two of the three men had opened  
the showcase and was stuffing goods  
into his pockets.  
He rushed round the showcase  
and the three men ran from the  
shop. He tried to call for  
assistance but the man who had  
taken the two items vanished down  
the street.  
He managed to catch one man  
and with the help of his dog, which  
was out on the pavement, he  
brought him back into the shop  
where he locked him in and called  
the police.  
Before the police arrived crowds

# ANYAIA FORMS GOVERNMENT IN S. SUDAN

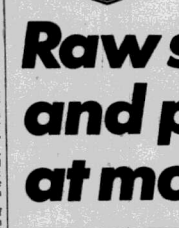

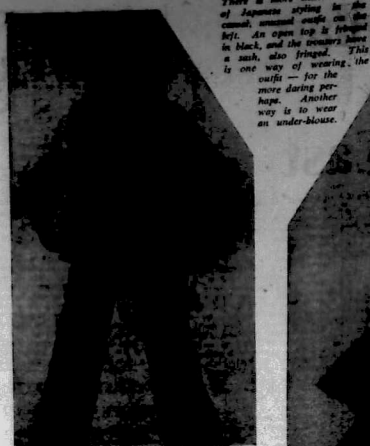

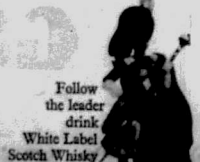

## What power means to Russia's No. 1 woman

On May Day this year the Soviet Communist Party secretary, Mr. Brezhnev, was holding court on top of the rust-coloured Lenin-Stalin mausoleum overlooking Moscow's Red Square.

Suddenly he leaned over the marble balustrade, smiled, and then vigorously beckoned to someone on the rising steps below.

Becks craned as diplomats and newsmen tried to identify the person unexpectedly singled out by Russia's unpredictable strong man.

The crowd parted, and Mrs. Ekaterina Alexeyevna Furtseva, a buxom, plainly-dressed woman, pushed her way to a place of honour at the leader's side — the first time a woman had been invited to join the Soviet hierarchy at such an important event.

Today, this matronly woman with

deceptively merry blue eyes is undoubtedly the most powerful woman in the Soviet Union, the first ever female member of the Presidium, Russia's top policy-making body. And depending on which version of her childhood you believe, she is either 54 or 59 years old.

According to the people who know her well, Madame Furtseva is an ardent champion of Russian women, and uses Article 122 of the Soviet Constitution as her shield.

This, in fact, guarantees women "equal rights with men in all spheres of economic, governmental, political and other public activities."

As a result, it is said, she was often the only woman at work and does not believe they should dig ditches and be employed in other forms of heavy manual labour.

Recently 12 pregnant women in a textile factory complained they had been given work targets beyond their powers. Thanks to her intervention, factory managers all over the country were ordered to transfer such women from heavy and harmful work.

It was perhaps small wonder the manager lost little time to implement Madame Furtseva's advice, for her past record suggested she is a fiery individual.

Frightened of no one and never afraid to speak her mind.

Back in 1952, for instance, she was a small cog in the party machine, but that didn't stop her leveling charges of academic favouritism in the Moscow Physics Institute.

She complained that 102 of the personnel there were relatives, some of whom were working under direct supervision of their relatives.

This was one of the first official disclosures of bias or influence within the Soviet Union.

Mrs. Furtseva was also one of the first to back Khrushchev in 1957 when disorganised speeches in the Kremlin. In late June of that year the Central Committee met in a showdown session.

Khrushchev and his followers were lined up against old-line Stalinists such as Molotov, Lazar Kaganovich and Georgi Malenkov. Comrade Furtseva was the first speaker. Without warning, she denounced the old guard for their

"dangerous and foolish policies".

All three were demoted and exiled to minor jobs in far-off towns. Shortly after this, she was awarded one of the vacant seats on the Presidium.

Her support for Khrushchev was perhaps understandable. Years before, with his help, she was appointed to her first important post as Party secretary of Moscow's Frunze District.

In 1950 she was elected second secretary of the Moscow City Committee, headed by Khrushchev. When Mrs. Furtseva first became prominent, little was known about her. Before long, however, an official Soviet biography of Comrade E. A. Furtseva appeared — to dispel certain "incorrect" facts.

But the paragraphs about her background in the Soviet Encyclopaedia bear little relation to the story told by her close friends.

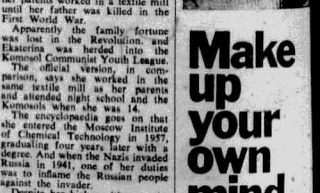
The encyclopaedia, for example, says she was born in 1910 in the tiny mining village of Vshchiv-Volochok near Moscow, and that her parents worked in a textile mill until her father was killed in the First World War.

