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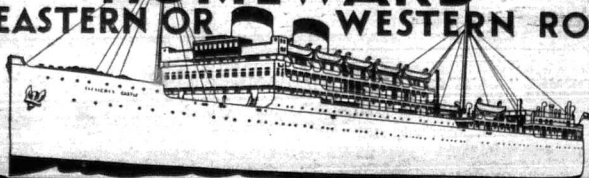

## CHANCELLOR REVIEWS THE POSITION.

## Agreements Attacked.

## ABROGATION OF ANGLO-RUSSIAN COMMERCIAL TREATY.

The principal business when Parliament reassembled on Tuesday was in connection with the Ottawa agreement, the debate on which is scheduled to last three days.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer, Mr. Neville Chamberlain, outlined the present position in regard to the agreement and the benefits which it would confer on the Empire. He declared that if the agreements increased the prosperity of the United Kingdom they would be the best contribution to the restoration of world prosperity.

An attack was made on the agreement by Mr. George Lansbury and Sir Herbert Samuel, but in the main the debate is reported to have been a friendly one. It appeared to be appreciated that nothing could stay their ratification.

The House was surprised by the announcement made by the Secretary of State for the Dominions, Mr. J. H. Thomas, that the Government has given six months' notice of the abrogation of the Anglo-Russian commercial treaty. He explained that this step was necessary by the Ottawa agreements.

## Amendment Requested.

The proposition of the Government to amend the Ottawa agreement was discussed in the House of Commons. The amendment proposed was to extend the term of the agreement from six months to three years.

The New Zealand House of Representatives agreed to the Ottawa agreement. The Canadian House of Commons also agreed to the agreement.

Changes in the Australian tariff were effected by taking the new schedule in the House of Representatives.

Similarly in South Africa the agreement, published in a special issue of the Gazette, came into force immediately, subject to the necessary amendments.

# Fighting Speech by President Hoover.

## CAUSES OF THE WORLD DEPRESSION.

### Disarmament Plan.

#### REDUCTION OF TARIFFS WORSE THAN CANCELLATION OF DEBTS.

In an election speech at Cleveland, President Hoover rebutted the Democratic arguments. He maintained that the causes of the world depression were not to be found in the American tariffs but rather in such things as the harshness of peace treaties, increase in armaments, agitation in India, and the revolutions in China and Russia.

The American disarmament plan, he said, would save the United States over 200,000,000 dollars and would increase Europe's buying power by a thousand million.

### Criticism of Opponent's Proposals.

Cleveland, Oct. 16. It is not American tariffs, but war-time slaughter of mankind, harsh peace treaties, the increase of standing armies from two to five millions, agitation in India and revolutions in China and Russia that are responsible for world depression, according to President Hoover who today made a fighting speech rebutting the Democratic arguments. The President confidently predicted that the world measures which he proposed would promote recovery. The American disarmament plan would save the United States over 200,000,000 dollars annually and would increase Europe's buying power probably by a thousand millions. He finally described Mr. Frankfurter's proposal to reduce tariffs and cancel Europe's debt annuities through remonetization as vastly worse than debt cancellation. (Reuter.)

### BRITISH NAVAL OFFICER APPEALS.

#### Sentence Upheld by Court.

### SUGAR PRODUCTION.

#### Cuban Crop to be Restricted.

# German Demand for Colonies.

## ENTHUSIASM IN THE REICHSTAG.

### Anniversary Meeting.

### FORMER GOVERNOR IN EAST AFRICA APPLAUDED.

Berlin, Germany, 14. The return of Germany's colonies was demanded at an enthusiastic meeting held today in the Reichstag to celebrate the fifth anniversary of the foundation of the German Colonial Society which was attended by a number of ex-Colonial Governors and officials. Doctor Schöner an ex-Governor in East Africa was warmly applauded, when referring to the "robbery" of Germany's colonies and the blessings which German rule brought. A message was received from Herr von Papen sympathizing with the aim of keeping the Colonial spirit alive and opening the way to renewed Colonial activity. (Reuter.)

### THE LOCHABER WATER POWER SCHEME.

#### Great Engineering Undertaking.

Glasgow, Oct. 13. Another stage in the progress of the Lochaber Water Power Scheme has been reached with the completion this week of the Logan pressure tunnel, three miles long and more than fifteen feet in diameter, through which the waters of Loch Logan and the Spean River will be turned into Loch Treig in Invernesshire, Scotland. The scheme, which is being undertaken to provide electric energy some of the biggest engineering works of their kind ever carried out in Great Britain. It is designed to tap Scottish Lochs in order to produce electrical energy for manufacturers of aluminium.

When completed the installed plant will have a capacity of 130,000 horsepower which will operate in a continuous basis. The scheme is drawn on a catchment area of 308 square miles. The works include three major and four in all, eight miles of pressure tunnels and one mile of pipe line and tail race. A striking feature is the Ben Nevis tunnel, fifteen miles long and built in 1912. It is the driving of which through granite and schist was successfully completed in 1920. This tunnel has a diameter of 40 feet and is submerged in a half of railway line which has therefore been lifted without dislocation of traffic by forty-five feet. About 1,000 men are employed on the construction of the dams and tunnels.

### A SPANISH BILL.

Berlin, October 15. Exciting rumours are afloat following an unexpected Cabinet meeting to consider the storm of protests over the project to raise agricultural imports. The Cabinet dealt, inter alia with a letter from Dr. Luther, President of the Reichsbank, who according to the newspapers has warned the Government of the impossibility of maintaining the stability of the currency unless the quota project is abandoned.

### TO REGULATE RELIGIOUS ORDERS.

Madrid, October 14. A Bill to regulate religious orders in Spain has been introduced to Parliament. The Government reserves the right to approve the appointment of high ecclesiastical officials and provides that bishops will be chosen by Roman Catholic circles shall become national property. (Reuter.)

Experts declare that no show for many years has marked such general advances in design of buses and motorcars.

### Tribute to British Products.

Brighton, October 18. Australia was foreign buyers day at the Motor Show and visitors from fourteen foreign countries were among the 16,992 people present at Olympia. They came in response to 2,000 invitations despatched in advance by the Society of Motor Manufacturers and Traders. As a large proportion of the cars exhibited are of British manufacture, foreign interest which has been displayed is regarded as a tribute to the growing prestige of British motor products.

### NEGOTIATIONS WITH REGARD TO FREEDOM OF TRADE TARIFF MATTERS.

The Norwegian and Danish Governments have also been invited to participate in similar negotiations. Conversations on the same subject are proceeding with the Argentine Government.—British Official Wireless Service.

# Funnels Repainted to Disguise Steamer.

## DESTROYERS RACE TO RESCUE.

### But Arrive Too Late to Intercept Looters.

Hongkong, Oct. 14. Pirates overpowered the officers of the British steamer "Helikon" and took the vessel to French Bay, near the notorious pirates' base of French Bay. This is the first case of piracy this year.

### Ship Disguised.

Hong Kong, October 14. The "Helikon" was under the control of the pirates for forty-five hours before she was abandoned at midnight. The pirates disguised the steamer by repainting the funnels. They threatened the officers with death when they saw a vessel overtaking them which they feared was a warship and two Chinese passengers committed suicide by throwing themselves overboard, one of them being a rich merchant who had a poignant farewell to his daughter. Five Chinese passengers were kidnapped and are being held for ransom. Two European ladies were not molested.

The British destroyers "Horse" and "Wharfedale" were sent to intercept the pirates who made off with loot and prisoners.

This is the third time the "Helikon" has come into contact with the pirates. The vessel was captured in July, 1920, and an attack in August, 1921, was only frustrated by the time.—(Reuter.)

### THE FRENCH SENATE.

#### Few Changes Caused by Election.

Paris, October 16. The Senatorial Election first ballot has resulted up to the present in the election of M. Doumergue for the Meuse by 692 votes out of 822, and the Minister of Agriculture, M. Gardy, M. Paul Doumer, the Minister for War, M. Lucey Saint, the Resident General of Morocco.

#### Little Change.

Paris, October 17. Apart from half a dozen gains for the Ministerial Radicals, the three yearly election of the senators have left the composition of the Senate practically unchanged, the only surprise being the defeat of the ex-Minister, M. Messrou, by M. André Falloux, the son of the former President.—(Reuter.)

Speech by the Premier.

#### NATIONAL GOVERNMENT STANDS BY THE LEAGUE COVENANT.

In a speech at a luncheon given in his honour, Mr. Ramsay MacDonald stated that the keynote of the British policy was disarmament not re-armament. It was necessary, he maintained, to straighten out the background before disarmament action could be effective. Britain was still endeavouring to overcome the German objections regarding the Four Power Conference and her intention to withdraw from the Disarmament Conference.

