately to her and to Miss Shirley McGuire, his teacher friend who lives in London.

"Tony is very well organised," she says. "One month he sends eight pages of letters, with an extra page to be forwarded to the other and vice versa..."

"I have reached him, except for one which I wrote in August. He writes me every day."

Except for the obviously tired handwriting and the cheap paper, the letters are typical of those from Chinese exercise books, but they do not appear to be the kind of letter that you expect from a son who had not much to say.

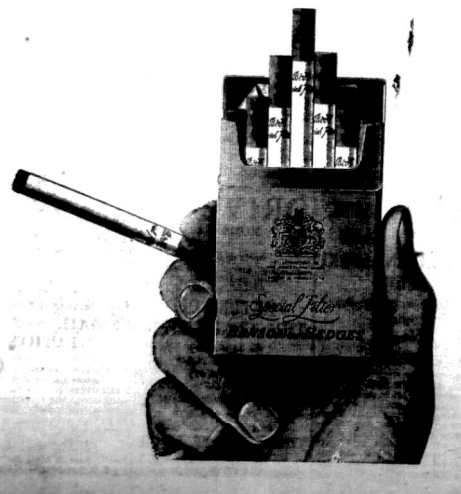

Pakistan is trying
to pick up the pieces

By NASIM AHMED

Most violence goes on
unabated in East Pakistan. No
accurate figures of casualties
can be expected from this
enclave, once part of Bengal,
which has a population exceed-
ing 50,000,000. Rumour, how-
ever, has the death toll alone
running into hundreds.

When President Ayub Khan
announced in February that he
expected the political fever would
die down and power in Pakistan
could be peacefully transferred
from President to people.

Clearly, this hope has been
confounded and a harassed Govern-
ment is trying desperately to
bring the wave of terror through a
mixture of political concessions and
military action.

Chief villain of the piece appears
to be the ageing octogenarian,
Moulana Bhashani, leader of the
pro-Peking National Awami Party.
He is supported by extreme leftists
in London's own Faraj Ali. Their
concerned call is simply for a violent
revolution to turn Pakistan
socialist.

There is, however, little prospect
of an election of any sort in the
present turmoil. The elections
scheduled for September this year,
and the Presidential elections which

are thus likely to have
more success with their measure
to curb mob violence and bring
Pakistan back to its normalcy.

In another move to placate the
public, President Ayub sacked his
Prime Minister, General Musa, from
the Government of West Pakistan
After an undistinguished record as
Prime Minister, Musa was replaced
by a young man, Hafeez Jutt, an
administrator who has been in the
problems of President Ayub's regime.

The new Government of West
Pakistan, Mr Yusuf Haroon, was
banished from Pakistan in 1966
both for his opposition to a candi-
date of President Ayub for election
in Karachi and for the independence
he showed during his brief editor-
ship of Dawn, one of Pakistan's
biggest newspapers.

He has good relations with many
of the tribal chiefs in the
troubled Baluchistan region,
and this may help in the difficult
task assumed to him.

Whether Pakistan can move
towards parliamentary democracy
without further bloodshed is
doubtful. The tribal wings of the
country, with 11,000,000 people
between them, can stay together
only if they are given a measure
of self-government.

President Ayub's
regime is given by opposition poli-
ticians in East Pakistan with-
out a shadow of doubt. Moulana
Bhashani and his supporters are
not interested in a political and
economic revolution in support of
Socialism, which is strongly opposed
by the right-wing socialist groups.

If violence between these two
factions spreads, both Pakistan's
economy and its nascent democracy
will be in grave danger.

Making the most
for mini-States

Lord Shepherd, Britain's
Minister of State at the Foreign
Office, with special responsibility for
the administration of dependent
territories, has been rushed
back to London from the
Caribbean to consider his new
problem, Anguilla.

It was all a great pity, for he
was hoping to see the first of a
long-standing difficulty, St. Vincent,
on his trip. The air force caught
up with him in Montserrat, which
he was visiting after a brief stop
at Antigua.

In those four West Indian
islands you have examples of the
problems facing Britain. Anguilla
is part of the debris from an
Associated State which did not
work; St. Vincent is a colony
which, although scheduled for
associated status under the West
Indies Act of 1967, has not yet
sorted out its internal problems.

Montserrat is the one island offered
associated status which opted to
remain a colony; and Antigua is
an Associated State which has so
far survived.

But if you want to suggest your
own alternative solution from the
West Indies Act of 1967, as
Her Majesty's Stationery Office has
run out of copies. It very seldom
happens, the salesman said, "but
there has been a tremendous sale
in the last few days."

One of the last things Britain
wished in the West Indies was
the resurrection of the problem of
smaller territories. Certainly, the
last thing to give the Government
all over the world which countries
are having at Britain's expense.

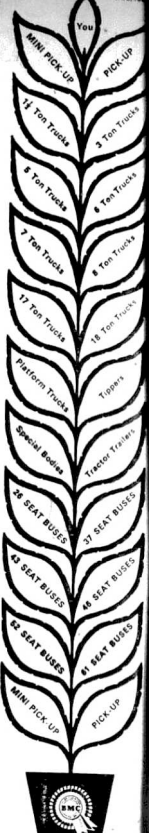

islands were too zealous in guard-
ing their own way, the big islands
thought they were subsidising the
small islands, and the small islands
thought the big islands were their
own way as independence, while
the small islands carried on talking
talks.

In 1965 Antigua did the same.
In August, 1965, Barbados made it
plain that it would first seek inde-
pendence before considering federa-
tion.

Britain was left trying to cool
tempers. More internal advance was
the answer. In July 1965, Mr
Anthony Greenwood, then Colonial
Secretary, ordered a big meeting
of former colonial servants, politicians,
journalists and technicians to gather
at Oxford and think up an answer.

Whether or not the deliberations
alleged policy or not, in December,
1965, constitutional proposals for
Antigua, St. Kitts-Nevis-Anguilla,
Dominica, St. Lucia, St. Vincent
and Grenada were tabled by the
British Government.

Thirteen months later, after negotia-
tions between Britain and the
islands, Parliament was ready to
rush through the West Indies Bill.

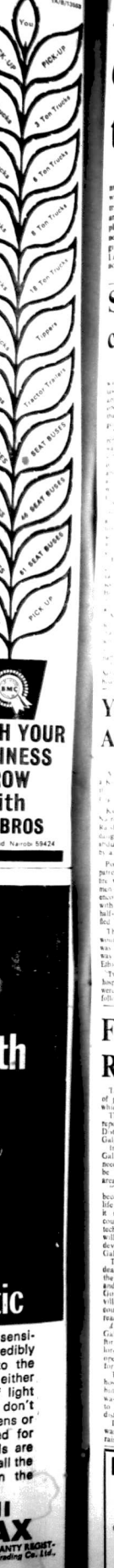

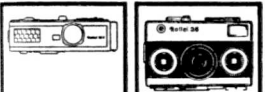
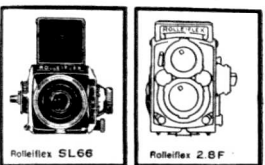

Dave Norris, the national Olympic committee secretary, has said there is no similar action from the other six athletes. The team leaves on Friday and in Wellington Mr. C. W. Blaney, chairman of the New Zealand Amateur Athletic Association, said he did not intend calling a meeting of his executive committee to reconsider the question.

Mr. Blaney said the fact that the International Olympic Committee had branded the South African Games as "contrary to Olympic principles and ideals" made no difference to the attitude of the N.Z.A.A.A. He added that the N.Z.A.A.A. was answerable only to the International Amateur Athletic Federation.
