ACTIONS OF COFFEE BOARD ENDORSED

Motion Disapproving of Control Decision Lost

No Confidence Resolution Withdrawn

THE first item on the agenda of the 1941 Coffee Conference, which was opened in the Memorial Hall, Nairobi, on Friday by H.E. the Governor, was the approval of the annual report and accounts of the Board. This matter was dealt with in the Chairman's speech and after an animated debate, the following resolution, moved on behalf of the Coffee Board from the Chair, and seconded by Mr. Conway, was passed by 25 yeas to 10 nays:

That the Conference approves the report and accounts of the Board for the year ended June 30, 1941.

The motion was opposed by Mr. T. A. Wood (Rhodesia), the Rhineland planters having lodged their objections, expressing in the first place strongest disapproval of the Board's actions in advocating control (in July 1940) and, in the second place, want of confidence in the Board as at present constituted.

Mr. Wood said he had no doubt that the Board had done its best, but there was strong disapproval of the past twelve months. Dealing with what he termed "the ancient history" of the Board he said that his impression was that it had been largely unproductive. The African and maintaining of a better policy of the Board. The African was protesting coffee in increasing quantities and the only chance for the future of the European planter was to produce coffee of better quality. In these circumstances, he suggested that one of the first actions of the Board was to walk into the London market and definitely upset it.

Strong Criticism

Planters had been getting better prices in London before the Board upon the market than they got afterwards. The next thing the Board did was to experiment with planters' money, on ready-produced coffee. Mr. Wood also criticised the Board's policy of looking to the United States as the sole market for Kenya coffee when a local dealer had at that time proved that there was a potentially valuable and developing market in Australia.

The speaker contended that in the first instance of July 1940, urging the imposition of control and the placing of the Board's staff at the disposal of the Control—had the Board been satisfied that there were no consulting planters as a whole then taking such action.

He contended that the Board had duty to planters, in the same way that the Board of Directors of a Company had to consult the shareholders before disposing of their property or assets.

Had there been a few active coffee planters in Kenya at that time—when, of course, there are not—had he thought that they would have succeeded, had they applied to the Court for a Writ of Mandamus against the Board. Certainly the Board should not have taken such action.

Not Individual Cases

In reply to a question, Mr. Wood emphasized that they were not sitting at individuals and the motion was aimed at the constitution of the Board and not at its personnel.

Major R. F. Ward (Coffee Board) said he felt that more full and better informed staff was far more important than those which had been given. He stressed the undoubted fact that the 1939 Coffee Conference had indicated that there was a decided business among planters regarding the possible effect of the war on the coffee industry. They had then expressed their views to the Board. The Board would watch the position with great interest and, where possible, at the right moment, for the protection of the industry.

He emphasized that there had been an attempt to British rearmament after Dunkirk and said that it was not possible to obtain Government rearmament without the consent had control over the product regarding which they had no direct interest.

The situation here following the collapse of France and the entry of Italy into the war had been very different from that now prevailing and the Board had had to take prompt action. The Time Factor

Mr. W. H. Guinness (Coffee Board) said that if the Coffee Board had taken as long to make up its mind with regard to control as the present opponents to it had taken to make up theirs, the industry would have been in a state of chaos. At the 1940 Conference, with the Board's motions before it had voted no opposition and even the present opponents to the Control were a majority submitting an alternative scheme of control themselves.

Mr. A. H. P. French (Kimberly) said that there was no doubt that dissatisfaction existed. He thought that the Board had shown too much haste in disposing of their motion. He was in favour of some form of control, but was opposed to the way in which they had been done. He said, however, that they had been done in the past season. Comparative Coffee Prices

During the course of the Chairman's report at Friday's Kenya Coffee Conference reference was made to the fact that average prices from Tanganyika and Uganda were higher than those from Kenya. Mr. Turton, asked if any information could be given, on this subject.
