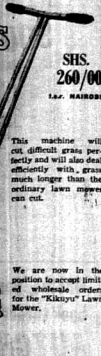

Chancellor urges Europe to increase trade

FIRM ON GOLD DECISION

MR. R. A. BUTLER, Chancellor of the Exchequer, has called on Europe to increase its Continental trade rather than gold transactions to bridge the gap between debtors and creditors. "We want more trade, not more gold payments," he told the Ministerial Council of the Organisation for European Economic Co-operation at the opening of a two-day session in Paris.

The main object of the meeting is to seek a formula by which the gold payments of the Continent's industrial nations could be reduced. The Chancellor's proposal is to set up a committee to study the problem. He said that the United Kingdom is prepared to accept a reduction in its gold payments to the Continent of 10 per cent.

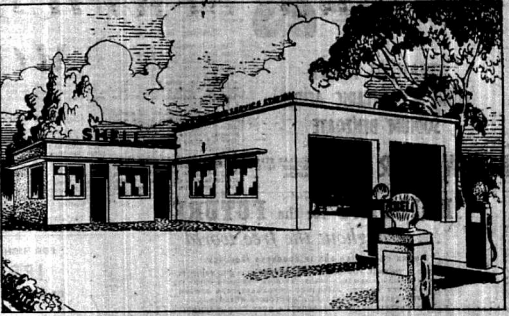

100,000,000 CARRY ON RED CROSS TRADITION

Help for Kenya work sought

ONE HUNDRED years ago the appalling sufferings of the sick and wounded in the Crimean and the heroic work of Florence Nightingale stirred public opinion in England.
Ten years later the Geneva Convention was signed and today more than 100,000,000 people throughout the world wear the Red Cross badge.

Against such a background and with an ever-growing need for their services the British Red Cross Society will be carrying out its work throughout Kenya tomorrow.

Her example

In 1854 in the Crimea there were not even the simplest provisions to treat the sick and wounded of a large army. Miss Nightingale, deeply interested in hospital work, volunteered to go to the Crimea with one from the Secretary of War leaving her to do so.

She set out with a staff of 37 nurses and they reached Scutari in time to receive the wounded in the hospital which she had to establish in a day or two by 600 of the brightest pages of English history.

Her example was followed by Miss Nightingale's labours. She would stand for 20 hours at a stretch to see the wounded accommodated; regularly took her place in the operating room to comfort the sufferers and at night, lamp in hand, made her military rounds of the wards.

Stayed at post

Soon she had charge of 10,000 wounded all the long way to the Bosphorus. In February, 1855, she died of fever in Turkey, before long the figure was set by law as 12.

Prostrated with fever, Miss Nightingale refused to leave her post and remained until Turkey was evacuated by the British in July, 1856.
London prepared to give her a national reception but she returned quietly in a French ship and occupied her country home.
Although she neglected posture to make her patient in selflessness task, Miss Nightingale had a natural feeling for society and was permanently affected by her terrible mission. Her quiet life afterwards led was full of

The Red Cross knows no racial barrier. This African "hero" who has written a message, like a son of Florence, on whom the Society's workers appear only a kindly eye.

With 250,000 raised in recognition of her services she founded the Nightingale Institute for training nurses in England, Scotland, and South Africa.

She helped some hospitals and nursing reform and in 1868 she was appointed "Honorary Lady" an enormous distinction.

Frequently she was commended for her services by King Edward VII and she died in London in August, 1910.

Swiss interest

Marie Henri Dunant, a Swiss, was interested in Miss Nightingale's achievements. In 1863 he formed the Red Cross in Switzerland. It was the first of the Red Cross societies in the world.

His terrible suffering impressed him so profoundly that he returned to Switzerland determined to rouse public opinion. From this came the Geneva Convention, signed in 1864 by 16 European States.
The principle was established that it was the duty of Governments to collect and care for the sick and wounded, whatever their nationality.
The flag of Switzerland, a red cross on a white ground, was reversed and the red cross on a white ground became the symbol of neutrality.

Emergency work

In 1870 the British Red Cross Society was formed and in 1918 came the League of Red Cross Societies, making between 60 and 70 national societies.

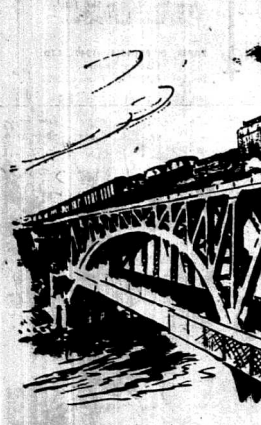

Naivasha approves scheme

A PLAN for closer administration of Africans in the settled areas submitted in a memorandum by Mr. Humphrey Slade, Member for Abercrombie in Kenya Legislative Council, was unanimously approved by Naivasha County Council yesterday. The plan is to tighten discipline among Africans in the Colony and to recover their respect and confidence.