#### The German Claim to Equality.

London, October 22. The Anglo-French conversations with a view to clearing the way for the resumption of the Disarmament Conference were held this morning and afternoon, between Mr. Ramsay MacDonald, M. Herriot, Sir John Simon and the French Ambassador, and was adjourned at 6:30 p.m. after which a summary statement that the conversations had been normal in a most friendly spirit and were being resumed to-morrow. Herriot replied and stated when asked what progress had been made but he declared that in the British side the fact was not satisfactory. It had produced an understanding and had assisted in the removal of obstacles. He stated that nothing had occurred to cause the British Government to reconsider or withdraw the invitation to the Five-Power Conference.—(Reuter).

#### Discussions Continued.

Rugby, October 14. The French Premier drove to Downing Street this morning where his conversations with Mr. Ramsay MacDonald on the Disarmament question were resumed. M. Herriot is leaving London for Paris at four o'clock this afternoon. A communiqué will be issued at the end of the day's talk.

It is emphasized by the newspapers generally that the present exchange of views is designed solely to remove obstacles in the way of the Disarmament Conference.—British Official Wireless Service.

#### Growing Tension.

London, October 14. The Anglo-French Conference agrees that Britain, France, Italy and Germany should confer, preferably at Geneva, to discuss disarmament difficulties. The British Government has invited Germany and Italy to adhere to the invitation. The German minister would seek a means whereby the work of the Armaments Conference might effectively be resumed. The Conference ended at 1:40 p.m. Mr. MacDonald has already replied that he is willing to attend at Geneva, but Germany, up to the present, objects to Geneva as the venue.

#### The French View.

M. Herriot, in an interview with Reuters, declared there was "nothing whatever" in reaching a complete agreement. "My English friends in France agreed to confer with Italy and Germany while Britain agreed that the Conference should be held at Geneva within the framework of the League," he said, "and should be a preliminary character. Unfortunately, Italy insists on Geneva."

for equal status. In this country their claim has received almost universal sympathy and support on the understanding which is paramount that its recognition must be made to promote agreement all round, not used as a pretext for rearmament. This sympathy and support can only be weakened by anything which throws doubt on the sincerity of the German desire in co-operation with other Powers to work for peace in Europe.—British Official Wireless Service.

#### Hopes Not Abandoned.

London, October 15. Hopes regarding the Four Power Conference are in no way abandoned at London and conversations with Germany are continuing. The Hague and Lausanne are unofficially mentioned as alternative venues. The British Government's view is that the venue is immaterial and what matters is that the representatives of the Four Powers shall meet informally and find a means of restarting the official work of the Disarmament Conference.

Meanwhile Franco-German tension is growing. The Paris press reports the German refusal to attend the Conference at Geneva as proof that Germany wants to resume while the Germans are indignant at the allegation of the French delegate, M. Maslari, at Geneva that the German police are part of Germany's armaments forces.

A semi-official declaration by Paris says the German refusal to attend the Conference must occur on leaving to the end a decision as to whether the convention applies to Germany.

#### British Policy.

London, October 17. The keynote of the British policy is not re-armament. Disarmament said Mr. Ramsay MacDonald at a public luncheon in his honour when he emphasized that the Government's determination to stand by the Covenant of the League of Nations. He added that if the Government was not moving as fast as was expected it was because they knew that even behind the pleasant looking proposals there was a background which had to be straightened before disarmament action could be effective.

In dealing with Germany's claim, he said that as far as the purely moral basis was concerned she had known for some time that Germany did not intend her claims and had proceeded to endeavour to overcome the German objections to attend the Four-Power Conference and the intention to withdraw from the Disarmament Conference. He said he hoped it was not her last word. The British Government was continuing to pursue its purpose.

#### Statement in the Commons.

London, October 18. Sir John Simon, replying to the Liberal Member Mr. G. L. M. Mander (Wolverhampton, E.), said the Government recently proposed a meeting of the four principal Powers concerned with a view to solving the difficulty raised by the withdrawal of Germany from the Disarmament Conference.

The British proposal for the Conference was accepted by the other three Powers but up to the present it had proved impossible to arrange a place of meeting. The Government was considering the next step to secure agreement.—(Reuter).

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**RIOTS IN LONDON.**

**STONES AND IRON RAILINGS THROWN AT POLICE.**

**Numerous Arrests.**

**DISTURBANCE ENGINEERED BY COMMUNIST ORGANISATION.**

Ten thousand unemployed demonstrators took part in rioting in London on Tuesday night. The disturbance, according to a statement made in the House of Commons, was organised by the National Unemployed Workers' Movement, a well-known Communist organisation.

The demonstrators came into conflict with the police and a number of arrests were made. Stones, bricks and iron railings were thrown at the police who are reported to have acted with admirable restraint in spite of great provocation.

Over forty people were arrested for wilful damage, larceny and assaulting the Police.

In the House of Commons Mr. Ramsay MacDonald acceded to a request by Mr. George Lansbury, the leader of the Opposition, for the matter to be debated on the adjournment.

**To be Debated in Commons.**

On Tuesday, October 17, a motion for a resolution was introduced in the House of Commons regarding the disturbances in London on Tuesday evening. The motion was introduced by Mr. George Lansbury, the leader of the Opposition, and was supported by Mr. Ramsay MacDonald, the Prime Minister.

**Statement in Commons**

London, 18th. Mr. George Lansbury informed the House of Commons that the unemployed disturbances yesterday evening were organised by the National Unemployed Workers' Movement, a well-known Communist organisation. The demonstrators numbered 10,000. The police succeeded in diverting the processions before they reached the Court Hall, but one contingent was tried to force the police cordon. Considerable damage occurred afterwards, and stones, bricks and iron railings were thrown at the police, who were compelled to make numerous arrests, which added to the disorder.

The affair was clearly premeditated, as many of the arrested persons had stones, and pieces of iron, in their pockets. Over forty people were arrested for wilful damage, larceny, and assaulting the police.

Several of the demonstrators and the police were injured, but the numbers of these are uncertain.

The police behaved with admirable restraint, despite great provocation.

Mr. Ramsay MacDonald acceded to a request by Mr. George Lansbury's request for a debate on the adjournment. —(Huter.)

Rome, October 17. Twenty-five thousand Fascists frantically cheered a speech by Signor Mussolini at a Review held today to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the meeting at Milan at which the march to Rome was planned.

The Duce declared that those who believe the present crisis is solvable by miscegenous remedies are on the wrong track. "Either this is a cyclic crisis in which case it will solve itself, or it is a breakdown of the system, in which case we are facing a transition from one epoch of civilisation to another," he declared.

The second decade of Fascism presented a task no less severe than the first and its accomplishment rested with youth. "Nobody" he said "is so old as the person who is jealous of youth." —(Huter.)

**ITALY AND A CROATIAN REVOLUTION**

**Remarkable Allegations Preferred**

Belgrade, October 17. Remarkable allegations against Italy, that she is planning to assist the Croatian revolutionaries in a plot to arm the revolution in a big way for a revolution in the spring, which was reported as discovered last week, are made in the report of an enquiry by the Jugoslav Ministry of the Interior. The report states that it was planned for the Italian Fleet to blockade the Dalmatian coast and to supply arms and ammunition to the revolutionaries. Twenty-nine of the crew of the Italian cargo steamer "Monte Nevoso" of 5,843 tons, which was stranded off the Norfolk coast, were taken out of Godstone by the Cromer lifeboat, which, on returning to her office 60 hours was greeted with showers of large crowds and the playing of church bells. The Captain and three officers of the "Monte Nevoso" refused to leave the ship, but after the vessel had broken up they left in one of the ship's boats and later were found by a Lowestoft motor boat which threw into that port.

A Channel steamer, "Three Angels" of H.M.S. "Broke" and a flying-boat searched the Channel yesterday without success for the six craft which had sent out distress signals, which were heard by five ships, one having seen a rocket fired. No airplanes, either British or foreign, however, has so far been reported missing.

Ten years had indeed witnessed an enormous change in the life of the two people. The Bishop reminded the assembly that ten years was the period of time given to St. Paul for preparation for his great work. Ten years had also been the time accorded to Krato, the first Protestant Missionary to enter East Africa, for that work of his which was in fact the beginning of the great work that had been done in the Kingdom of Uganda and in the neighbouring countries. Remembering this, he said, we would thank God for the beginning that had been made and pray for the future development and work of the Uganda Hospital.

Sir Albert Cook said that he should accept the invitation to be present on this occasion, first because he had always taken a sympathetic interest in the initiation and development of medical work in the Eastern Provinces, and secondly because he was glad to bear testimony to the man, under whose guiding hand and in God's goodness, the work had so prospered. Dr. Hunter.

