Apart from the threat to Singapore a bastion of the greatest strategic and economic importance, the Japanese advance down the Malayan Peninsula deprives the Allies of a most important source of rubber supply. Mr. Winston Churchill rarely gives an optimistic prophecy, has predicted that Singapore will not fall. But a number of the rubber plantations in the Japanese hands and more are seriously threatened. There have been rather vague reports that a "scorched-earth" policy has been applied by our retreating forces. Whether that be so or not, it is likely that the Japanese before they are driven out by our avenging armies. In the meantime the Japanese exploit to the utmost the rubber plantations which fall into their hands. We must assume, therefore, that the supply of rubber, available to the Allies from Malaya, will be radically restricted and may cease to flow. There are other sources of supply. Malaya is the centre of the largest plantation rubber area in the Empire.

Until 1918 no rubber was almost entirely obtained from the tropical forests of South and Central America and West Africa, and a South American tree of enormous increase in demand, caused by the advent of the motor-car, led, firstly, to the reckless exploitation and destruction—notably in the Southern Sudan—of great areas of wild rubber, and, secondly, to the development of plantation rubber which had great advantages of reduced cost and more efficient methods of production. The second and third sources of rubber do not crumble in a nation's war potential. Germany has driven far too far on synthetic rubber tyres; and certain American tyre factories have devoted much attention to the development of synthetic rubber. Nevertheless, the loss of Malayan rubber must complicate the prosecution of a war in which so much depends on superiority of mechanized equipment. All available supplies of rubber will be required

On the outdoor and ploughing and planting on the contour will give some protection to the soil. The best lands are being broken and brought under crop. It will be quite easy to leave strips of ground on the contour and these will be found to be very effective in preventing soil wash. The best use for an acre of cultivation, while this business present in the soil, is to plant the first two or three crops, but let us make up our minds to do this as early as possible. 

BATTLE OF ATLANTIC

No Doubt About Ascendancy

London, January 5.

A leading article in the Times on the emergency situation, states: "Mr. Churchill told a press conference in Ottawa that the sea shipping lanes in the Atlantic during the past few months had been the most important of those in the preceding period of the war's length. The course of the battle of the seas will illustrate the part of the seas in April that they had indeed acted as a dangerous base for a whole year before that, ever since the French collapse in May and June 1940 had left us generally short of escorts for the convoys. The enemy found means to conduct that he could, however, if he were to employ a more technical of course attack—the 'wolfpack'—whereby, instead of making single attacks at short range, the U-boats would in parties of six or more attack a convoy, and thereby avoid the danger of being detected by the escorts. The U-boats after dark covered up their quarry by the surface, and then struck from well outside an area that could be covered by an escort of night strength.

"The number of convoys of merchant ships that are now being escorted is a record, and the enemy has developed the use of long-range radio-wave detectors not only for direct attack, but also for collaboration with the U-boats. By this means the rate of destruction has been maintained at a high level for months more until some more effective means of the new weapons was evolved and put into service. How effective the outfit has proved is now made manifest. The convoys which figured in the latest Admiralty announcement consisted of over 100 ships. It was attacked with great determination and tenacity over a period of five days. Yet an effective force of escorts that in more than two merchant ships were lost. EUROPEANS WIN AT PARKLANDS

Good Bowling By Kadir And Smith America's War Reactions

THE Europeans and the Asians had a good match at Parklands last night when some really good cricket was witnessed. The Europeans won by 100 runs five minutes before time. Bowling on both sides was interesting. Smith taking five wickets in each innings, while Kadir, for the Asians, had seven wickets in the innings.

The war-winning reaction of the reports from America up to the time of writing—December 31—has been the news that all observers have laid on the political unity which has been created by Japan's invasion and unprovoked assault. American opinion seems to have passed through three stages in its opinion on the matter. The first news of the Japanese raid on Pearl Harbor, Honolulu and other bases in the Hawaiian Islands, caused a shocked incredulous surprise and bewilderment to many people—and not only to Americans—it was utterly unbelievable.

