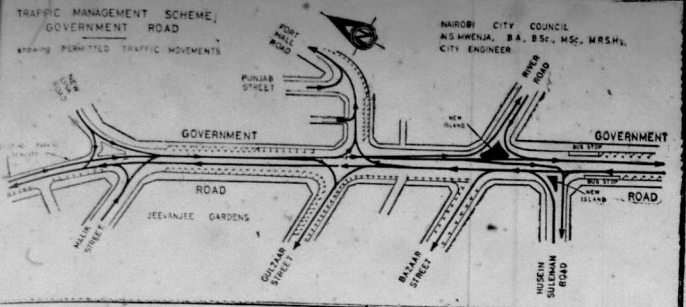
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New traffic scheme for Government Road

In the next few weeks the Nairobi City Engineer's Department will be putting into operation a traffic management scheme on Government Road between the junctions with Hussein Suleiman Road and the new link road from Fort Hall Road Roundabout, the Town Clerk, Mr. J. P. Mbogua, announced yesterday.

He said this stretch of Government Road, and particularly the junction with River Road and Bazaar Street was one of the most congested parts of the central area in the peak hours.

The opening of the new link road to Fort Hall Road roundabout, and the gyratory system on

Government Road and Victoria Avenue, had provided good alternative routes to the various cross and right-turn movements at River Road and Bazaar Street. These would not now be available.

Fort Hall Road from Government Road to Fort Hall Road roundabout will become one way towards the roundabout, subject to the decision of council on any objections raised by the public.

The carriage-way of Government Road will be marked out to ensure rapid and free movement of traffic in all the permitted directions.

The public who normally make the cross movement from River Road to Bazaar Street are advised to use the new link road from Fort Hall Road roundabout to Government Road and then to

turn right into Gulzair Street. Motorists who now turn right into River Road from Government Road should turn right at Fort Hall Road. If they have come up Government Road from Queensway, then they should turn right at Coryndon Street.

Motorists who turn right into Bazaar Street from Government Road are very few in number and there are a large variety of alternative routes depending on their origin. The right turn from Hussein Suleiman Road to Government Road will be permanently banned from henceforth.

Motorists wishing to turn right out of River Road into Government Road should use the new link road.

The scheme is designed to be on a permanent basis and it is hoped will dispose of congestion at this traffic black-spot for some time to come.

Alterations are to be made to Government Road in Nairobi to reduce the danger of accidents and speed the flow of traffic. The above diagram shows the new routes for traffic which are explained on the right.

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ADMINISTERING JUSTICE IN KENYA

The speed of a referee

This is a condensed version of a speech made by Chief Justice Kiiki Mwenda at the Annual Meeting of the Judiciary at Kabete on Thursday.

The Kenya nation at the very outset of attaining independence decided to make justice our shield and defender.

The prerequisites to attaining the goal of justice as the shield and defender are, essentially, three: (a) A democratic Government...

(b) A sovereign Parliament that is geared towards the just government of men.

(c) An independent Judiciary that acts without fear or favour, and with a recognition and acceptance by each of the three institutions of State, namely, Government, Parliament and Judiciary...

The Kenya Constitution has gone as far as is practicable to provide for women seats for these prerequisites.

At the time of Kenyan independence, the Kenya Judiciary was a small court system under four heads of courts: the High Court, the District Courts, the Magistrates Courts and the Kaduna Courts.

It is desirable that persons of a dishonest cast of mind should be made aware that, against the great rewards they may obtain as a result of successful litigation, they are likely to be subjected to a sentence of imprisonment which carries the death penalty.

The purpose for which laws are made, created and set up is to deter those who water between the life of honesty (which is paid) and the life of dishonesty (which is rewarded) from opting for the latter.

Protection of the Public: In any system of law, the protection of the public is the primary concern. It is the duty of the law to protect the public from crime.

Reformation: A criminal, although he has broken the law, should be a member of society for which he lives. It is the duty of the law to reform the criminal.

The course which will achieve the best results is to reform the criminal and will particularly depend on his previous history and character.

The law makes express provision so that, after conviction, the convicted person may receive any sentence which he may wish to accept.

Who is responsible for it? The former colonial Powers, who continue to detain their own terms with strings attached. It is no secret that the White countries still dominate the world.

It is imperative that Africa was a large production of a well-developed economy and that it was able to develop a modern civilization as early as the rest of the world.

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The justification for the retention of this element in modern judicial thinking is the consideration of the public or the injured party believes that a criminal on conviction will suffer nothing proportionate to the harm he has inflicted on his victim.

The element of deterrence has played a big part in the punishment of criminals in many countries. For example, in England, as late as the 17th century, the punishment for theft was death.

Kenya ready for General Election

NEW COMMISSION

Kenya is set for next year's General Election with the Government promising to hold a referendum on the subject of the country's future status.

The announcement followed a meeting between the Prime Minister, Mr. J. M. Kenyatta, and the members of the Electoral Commission.

The Commission is expected to undertake a major review of the country's constituencies after receiving demographic and population information from next month's population census in Kenya.

The review of the commission, announced by the President in a statement, will be completed by the end of the year. It will be followed by a revision of the Voters Roll and an increase in the number of seats in the National Assembly.

The former chairman of the commission, Mr. Humphrey Slaye, is understood to have resigned and is expected to be replaced by a new chairman.

The present Parliament is expected to be dissolved in the next few months. A specially elected or nominated assembly will then be formed to prepare the new constitution.

The Ministry of Agriculture explained that the control of the disease caused by the insect is difficult and it was thought easier to do away with the trees where the insect is present.

The ban is effective to all citrus trees in the Mbagua area.

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Work finished

The Teachers' Service Remuneration Committee has completed its work and forwarded its recommendations to the Minister for Education.