**History of the Work.**

Sir Albert traced the history of the work from its first beginnings with the setting of a dispensary in

1922 by the Rev. A. J. Kitching, the present Bishop of the Upper Nile. Sir Albert endorsed the Bishop Uganda's remarks that Dr. Hunter was a man of dogged resolution, by telling the assembly of the illnesses which Dr. and Mrs. Hunter had suffered—illness, he said, such as would have made other people retire from the work. Dr. Hunter had shown this same determined resolution in all the many difficulties with which he had had to contend.

Mr. Carr's gift, though indeed generous, had been barely sufficient for the opening up of a medical missionary work. Dr. Hunter had had to undertake long journeys to the surrounding country in order to win the confidence of the people. It was on one of these journeys that Dr. Hunter sustained an accident that had left him with a permanent injury. There could be no praise high enough for this determined pioneer medical missionary, said Sir Albert. He paid tribute, too, to the work of Dr. Wiggins, the chief P.M.O. for his service as a C.M.S. Missionary, in connection with the Leprosy work.

Sir Albert closed by saying that the efficiency of the hospital's work fully justified the theory that medical missionary work was simply a bait to bring people within the hearing of the Gospel. Their work was the outcome of Christian sympathy and a part of his self-sacrificing service.

After the service, tea was kindly provided by ladies of the Mission and the guests inspected the hospital including its X-ray department.

Nakuru, Monday.—This morning Nakuru's municipal dog catcher was apprehending all the stray dogs in the township, whether licensed or unlicensed. This is a first step in the campaign against rabies.

Many of the dogs quite obviously objected to this summary and unceremonious treatment, but, despite their protests, they were put into cages on wheels and taken to the local veterinary headquarters.

#### Days of Grace.

Owners of all runs were indulged to be indulgent when they heard what had happened to their animals; it is understood, however, that there will be a half period in which dogs may be claimed.

The campaign will be continued for several days until the authorities are sure that no ownerless dogs are at large.

#### A Court Case.

M. S. H. Shalleron, a Mole District dog owner, who has a dog from Kariakoo, has been declared a rabies infected area and is in quarantine.

He informed Mr. S. H. Capnelly, Senior Resident Magistrate, that he had brought the dog from that area and that he was aware of no official regulations until he got to Nairobi. Then he took the animal to the Veterinary Department. Mr. Shalleron said that when he was in Kisii he never saw a paper.

There were said the Magistrate, extending grace to what Mr. Shalleron appeared to have been so situated that no official notices had come to his notice. It appeared, however, to be an extraordinary state of affairs that in a badly infected area persons were allowed to bring dogs into the city without clean areas without any warning to the person applying for the ticket. The Magistrate hoped that immediate steps should be taken to avoid incidents of this nature occurring in future.

Mr. Shalleron was fined Shs. 10/- or one day's imprisonment.

## New Machine Crashes into Burnt Forest.

### OCCUPANTS UNHURT.

#### [FROM A CORRESPONDENT]

On Sunday (about 10-30 a.m.) an accident occurred to an aeroplane in the Burnt Forest area in the vicinity of Amahak. The pilot of the machine, V.F. KAS (fitted with a Mark II Gipsy engine) was completely wrecked fortunately without injury to either of the occupants.

At 10.15 a.m. Capt. Usheer took off from the Eldoret aerodrome with the well-known party. Mr. M. Moore as passenger and the machine was carrying a few boxes containing kit and 24 gallons of fuel, in addition to the two occupants. Before starting, all the usual tests as to condition of engine and controls, etc., had been carried out and the machine was in a thoroughly satisfactory condition.

Making an excellent take off the pilot headed in the direction of Nairobi on a compass bearing of about 10-30 a.m., when approaching the Abalabai Forest the pilot considered that it was expedient to gain more altitude before passing over the hills, the highest point on the journey, and as the wind was blowing from the port side, decided to make a series of richochet descents in order to obtain the few hundred feet of additional altitude. The machine was then at a point about two miles north of Amahak station proceeding at an average speed of 100 m.p.h. and was about 100 feet high.

#### The Crash.

Following the first take-off the machine behaved in normal fashion when it took to the air. The controls were dead leaving the pilot and passenger down the hillside and pushing down the machine until it was on the ground. The machine will be found to have got into a spin. The control surfaces correct a spin were applied but were unable to take the machine out of its spin. The pilot in charge and refused to answer the controls. Still spinning the machine crashed into the first part of a wood in excess of 150 miles per hour. With an uproar of splintering timber, metal and fabric, the machine came to rest with her nose embedded in thick undergrowth, with the passenger's seat completely covered in the wreckage.

The following account is given for the value of bearing pain that threw the numbers of injuries by force. Most arms and legs were found to his surprise and pleasure that he was still in one piece and that his passenger was likewise unharmed. By some miracle of chance, neither sustained so much as a single abrasion. The pilot was very thoroughly "written off" though—in fact it was completely shattered after but 104 hours flying.

#### Atmospheric Disturbance.

Capt. Usheer is quite unable to give any explanation of the occurrence. "Everything happened in a moment and it appears that the only possible explanation is to be found in the presence of some sort of local atmospheric disturbance. The pilot is emphatic that there was no attempt to make a turn and asserts that ample bank was given.

On getting clear of the wreckage, pilot and passenger forced their way through the deep undergrowth in the direction of the Nakuru-Eldoret road. They had proceeded a few hundred yards when they were met by a party of natives. It appears that Messrs. G. D. Ball and W. H. Macdonald, of the Burnt Forest Saw Mills, had seen the machine disappear, had heard the noise of tumbling up every available native, had provided them

## solvers with first aid appliances and maintained to search.

#### A Forest Guard.

Leaving a forest guard and a native police Kanga to attend to the machine, Capt. Usheer and Mr. Moore were taken to Mr. Ball's house where they were provided with lunch and taken into Eldoret by their boat. Of his kindness, Capt. Usheer spoke in appropriate terms. On the way, a call was made at Farm 35, the Forest Post and in the absence of the European Forest Officer, Capt. Usheer sent two akorua out to retrace the temporary ground and a full report of the accident was also sent to the Commissioner of Nakuru, Nairobi, by a passing motorist. The accident also news of the safety of both occupants.

In Eldoret Capt. Usheer made a special report of the crash to the Superintendent of Police, Nairobi, to inform the Registrar of Aircraft, Nairobi, and the Inspector of Aircraft, Kisumu.

He speaks in the highest terms of the coolness and courage displayed by his passenger Mr. Moore and is immensely grateful for all the assistance rendered to him by willing helpers. He was turned to Nairobi yesterday with Mr. Mustert of Wilson Airways, a Gibraltar native in the service. Instead of crashing, he was struck the sight of Capt. Usheer making his way through the forest. Capt. Usheer was of Wain, a very capable pilot, who is now taking his own horse to Maricao at Eldoret on Saturday. He is a very capable pilot and will be a great asset to the service.

#### A Previous Accident.

It may be recalled that Captain Usheer met with a serious accident on July 17 near Narok. When the machine that he had previously owned collided with a native hut and was entirely destroyed.

The ill-fated V.F. KAS was flown up from Mombasa to Nairobi by Captain Usheer on October 10 after it had arrived in the country by boat from England.

On October 12 he flew the Commissioner of Police from Nairobi to Nakuru and the Mergent Crater. On the following day he flew from Nairobi to Eldoret to ride in the Races there and it is interesting to note that he rode his own horse "Marmion" to victory on both days of the Meeting.

On Monday Mr. Mustert flew to Eldoret in a Puss Moth and brought Captain Usheer and Mr. Moore to Nairobi. On the way they circled several times over the scene of the accident and were successful in obtaining a glimpse of the wrecked machine.

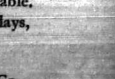

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# THE IMPROVEMENT OF CROP PRODUCTION.

## Work of the Division of Plant Industry

### COMPLEX PROBLEMS.

### Attempts to Combat Pests and Diseases.

During 1931 valuable work was carried out by the Plant Industry Division of the Department of Agriculture. In the course of the annual Report the Director of this section outlines some of the activities of the Division.

Much experimental work has been devoted to the improvement and maintenance of soil fertility, to the methods of increasing crop production and to the number of cash crops.

The control of diseases and pests has occupied much of the time of some sections of the Division. The recent campaign interfered considerably with the work of the Entomological Services and investigations were carried out into control measures and observations of the history and habits of locusts. Mealy-bug and Coffee Berry Disease were also tackled by this section.

### Locust Research.

An important section of the 1931 Report was devoted to the prevention of locust and grasshopper plagues. The Deputy Director of Agriculture is that entomologist who is dealing with the annual outbreak which work was hampered throughout the year by the necessity of chasing a number of them to the disposal of the locusts on foreign service. The report shows that the work carried out with the object of improving crop production is being given to these problems.

