Governor Declares That Alternative Taxes Have Failed

REPORT TO COLONIAL OFFICE

The Kenya Budget for 1935 was introduced in Legislative Council yesterday and His Excellency the Governor, Sir Joseph Byrne, spoke for over an hour on the financial position.

Government is anticipating next year a net increased revenue of £30,055 and proposes an increase in net expenditure of £47,467.

It was now anticipated that the year 1934, which began with a Budget showing an estimated surplus of £10,933, will close with a deficit of £54,536.

His Excellency made a long statement on taxation. He said that whereas the Alternative Taxes had been accepted on the understanding that they would produce a minimum of £80,000 they had in fact only produced £60,000.

He pressed a strong preference for Income Tax, claimed that the Alternatives had failed, and intimated that he proposed to report the unsatisfactory operation of the Colony's fiscal system to the Secretary of State.

Among the Bills which will be submitted for the consideration of the Legislative Council, a Bill will be introduced to amend the Licensing Ordinance, No. 118 of 1933, to provide for a Provincial Fund in respect of the African Local Civil Service, similar to that which this Council has passed in respect of the European Local Civil Service; a Bill to consolidate and amend the law relating to the sale and control of liquor, which follows the recommendations of the Committee whose report was recently adopted by this House; and a Bill to amend the provisions of the definition of the expression "Native" in a matter which hon. 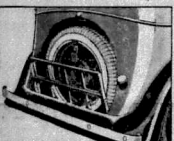

BUSINESS CONDITIONS IN SOUTH AFRICA

Activity Remains at High Level

RAINS SAVE CROPS

Stock Exchange Values Buffer Material Setback

The following summary of trade conditions in the Union of South Africa as at October 31 has been compiled by Col. H. B. Turner, Commissioner for the Union in British East Africa.

Business conditions in the Union continue to be fairly stable. Activity and on the whole satisfactory... The weekly statements of the South Africa Railways and Harbours Administration continue to disclose a very satisfactory state of affairs, and income, although it does not exceed that for the corresponding period of last year by such a large margin as that for the five weeks ending September 29, is still running at a substantial level above that of a year ago.

Farming
Rain fell over a wide area in October, and in many parts where neither dry conditions prevailed during September, nor the wetter crops and stock had improved materially. In the South Western Provinces of the Cape some crops just in time to save crops. According to the estimates of the Department of Agriculture a large wheat crop is expected during the current season, the number of bags forecast being 4,000,000 as against 3,000,000 for the previous season.

Locusts are still very troublesome in Zululand and in parts of Natal. In other provinces large swarms are hibernating. Up to the present, however, apart from the sugar areas, the damage done by this pest has not been material. The acute shortage of butter reported for September and the first weeks of October has been considerably eased. Large quantities of flour butter have been coming on to firm markets, causing prices of this product to drop a few pence per pound.

Stock Exchange

On the Johannesburg Stock Exchange gold shares underwent a setback of from 10 per cent. to 20 per cent. on the average during the past month, the result of a number of mining companies whose underlying large declines than those of revolving concerns. The drop in prices is the result of a number of factors. In the first place a good deal of mining has been ceased by continued lowering of milling grades, many shareholders holding the view that larger profits should be made and larger dividends paid. Then, too, the speculation of the mine workers for some time based on the price of gold has been a heavy factor.

Lastly, the unsettled state of stock markets available in all parts of 11 per cent. The same was once absorbed within a few hours.

AFFORESTATION

Progress of New Scheme in England

London, (Daily News) (By Air Mail).

The rugged highlands of East Dorset, made famous by Thomas Hardy in his novels, gradually becoming immense forests of pine and spruce trees. Land which has centuries produced nothing but grass and heath is being turned into vast woodlands by the planting of millions of trees.

Similar work is being carried out on the western borders of the New Forest. Some 3,000 acres are being dealt with in East Dorset and more than 2,000 acres here, being planted by the Forestry Commission in accordance with plans laid out in 1920 for making good the ravages in British forests during the war.