The committee has recommended a 5% increase in the salaries of teachers and a 10% increase in the salaries of head teachers.

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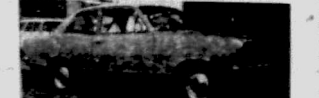

Hanoi denies war is being de-escalated

North Vietnamese and Vietcong delegations appeared to have implicitly denied at the Paris peace talks American claims that they could possibly be de-escalating the war in South Vietnam.

Whether South Vietnam agreed or not with the United States that there had been a recent drop in military activity, and infiltrations was a question that produced middle and confusion at Press briefings after the 24th session of the talks.

Asked daily whether their armed forces were scaling down the war, spokesmen for both Hanoi and the Vietcong Revolutionary Government answered in more or less the same way.

"The United States is untruthful and treacherous. Our people will continue to fight for their independence, the Revolutionary Government spokesman stated.

The United States Secretary of State Mr. William Rogers stated on a drop in infiltration and level of combat had been a device to cap off the United States' negotiation of the war was not clear.

The Hanoi delegate spokesman said he was doing as the United States wishes but that the Vietnamese people will firmly resist this aggression.

He added, "We don't know enough yet."

Some American and South Vietnamese military spokesmen reported yesterday that military activity throughout the country had continued to decrease.

Nine Vietcong artillery bombardments were reported throughout Thursday and during the night of Thursday and Friday.

A First Air Cavalry position in Tay Ninh Province, 25 miles northwest of Saigon, where some thirty mortar shells were said to have caused serious damage.

Only three engagements were reported for Thursday throughout the whole of South Vietnam. All three were in the area immediately northwest of the capital.

The three left 41 Vietcong dead and five American wounded. On Thursday night American B-52 bombers flew 10 missions, eight around Saigon and two in the high plateau region in the centre of the country.

The American military command gave American deaths since October 1968 as 26,500 wounded.

Since the Vietnam peace talks began in Paris a year ago nearly 14,000 American troops had been killed and 55,500 wounded.

In Washington a State Department spokesman refused comment on reports from Hanoi that North Vietnam had withdrawn about three regiments, numbering 50,000 men, from South Vietnam.

Observers regarded the reports as potentially significant because of the severity of the military situation in Vietnam was responding positively to President Nixon's recent announcement that the U.S. was pulling 20,000 American soldiers out of the country at 10 per cent of total U.S. strength in Vietnam.

The President's speech called on the Hanoi Government to make a similar gesture, when he made his announcement.

PORTUGUESE BOMB ZAMBIA AGAIN

Portuguese military aircraft dropped 24 bombs on a Zambian village near Mozambique after being ordered by Mozambique on Thursday in the second of similar attacks on the Zambian Defence Ministry announced on Thursday night.

The village, known as the village of Luanda, in the Kafue District of Eastern Province, near the border with Portuguese Mozambique, was the target of the attack.

At least two women were killed in the raid.

In Luanda a High Court judge ordered sentences for two Portuguese soldiers accused of illegally entering Zambia from Angola.

The judge said that the two soldiers had been charged completely by the court.

The judge also sentenced the sentence of the two Portuguese soldiers said in court he was "astonished at the severity of the sentences. It is my plain duty to interfere."

He added the magistrate seemed to have sentenced them on a whim and had not given sufficient weight to evidence given in their defence.

The Zambian Government said that in the latest raid the four Portuguese planes dropped the 24 bombs over a wide area.

The Portuguese dropped their bombs widely from very high altitudes as they feared Zambian fighters in the deadly machine-gun fire of the Zambian troops, it said.

The Permanent Secretary at the Defence Ministry, Mr. Sylvester Mawewe, said the attacks are completely senseless in that the targets are innocent, peaceful women and children to whom no harm would be done by the terrorists.

He added, "Zambia will definitely make sure that the Portuguese planes are shot down at a rate of one out of every five."

Guyana holds protesters

Guyana police yesterday stamped the highest security net in the country and had not given sufficient weight to evidence given in their defence.

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In a press conference statement, SWAPO president, Mr. Sam Nujoma, said South Africa also wanted to show the world and the United Nations that SWAPO would defy the world body with impunity through terrorism.

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Mr. Nujoma said the Windhoek trial should not be misinterpreted as SWAPO's intention to dispose hostile to any yielding to international pressure.

Kenya is set for next year's General Election with the announcement yesterday by President Kenyatta of new members of the Electoral Commission.

The commission is expected to undertake a major review of the country's demographics after receiving demographic information from next month's population census in Kenya.

The names of the commissioners announced by the President in yesterday's Kenya Gazette are: Chairman, Mr. B. M. Oguni, the chairman of the Kenya National Council of University College; Mr. N. J. Montgomery, announced last month that Kenya's Electoral Roll would be revised in September to allow those who had not registered to do so.

The board of inquiry into a dispute between the Kenya Commission and the Kenya Commercial Motorists' and Allied Workers' Union resumed full work yesterday amid allegations of discrimination in a work study report and union members' refusal to attend the firm by a Nairobi advocate.

Mr. Otieno was speaking for the union after it had changed its mind on asking the board to boycott any further proceedings unless their demand for the production of a work study report was met or unless they were given an adjournment to seek legal advice.

The High Court ruling on the matter.

The union members remained adamant on the issue. The board chairman, Mr. G. G. S. Munira, said that the union members and one K.M.C. member appear before the board as individual witnesses to enable the board to carry out its functions.

However, the inquiry took a new turn ten days ago when the union agreed to carry on with discussions. Mr. Otieno then took over the case and the board chairman, Mr. Mubanjali, began conducting his case.