In the course of this section the Deputy Director has been busy with the control of locusts in the cereal industries as well as with the control of locusts in the discovery of new physiological characters of locusts and general reports beyond the limits of all kinds to which the locusts are increasing severity of root and stem rot in cereals and the increased humidity of the last few years. Concentrated attention is being given to these problems.

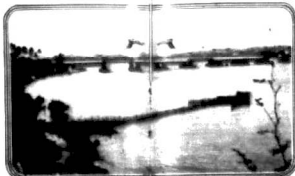

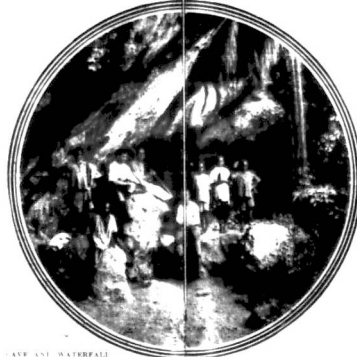

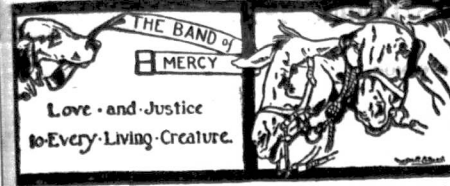

### The Discovery of Gold.

### CATTLE LIFTING THE NATIONAL PASTIME OF THE LUMBWA TRIBE.

During 1911 the Nyanza Province encountered great difficulties as, not only was it subjected to the effects of the "economic blizzard" but in addition it was ravaged by locusts. In the annual Report of the Chief Native Affairs Department for last year the Chief Native Commissioner pays tribute to the heroic efforts made by the natives to save their crops and freely admits that had these not met with success procedure would have been destroyed wholesale.

In reviewing the activities of the Nyanza Province for the year the Report refers to the discovery of gold in North Kavirondo as an event of outstanding importance. Although up to the present time the natives have accepted the situation in a somewhat fatalistic attitude that they view the whole procedure with profound distrust.

The Lumbwa have again indicated in their national pastime of cattle lifting. In spite of failure so far to discourage stock thieving amongst this tribe by means of collective punishment it is believed that there are faint signs of an improvement and the hope is expressed that the energies of this virile tribe may in time be turned to more profitable pursuits.

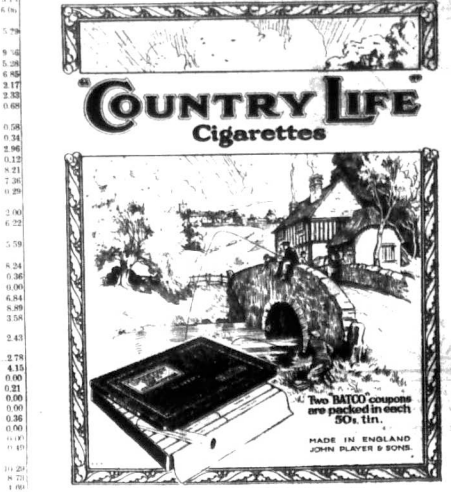

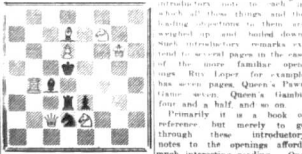
Table showing rainfall returns for various districts over a period of 7 days.

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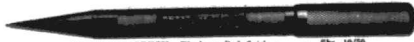
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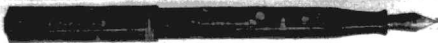

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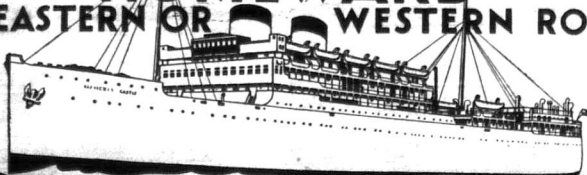

**Mr. Baldwin's Reply.**

London, October 21. (As an administrative action and in view of the fact that the House of Commons have approved the measure, was not taken by 412 votes to 84 by the adoption by the House of the necessary financial resolutions.)

The closing stage of the debate was marked by a spirited onslaught by the Labour members, who were led by the Minister, Mr. Arthur Greenwood, who asserted that the Government had allowed itself to be blackmailed by the Dominions.

The Labour members denounced the abrogation of the Russian trade agreement as a betrayal of the principle which the Government had stated in its negotiations with the Soviet Government for £200,000,000 of heavy credits.

Mr. Stanley Baldwin, in reply, explained that the Government had already begun for a new Anglo-Russian trade treaty and was anxious to secure a better proportion of the orders from Russia than previously.

**Revised Agreement.**

Mr. Baldwin stated that it was his belief that the Government had entered into a new arrangement with the Soviet Government which was a more satisfactory character.

The Government's attitude was indicated by Mr. Ernest Bennett, who is a member of the National Labour Unemployed Committee in a speech at Oxford this evening when he said that the Premier desired him to say that the Government was aware of the hardships of the unemployed but could do nothing other than help by the kind of work they were now being made to do. Mr. Bennett said that at a meeting of the National Unemployed Workers' Movement would take place on Saturday, October 20, 1923.

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# "HUNGER MARCH" ON LONDON.

## Unemployed from All Parts of England.

### LANCASHIRE PARTY PASSES THROUGH OXFORD.

#### Hospitality of Students.

MARCHERS FED, WAITED UPON AND SUPPLIED WITH BLANKETS.

Parties of unemployed from various parts of England are converging upon London, in the form of "hunger marches." Some 240 marchers from Lancashire were, much to their surprise, received with hospitality by the students, when they passed through Oxford. The undergraduates, of both sexes, supplied the marchers with hot meals, waited upon them, entertained them and supplied them with blankets.

A Government spokesman, a member of the National Labour group, said the Government was fully aware of the hardships being suffered by the unemployed; but the trouble being stirred up at the present time hindered rather than helped the consideration of the position. He pointed out that the demands put forward by the Communist movement which was organising the trouble, would cost the country £800,000,000 a year.

### Impossible Demands.

Parties of unemployed "hunger marchers" are converging on London from various parts of the country. A party of 240 from Lancashire arrived today at Oxford and were surprised by the hospitality of the undergraduates of both sexes who gave them a hot meal, waited on them at table, entertained them to a concert, and provided them with blankets and two new red banners.

The Government's attitude was indicated by Mr. Ernest Stanford, a member of the National Labour Executive Committee in a speech at Crawley this evening when he said that the Premier desired him to say that the Government was not well served by the hardship of the unemployed but consideration of these hardships was hindered rather than helped by the kind of trouble that efforts were now being made to stir up. Mr. Stanford added that at a moderate estimate the demands of the National Unemployed Workers' Movement would cost the country nearly £800,000,000 a year.

#### Nearing London.

Two thousand unemployed "hunger marchers," both men and women, are on the last leg to London from all parts of Britain. They arrived in batches at various suburbs to-night and will reach London tomorrow, with the exception of demonstrators in Hyde Park and proceeding to Government demands for increased relief. Some have been as long as a month in Glasgow and have taken weeks on the road. They have experienced particularly wet weather and other hardships. The march apparently was organised by advanced elements which have been denounced by the Trades Union Congress as "Communist enterprises and the exploitation of the employed disinherited."—(Hester).

### British Delegate Resigns.

### DISAGREES WITH POLICY OF GOVERNMENT.

### Sir W. Layton Opposed to Imperial Preference.

Ottawa, October 25. Reports as to the postponement of the date of the World Economic Conference were based on some foundation," said Mr. R. B. Bennett, the Prime Minister, in replying to a question by Mr. Mackenzie King in the House of Commons today. He added that discussions were still continuing in respect to the date of the Conference.

#### Sir Walter Layton.

London, October 25. Owing to a difference of opinion with the Government, Sir Walter Layton has resigned from the Preparatory Committee of the World Economic Conference.

#### Letter to Premier.

Sir Walter Layton in a letter to the Premier says that there is common ground between the Governments and himself on many points as far as matters of the necessity of a settlement of various and the very early removal of the present artificial blockade of international trade. On these points he is in agreement with the Government. He says that the desired result may be obtained through individual negotiations with foreign countries, within the limits set by the Ottawa agreement and subject to the approval of the Government on our most favoured nation rights. Sir Walter Layton fears that the method of bilateral negotiation will make very little impression on the world's protectionist system and Britain should press for much bolder and broader plans.

#### Points of Disagreement.

Sir Walter Layton is of the opinion that progress in the direction of lower tariffs is handicapped by acts of the Government's policy and mentions that apart from a tendency to introduce a permanent of rigidity in tariffs, the most serious impediment to the principle of a comprehensive tariff in the Ottawa agreements with Canada and Australia, and to the "unhelpful attitude" of Britain towards the world's commercial and monetary policy, but financial and economic problems are inextricably interwoven. In the absence of a radical change in the world's commercial policy in which Britain's attitude is almost the only one, he says, "I do not see the possibility of a really satisfactory outcome of the world conference on the monetary side."