Apparently the family fortune was lost in the Revolution, and Ekaterina was her father's only child. The official version, in comparison, says she worked in the same textile mill as her parents and also worked in a factory and the Komsomols when she was 14.

The encyclopaedia goes on that she entered the Moscow Institute of Chemical Technology in 1957, graduating four years later with a degree. And when the Nazis invaded Russia in 1941, one of her duties was to inflame the Russian people against the invader.

Despite her high position — she even outranks her Soviet Minister husband — it seems unlikely she will ever become Premier of the Soviet Union.

But even if her personal ambition goes no further than her present position, she remains still the most powerful woman in Russia and perhaps the world while she lives.

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## Ten films the cinemagoer has made famous

**PAUL WALLACE** writes that nobody could have predicted the phenomenal success of box-office winners like "Gone With The Wind" or the James Bond films. Sometimes the star names made the films, sometimes the films made new stars. But the recipe for success is a mixture one, which always depends on the ordinary film fan.

At this very moment, in countless cinemas around the world, the curtains are opening on a scene of brilliant Alpine colour. As the music begins, the camera zooms across a spectacularly beautiful mountain lake. Millions of people will sit enthralled as Julie Andrews sings her way through another performance of the biggest money-spinner in cinema history — *The Sound of Music*.

For this emotional extravaganza charmed its starfarer way to the top of the pop poll so rapidly that in four years its success has even surpassed that of the phenomenon of the 30-year-old production *Gone With The Wind*...

Yes, the film world pundits are puzzled still... The elusive qualities which a best-selling film possesses are so intangible and mysterious that they simply cannot be conjured up at will. Nobody would have dared predict that *The Sound of Music* would prove such a hit. It was released at a time when cinemas were still in the doldrums — yet yet this best-seller of all time pulled in over £10,000,000 in the U.S.A. — and just less than half in Britain.

This financial jackpot was achieved while the number of cinemas continued to dwindle year by year. It was achieved despite the fact that the big success of the past were available to the public through many more cinemas.

In 1950, for example, Britain had 4,584 cinemas. By the end of last year the total had slumped to 1,736. One secret of the Julie Andrews film is that people go again and again to see it. Its probable audience is probably about 30,000,000 by now, but this consists of thousands of "multiple viewings". One man even claimed a world record for attending 100 performances in the past three years!

For many people, however, the film of *Gone With The Wind*. Although its takings have surpassed by *The Sound of Music*, it was the great love story of another generation's lovers. Still the film is so over-released that it was recently re-released: dressed up for the wide screen, with stereophonic sound.

## Composer of two musical worlds

There are few musicians who wear their jazz in modern urban swing, and yet retain the best of both worlds.

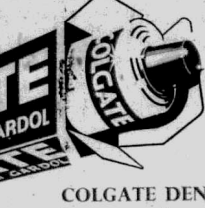

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## AUSTRALIAN 'SLANGUAGE'

### Decimal coinalg defeats the 'Strine' makers

By DON WHITTINGTON Sydney.

For the first time since Australia was settled nearly 200 years ago, Australians have stopped mauling the English language into their own brand of "slang" called "Strine".

A survey conducted by a leading Australian bank, in collaboration with Sydney's evening newspaper, has disclosed that, although decimal currency was introduced three years ago, not one new name had been invented for the new coins or notes, although many of the traditional names used for the old sterling currency have been abandoned.

Over the years Australians have been remarkably inventive linguistically. A noted authority on the subject, S. Baker, has written that "in terms of population or length of history, Australia has made more alterations to the English language than has America."

Some Australian slang terms are indigenous. Some have been borrowed or adapted from English. Words like "burr", an exclamation showing little else to recommend him; "bludger", a parasite; "sheila", a girl; "sheila", someone who makes a lot of noise but achieves very little, and two major world wars.

Before decimal currency was introduced Australia has used British currency for many years, and a rich collection of slang terms had emerged from shearing sheds, cattle and construction camps, and two major world wars.

The better known of these were "burr", for a threepenny bit; "craz", for sixpence; "deaner", one shilling; "sny", or "two bob", for two shillings; "caser", five shillings; and "half-casser", two-and-sixpence; a "quid", "frogkin", or "middy" for one pound; a "spit", five pounds; and a "twit", 100 pounds. Most of these coins and notes were retained when decimal

currency was introduced. The threepenny piece disappeared, but sixpence became five cents, a shilling became two cents, a pound became two dollars (the old ten shillings became the single dollar unit), five pounds became ten dollars, and the old ten pound note became 20 dollars.