Mr. Otieno told the board yesterday that it had improperly refused to allow his witnesses to give evidence and that the K.M.C. was refusing to produce it.

He said that the union had given a sworn statement to that effect and then produced it for consideration by the board.

He claimed that the union had properly applied for its production and added that the union still maintained that the report was the cause of union members' dissatisfaction.

Referring to the first part of the union's memorandum, Mr. Otieno said that the union had in salaries, medical facilities, welfare and housing allowances between management staff and union members was the main cause of the dispute.

He said there was an open gap in terms of salaries between the two groups on the board. He pointed out that the management staff received a minimum of £30 per month, while union members received no more than £10 per month.

It was pointed out under such discrimination there could be no understanding in the K.M.C. He pointed out that the management staff were allowed leave overseas because of their huge salaries while union members could not have those rights.

He also pointed out that under the medical scheme, management staff had this facility extended to their families while union members had nothing of that sort and had to pay for Government dispensaries when they fell sick.

On contracts, he said that the management staff were given large amounts of money in gratuities and were allowed to extend their contracts.

On a further discrimination claim against the management, Mr. Otieno asserted that management staff had a club of their own, which union members could not join.

"This practice is outdated in Kenya and against the Constitution. Union members cannot go in even if they have money," he added.

FOOD WORKERS THREATEN STRIKE

The Kenya Union of Commercial, Food and Allied Workers has threatened a country-wide strike action by its 70,000 members if the Government does not improve the country's services in the commercial, food and other sectors.

In a letter to the general manager of the Agricultural Finance Corporation, the union's secretary-general, Mr. G. S. Mubanjali, has served the corporation with strike action in the event of the receipt of the letter or alleged refusal by the firm to recognize the union. The letter was dated July 3.

The letter accused the management of the corporation of the serious manner in which it had dispensed with the services of one employee and also with the suspension of another employee.

A leading union official said that at the expiry of the seven days, the union would call the 48 members of the union employed by the corporation on strike, and might call a sympathy strike by about 70,000 members of the union.

An official from the union declined to comment on the grounds that the corporation had not received the letter. There would be a meeting next Monday by which one of the agenda would be consideration of the suspended employee.

He added that the question of recognition had been the subject of a long correspondence between the corporation and the union, and had not been settled yet.

A C.O.U. spokesman said: "C.O.U. will always give support to any action in a fight for recognition by employees."

He added that C.O.U. would see to it that all machinery had been exhausted between the union and the corporation before strike action is taken.

Dispute hearing 20 years, strokes for robbery with violence

Three men were yesterday sentenced to a total of 60 years imprisonment and 24 strokes each by a Nairobi magistrate, Mr. F. P. Simpson, who found them guilty of robbery with violence and theft of a motor vehicle.

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Hanoi denies war is being de-escalated

North Vietnamese and Vietcong delegations appeared to have implicitly denied at the Paris peace talks American claims that they could possibly be de-escalating the war in South Vietnam.

Whether South Vietnam agreed or not with the United States that there had been a recent drop in military activities and infiltrations was a question that produced middle and confusion at the talks.

Asked flatly whether their armed forces were scaling down the war, a spokesman for both Hanoi and the Vietcong Revolutionary Government answered in more or less the same way.

"The United States is stubborn and intransigent. Our people will continue to fight for their independence," the Revolutionary Government spokesman stated.

The Secretary of State Mr. William Rogers' statement on the Vietcong infiltration and stale of combat had been a device to camouflage the United States' intensification of the war, he added.

The Hanoi delegation's intensification of the war, the Vietnamese people will firmly oppose this aggression."

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PORTUGUESE BOMB ZAMBIA AGAIN

Portuguese military aircraft dropped 24 bombs on a Zambian village near the frontier with Mozambique on Thursday night.

The series of similar raids, the Zambian Defence Ministry announced on Thursday night.

It said none of the villagers was injured but one hut was damaged.

The raids started on Monday when Portuguese planes bombed the border with Mozambique in the Kolate district of Eastern Province, near the border with Portuguese Mozambique.

On Wednesday two Portuguese planes again entered Zambian airspace near Lote and turned back for Mozambique after being engaged by Zambian ground forces.

In Lusaka a High Court Judge quashed sentences on two Portuguese soldiers accused of illegally entering Zambia on Angola on June 16. Both were discharged completely by the court.

Mr Justice Evans reviewed the sentences and said that the Portuguese soldiers, said in court to be a lieutenant and a sergeant, had fined them each about £11,000 with an alternative of two years' imprisonment for illegal entry into Zambia.

Mr Justice Evans said: "I am shocked at the severity of the sentences if it is my duty to interfere."

He added the magistrate seemed to have sentenced them on a wrong principle and had not given sufficient weight to evidence of mitigation.

He charged the two men and said it was up to immigration officials to take any action they saw fit. The men had so far served 18 days of their sentences.

The Zambian Government said that in the latest raid the four Portuguese planes dropped the 24 bombs and were met with impunity. The Portuguese dropped their bombs from a high altitude as they feared to be caught in the deadly machine-gun fire of the Zambian troops.

The Permanent Secretary at the Defence Ministry, Mr. Peter Mavuso, said: "The attacks are completely senseless in that the targets are innocent, peaceful women and children. It is inhuman to use bombs and other terrorist measures by terrorise peace-loving villagers."

He added: "Zambia will certainly make these intruding thieves of life and property pay back at a time of our own choosing."

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Guyana holds protesters

Guyana police yesterday clamped the tightest security on in the country's history on Georgetown on Thursday night.

Police in Guyana held 24 protesters, including the Guyana Governor, Mr. Nelson Rockefeller, due to start last night.

The protesters' convoy was arriving from Jamaica, where his house was on fire on Sunday.