#### Premier's Regrets.

Mr. Ramsay MacDonald, in replying regretting his decision, expressed the opinion that Sir Walter Layton is wrong on many important points, especially by the suggestion that all Britain proposes is commercial agreements with individual countries.

**Arab & Afro-Asian Relations.**

**THE YOUNG NYIKA.**

**Abortive Effort to Form Political Association.**

In the annual report of the Native Affairs Department for 1931 the Chief Native Commissioner in referring to the political and general situation in the Coast Province states: "The Mombasa District: His Excellency the Governor and Lady Byrne were in residence at Government House Mombasa, for three weeks in August. Relations between the Arab and Afro-Asian Associations shows little signs of improvement. The latter persistently demand an extension of the franchise to include their members, a demand which the Arab community as persistently opposes."

**Lamu District.**

Little sympathy, however, was forthcoming from the tribe in general and the movement proved abortive. These people are not politically minded.

In the Malindi sub-district the cotton crop was good, and provided a very welcome contribution towards the local revenues.

This district has seen a great advance in social development.

**Digo.**

In the Digo district also, social development has been prominent. The year was not a prosperous one, crops being poor owing to unevenly distributed rainfall.

The inhabitants are generally law-abiding, but there is a certain amount of stock thieving between them and the Akamba who reside in the district.

**Vel.**

This district was added to the Coast Province on January, 1932. The Vel is a placid, good-tempered, tractable and pleasant people.

**STRIGA WEED.**

**Eradication Campaign in Nyanza Province.**

The following notes on the eradication of striga weed campaign during the present year have been published by the Kenya Department of Agriculture.

Striga herminthodes, commonly known as striga weed, is a flowering plant which occurs in Nyanza Province as a parasite on the roots of a number of plants, both wild and cultivated, belonging to the grass family. A few years ago farmers in the area between Kibigo and Keru began to be alarmed at the damage which the weed was doing to maize and other crops. They observed with concern the necessity to clean farms presented by those on which adequate steps to eradicate the weed were not being taken.

For three seasons in succession, therefore, the Department of Agriculture, at the request of Farmers' Associations, has conducted a campaign to ensure the systematic destruction of striga on infested farms. The organization has been in the hands of the Senior Agricultural Officer who had the assistance of a Plantation Inspector stationed in the area, who has been locally in charge. As a result of experience in previous years it was found possible in 1932 to reduce both the period of the campaign and the area requiring systematic inspection. The campaign therefore lasted from May 1 till September 30. During the period an Honorary Striga Inspectors who had been nominated by the Farmers' Associations concerned were responsible for the inspection of all farms within the specified areas. Each area was divided into compartments and Striga Inspectors were appointed to inspect a definite number of squares within each area.

**Cases of Neglect.**

The campaign in 1932 has run very smoothly, due largely to the regularity with which Honorary Inspectors submitted their weekly reports. Although it was found necessary to issue ten official cleaning-up notices, cases of neglect, the warning was usually heeded and prosecution had to be resorted to in three instances only. In each of these a conviction was obtained and a fine was imposed.

At the close of the present season's working, the opinions of the Plantation Inspector and the Honorary Inspectors on the value of the campaigns were sought. From the reports of all these it is evident that the efforts to enforce eradication of Striga during the past three seasons have been most successful and fully warranted. The general opinion is that Striga is now much less prevalent than formerly on non-native farms and that on most of the labour required to keep it under control is quite small. Pears held in 1930 that Striga might ruin maize growing in the area between Kibigo and Keru have now been allayed, although it is appreciated that there must be no relaxation of the routine of Striga destruction.

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Improved Marketing Methods.

SMALL HOLDINGS THE REMEDY FOR DEPLETION OF SOIL FERTILITY.

During 1951 considerable progress was made in the development of native agriculture in the Reserves. In the annual report of the Department of Agriculture for that year a section contributed by the Deputy Director (Plant Industry) outlines the work in this regard.

The old system of a large number of small demonstration plots is being replaced by an effort to substitute the system of Native Council Seed Farms. This is still in the early stages but already progress is being made.

An attempt to improve the marketing facilities for native produce has been welcomed by the natives in the Kikuyu Reserve and according to the report, they "revealed an immediate readiness to grasp any opportunity of escaping from the confines of the existing marketing system."

One of the most serious problems affecting the Reserves to-day is that of the depletion of soil fertility. This, it is maintained, can be remedied by the introduction of the system of small holdings.

Mixed Farming.

An important section of the annual report of the Department of Agriculture for 1951 is that dealing with the development of mixed agriculture in the Reserves. Deputy Director, Plant Industry, writes also to this effect.

TENTATIVE FIGURES OF SURPLUS AVAILABLE FOR EXPORT.

The first attempt at a forecast of the crop production in the present season is indicated in the Report compiled by the Statistics branch of the Department of Agriculture for the month of September. It is emphasized that the figures quoted are liable to considerable variation and should therefore be treated with reserve.

In comparison with the previous year it is shown that the area under maize has increased by 4.7 per cent, that under coffee by 3.9 per cent, but the total wheat area which is expected to be harvested has decreased by 9.4 per cent.

While there is great difficulty at this stage in estimating accurately the amount of produce which will probably be available for export, from information so far received it appears that this will be substantially greater than last year.

September Reports.

The Crop Report for the month of September prepared by the Statistics branch of the Department of Agriculture is as follows:—

The following report presents the first forecast of crop produce for the present season. It also furnishes estimates of the surplus of the main crops which are likely to be available for export during the year ending July 31, 1934. The figures of total yields are based upon reports received from 727 Crop Correspondents.

It was realized that, owing to the heavy frostation growers would not be sowing cereals until total planted acreages under maize and wheat. Crop Correspondents are therefore called upon during the month to render a return of the acreage under these crops which they reported to be sown and the figures given in this report are based upon these returns.

It is noted in some cases where late sowings of maize and wheat have occurred, that it is not so probable to provide estimates of yields which may be expected, and that, therefore, considerable damage may possibly occur in these later sowings by the heavy frost.

The figures of production of cereal crops given in this report should therefore be used with reserve. It will be possible to give a preliminary report on figures published in subsequent reports, when it is hoped that the harvest generally of the cereal crops will be available.

Principal Crops.

The area of maize which is anticipated will be harvested is estimated at 167,000 acres, an increase of 7,572 acres or 4.7 per cent, as compared with the previous season. The estimated yield, which appears to be a high one, is estimated at 8.53 bags per acre, which would produce a total crop of 1,426,000 bags, but owing to the heavy frostation this estimate may be considerably reduced in subsequent reports.

The total wheat area which is expected to be harvested is estimated at 209,020 acres, a decrease of 4,086 acres or 9.4 per cent, as compared with the previous season.

From reports received it would appear that an average yield of 10.50 bags per acre is anticipated, which on an estimated total yield of 2,192,000 bags, leaves a surplus likely to undergo revision, owing to the heavy frostation and the

# LECTURE ON THE ART OF PAINTING.

## CHANGES THROUGH THE CENTURIES.

### Some Great Artists.

An interesting lecture on the art of painting illustrated by the reproduction of a few of the most famous paintings of the past, given at the City Secondary School, Nairobi, on Saturday evening by Mrs. (Mrs. G. K. Kibira).

Mrs. Grayson first touched on the history of art in which she said it was obvious that created and the drawing that created most and the individual artist who had a character of his own—each artist copied what he master painted in a more simple way, and so the picture, mostly of the hands of the Medians and Greeks, became increasingly stereotyped and lifeless.

The influence of Byzantine art was first felt in Western Europe in the north of Italy in the two cities of Venice and Ravenna, both being sea ports, which were centres of trading with the East. Italian artists rapidly assimilated all that the East could teach them, and soon became individual artists who created a new standard in painting which added life and vigour to the old painting. The founder of modern painting was Cimabue, of Florence, who worked in the 13th century. He painted what he saw and was not a copyist. Cimabue taught Giotto, who had the same talent as his master. And so the growth of painting continued in Florence. A hundred years later the full height of Italian art was reached in Florence by such men as Botticelli, Michael Angelo, Leonardo da Vinci and Raphael Sassano.

Venetian Painting  
In other parts of Italy a school of painting arose in Umbria which was a small state between Tuscany and the Papal States. The artists flourished in Siena and further north in the many cities of Lucca, Pisa, Florence, Prato and finally Venice. The development of painting in Venice was rather later than in other parts of Italy—it was slow to develop and the mantle of Byzantinism. The final flowering of Venetian painting was reached about a century later than the height of the Renaissance in Florence and other parts of Italy.