Although the designs of the bank notes were changed, and even the size changed, slightly, the basic colours remained, so that the \$20 note today is still the old red colour, the \$10 note is still a deep blue and the \$2 note is still green.

None of them is ever called a brick, a spin or a frankin, except by old hands who find it hard to abandon familiar words. Five cents is never called a rack, or ten cents a deaner.

This might not be so strange if there was any sign of new words replacing the old, but there is not. Barman, bookmakers, bank tellers, bus conductors, and others who handle money continually say their customers show no sign of desire to fasten slang words on the new currency.

The bank-newspaper survey mentioned earlier, which was conducted in the form of a competition, failed to produce a worthwhile word for any of the new notes or coins.

The nearest approach to anything that might become common usage was a "fiz", for the single dollar note (the old "half quid"). The "fiz" was supposed to refer to a lizard which formed part of the design, or to the Queen's head, which appeared also, but it appeared to be contrived, and shows no sign of becoming popular.

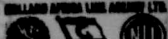

number of applications for citizenship was tapering off and the time soon passed when the Immigration Department would not have enough applications for action, an Assistant Secretary for Home Affairs, Mr. Matsano, told Parliament yesterday.

He was replying to Mr. K. Mwangi (Karu, Embu East), who had asked how many people were given Kenya citizenship since independence and whether it was the intention of the Government to reduce the total number of people being granted citizenship every month.

Mr. Matsano said 15,175 people had been registered as Kenyan citizens and 160 naturalised since independence.

The Government, he said, was considering reducing the number of citizenship applications, not by deliberate action but through the fact that the number of applicants was gradually diminishing.

He was asked by Mr. B. M. Karungura (Karu, Embu East) what steps the Government had taken to assist 300 employees who lost their work with the banning of the betting industries.

Mr. Matsano replied: "I hope that M.P.s will appreciate that although their difficulties cannot be ignored, the financial embarrassment caused to so many families of thousands of unfortunate citizens who had fallen victims of gambling far outweighs the problems of the now displaced few employees."

"In the case of gambling machines, most of them were installed in hotels and bars where other business is still operating. The question of all the labour being sacked would, therefore, appear to be used by other sources only to frighten the Government policy."

"It should also be realised that our Government will not yield so any measure which is being put through the Press by interested parties. The interest of the nation must prevail."

"According to the information available, some of the bookmakers still operating at the hotel races and so not all their previous employees will be laid off as a result of closing down the town offices. The Government will expect the remaining bookmakers to co-operate by retaining most of those they can afford to employ."

Mr. Matsano was asked by Mr. O. Ochi (K.P.U., Nyakabony) what police officers when dealing with anyone who tries to escape or resist or is arrested by the police to death instead of shooting to disable?

It made no mention of sanctions against any party not heeding the appeal, although such sanctions may be imposed under article 7.

An expert on the situation said that the appeal was a significant step, but that the truce was still fragile.

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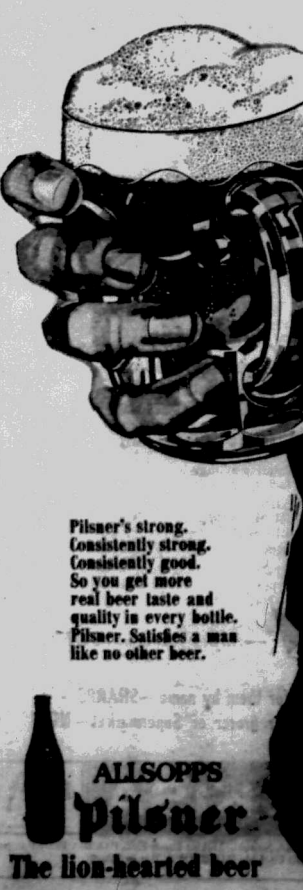

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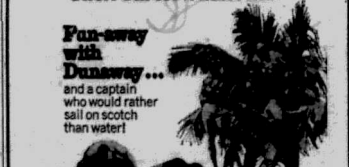

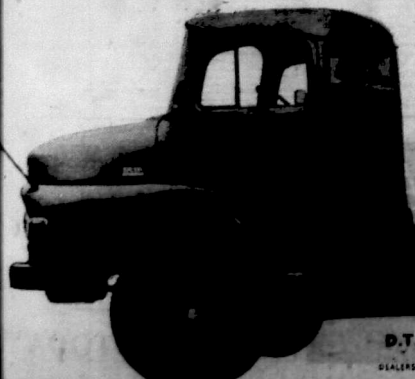

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# Annual Flag Day of the Society of St. Vincent De Paul

In addition, and where necessary, the Society arranges medical treatment. On occasions it has been possible to arrange remission of school fees and also to secure employment for destitute persons. The Society also maintains two homes for the destitute, one in Nairobi and one in Mombasa.