The protesters, who were arrested before Jamaica, protests against his visit, erupted into a riot between police and demonstrators in which three people died.

Police in Georgetown already have taken some P.P.P. members into detention. The Police Commissioner, Mr. Carl Austin, said security arrangements would be far stricter than those employed during the visit there in 1966 of Queen Elizabeth II.

The left-wing Progressive Youth Organisation (P.Y.O.) charged that Mr. Rockefeller's visit "will only serve to step up the exploitation rate and the sting of Yankee greed on our backs."

The ruling elite in the United States was exploiting Latin America daily, the organisation added in a statement issued by chairman, Mr. Vincent Geckah.

Governor Rockefeller's talks during the visit will cover defence matters and financial assistance for setting up television in Guyana and building a new general hospital for the city.

CIVIL RIGHTS LEADER FRED

The Negro civil rights leader, the Rev. Ralph Abernethy, who is awaiting trial on a charge of inciting a riot, left jail in Charleston, South Carolina, yesterday and immediately called for a settlement of the city's week-old hospital dispute.

Mr. Abernethy, leader of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and successor to the Rev. Martin Luther King, was jailed after organising support for strikers from two Charleston hospitals.

The dispute at one of the two, Medical College Hospital, ended with an agreement between management and workers last Friday, but Negro workers, suffering civilians in Baffin in the wake of the dispute between the Lagos Government and the International Committee of the Red Cross.

TRIAL 'meant to intimidate Africans'

The South West Africa People's Organisation (SWAPO) yesterday accused South Africa of holding a terrorist trial at Windhoek, capital of the territory, to intimidate it people.

Eight SWAPO members are alleged to be charged under the Terrorism Act, which was passed in 1967 to give the South West African administration in favour of a SWAPO-banned.

In a press conference statement in Lusaka, SWAPO's president, Mr. Sam Nujoma, said South Africa is also wanted to show the world and the African continent that she could defy the world body with impunity through its *de facto* administration of South West Africa, also known as Namibia.

The U.N. has terminated South Africa's right to administer the territory, originally granted by the League of Nations after the First World War.

Mr. Nujoma said the Windhoek trial should not be misconstrued as South African willingness to dispense justice or as any yielding to international pressure exerted during the Pretorial trial, which ended last year of 37 other SWAPO members.

"On the contrary, the Windhoek trial is meant to intimidate the Namibian people into submitting to South African authority," he added.

Armed men maul off after three hours' fire in city centre

Standard Staff Reporters

A gunman assassinated Mr. Mboya in lower Government Road, Nairobi, this afternoon. Mr. Mboya, Kenya's 38-year-old Minister for Economic Planning and Development, was shot three times in the chest at close range as he walked out of a chemist's shop. He was dead on arrival at Nairobi Hospital.

Hundreds of uniformed police and Special Branch were drafted into the city centre area to control the thousands of stunned shoppers and bystanders, many of whom were weeping.

According to eye-witnesses, a car which had previously stopped near Mr. Mboya's parked car, drove off at speed soon after the shot had been heard. Mr. Mboya had walked into Chahni's Chemists and stayed about ten minutes to buy medicine.

The director of the shop, Mrs. Mohini Sehmi, shocked and weeping, told Pressmen she was standing at the doorway having escorted the Minister from the shop and was chatting to him as he started to move to his car. As Mr. Mboya climbed into the car he had bought the house in "very rapid succession two or three shots".

"Mr. Mboya staggered back against the wall of the shop, I pulled him back into the shop, he staggered and fell down. He did not utter a word. It was, oh, very terrible, and it was just near his right shoulder. The bullets must have just missed him."

Mrs. Sehmi remembered seeing the face of a person and also a black car which had stopped outside the shop shooting off.

Another eye witness, Dr. Nazari, "I heard two shots," he said. "The Minister immediately collapsed, fell back into the shop, breaking one of the bottles of medicine he had bought."

The Minister was driving his Mercedes with a "CM" plate and the Kenya flag flying on the bonnet.

A doctor at Nairobi Hospital confirmed that Mr. Mboya was dead on arrival from haemorrhage caused by bullet wounds in the chest.

The Minister's personal effects were closed by officers with high-ranking officials. In mid-afternoon, the Police Officer in charge of Presidential Security, Mr. Alec Pearson, accompanied by another senior officer, searched the surrounding area for any clue to the assassin.

A police officer asked over his public address set for witnesses. Mrs. Sehmi said: "This barbarous practice must get root in the country. I am too stunned to comment just yet."

'Most shocking' - Deputy Speaker

The K.P.U. Publicity Secretary, Mr. Ashing Onko, who broke down and wept in the street, had to be helped into his car by friends. The late African Standard office in Nairobi and staff telephones were inundated with inquiries throughout the afternoon. Among the callers was the Deputy Speaker of the National Assembly, Dr. F. S. De Souza, who described the assassination as "most shocking."

The Attorney-General, Mr. Charles Njiru, hurried to police headquarters for more than two hours to help identify the car with high-ranking officials. In mid-afternoon, the Police Officer in charge of Presidential Security, Mr. Alec Pearson, accompanied by another senior officer, searched the surrounding area for any clue to the assassin.

An immediate full-scale police operation was put into action and off-duty uniformed and C.I.D. officers were hastily recalled. A squad of police was dispatched to Nairobi Hospital after Mr. Mboya's body was taken there to keep back an almost hysterical crowd which pressed into the corridor.

An angry crowd struggled with police outside Nairobi Hospital later in the afternoon, after they were refused permission to see Mr. Mboya's body. They chanted: "We want to see Mr. Mboya." Police used tear gas and water cannons to disperse the crowd.