The idea of the memorandum, said Mr. Slade in his covering letter, was to gain the support of the Council for the general objective and organization of the scheme. The Council approved the memorandum after the District Commissioner, Mr. Tannahill, had stated that he had received instructions from the W. Council to implement some of its proposals.

"It is apparent," states the memorandum, "that both in the present stage of the Emergency and for a long time after the cessation of open hostilities, we must undertake and promote in a difficult struggle for the restoration of discipline among Africans in this Colony and for the recovery of their respect and confidence."

Local check

"Close administration is resented by many as a necessary incident. If not the principal cause, it is a solution of this problem. It has been established already by some extent that the Kikuyu, Meru and Embu Reserves, and well understood to be intended there as a mere precautionary measure in order to be able to deal with any emergency which is concerned with closer administration of the settled areas and more particularly, the County Council of Naivasha County Council areas."

"Dealing there with closer administration in these areas," it would suggest that the general objective must be localisation of administration, with active employment therein in favour of European and African residents.

Five points

"This would have the purpose of—

- (1) Establishing closer contact between the Government and Africans, through European and African workers there, over a long period, and through local leaders in contact with them.
- (2) Providing a 'level cut to the ground' as soon as the present phase of emergency is ended, to detect and remove promptly all signs of any further development of subversive activity.
- (3) Developing religious, educational and social facilities, and encouraging local voluntary efforts in that respect.

Protest over scheme to resettle Kikuyu

Not persuaded

The 100-strong meeting of settlers had been convened to show Mr. T. M. Mumbo, District Commissioner, Kilimo, to south of the 'way' for the Kikuyu settlement by explaining that their loyalty was above question. Their settlers were not persuaded.

The scheme was considered highly intricate in view of the large labour force comprising more than 20,000 African of various ages and professions working in this area, who are now to be uprooted and resettled. Further repatriation was called for.

Thoroughly vetted

The Government spokesman said yesterday that the Kikuyu plan to be resettled in Kilimo District was not to be thought of in terms of those Kikuyu at the settlement camp at Kilimo, the vast of them in the resettled area. There was absolutely no reason for the settlers to be worried about the resettlement scheme. All these things in the Kilimo District had been thoroughly vetted and there could be no doubts of their complete loyalty, symbolised by their long service.

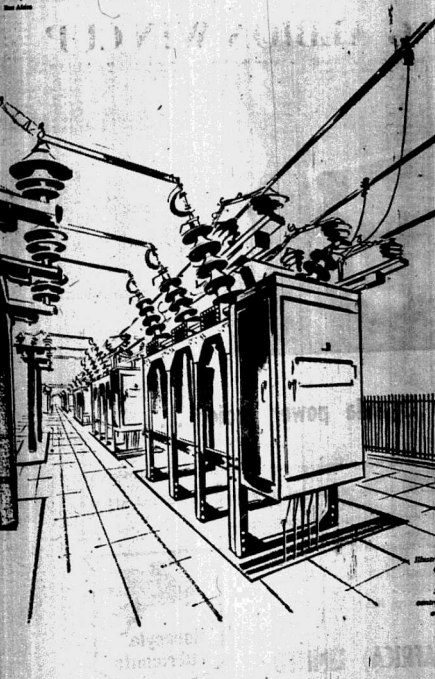

Miniature town

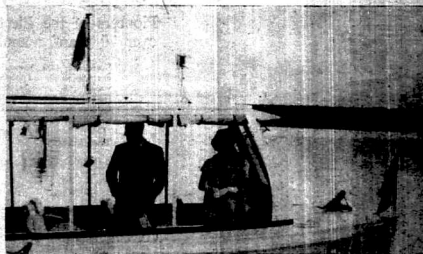

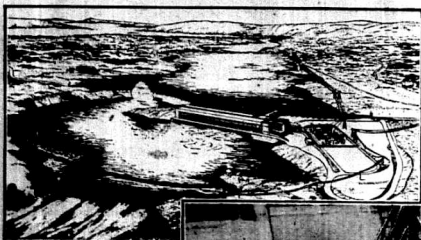

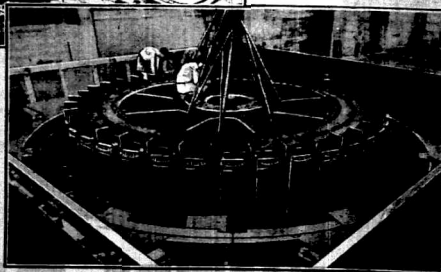

DIEN BIEN PHU fell yesterday it was announced in Paris. M. Joseph Laniel, French Prime Minister, told the French Assembly that the fortress had fallen after 20 hours continuous fighting. The Communists attack was said to be one of the fiercest since the siege started 37 days ago. Shock troops in the area were ordered to overrun these strong points which cover the underground command post of Gen. Christian de Catrice.

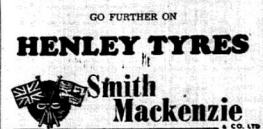