In Twenty Year's Time

Some of the earlier plantings are now becoming more apparent, and enable the observer to view also the effect of this vast afforestation in about 20 years time. The New Forest itself is getting on well. The planting now being carried out in East Dorset and more than 2,000 acres here, being planted by the Forestry Commission in accordance with plans laid out in 1920 for making good the ravages in British forests during the war.

In what will probably become known as the Warham Forest of some 4,000 acres have already been planted with more than 5,000,000 trees, and this is expected to last at least another five years. About two-thirds of the area of the new Ringwood Forest has been planted.

The work, which is carried out under the supervision of Forestry Commission officials, involves the preparation of the ground in the summer, and at the time of the year the busy time of planting begins.

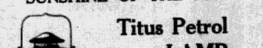

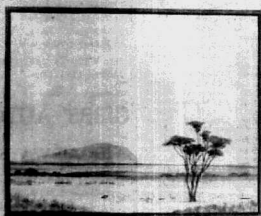

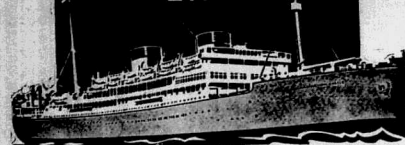

AUSTRIA'S ATTITUDE

Further Complications Introduced

London, Nov. 21. A further complication to the disarmament question has been introduced by Austria, whose delegate to the disarmament conference, Alfred Pferschy, has declared that Austria had been deprived of all armaments and was unable to accept any convention unless she obtained equality of rights... This statement, which was Austria's first public intervention in the disarmament question, has been received in Vienna where it is believed to have a close connection with the Rome Pact and to have been influenced by Italy who desires Austria to be as strong as possible.

MR. HAYTHORNE REED DEAD

Former Judge of Zanibar and Nyasaland

Mr. Haythorne Reed, who died at the hospital at Harrogate, Eastern Transvaal, at the age of 61, was until a few months ago a judge of the High Court of Zanibar and Nyasaland... While he was home on leave last year he undertook the task of revising the laws of Nyasaland. He finished it last July, and went to South Africa for a holiday. He first since his retirement. He had been looking forward to revisiting Nyasaland which had been familiar to him in his earlier life. His wife was with him when he died.

Early Career

Haythorne Reed was born on August 18, 1873. His father was a solicitor at Bridgewater, and he was educated at Balliol College and Emmanuel College, Cambridge. Having entered at the Inner Temple, he read in the chambers of Mr. H. E. Duke (now Lord Mervale), and was called in 1907. From 1908 to 1912 he was at the Midland Circuit and also practised in Bristol.

In the latter year, however, in which the South Africa War terminated, he went out to the new colonies with a view to obtaining a magistracy appointment under the Milner regime. As it happened, however, he joined the South African Constabulary. Reed rose quickly from first-inspector to 1922 to sub-inspector and lieutenant.

Zanibar Appointment

After leaving South Africa he was appointed Assistant Magistrate at Zanibar in 1920, and became Town Magistrate a year later. He was appointed Assistant Judge, Tanganyika, in 1925, and Judge of the High Court, Nyasaland, in 1927.

As a judge he was most hard-working and conscientious, and was always helpful and sympathetic to district officers. A quiet, kindly man, he was much liked and trusted.

He was married and had three children. Mr. S. H. Kirshen, the barrister who defeated Nurse Edith Cavell has died in Brussels, aged 57.

KENYA'S SURPLUS BALANCES EXHAUSTED

and £240 less from European hotel levying fees. Among the increases are £200 from veterinary inoculation fees; £140 more from Hospital Fees; £200 extra from Birth of Health; £200 increase on Passenger Levy; £200 additional from Public Works; £200 from the grading of agricultural produce; £200 increase from registration domestic services, and an extra £200 from aviation levying and road levying.