The crowd turned themselves into riot formation and charged the crowd, which scattered. But last night police continued to keep a close watch of the hospital.

The Kenya Tourist and Wildlife, Mr. Ayodo, went to Mr. Mboya's house. He told reporters: "This is a tragic loss for Kenya. The flag at Nairobi Hospital was flown at half mast."

'Kiss of life' failed

This graphic account is from a Standard staffman who arrived on the scene at 11.50. The shooting was over in seconds, leaving buy Government Road shoppers and bystanders shocked and rooted to the spot as the car sped away. Mr. Mboya fell in the doorway of the chemist's shop hit by three bullets and lay with his chest covered in blood only feet from his car.

An assistant from the shop ran out and tried to keep Mr. Mboya alive with the "kiss of life" but with little hope. A woman in a brown shirt, who had been on the pavement at the time, was laid away weeping by the police and taken to hospital with shock. As I watched her being taken to hospital, she kept saying: "My husband is dead. My husband is dead."

The ambulance which had taken Mr. Mboya to hospital returned to the scene to report to the police that Mr. Mboya was dead. By then, police reinforcements had arrived and the crowd was dispersed to a C.I.D. man could examine the ground around the spot where Mr. Mboya fell.

Police cordoned off the Government Road as the news spread through the city centre and hundreds of people made their way to the scene.

Coast gift to Forces' Hospital

The constant acceptance of United Nations Security Council resolutions which would not possibly be implemented had "depreciated" the value of the council, Israel's Foreign Minister, Mr. Abba Eban, said in Nairobi last night.

TOWN STRAFED

Three people were killed and 20 injured when two Federal Nigerian planes flew over the town of Owerri in Biafra yesterday and heavily strafed it.

Biafran lack-ack opened up against the planes for the first time since Owerri was re-captured by Biafran forces in April.

Despite a steady barrage of ground fire, the two planes hit Owerri market, the town's main street, a school, and a newly-opened canteen. Casualty figures were announced by official sources.

The home of the Catholic Bishop of Owerri, the Rt. Rev. J. Whelan, was heavily pelted with cannon fire.

At the general hospital, at least seven of the seriously injured were treated. This was the third and most serious raid on Owerri since April.

Casualties would have been much heavier in the market place if it had not been lunch time.

In Abidjan, Ivory Coast, Presidents Kaunda of Zambia and Houphouët-Boigny of the Ivory Coast yesterday appealed to the Heads of State to do everything to enable the International Red Cross and other organisations to carry on relief work in Nigeria.

The plea, also addressed to the U.N. Secretary-General, U Thant, came in a communique issued after President Kaunda's departure.

It said millions of Biafrans had died and hundreds of thousands were condemned to a slow genocide without precedent in the history of Africa.

The two leaders said the Nigerian problem could be solved only by negotiations following an unconditional ceasefire.

Their appeal, they said, was made not because of military difficulties, but because of the decision of the Nigerian Federal Government to ban operations to supply food and drugs to the unfortunate Biafran civilian population, particularly the hundreds of thousands of children threatened with death through lack of food and care.

In London, the British Foreign Secretary, Mr. Michael Stewart, said yesterday that Britain was making every Nigerian initiative to open up land relief corridors into Biafra.

Four of Ghana's registered political parties have merged to form the United National Party (U.N.P.) to fight the elections on August 29.

They are the Ghana Democratic Party, the Nationalist Party, the Republican Party and the All People's Congress.

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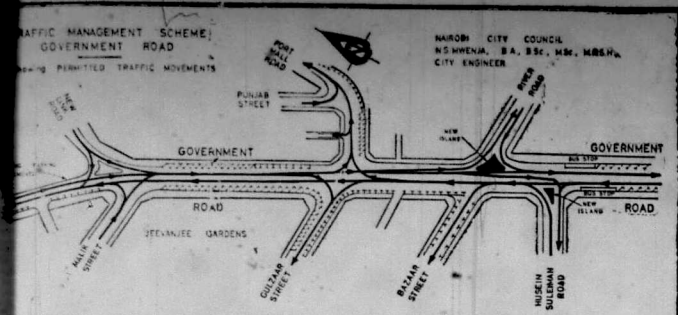

New traffic scheme for Government Road

In the next few weeks the Nairobi City Engineer's Department will be putting into operation a traffic management scheme on Government Road between the junctions with Hussein Suleiman Road and the new link road from Fort Hall Road Roundabout, the Town Clerk, Mr. J. P. Mbugua, announced yesterday.

He said this stretch of Government Road, and particularly the junction with River Road and Bazaar Street was one of the most congested parts of the central area in the peak hours.

The opening of the new link road to Fort Hall Road roundabout, and the gyratory system on

Government Road and Victoria Street at the junction with Kenyatta Avenue, had provided good alternative routes to the various cross and right-turn movements at River Road and Bazaar Street. These would not now be available.

Fort Hall Road from Government Road will become one way towards the roundabout, subject to the decision of council on any objections raised by the public.

The cartwayway of Government Road will be marked out to ensure rapid and free movement of traffic in all the permitted directions.

The public who normally make the cross movement from River Road to Bazaar Street are advised to use the new link road from Fort Hall Road roundabout to Government Road and then to

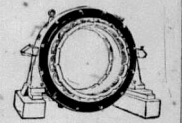
turn right into Gulzazar Street. Motorists who now turn right into River Road from Government Road should turn right at Fort Hall Road. If they have come up Government Road from Queensway, then they should turn right at Coryndon Street.

Motorists who turn right into Bazaar Street from Government Road are very few in number and there are a large variety of alternative routes depending on their origin. The right turn from Hussein Suleiman Road to Government Road is banned at peak hours now and will be permanently banned from henceforth.