The legend Vanishes. Almost as rapidly that over confidence which the Japanese had caused the extent of the damage which the Japanese had inflicted by the daring ferocity of their attack. The legend of the invulnerability of the American Continent and the safety of the West Coast—statements which were quite genuine even though it may eventually be found that no hostile aircraft were within two thousand miles of America at the time. And when Winston Churchill announced in the House of Commons the loss of H.M.S. Prince of Wales and of H.M.S. Repulse which were in Japanese hands, the news of the damage done to the U.S.A. Pacific fleet in the lightning raid on Pearl Harbor.

The station of hot anger was replaced by grim determination and slow rage. It was in the mood of anger that the two houses of Congress met on Monday to pass only one resolution—the declaration of war upon Japan. But when the Houses gathered on Thursday, only four days later, to vote a unanimous declaration of war on Germany and Italy, it had already reached the mood of controlled, determined rage. The result of the fight of events made their impact felt on the American consciousness.

It would take too long to recount here all, or even the major evidence of the widespread political unity in the American people which have been appearing in the last few weeks. The cessation of labour trouble; the rush of donations to the United States Red Cross; the rush of the United States Army, Navy and Marine Corps; the recommitment by Lindbergh the unanimity of press and radio; these two voices of America. Suffice it that America is in a mood of unity which has never been before in her history and is a "solid" existence as an independent nation.

That is a political fact which in its implications for the future far outweighs the military and naval successes which Japan has achieved in the surprise of her attack. It is a fact which has been the first stimulus of a widespread awakening among themselves, suddenly aware that the American people were not being distracted from the main issue of the war. Japan has not provided the political distraction which Hitler hoped. The American people have fallen into the trap of regarding Japan as their main enemy. They see the news of her attack as but one arm of the Titanian grip which is trying to engulf the world in its tiny embrace. They have lost sight of the fact that the back of the main of the empire is Britain.

This, which it came about as an anti-climax after the excitement of the American people and was crowded out of the headlines by action reports from the fighting in the American declaration of war by Hitler and Mussolini, was outstandingly a major political event in its way transcending in importance even the German attack on Russia in its ultimate effects upon the course of world events.

For America it now no longer a collection of forty-eight States, but a well-organized portion of the Western Hemisphere, no longer even a collection of States which are enabled her to stand aloof. America is part of the world.

 When he joined Mandeville he became famous for "producing ghosts" on the stage. An American once asked for a ghost he could take back to America.
 A medium once held him up and demanded him to produce money out of nowhere, and make me the richest man in the world."
 In 1925-26 he held the height of his fame—David Dewant had retired. Paralytic made those magic hands useless, but he was still an inveterate as ever in magic. Every year numbers of the Magic Circle went to his bedside to show him their best tricks.

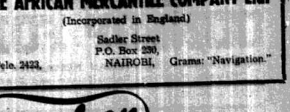

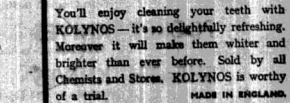

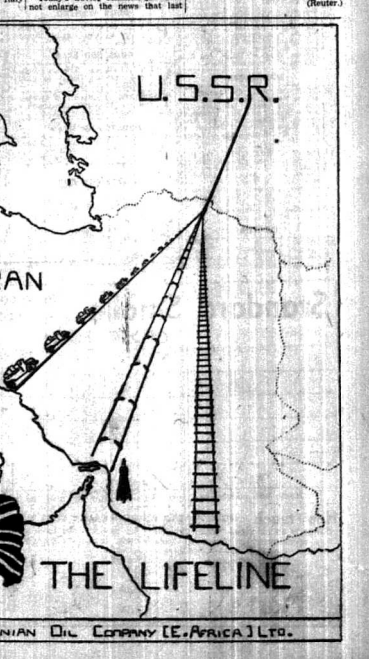