The Flemish School  
Turning to Flanders, Mrs. Grayson said as early as 1380 were working the two famous Van Eyck brothers, the founders of the early Flemish School of painting.

The Van Eycks were followed by Gerard David, Quentin Massys and his two sons, Petrus (the father of landscape painting of the northern schools), Mabian and Hans Memling in the Netherlands; the Dutch Primitives were working at Leyden and Amsterdam during the XV century. A century later the masters of Flanders, the great masters, the Flanders, the great master, Peter Paul Rubens, was painting in Antwerp from 1567 to 1630, when he went to Venice to study the works of Titian and Paul Veronese. Rubens was the founder of the late Flemish School, and his pupils included Anthony Van Dyck, Frans Hals, Teniers the elder and the younger.

In Holland  
Contemporary with the late Flemish School was the late Dutch School. The giants of the Dutch School were Rembrandt, Frans Hals, Ruysdael, Terborch, Gyp, Hobbema, Jan Vermeer, Pieter de Hooch, Wouverman, Gerard Dou and Gabriel Metsu. There was a revival of art in Holland in modern times when a school of painting was founded at the Hague in 1800, a school including John Rubens, Anton Mauve, and Jacob and William Marin, who only died in modern times.

During the years when Spain and the Netherlands were under one crown, the influence of Van Eyck and the early Flemish masters was fairly strong in Spain in the XV century. Later Spain was much influenced by Italian art and it was only in the XVI cen-

In the beginning of the XIX century, the Barbizon School, with Corot, Millet, Daubigny and Meissonier, and finally the great French Impressionist, Paul Cézanne, were working. There were also two women painters—Madame Le Brun and Rosa Bonheur.

English Painters  
Having dealt with the early school painting in Ireland and Northumbria, Mrs. Grayson spoke of the English employment of foreign masters for about 200 years. Among the great English painters were William Hogarth, Thomas Gainsborough, Thomas Gainsborough, George Romney, John Opie, George Morland, Sir Thomas Lawrence, John Constable, John Ruskin, John Crome, Turner, Bannister, Watts, Alfred Stevens, Rossetti, Millais and Whistler, to which must be added the two great English Impressionists and the French Impressionists.

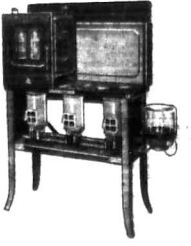

## HARD CONDITIONS ON THE NORTHERN FRONTIER.

### The Fight for Existence.

### LENDING MARCHES IN SEARCH OF GRAZING.

A vivid picture of the hard conditions of life in the North Frontier Province of Kenya is painted in the annual Report of the Native Affairs Department for 1931. The tribes wage a never-ending fight for existence and their security often depends entirely on their own resources.

In this vast land of approximately 95,000 square miles, equal in extent to Great Britain and Northern Ireland, there is no place for the weak and helpless. There is little regard for the sanctity of human life. The tribesmen look upon the safeguarding of their rights and the redress of their wrongs as their own privilege and duty.

The majority of the people are nomads and their life is spent searching for water and grazing. In the nomadic wanderings it is sometimes necessary for a human herd of fifteen men or women to be formed at the wells so that water may be lifted in small buckets by hand to hand from the bottom of the well to the top.

An interesting section deals with the Galla tribe who have virtually become the slaves of the Somalis. These people are now developing a race consciousness and are desirous of obtaining their freedom. The problem is one of considerable difficulty regarding which it is possible that much may be heard in the future.

### Fued Between the Boran and the Sukuyu.

In the Annual Report of Native Affairs for 1931, the Chief Native Commissioner in a section dealing with the political conditions in the North Frontier Province.

In the Northern Province there are two problems which the Administration has to find solution. One is the increasing immensity of the area, the aridity of the country, the variety of the tribes of the Province, the warlike disposition of the tribesmen, the conditions of life and the difficulties of marketing live stock.

It holds little permanent water, and much of that water is such that most civilized human beings would not drink it unless rendered fit by dire necessity. The grazing for the stock is scanty, and where it is in such small quantities it is not good.

The great majority of the people are nomads who spend their lives following or seeking water and grazing. It is a common failure that pastoral tribes can move easily, but nothing could be further from the truth in the Northern Province of Kenya, and it is doubtful if any native would willingly exchange the security of a settled home for the life of a nomad. The protection, pasturing and watering of the stock is a daily work and anxiety: the stock is guarded by the men, and at night by the women and children.

There are in the Province considerable herds of cattle, sheep, horses, ponies, and mules, but generally, as a rule, they are not properly cared for. The tribes are generally poor, and their life is one of constant struggle for existence. The tribes may be divided, roughly, into two parts: the small and the non-tribal, and the Mohammedan and the non-Mohammedan.



## A SPARSELY POPULATED AND BARREN AREA.

### Boundary Disputes.

#### HOW NOMADS TRY TO HELP EACH OTHER IN TIMES OF DROUGHT.

Similar in many respects to the Northern Frontier Province of Kenya is the country occupied by the Turkana and West Suk tribes. The area is sparsely populated, having a population of only 4,176 per square mile.

According to the Provincial Commissioner it is a married life that human beings are able to lead in this area, as extensive as all the other provinces and all districts.

Amongst the problems which have engaged the attention of the Administration during the last year that of the grazing rights between the Suk and the Karamoja have been amongst the most pressing.

At a meeting before the Provincial Commissioners of the Eastern Province of Uganda and of Turkana a decision was arrived at for a retiral of the old boundary (the Siam River) for a period of two years.

Locusts did much damage to the grazing in Turkana during the year and rains generally were poor. As a result there was a good deal of sickness.

### Problem of Grazing Rights.

In the annual report of the Native Affairs Department for 1929 the Chief Native Commissioner mentions in dealing with the pastoral conditions in the Eastern Province.

In September of this year the Government Commissioner for the Eastern Province and the Native Commissioner for the Eastern Province met at the Government House at Nairobi to discuss the problem.

On the whole the results have been successful. A letter has been sent to the Turkana and West Suk tribes (the Lok and the Mbebi) regarding the part of the Turkana which they have reserved themselves in the agreement.

The year has been from now on a period of relative calm. The Turkana again have to thank the King of Abyssinia for his willingness to put off the boundary of the frontier.

Strained Relations.

Relations, however, with Abyssinia subjects have been somewhat strained by the continued occupation by the latter of Nakuru.

Of the general problems of the Province the London and Nairobi reports are as follows:

The Province is about 220 miles in length and 100 wide, with an approximate area of 24,100 square miles. It is divided into two parts: the Turkana and the West Suk. The Turkana are about 100,000 in number, and the West Suk are about 40,000.

The Province is a barren and rocky country, with very few natural resources. The soil is generally infertile, and the climate is arid. The Turkana and West Suk are nomadic people, and their main occupation is stock raising.

The Turkana and West Suk have a long history of rivalry and conflict. This has been due to competition for grazing land and water. The British Government has been unable to resolve these disputes.

All our endeavors, including the imposition of heavy fines, have failed to bring about a settlement. It is hoped that a settlement will be reached in the near future.

It is interesting to note that the Turkana and West Suk have a common ancestor. They are both descended from the same stock, and their language is very similar.

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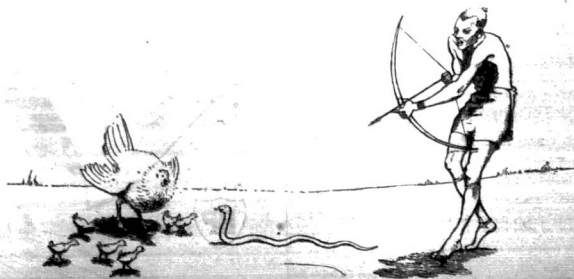

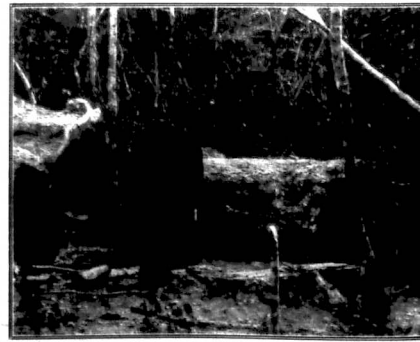

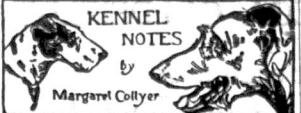

**KENNEL NOTES**  
Margaret Collyer

As the possibility of a rabid dog apparently casting fear into the hearts of quite a few people who own dogs in this city, the week gave a fairly minute description of the disease. It is to be observed in the dumb form of the disease. About 15 to 20 per cent of the cases are of this nature. Milder and other well-authorizing put it at as much as 50 per cent, meaning that the great majority of cases observed are the dumb form.