Motorists wishing to turn right out of River Road into Government Road should use the new link road.

The scheme is designed to be on a permanent basis and it is hoped will dispose of congestion at this traffic black-spot for some time to come.

ADMINISTERING JUSTICE IN KENYA

The shearer and the shepherd: Lawino's lament for Bw. Shafto

The Kenya nation at the very outset of attaining independence decided to make justice our shield and defender.

The prerequisites to attaining the goal of justice as the shield and defender are intricately interwoven with those for the protection of individual rights and these are:

(a) A democratic Government that implements the wishes of the majority democratically with protecting the interests of the minority. (b) A sovereign Parliament that is geared towards the just government of men.

(c) An independent Judiciary that is not afraid or afraid of, ill-treated or ill-treated by, the Executive and the Legislature.

(d) A recognition and acceptance by each of the three institutions of the Government, Parliament and Judiciary, that the exercise of their respective responsibilities they are equally sovereign.

The Kenya Constitution has gone as far as it practically can provide by written word for these prerequisites.

This is a condensed version of a speech made by Chief Justice Kilili Mwendwa at the Annual Health and Industry Training Institute at Kabete on Tuesday, July 2, 1969.

The justification for the retention of this element in modern judicial thinking is the consideration that if the public or the individual party believes that nothing of conviction to the harm of the public or the individual party will be done outside the courts.

(a) Deterrence against further misbehaviour by the criminal himself. (b) Deterrence to others. Deterrence is a factor which in Kenya plays a large part in determining the severity of punishment.

The purpose for which laws are made courts are set up and prisons are established is the protection of life, liberty and security of the person and of the privacy of the home and property of the individual member of society.

These forms the class of habitual criminals who are either deterred from committing further offences after conviction is negligible. In their case in determining the appropriate sentence, the interest of the public at large is the paramount consideration.

In a letter to the general manager of the Agricultural Finance Corporation, the union's secretary-general, Mr. Mubani, has served the corporation with strike action in protest against the receipt of the 'seven days' from the receipt of the letter to recognise the union. The letter was dated July 3.

The letter accused the management of the corporation of the 'serious manner' in which it had dispensed with the services of one employee and also with the suspension of another employee.

A leading union official said that at the expiry of the seven days, the union would call a 49 members strike.

Mr. Mubani said that the corporation had been subjected to a sympathy strike by about 70,000 members of the union. An official from the corporation declined to comment on the grounds that the corporation had not received the letter. There would be a meeting next Monday in which one of the agreed conditions of the suspended employee would be considered.

He added that the question of recognition had been the subject of ceaseless correspondence between the corporation and the union, and had not been settled yet.

Mr. Mubani said: "Our union will always give support to any man in his fight for recognition by employers."

He added that Cotu would see to it that all machinery had been exhausted between the union and the corporation before strike action is taken.

Discussions resume on K.M.C. row

The board of inquiry into a dispute between the Kenya Meat Commission and the Kenya Commercial Union resumed full discussions yesterday amid allegations of discrimination by the union against staff and union members levelled against the firm by a Nairobi advocate, Mr. S. M. Oieno.

Mr. Oieno was speaking for the union after it had changed its mind on taking the case to the High Court following its refusal to boycott any further meeting unless their demand for the production of a work schedule for the year was met or unless they were granted an adjournment to seek a High Court ruling on the matter.

When union members remained adamant on the issue, the board chairman, Mr. G. S. Munoru, issued summonses to the union members and one K.M.C. official appear before the board as individuals with a view to enabling the board to carry out its functions.

However, the inquiry took a new turn six days ago when the union agreed to carry on with discussions. Mr. Oieno then took over from the union's general secretary, Mr. Mubani, and began conducting their case.

Mr. Oieno told the board yesterday that it had approved that it give sufficient time to the K.M.C. was refusing to produce it.

He said the union's submission was that the report would have incriminated the management and it was a confidential document of the K.M.C. should have applied for its production. The union has given a sworn statement to that effect and then produced it for confidential study by the board.

He claimed that the union had properly applied for its production and added that the report was the cause of unrest in the company.

Referring to the first part of the union's memorandum, Mr. Oieno said discrimination in salaries, medical facilities, welfare and housing allowances between management staff and union members was the main cause of the unrest.

He said there was an open gap in the terms of salaries between the two and the board's allowance in management staff received a minimum of £30 per month, while union members received more than £10 per month.

It was obvious that under such discrimination there could be no understanding in the K.M.C. He pointed out that the management staff were allowed leave overseas because of their huge salaries while union members could not have those rights.

He claimed that under the medical scheme, management staff had this facility extended to their families while union members had nothing of that sort and had to attend Government dispensaries when they fell sick.

On contracts, he said that the management staff were given their contracts, were given large amounts of money in gratuities and were allowed extra time for their contracts.

On a further discrimination claim against the management, Mr. Oieno asserted that management had had a club of their own, which union members could not join.

"The union is dissatisfied in Kenya and against the Commission. Union members demand that even if they have money," he added.

ETA KNEES SEEK 'LABEUS' WRIT

The court held that the arrival of the other two accused and their actions during the hearing of the case indicated that they aided and abetted Kamanjiri and he was left with no doubt as to their guilt.

Kamanjiri, who had 12 previous convictions, was sentenced to 20 years' imprisonment with 24 strokes on robbery with violence.

The court ordered that each of them be subjected to police supervision for a period of five years on completion of the sentence.

Lamu people raise £1,250 for school

His untimely death is a loss not only to the people and Government of Kenya, but to Africa and the world as a whole.