Most of the branches of the Society operate in rural areas where priority is given to the distribution of wheat, dried milk, soy bean oil and clothing.

As the Society is run on voluntary lines all monies received go to the destitute. Also income is mainly derived from voluntary sources.

## Nearly 1,900 seek jobs monthly

The amount of applications dealt with by the Kenyanisation of Personnel Bureau varied considerably in a monthly average of 1,648 school-leavers and 250 experienced people had been registered with the bureau as job seekers. 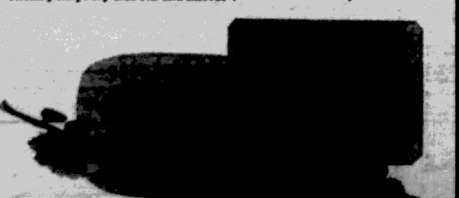


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# Banking and interest rates

The kind of misunderstanding that clouds so many issues in Kenya, which is becoming political because of half truths, surrounded a question asked in the National Assembly about interest rates charged by the commercial bank.

"Why do the banks give less than five per cent interest on the money banked by their customers and, in turn, loan money at an average rate of ten per cent?" the questioner wanted to know. "How long has the present bank rate remained at this level?"

The inference from the first part of this double-barrelled attack is that private banks must be up to some mischief by more than doubling the interest they charge, compared with what they pay, on money loaned which, after all, comes out of the savings deposited by the customers. Following this line of argument, somewhere the banks must be taking a heavy cut out of their users.

"This is a false inference. In the first place, their liquidity is perilously low, out of a deliberate policy of taking risks to help development. In other words, the banks have far more money out on loan, supporting individual enterprises, than is acceptable for safety banking practices generally in the world."

The Assistant Minister for Finance replied with the relevant figures, disproving the inference. Mr. Balala pointed out that the commercial banks are paying between three and four-and-a-half per cent interest on fixed and savings deposits. Loans are not charged at ten per cent but, as he said, "at a minimum effective rate of seven per cent for first-class credit risks and eight to nine per cent for normal advances."

If a business run on an overdraft fails, the bank takes the knock. Higher rates, says Mr. Balala explained, may be charged for unsecured risks. The banks have to meet administrative costs and, compared with the current rates operating in the world, he felt surprised those charged in Kenya are very reasonable.

These differences in rates of interest, together with charges levied for operating accounts, have frequently been criticised by uninformed people. Do they have any conception of the commitments the banks undertake? Buildings have to be erected and maintained, often small branches in out-of-the-way places to cater for scattered communities. Transport costs met and staff paid. All banks in Kenya are carrying

staff additional to normal requirements that running a bank, which is a business, is a transitional period caused by the over-expanding demands for Africanisation.

Inquiries show staff emoluments account for no less than 60 per cent of total operating costs, meaning a salary bill of around £4,000,000 a year in Kenya alone. The banks employ approximately 5,000 employees in all grades. These salaries are not paid out of this air. The banks are now effectively organised considering all their ramifications, lubricating the entire financial machinery supporting the agricultural and commercial economy of the country.

Mr. Balala said he did not understand what "bank rate" his questioner meant. Neither would anybody else who understands banking practice. The term "bank rate" is loosely applied to mean the interest rates charged by commercial banks on their lendings. It is not the rate of interest.

The Bank Rate declared in London is a highly controversial subject and the usefulness of frequent changes is challenged by economists. Briefly, the Bank Rate is used as an instrument to control spending, thus the levels of unemployment. A low rate — cheap money — encourages spending, but causes inflationary tendencies; a high rate — dearer money — curbs borrowing and is supposed to be disinflationary.

The first series of "wobbles" occurred in the first year of the First World War, when there were eight changes and the rate reached ten per cent, the highest recorded. For the decade 1940-50, despite the war, no change was made, and the rate remained at its lowest, two per cent.

Thereafter, changes have been fairly frequent especially in the latest years of Britain's financial stringency, and the current rate is eight per cent. These differences in rates of interest, together with charges levied for operating accounts, have frequently been criticised by uninformed people. 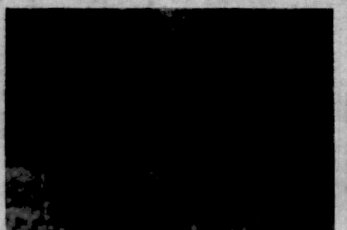

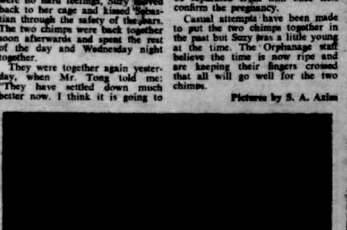

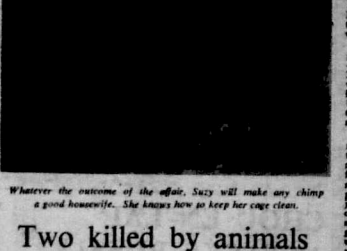

If the Government is to plan ahead to produce the necessities of life for Kenya's people it must know more about the population and its movements.