The Post Office

The fourth source of revenue is the Posts and Telegraphs Department. This shows for 1963 an estimated income of £138,252 compared with £174,096 in 1963, being a net increase of £35,825. Among the decreases in revenue which the Post Office expects are £1,000 less from postal orders, and £1,000 less from telegraph revenue. On the other hand there are several substantial increases including £2,500 from sale of stamps (due to special issue for His Majesty's Silver Jubilee); £500 extra from the savings bank and £2,500 increased revenue on telegrams. In addition to this, as already stated, Government expects a windfall from dealer's proceeds of the proposed new picture stamps. This windfall is placed at about £7,000, being Kenya's share of the proceeds.

Departmental Earnings

Another lead of revenue is that showing earnings by Government departments. The total increase here is £7,900. It includes £2,000 more from the Government Printing Department and an addition of £4,500 from prison industries due mainly to an increase in the revenue from the prison quarries.

Land Income

In regard to revenue from land there is a decrease expected in 1964 of £7,000 on the stand premium for farms. An explanation given by the Budget being a revision of the terms of payment. The last lead of revenue is the Colonial Development Fund which amounts to £4,400 in 1963 compared with £4,780 in 1964. There will be a decrease of £700 in the year for taxes, by credit and of £200 in respect of Colonial Forest reserves, training for which has now been completed. Increases, however, include an additional £200 for the Livestock Research Station at Naivasha, and £154 for a Colonial Agricultural Scholarship scheme, which is a new grant.

Mining Royalties

Then there is revenue from Government property and royalties. The decreases here include a reduction from £20,000 to £20,000 in the expectations from land rents, £300 less from Magadi Soda royalties, and a decrease of £1,000 from mining fees. On

the other hand there are several increases, the chief of which is in respect of mining royalties which are expected to increase from £2,000 (this year's figure) to £2,000 in 1965.

So far as revenue from Government property is concerned the principal decrease is of £100 from the sale of trout fry, and £1,000 deletion owing to the sale this year of a bonded stock of horses which represented that amount in 1963 but none of which were sold a second time. Among the increases are £100 extra revenue from Government farms produce and stock; £200 more from stores, and an increase of £3,800 (£6,200—£2,400) anticipated next year from ivory sales and condensed supplies. The figures apparently are to contribute their full share in 1965 to the upkeep of Government!

On the other side, however, provision is made for an increase of £10,000 in interest payments by the Land Bank which is to be largely capital being employed.

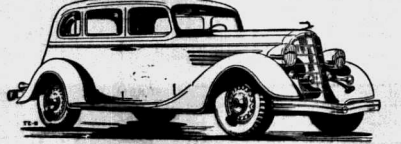

their financial and economic burdens, who have long been impatiently waiting for some practical sympathy or improvement in the contribution to the solution of their problems. Some of them, going to the extreme, have said that the Government's policy, consciously or unconsciously, has defaulted in its result of extinguishing white settlement entirely. They are of course, being so policy which Government they carry out has done effect. But it is a very regrettable fact that in the ranks of the white settlement in Kenya there is a feeling springing from the whole atmosphere of the work of Government, that they can get to the native side of the safe, while the Government is not doing anything to help them. That is not at all an accurate statement and it is an accurate fact of the impression which is abroad. There is an absence of real sympathy on the part of Government for the struggling settler. He is still regarded as a parasite, and it is not until the process has become an extravagant, optimistic—directly or indirectly—being satisfied. That sort of attitude gets a man on the way which he is up against it, seen no way out of it. It is the same for the instances—barring those where his next meal is coming from or which will help to support the family which is his only home. On the other hand, the Government's policy cannot be called unfair or unjust, because he cannot afford to get the other side of the situation of the settler. Happily there are not too many cases quite so bad, but there are enough to suggest that while settlement as a whole, while the Government is not making any special provision of official regard, do expect to find in the Government any help to support what they are doing. In fact, the Government is a following for people who are offering to have their property in the private view, there is no public evidence today that Government is making any such provision. In seasons and on the night of the Government's settlement, the Government is the prize of increased settlement. It would be a great pity if the present support which the country government is giving to the policy of greater native production were withdrawn or reduced to the state of hostility. If that ever comes to pass, it will be because the Government has not taken wisdom in its dealings with the people. After all, it is only because the European settlers of this country, with their energy and their money, produced from the land in the past export surplus amounting to scores of millions of pounds that Kenya has the elaborate administrative structure and the transport services it boasts to have. Without the services from direct and indirect taxation which white settlement has created through its immense enterprise and industry, Kenya would be a vast, unproductive Native Kenya, a Nairobi group of Government buildings. The maintenance of white settlement is the key factor in the Government's policy, and it is not Government with any other view, either in the past or in the future, to undertake the irreparable to the future of a country which has been built up so richly with good British and Colonial money, and which is so useful now. 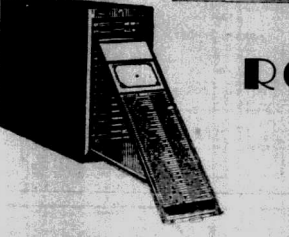