The dumb form is distinguished from furious rabies by the fact that the invading or nervous symptoms are less marked, and in very rare cases entirely absent. 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# KAKAMEGA GOLDFIELDS' PROMISE.

"Since among veins and reefs already proved there are many sufficiently large and rich to be regarded as workable mining propositions, it may be taken as certain that intensive prospecting over the whole area will reveal many more of such rich and workable reefs."

"Reliable information has just come to hand to show that a rich reef 12 to 14 inches thick, at 10 ft. from the surface, has been proved at a depth of 34 ft. to have increased to 6 ft. in thickness... the whole of the reef carrying good gold."

As an indication of the possibilities of the area Sir Albert Kitson in a fairly examination of the bed and side of one stream revealed large numbers of pieces of quartz on several of which, up to 12 inches by 10 inches in size, gold could be seen freely over some of the faces... as if sprinkled with a pepper pot. The fact that such large pieces of auriferous quartz, of two distinct kinds, were in that stream is proof that two reefs at least 9 to 10 inches thick exist in that valley and await discovery and development.

It is revealed that the largest nuggets reported to date are one of 9½ ounces and one of 8½ ounces. Many small nuggets from a pennyweight to several ounces have also been found.

One of the remarkable features of the goldfield is the very great number of small reefs, veins and threads of quartz. The importance of locating these small veins and threads of quartz is that at one place on the southern slope into the Kwa River the soil to a depth of three feet in an area of less than half an acre, was searched by small boys, and all the bits of quartz collected and treated for gold, with the result that 80 ozs. of it were obtained."

"That there are undoubtedly many small and rich veins of quartz, and probably reefs as well, in the beds and sides of most of the streams can be realized when note is taken of the high proportion of rough coarse gold and the small nuggets, with quartz attached, showing but little or no evidence of attrition, that are found in the sluices. They have been derived from rich veins cut by the streams. Diligent search should be made for them."

#### Diligent Search Necessary.

So Albert Kitson writes: The goldfield lies in Northern Kavirato, between latitudes 0° 20' N. and 0° 20' S. and longitudes 34° 20' and 34° 37' E. It embraces the greater portion of the basin of the Isaka (Isaha) River, a tributary of the Nana River, the middle portion of that of the Yala River and the southern portion of that of the Elwasa River, a tributary of the Yala. It extends N.E. to the Mumia-Yala road, in a strip, some 20 miles long by 14 miles broad, and has an area of approximately 420 square miles. Prospecting and mining operations have been extended considerably since the end of May, principally eastward, and have now nearly reached the Nandi escarpment. The Nana, flowing S.W., and the Yala, generally W., meet Lake Victoria within four miles of each other, near the northern end of the lake, at a distance of some 40 miles west of the western boundary of the field.

#### Discovery of the Goldfield.

The field was discovered towards the end of last year by Mr. L. A. Brown, with whom Mr. Stinson, D.S.O., O.B.E., and Mr. Arnold were associated by means of searching the gravels of some of the streams. Alluvial operations followed rapidly, and soon there were upwards of 200 workers on the field, engaged in sluicing the gravels of the numerous streams flowing into the Isaka, the Koa, the Peraki, and the Yala.

Prospecting for auriferous reefs commenced later.

#### Means of Communication.

There are four main roads into Kakamega from the Kenya side, viz. 8, from Kitale, 112 miles, S.W. from Eldoret 68 miles; 5, from Kapabert 31 miles; and N. from Kisumu, 28 miles. From Jijiga, Uganda, there is a main railway through Busia and Mumias to Kakamega, 144 miles; also a boat service over Lake Victoria from Kisumu to Uganda and Tanganyika ports.

Two railways serve the district. To the north is the Kenya-Uganda railway, with Brodick Falls Station about 50 miles from Kakamega, while 28 miles to the south is Kisumu at Lake Victoria, the terminus of the southern railway from Nakuru. There is besides a narrow-gauge railway from Kisumu through Yala to Isakona station. This station is close to the western boundary of the goldfield.

#### Mining Timber.

In the eastern portion and a part of the western portion of the field there is a good field of indigenous timber that can be drawn upon by the miners. The soil-portion of the field, however, is not well supplied with it. But, owing to the strength of administrative officers in this portion is able to furnish all that is likely to be needed for some time. Commencing about 15 years ago they, by energetic and judicious planting, planted some thousands of Australian gum trees (Eucalyptus wattle, acacia, and ironwood) in avenues and along the main portions of the goldfield and in various other parts of Northern Kavirato. Many of these trees are now 2 feet and upwards in diameter, and will weigh thousands of seven timber suitable for some props and other purposes.

The only available map of the district is one on the scale of four miles to one inch. This is an inadequate small-scale map, and the positions of the streams, gullies, and claims. A topographical survey of most of the field on a scale of one mile to one inch is now being made by the Survey Department. On a map prepared on this scale it will be possible to show the positions of the most important mineral discoveries and mining operations on the field.

#### THE INVESTIGATION.

##### Demonstration to Miners.

The observations upon which the report is based were made during two visits to the goldfield extending over two months. While in the field, Mr. Stinson and I visited a number of the claims of the prospectors and miners as well as the reefs. The result of our observations is as follows: Some 60 places were visited and examined, and the results of the investigations show that the goldfield is rich and well developed. The field geology is simple, and the reefs are well exposed and workings were noted, and specimens collected for later detailed examination.

To state the results during the visit made by Mr. Stinson and I, often with long detours through boggy and breakages. In all places the reefs were travelled by me on the work.

Much time also was spent in walking to and from workings remote from the roads, in passing country of quartz reefs and reefs visited and in giving advice in connection with the various difficulties met with by the miners in their work and in preparing for future work and on practical mining.

In addition to the examination of a large number of quartz reefs and soil were taken from numerous veins and reefs. These were panned by myself just as collected for so to show first the quantity and secondly in the sluices, and a second time after the quartz had been dollied to show the gold and the quartz. In numbers of cases it was found that the gold was in large quantities, quartz panned through a 40 mesh sieve and contained gold. So this already panned quartz sand was dried, crushed to pieces, and re-panned and re-panned. Good "tails" of very fine gold were obtained therefrom, some of the gold being readily visible to the naked eye. In several cases the powdered quartz was again ground and panned, and large numbers of minute specks of gold were obtained. Much of the work was done in the presence of the miners who supplied the quartz, and others who were doing the panning operations, with great interest, and had practical demonstration of the methods of panning, and the best methods of sluicing in the final separation from the fine concentrates. #### A Surprised Prospector

As an example may be given here of the value of fine crushing of the quartz in panning. One well known miner on a roof was using the quartz from a crushed quartz with a steel plate. Some of the crushed material was passed by him at his request, and a very good yield of moderately coarse gold was obtained. But this crushed and panned quartz was obviously too coarse to be admitted to a small portion of a sieve and roughly treated in the mill. This I re-panned and a good tail of very fine gold was the result. It was his estimate that a large proportion of the gold in the quartz probably half of it was being lost by his mode of treatment. It may also be mentioned that this two-dashed and panned powdered quartz was again ground in a mortar and panned and passed a third time. It yielded a good tail of extremely fine gold, so fine indeed that without the use of a pocket lens it looked merely like a yellow smudge.

Though the great majority of the miners without previous experience of any kind in prospecting and mining, yet it stands much to their credit that, following the methods adopted by Messrs. Johnson and Arnold and Major Siamese, their work should have yielded information of an immense value regarding the character and modes of occurrence of the quartz veins and reefs. The significance, however, of this, they did not realize, until it was explained to them.

#### Geological Features.

The oldest rocks of the field consist of phyllites, slates, schistose grits, quartzites, and conglomerates of the Karagege-Angulene system of pre-Cambrian age. They consist probably the greater portion of the field. From the top tips of the strata observed in the streams and on the slopes and along between them, and the larger number seen in the trenches of the prospectors, these rocks appear to be divided into at least two arcines and two anticlines with a general strike of about E-W. There are, however, several variations especially in the basins of the Koa and the Luganda, both tributaries of the Isako. In the basins and the eastern portion respectively of the field. On the northern and southern margins of the field, and into the field to the south of Kakamega there are intrusive masses of granite, of at least four different kinds and ages. In some places, there are other intrusions of igneous rocks which occur at different places through the field. Towards the southern side of the field, and extending E.N.E., is a belt of highly metamorphosed, gneiss

and quartzites with large masses of white opaque quartz. These rocks form a prominent feature of the landscape.