It is needed chiefly to give the Government a better picture of how many people it has to provide food, houses and schools for, and to give an idea of how the pattern of life in Kenya is changing, with people moving mainly around the country and particularly towards the over-crowded towns.

Kenya's rapid population growth can be seen from the figures of earlier censuses. The 1948 produced a figure of 5,500,000 people living in Kenya. By 1962 this had risen to 8,500,000 — 1,000,000 more than the Government had estimated.

The present estimate is that there are 10,500,000 people in Kenya. If that is correct, it means the population has almost doubled in 21 years — and the figure may be even higher than the estimate, as it proved in 1962.

That means the nation's population is increasing by 21 per cent every year, and it presents tremendous problems for the Government, which has to plan to produce enough food, medicine and other necessities for the rapidly growing population.

The situation is particularly serious in the towns. In almost every country in the world people are moving out of rural areas to the cities and towns in search for work or an easier life, and Kenya is no exception.

Nairobi has shanty villages on its outskirts, with thousands of people living in bad conditions, or causing overcrowding in relatives' homes. In the centre of the city crowds of people swarm outside building sites and hotels, vainly looking for jobs.

Once again, the figures tell the story. The 1962 census gave Nairobi's population as 243,000, and that marked a big increase on the old figure of about 150,000. Now the estimate is that there are 500,000 — half a million — people in Kenya's capital city. Its population has doubled in seven years, as against the 21 years for the country as a whole — partly from a rise in the birthrate but mainly because of the non-stop influx of people from rural areas.

How to stop this one-way flow of people is one of Kenya's most urgent tasks, because it is impossible to provide decent living conditions for a population twice as big as the city can hold.

On a smaller scale, the same situation exists throughout the country. Because of better health services and the ending of tribal wars, fewer people are dying young. It is still the general rule for most Kenyans to have lost of

children, so the population is bound to rise sharply.

Many people think this is not a bad thing because Kenya is a big country with a lot of empty spaces. But space alone is not the answer to the population problem.

Kenya has a deep pride in the land and everyone's ambition is to own his own shamba. But as one generation succeeds another, fathers will not see enough land to pass on to each of their many sons. The situation is even more complicated by the continuation of such practices as polygamy, by the irresponsible attitude of many men to their illegitimate children, and the fact that thousands of people are now living in the towns with no land of their own.

A few months ago, in a lecture at University College, an expert in population forecast that if Kenya's population goes on rising at its present rate, in 90 years it will be 144 million.

Imagine what that would mean. The country would be so crowded that instead of the vast stretches of the countryside on either side of the road, somebody travelling from Nairobi to Mombasa would be passing through slowly-packed housing estates most of the way to Mombasa.

They would run even through the Tsavo game park area, because with so many people in the country all the animals would have been killed off long ago and there would be no room for game parks.

To many people that may not seem very important, though it would mean that tourism, now one of Kenya's biggest industries, would be virtually wiped out.

Overcrowded conditions already exist in Britain and other European countries, but these countries rely on industry — from deposits of iron and other metals beneath their soil — to keep wealthy. Kenya has none of these, and at least 70 per cent of its people will have to rely on farming to keep them alive for as far ahead as we can see.

But with a population of 144,000,000 there would not be enough land for them to live and work on.

All the same, Kenya is comparatively lucky compared with some older countries and has more time to plan how to defeat these staggering problems.

Statistics show how grave a crisis man is facing on this planet he has tamed. It took all of recorded history until about the

year 1850 for the number of human beings in the world to reach one billion (1,000,000,000). But the second billion was reached in less than 100 years; and the third billion took less than 30 years.

The world's population is now estimated at 3,545,000,000. It is expected to reach 4,000,000,000 by 1975 and 7,000,000,000 by the year 2000, which would be double the figure in 1965.

Every day 180,000 babies are born in the world — 65,000,000 every year. Most of these are in India, China and Africa. India has the biggest increase of all. Seven out of every 50 people in the world are Indians. The country has a population of 525,000,000, and an Indian baby is born every one and a half seconds.