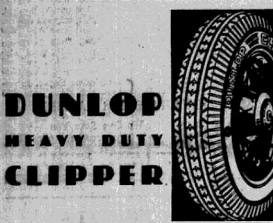

We are in a position to assure them that, in the determined stand they are going to make on this issue, they will have a wholesale cutting back in the Colony.

My offer you, Sir, my congratulations on your Leader in today's East African Standard.

THE P.A. SHILLING

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir.—In the recent very interesting correspondence in your paper on the subject of the devaluation of the East African shilling the fact that the shilling is already very considerably devaluated seems to have been very largely overlooked.

In the Sunday Observer of September 23rd values of the Pound Sterling are quoted as from Shs. 11 1/2 to Shs. 12 1/4 in the various countries, still on the Gold Standard. The East African shilling is on a par with sterling and is therefore at the present time devaluated to the extent of 40 per cent.

It must be obvious to everyone that if this devaluation had not occurred almost every article in Kenya would by now have been plainly rotten. One hears it said that this would not break the spirits of certain members of our local Government, provided always to ensure that they would continue to enjoy their present appointments which, in fact, very many of them would not.

The above facts regarding the devaluation of the shilling seem to me to be of a nature to give the alarming predictions as to the terrible results which would occur from devaluation. The question is really not one of devaluation but of devaluing our currency by sterling and then either doing so with the current value of sterling or alternatively allowing it to assume its true value in the world, which would presumably, at the

present time be lower than the value of sterling.

As the British Government is not prepared to consider the devaluing of our currency from a sterling point of view, it is not possible to discuss the merits of devaluation of such a nature, even if I were convinced of the case. Sterling today is a "managed" currency in the British Government being primarily an international currency in a National Fund which they use to control the exchange value of sterling.

I think it is a pity that the British Government have apparently no industrial country, they naturally desire to control the exchange in such a manner as will, they consider, best suit their own circumstances.

I do not wish to say that the interests of the Colony, which are not, in this connection, taken into consideration at all. The Devaluation, which all have large agricultural interests which are represented in their Government, have either opposed or are opposing as opposed with sterling or have supported their former by way of subsidies or in other directions, and in some cases they have done both.

There are also provided their farmers with cheap money on a large scale. In this country where the agriculturist has no power in the Government, nothing of any account has been done as yet.

I would refer to the Elected Members to see every means in their power to bring this fact forcibly to the notice of the British Government who have done a great deal to help their own farming community, but then, as they are elected, and we are not.

An Economy Committee

As to administrative expenditure, some members think it is done and an Economy Committee should be set up to deal with the wide terms of reference to cover the whole of the colony's expenditure from every angle. The Economy Committee of 1932 had effected savings of £100,000 with very little reference to the budget, some of the largest spending departments have been excluded. The commissioners of that Committee had realized in great haste and there was far greater need today. The speaker asked for the support of the meeting in urging Government to appoint an Economy Committee.

It was gone down to the Budget Session next week. The Elected Members had held no meeting because they did not know what they had to face, but as assured his constituents that they were going to fight Government tooth and nail for economy in expenditure.