Nation mourns as gun hunt grows

Kenya went into mourning over the weekend for one of her most illustrious nationalists, Mr. Tom Mboya, as a full-scale manhunt went into operation to find the gunman who shot him down in a busy Nairobi street on Saturday. A wave of shock and horror swept the country with the news of the assassination. Even Mr. Mboya's most bitter political opponents joined in the general condemnation of what they called an cowardly and shocking act.

KENYA POLICE DESCRIBE GUNMAN

Appeals for information on the shooting have been broadcast regularly on V.A.K. and police are still anxious to contact anybody who may be able to help in their inquiries.

The investigation is being carried out under Mr. Hinga's personal supervision. He was notified within minutes of the shooting and was soon in conference with the Attorney-General, Mr. Njonjo.

Both men promised that no effort would be spared in tracking down the assassin. All resources of the police were mobilised to sift through evidence and try to piece the jigsaw together.

Mr. Hinga appealed to people throughout the country to keep their eyes and ears open for anything that might be of help.

Police have been working around the clock sifting hundreds of reports and statements in an effort to find the killer. So far no arrest has been made and, apart from vague descriptions given by eye-witnesses, no clear picture has emerged to point to a definite suspect.

An announcement from the President's Office called for flags on all public buildings to be flown at half-mast from this morning until noon on the day of Mr. Mboya's funeral. Arrangements for the funeral have still to be made. During the weekend most flags flying had been brought to half-mast.

It is expected that a book of condolences will be opened today probably in Parliament Buildings, but this has not yet been confirmed. A Requiem Mass is expected to be held at the Holy Family Cathedral, Nairobi, tomorrow.

Mr. Mboya was shot as he was leaving Chinani's Chemists in Government Road where he had been shopping.

At the shop the assassin fired two or three shots hitting Mr. Mboya in the chest. He fell back in the doorway of the shop, where an assistant tried the "kiss of life" to revive him. An ambulance quickly arrived but Mr. Mboya was dead by the time he reached hospital.

The assassin made his escape in the general confusion which followed the shooting.

Police were on the scene within minutes trying to find witnesses among the horrified crowd which had gathered round the shop. Others had their work cut out to keep the crowd from pressing into the shop doorway.

In a short time a massive police operation had begun to find the killer, while patrols stood by in many parts of Kenya to keep the peace and to deal with possible outbreaks of trouble.

Emotions ran high as police pushed policemen aside and kicked in the door of the surgical wing at Nairobi Hospital as they invaded the corridors hoping for a glimpse of Mr. Mboya. They threw themselves about in grief, shouting and crying.

Thousands of people converged on his house where the open coffin was placed in the garden.

The Director of Medical Services, Dr. J. C. Likimani, arrived to supervise the removal of the body to the City Mortuary, where a post-mortem examination was held. Crowds also had to be restrained there. A crowd gathered in the city centre with the aim of marching to State House, but was dispersed by police.

A hospital spokesman said that inquiries were being made to be carried out at the hospital. Patients had been seriously disturbed by screams of the crowd. Police guards remained at the hospital, the mortuary and the police station.

Mr. Mboya's body was moved from the mortuary to his home in Convent Drive which became the focal point of the city's mourning. Thousands of people converged on his house where the open coffin was placed in the garden.

Throughout the day people of all races lined up to pay their last respects.

In Nyamata, the news of the shooting was received first with shock and later there were sporadic outbreaks of violence between Luo and Kikuyu.

In Homa Bay, about 50 Kikayus were taken to the police station for safety after their shops were attacked with stones. Similar incidents took place in Nakuru.

The last few minutes of Minister's life

Mr. Mohini Sehmi told the East African Standard yesterday of his last-minute visit to her Government Road chemist's shop.

In her bungalow in Glandower Road, Nairobi, Mrs. Sehmi, who is 35, said: "Tom and Pamela Mboya were regular customers of the shop and friends of the family. She dated by the assassination, she told with a trembling voice how the Minister had appeared at the shop when the doors had been closed for the day.

"When he parked his car outside we opened the door for him and he came in. He bought some toiletry articles and stayed with us chatting for about ten minutes. The shop pharmacist and myself were behind the counter talking to him and when he was ready to go I opened the front door again to let him out.

"Before he came in I had seen him talking to someone outside but hadn't paid much attention at that point.

"As I opened the door we shouted 'welcome' to him and he started walking outside. The door

of the shop is at an angle to the road and we were not we outside properly. It was I was still talking to him when we heard shots.

"I said to him 'What is that Tom?' and suddenly he leaned back against the wall. It never occurred to me at that point that he had been hit. Then he slumped against me and we staggered back almost into the shop.

"Then he must have staggered again, and then he fell back to the shop. I saw blood on his shirt, which was red anyway, and I realised then what had happened. He never uttered a word. He fell into my arms and began to fall to the ground.

"I now had his blood on my hands and we managed more or less to break his fall and we helped him to the floor. He was now right inside the shop. I closed the doors and called the pharmacist and said the police must be brought and an ambulance.

"Then I went outside to get help and after shouting for assistance in the street I ran back inside and closed the door again to keep out all the crowds who were against the window.

"I think there were just two shots but it might have been three. I am not sure. They were fired in such rapid succession I might have heard an echo. He must have been hit before he even knew there was a gunman. If he had seen anyone beforehand he would have jumped inside. But he never moved.

"Inside I held his head and asked him 'Are you alright?' and there was no sound from him. His arms went up once and came down slowly and he moved his head once or twice and his eyes opened, but he never spoke. His chest never moved and he was not breathing at all.

"A cousin of Mrs. Sehmi, Harivar Sehmi, a teenager on holiday from Mombasa, also tried the kiss of life, again without success. Although we could see the movement of the heart beating. Then the ambulance arrived with resuscitation equipment.