It has even been forecast that

unless something is done there will be standing room only all over the world by the year 2066, when there will be eight times as many people as there are now.

While more babies are being born, old people are living longer — doctors think 150 may be a common age in the future. But experts agree that these figures may never come true. They fear a terrible catastrophe, through war or mass starvation, will cut down the multiplying world population.

In Kenya we have a chance to prevent this by developing plans to control the birthrate and to use the land to the full to give the chance of a good life to a population which is bound to grow — but must not be allowed to become so big that everybody lives in poverty.

Next month's census is a first step towards doing this, and that is why the cooperation of all Kenyans is needed to make it a success.

# Strategy for parkers

Nairobi residents who drive a car have two main topics of conversation these days — the swiftness of other motorists, and the mysteries of trying to park.

I am reliably informed that one driver's sole reaction to the latest moon-shot was to say wistfully: "At least when they get there they won't have trouble finding a space."

The great parking war is being fought again with the baffled motorist on one side, the City Council on the other and — caught in the crossfire as usual — the police.

The police, it must be admitted, have shown a fair amount of tolerance for the motorist, but the tide is beginning to turn and dark threats about towing away offending vehicles are being made.

However, for any war it is essential to have a sound knowledge of the layout of the ground, so here, for the benefit of the motorists, is a rundown on existing official parking areas.

First, the free ones — these can be found in the following places: outside the Law Courts (fairly full most of the day); behind the G.P.O., and the D.C. office (with some space available) beside the Supermarket (well used, but a fair amount of "floating" traffic); Jembu Road, behind the Kiboko Mosque (apparently unknown to the average motorist); between Uhuru Highway and Koinange Street.

It would seem that, for the motorist who has not already forgotten how to walk, the area of free car parks considerably exceeds that of paying parks.

There are also several open spaces where parking is possible — except in heavy rain — close to the city centre.

Street (usually almost empty); Travin Road, alongside the bus station (plenty of space); through Punjab Street, near Globe Cinema (not well patronized); Fuel Hall Road roundabout (not one of the best car parks but still fairly empty); Bora Road (busy).

In several of these parks cars are being built which have raised the suspicion that they were to be made paying parks, but I understand that these are bits for security guards only and there is no intention at present to charge for parking.

Now the paying parks, in most of which I understand there are still spaces available for anybody willing to take out a season ticket.

These are at Kinyasung Road, between Kimathi and Mutai Streets; Victoria Street roundabout near Albin Mosque; behind the Municipal Market on Koinange Street; Wafa Street, behind City Hall; Serengeti Hill Avenue, at the corner of Government Road.

This list does not include privately run paying car parks.

## A sophisticated Jekyll and Hyde

Alfa Romeo have had a racing tradition since 1909, and the last few years have seen this marque participating keenly in the East African Safari, local rallies and track events, and an increasing number on the roads.

The 1300 Touring International is the latest representative of the models imported, which include saloon, real GT, and Spyder versions.

This car is a well-equipped, well-appearance, lower speed saloon with distinctive styling and conventional features. The three-cylinder twin overhead camshaft engine, the engine employed by Alfa since 1923 drives the rear wheels.

After being driven over this very clean and well-kept car, I took a few minutes to look at the interior, the front ones fully reclining. There is good hand and leg room, and arm rests on all doors. One expects the usual courtly lights, ash trays, grab-handles and so on and they were all present and correct.

Neither the locking lobby hole nor the small shelf beneath it would, however, take my Pentax-type camera. The upholstery of deep red stretch-plastic and rubber floor mats are practical and washable.

The ventilation system admits curious quantities of hot or cold air, bonnet if required by a power-fail fan. The heater control has a delayed action and several attempts were needed to get the temperature exactly right.

Under the bonnet, the dipstick is easily accessible, though somewhat close to the distributor wires. The fans are prominently positioned and clearly labeled in English. The same can be said of the instruction book, which has enough detail for the enthusiast to do his own maintenance. A single carburettor (two-shock - Solex) minimized the need for "tuning" and it is the staggered operation of these chokes which gives the close to the engine's choke.

At low speeds only one choke is in operation, making the car distinct and economical. As more power is demanded, the second choke comes in, and the engine, now at full bore, is capable of continuous and unflinching acceleration.

Behind the wheel, I realized this is a driver's car. The major controls had a firm feel, even though the car had done 13,000 miles, and are positioned exactly where I instinctively reached for them. Here I must criticize the old-fashioned, pull-out hand-brake which was too close to the steering column, and had a "stirringly" feel.

The vivid acceleration, power-assisted disc brakes all round, light, accurate steering and compact external dimensions, enabled me to whisk through Nairobi's lunch-time traffic minutes after taking the car over, and five minutes later I was doing 80, all within my nerves or apprehension. It was almost instantly.