It is marked by high points, Kisa, Amshiri, Kulu, Kamungu, etc., on which boulders have been placed, as at many other places, for the assistance of prospectors. The conglomerates are most interesting rocks, and very generally show compositions similar at different places. They have a great development and possess many characteristics that long and intensive work upon them is necessary before they can be fully understood. At some places the rock is composed almost wholly of quartz in large pebbles of felspar porphyry, which decays to a clayey soil form, very fine in depth and leaves in evidence at or near the surface of its original character. At other places it consists mainly of large pebbles and boulders of quartzites in a siliceous matrix and forms black outcrops. Other exposures show it to be a mass of pebbles of felspar porphyry, but as highly silicified as to be unrecognizable with a good knife. It is well exposed on the surface, and the porphyry pebbles upon them are highly transparent and forms plainly visible, though completely silicified. This silicification of rocks is a noticeable feature in many parts of the field. In addition to zones of intense silicification, there are bands and steps of silicification, some of these in the stream-courses. Highly silicified slates and phyllites can be seen in many trenches. In some places the silicification of the veins and reefs associated with the altered rocks, showing the transition to the extreme stage of the process.

#### Igneous Rocks.

With regard to these rocks it should be borne in mind that the names given to them in this report are for general practical field-work. This section of them will have to be examined under the microscope before they can be definitely determined, and it is thus as seen in the accompanying table.

#### Mineralization of the Rocks

Extensive mineralogical work has been done with tentative remarks only on this question are made in this section of the report. From the evidence of the different kinds of quartz in the field and their associated rocks, it seems likely that the introduction of mineralizing solutions into the rocks was not confined to one of the periods referred to in this report, but may belong to several periods, and connected with the magmas of several of the intrusions into the field. There is evidence of greater porphyry of more than one kind, and granite.

#### Remarks on the Ridges.

The flat-topped ridges between the valleys are portions of an older plateau which at the western end of the field has an altitude of about 1,500 feet (some 900 feet higher than the present level of the shore of Lake Victoria), and at the eastern end from 5,100 feet to 3,500 feet. The main streams flow through valleys some 300 to 500 feet below the flanking ridges. These ridges are covered with red yellow soil to a depth of 10 to 20 feet, if not more. At a few places there are outcrops of rock, mainly coarse silicified conglomerates and quartzites, very few reefs of quartz, almost invariably non-surficial where exposed, and dykes of granite, gabbro, felspar porphyry and dolerite, with large boulders of granite in the granite areas. At the bottom of the soil layer and resting on the top of the dolerite underlying rocks there is usually a band of quartz derived from the veins and reefs in the field. The band varies in thickness from an inch to a foot or even more. At some places the quartz has been derived directly from the veins below, but at other places it has been transported slightly. Several occurrences were noted of definite erosion channels in the underlying rocks before the deposition of the surface material.

#### Mining Operations.

Mining operations consist of (1) digging the gravels of the streams, (2) prospecting for reefs of quartz and dolerite and the slopes into the main streams and their numerous tributaries, (3) working down to test the

underground reefs already discovered, and (4) crushing, by machine and hand, the quartz from such reefs.

#### ALLUVIAL WORKINGS.

##### How Gold Has Been Lost.

Among the greatest portions of some of the streams, containing the Isako and the Yala, and almost all of the smallest streams and gullies the contents generally consist of quartz to some 2 feet in thickness—some covered with a deposit from 2 feet to about 5 feet thick of dark bluish and black clay containing fine sand, and at some places a little fine gravel as well. This is covered with swamp grass. Showing openings are thus retained by the necessity for first draining the swampy area by cutting channels through the clay, and then removing the clay before the gravels can be treated.

The surficial gravel is then brought in big pans (baskets) from the working faces to the shams, put into the hoppers and panned, the larger pebbles being thrown out and the rest of the material cleaned. As most of the miners have had no previous practical experience of this work, there has been a serious loss of gold in many cases. This was due to—

- (1) unsuitability of shams, boxes, as to length, width and inclination for the volume of water being used;
- (2) losses being slightly tilted to one side or the other;
- (3) insufficient raking of gravel against the stream of water, thus leaving a ridge of it in the middle of the shams;
- (4) unsuitability of kind of riffle for the kind of concentrate from the material treated, thus causing much panning;
- (5) pebbles not being properly washed;
- (6) pieces of quartz being taken out and abandoned;
- (7) wash dirt and underlying clay from bottom not being carefully removed, and the same being used for that work;
- (8) big boulders and boulders being thrown on to worked ground and abandoned without being washed and the derived gravel and clay treated;
- (9) patches of stream-bed being left unworked at sides and under small pools;
- (10) neglecting to search for veins and reefs and reefs found during removal of gravel from bed of stream.

#### Advice Accepted.

All of these points were brought to the notice of the miners here and observed and the necessary advice given to them, with very pleasing results to many of them. At some places the alluvial deposits contain large pebbles and boulders of the local rocks embedded in slaty grey gravel. This is so, particularly at and between where the streams have cut through dykes of igneous rocks crossing their channels. At such places it is especially important that these large pieces of rock should be carefully cleaned of the attached gravelly clay, instead of being roughly thrown into heaps or some ground.


Some of the gold obtained by sluicing is coarse and fairly water-worn, a little is well rounded, a considerable proportion is rough gold, with quartz attached, wholly rough, or only very slightly worn. At such places in numbers of streams the gold is chiefly in small to very small grains, with only a few proportions of fairly coarse gold. It has the appearance of the gold obtained by crushing from some of the known rock reefs, and is strongly suggestive of derivation from reef or reefy of that kind, for it is not water-worn. From the extreme economy in grain of some of the gold in certain types of quartz, as will be indicated later in this report, the necessity for careful collection of it during sluicing is obvious.



# ERADICATION OF STOCK DISEASES.

## ACTIVITIES OF VETERINARY DEPARTMENT.

### Report on Last Year's Work.

#### SITUATION IN KENYA SHOWS MARKED IMPROVEMENT.

The situation with regard to the prevalence of stock disease in Kenya shows a marked improvement according to the report on the activities of the Kenya Veterinary Service during 1931. The control of the general incidence of disease, particularly underpest, may be said to be due to additional veterinary activities among the native stockowners in the reserves and the gradual reduction of native squatter stock.

In spite of the depression an advancement was made in the animal industry, and it is stated that the welfare there is a definite inclination towards dairying. It seems certain that in a few more decades the Colony will become overstocked unless better methods of animal husbandry are practised.

#### Increase in Dairying.

In the annual report for 1931 of the Kenya Department of Agriculture, Major H. H. Bennett, Deputy Director of Agriculture and Veterinary Officer, contributed an account of the work done in the Veterinary Division during the year.

Dealing with staff and administration the Deputy Director states that in accordance with the arrangement when drafting the 1931 departmental estimates, forty veterinary officers were provided for the service on the grounds of an increase in the number of animals which have been given to fill these various positions by younger men during 1931. During the year 29 appointments of veterinary officers were made to fill vacancies caused by transfers or retirement of officers. The maintenance and establishment of the staff are dealt with elsewhere.

In consequence of the desire to participate in mixed farming and the increased requirements for assistance from the native stockowners, many extra demands were made on the staff of the Administrative and Executive Division. In spite of the reduction and withdrawal of expatriate veterinary staff, the work of the Veterinary Division was carried out in a satisfactory manner.

#### Veterinary Policy

The policy of the staff to deal with veterinary problems is changing in the direction of refraining from the use of chemical material and the consequent creation of active foci of disease, and the emphasis is being placed on the use of veterinary research to report to the Government on the means of control as the ultimate objective.

#### Research

During the year the Veterinary Division continued, in addition to research on increased amounts of technical routine and diagnostic work, the following investigations: the preparation of serum diagnostic tests for several diseases, the application of blood and serum diagnostic tests to the detection of disease, and the investigation of the value of the existing laboratory facilities for the investigation of diseases of animals.

The practice of posting each veterinary field office to the laboratory for a short course, with a view to the maintenance of the most recent technique of diagnostic tests which could be carried out in the field, is being continued. It is at this time a fortunate circumstance that some foci of disease have been discovered in the reserves, but they have been eradicated by the application of the methods of control.

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#### Underpest

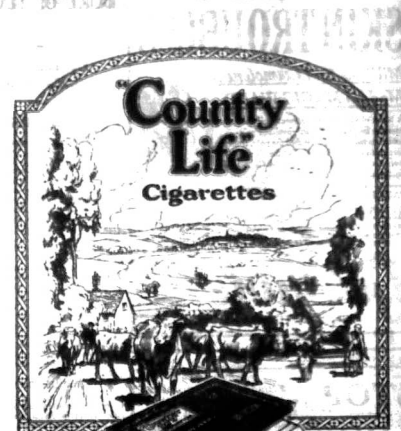

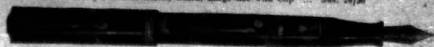