Earlier yesterday Mrs. Sehmi visited Mrs. Mboya to express her sympathy.

She said: "Pamela told me Tom would still have been alive today if he had had a streak of badness in him. She said they killed him because he was youthful but a good man. He died because they knew he was good."

Egypt uncovers big Israeli spy ring

CAIRO — A new spy network working for Israel has been uncovered in Egypt, it was announced officially yesterday. All members of the network, two of whom are West German subjects, were arrested on June 2.

Crowd weeps at Kisumu Show

Hundreds wept after news of the assassination of Mr. Mboya was announced by the Provincial Commissioner for Nyanza. Mr. Charles Murgat, to people from all over Western Kenya who were attending the Kisumu Show on Saturday afternoon.

Some people had to be supported from the main arena where they had assembled for the presentation of cups and awards by the wife of the Provincial Commissioner, Mrs. David Amayo.

Information about the death reached the showground just after 3 p.m. in a telephone call from Nairobi to the Mayor of Kisumu, Cnaan Samson Odoyo who was a personal friend of Mr. Mboya's family.

Conan Odoyo who was guest of honor at the show, collapsed when he heard the news. He was helped into a car and driven to Nairobi.

The Director of Social Services of the Kisumu Municipal Council, Mr. E. O. Gumbo, was pulled away from the microphone as he tried to announce the assassination. Presentation of the cups and awards continued and soon after the ceremony Mr. Murgat announced the news.

In a low shaky voice he said: "We have heard tragic news. Because of the sad death of Mr. Mboya, our beloved Minister for Economic Planning and Development, the show will be closed now."

Police were immediately called and on arrival arrested seven people who are to appear in court today.

Goods in both shops were damaged and a large crowd who were there to disperse.

The Central Nyanza Police Divisional Commander, Super-Channan, said that police patrols were increased in Kisumu.

Fifty Kikuyu families are being given police protection at Homa Bay Police Station.

A crowd estimated at about 1000 had to be turned away from Kericho stadium yesterday when it was decided to cancel sports meetings because of Mr. Mboya's death.

In the tea estates around Kericho on Saturday hundreds of Luo workers gathered together and wept openly when the news of the shooting reached them. The general feeling yesterday was that many workers would not report for duty today.

In Western Province 100 leading businessmen of the Asani community gathered yesterday in the Gandhi Memorial Hall, Kakamega, to offer prayers for the late Minister.

The gathering said that the whole Asani community in Kakamega township had been shocked at the news. All shops in the township remained closed throughout the day.

Speaking to Pressmen at Entebbe Airport shortly after his arrival from Zambia, a sombre-faced President Obote described the murder of Mr. Mboya as "a great loss to East Africa."

"It is an act that discounts the great achievements of the past and the promise of the future," he said, speaking about his visit to the Congo and Zambia the previous day. "I had not been in the news since Saturday. I would have been able to tell the people of Uganda that this journey was in a special class."

He had seen Uganda at the same grounds and at the same level with two other countries, and that furthermore he had seen a very clear demonstration of the complete interest in the welfare of Uganda.

In Zambia there had been a massive demonstration of the brotherly relations existing between the two countries.

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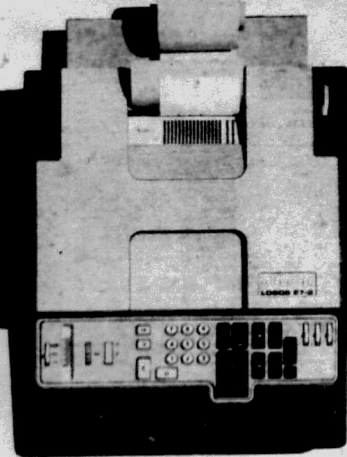

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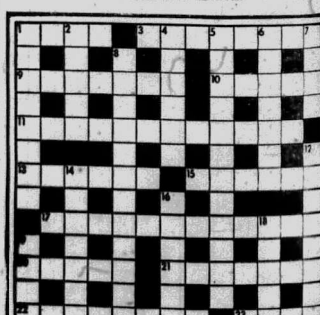

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Open starter to be British

George Archer of Texas, the United States Masters golf champion, recovered sufficiently yesterday to raise hopes that he will take his place in the British Open field which starts at Lybraz St. Annos tomorrow.

Archer, a 6ft. 6in. ex-cowboy, said yesterday morning: "I am 100 per cent better than I was. I shall be using the doctor again and I am hoping to be able to persuade him to let me practise this afternoon at the Blackpool hotel."

Archer was examined on Sunday and the possibility of a medical certificate was quickly ruled out. He arrived in Britain on Saturday after playing exhibition matches in Germany and Sweden and went straight to bed at the Blackpool hotel.

He said he had stomach trouble and then caught a cold. Archer was forced to miss the nine-nation Roosevelt tournament at nearby Fairhaven on Sunday and was denied valuable practice. He said he has not been able to practise at Royal Lybraz. Archer has no interest record in Britain. On his previous visit last September, he had to withdraw from the Alcan championship with stomach trouble.

Archer was his doctor yesterday morning and was advised not to play yesterday. The doctor said I should take it easy for another day but I could go to the club and practice on a register, said Archer. "I hope to do a little putting while at the course. The doctor is seeing me again tomorrow morning and I hope he will give me the O.K. to get down to some serious practice."

Bob Charles, the New Zealand leader, won the Roosevelt tournament at Fairhaven. Charles, in deadly form with his putter, had only 28 putts as he secured a seven-under-par 67, equalling the course record.

He said: "I have been playing well all season. This could be a happy omen for me in next week's British Open."
Charles won the title here in 1963 after a tie with the American Phil Rodgers. Ireland's Christy O'Connell was second on Sunday, two strokes behind.