# How farce fits into the modern world

At a time when the theatrical pundits are rigorously pursuing the avant-garde it might seem a little strange to find the name of one of the definitely old guard cropping up, if not constantly, at least persistently.

The name is that of Georges Feydeau, French farce-writer of extraordinary. Looked at coldly, there is nothing outwardly amusing about Feydeau, particularly since the 45 years since his death have given other farce-writers plenty of time to plunder his plays and turn what may have been original ideas into stock farcical plots.

The inevitable complaining situation, the inevitable argument, the inevitable comedy of errors, the inevitable farce, the inevitable farce.

So although one hears acid comments about this or that group "stealing" to put on a farce, one should not, on this occasion, accuse the Theatre Group of doing any such thing. Feydeau is not only apparently close to becoming "classical," he is also hard to read.

The group is presenting his *Hotel Paradiso* written in collaboration with Maurice Maeterlinck, and translated by Peter Glenville - at the National Theatre from next Thursday.

It was the choice of play that was just - but I believe the east suffered a number of the horrors of disappearance that one associates with farce.

As a result the producer, Pat Tytler, had to press himself into service as a visiting lawyer who suffers every time he meets - Mr. Tytler being the best stammerer in the group.

He has had considerable experience in both producing and acting in comedy, particularly in Aden where he has been involved in several shows in the R.A.F.'s Garrison theatre there.

With the year half over, it is interesting to see which artists and groups have so far been dominating the charts.

One of the more obvious trends in the continuing one that artists are slowly making a come-back — and among them are some old timers.

Frank Sinatra and Dean Martin, for instance, have been among the two most successful recording artists this year, mainly on the strength of two very good records, *My Way* and *Gentle on My Mind*.

Although they are not so familiar here, Fleetwood Mac have proved to be the most popular artists this year, followed closely by the Beatles, who have had two chart-toppers, *Get Back* and *The Ballad of John and Yoko*.

Also high in the popularity stakes are Herman's Hermits, the Foundations, Johnny Nash and Peter Sarstedt (whose *Frozen Orange Juice* is currently lying 11th in the charts).

Quite low down in record sales so far are Tom Jones and Engelbert Humperdinck, who were dominating at the time last year. But they have both been busy with overseas tours, and we can expect releases later on which should put them right back on top.

Among the new discs to have just arrived in East Africa is the current No. 1 in Britain, *Something in the Air*, by Thunderclap Newman.

There is a superficial resemblance to the Beatles in this record until you get to the raw piano solo in

the middle. The frequent change of direction in the record is a real surprise in the pop world.

As noted as we are to note *Thunderclap Newman's Island*, which is something of an improvisation in the pop world.

Another resemblance in *Something in the Air* is to the Who and it is interesting to hear that the number is produced by Peter Townsend of that group.

Almost certain of success in East Africa is the much publicised Oh Happy Day, which took the American charts by storm and had a lesser success in Britain.

The arresting sound of the Soul sound and Negro spiritual should be a successful one here.

But the number that I found most exciting was *Living in the Past* with its driving, rhythmic and earthy vocal giving it a haunting quality.

John Tull, as the picture on the left shows, is the man who has the formula which is way out even by today's standards, but which remains true to the mother tongue in terms of what they say their names.

The first John Tull (1971) was noted for his agricultural experiments and inventions. One record which will be of course be assured of success here for reasons of our *Love Train* is the latest from Otis Redding. It is soul music in the classic style characterised by insistent rhythm and poetic vocal.

The by now well-known *My Way*, by Frank Sinatra will probably be down as one of his greatest ever. It comprises the confident and a man who is looking back over his life, and in spite of failures, at least he was satisfied that he had done things his own way.

Such Jeffery thought demand a longer record than usual, and Sinatra of the maestro's range of passion and tranquility.

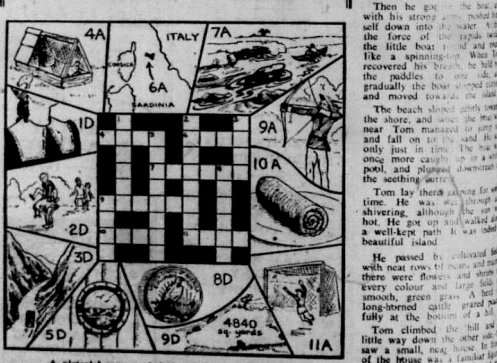
Tom crept under a ledge and lay quietly until the creatures had settled down. It was quite dark, so Tom thought he had better stay the night in the cave and start off early the next day.

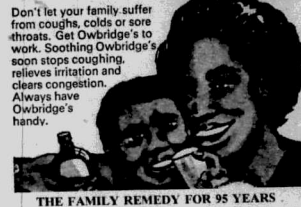

Here is a menu composed of two famous main dishes everybody knows. But the ones given here are slight variations. In the Coq chicken pieces cooked in red wine, artichoke hearts give an interesting touch, and the Baked Alaska is done in a honeydew melon instead of on the usual sponge cake.

Even the first course — a small portion of prawns — has an unexpected touch in the Angostura bitters.

Coq au Vin  
Mixed Green Salad  
Melon Alaska

**Prawn Creams**  
1 knob butter  
1 tablespoon flour  
1 pt. milk  
1 teaspoon celery salt  
pinch pepper  
juice 1 lemon  
grated nutmeg

2 tablespoons Parmesan cheese  
few drops Angostura aromatic bitters  
1 kilo prawns  
Cook and peel the prawns. Melt the butter and stir in flour, cook for two minutes without browning. Add the milk and continue cooking, stirring until the mixture thickens. Season with the celery salt and pepper and stir in the grated cheese. Add the strained lemon juice and continue cooking until the cheese is melted.

**Police dependent on public to fulfil role**

The responsibilities of the Kenya Police could not all be carried out without the backing and confidence of the public as a whole, the Commissioner of Police, Mr. W. Hinga, told Nairobi Rotarians yesterday. Mr. Hinga, who was speaking on 'My Job' at a luncheon held at the Intercontinental Hotel, said that it was up to the police to ensure that this public confidence was maintained and that the force carried out its duties, particularly those involving keeping the peace, with absolute impartiality and fairness. The Kenya Police Force's first responsibility was to maintain internal security to make sure that Kenya's economic development could take place in conditions of stability and confidence.

The police, he added, must never be associated with political or tribal groupings, for if they were they would immediately lose the respect of large sections of the community. He added: "We obviously cannot hope to please all the people all the time, but we must take care not to upset some of the people all the time."

There was nothing sadder than being a policeman in a free society like Kenya where all the basic human freedoms were guaranteed in the Constitution. Mr. Hinga went on: "To uphold that elusive ideal, the police is supposed to mediate in family

disputes that would tax a supreme court judge, soothe angry warlords who have had their shambles gutted down by a fire here and the city, or warring or clashing tribesmen over raided cattle, and despite his scanty knowledge of psychology, enforce hundreds of laws by using only necessary force to bring the offenders before the courts.

The job demanded extraordinary skill, restraint and equanimity of temper not usually undertaken by either those who were for the force or against it. "The Kenya policeman was forbidden by rules and regulations to act as a judge or a jury, for in that way lay the 'police state'."

In exercising discretion, Mr. Hinga said the policeman largely relied on common sense. As Commissioner of Police, it was his duty to ensure that the force was on top of its job and that each of the many branches of the force played a full part in the efficiency of the whole. He paid tribute to the C.I.D. for the success it has achieved in many recent cases, particularly gang robberies in Nairobi, where in nearly every instance, arrests had quickly been made and property recovered.

During his time as Commissioner, he had done all that he could to fulfil the police motto of "Ummishiki kwa wote" (service to all) in the spirit it was intended.

This was the Joginder's first major win and in the two other events, the driver's shaft trouble was the cause of his defeat. In the formula libre event, Utyate's superior wheel spin and the impressive clutch of the 1000-cc car, built by the Volvo.

"This weekend should see the real push of entries start," said Mr. Jacobs, who is organising the rally for the first time.

The draw will be held at the Tanganyika Motor Sports Club at 9 p.m. after which entrants not able to attend will be advised of their placements. The lists will also be circulated to A.A. offices in Nairobi, Mombasa, Kampala and Dar es Salaam. Late entries will be accepted until noon on August 1 and they will take their place at the end of the drawn cars.

Mr. Jacobs is anticipating many entries from Kenya and Uganda and is also hoping for a team entry from Zambia, which would be the first in the rally's history from outside the three East African countries.

"We're also hoping that the coup d'etat - the women's prize - will be won this year," said Mr. Jacobs. "No women drivers finished the rally last year and the cup was not awarded."

Mr. Jacobs promises that although the route will be a fast one, the smaller cars will not be at a special disadvantage and time allowances will be made for them.

Cars will be flagged away at the National Stadium by the Minister for Information and Tourism, Mr. Makare.

Heavy rain on Tuesday with frequent road washaways has given Mr. Jacobs a difficult time planning the route. "I have had to make so many changes to the original route that I've almost forgotten what it was," said Mr. Jacobs, who has been out surveying the route every week for the past few months.