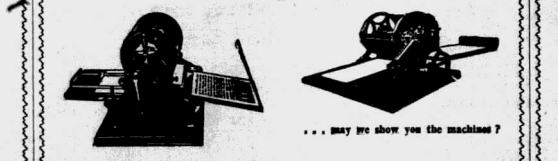

Yugo-Slav Note to League

ASSISTANCE GIVEN TO ORGANISED REFUGEE-TERRORISTS

In a Yugo-Slav note to the League Council in connection with the assassinations of King Alexander and Marie-Berthe Marcellis, grave allegations are made against Hungary, which is blamed for aiding and supporting the terrorist section of certain Yugo-Slav emigres.

It is stated that an inquiry disclosed that the assassinations had been organised and executed with the participation of refugee terrorists from Hungary who had enjoyed the same complicity as complained of by Yugo-Slav last June.

On arrival in Geneva, Herr Eckhardt, Hungarian representative on minority questions, strongly repudiated the allegations. The note, he said, amounted to an attempt at international terrorism, the objects being to distract attention from the real causes of the crime and to ruin the moral repute of Hungary.

Emphatic Protest

The general impression of the League Council is that the Secretary-General's report on the situation in Hungary is a masterpiece of evasion. The Council has been informed that the Hungarian Government has been organising and supporting the activities of the Yugo-Slav emigre in the League Council. The note, he said, amounted to an attempt at international terrorism, the objects being to distract attention from the real causes of the crime and to ruin the moral repute of Hungary.

Hungarian Denial

"I protest in the most formal and emphatic manner against such calumnies," declared Herr Eckhardt, the Hungarian representative on minority questions, who on his arrival here tonight, repudiated the Yugo-Slav note.

Emergency Assistance

The results of the inquiry, the note said, made absolutely clear the complicity for the aid and support given the terrorist section of certain Yugo-Slav emigres.

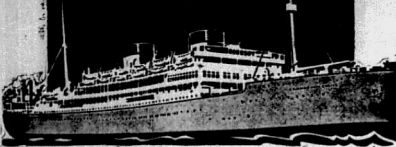

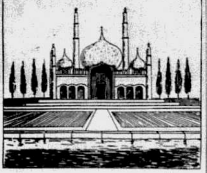

Chemical Properties of No Consequence

London, (By Air Mail).
It is said that London water has been proved to be as efficacious in the treatment of rheumatism as the waters of Aix-les-Bains, Carlsbad, Vichy or any of the numerous of British spa. This astonishing discovery has been made by a group of doctors working for three years on 275,000 patients at the British Hot Water Clinic for rheumatism at Rippon's Park.

Opinion was very divided on the matter, and it was decided to see what was transpired at the next meeting of the Uganda Coffee Board before coming to any definite decision.

He stated that, in his opinion, freight was necessary for shipping, and he thought that planters really realized the value of the coffee taken in this way. If draft were abolished, the price paid for consignments would probably decline proportionately. Members were of the opinion that they would prefer to risk this and considered that the amount taken in draft, especially in the case of large consignments constituted a genuine grievance and tended to cause planters to sell their coffee locally. Mr. Schiller promised to explain the Association's view to members of the trade in England.

Tanganyika's Proposals for Closer Union

GROWING WISH FOR COMPLETE CO-ORDINATION

Associated Chambers' Debate

THE PECULIAR PROBLEMS OF THE NORTHERN PROVINCE

As reported in yesterday's issue of the "East African Standard," the Association of Chambers of Commerce of Eastern Africa, in session at Mombasa, has unanimously adopted a resolution calling for a completely unified system of administration for the three Territories.

The debate on the resolution was an exceptionally interesting one as the delegates from Tanganyika explained very fully the views of the Chambers which they represented. With the exception of the Dar es Salaam Chamber, which is divided on the question, and the Mombasa Chamber, who regard the issue as a political one, the resolution was most firmly supported.

The delegate from Mombasa however, pointed out that the majority of the farming community of all races in the Northern Province were in favour of Closer Union, not for any other reason than that of the increased security which would be given in consequence. Opinion both among the European and Indian community in Dar es Salaam is divided.

Delegates from Kenya stressed the fact that the time had arrived when Closer Union was a necessity as a means of easing the financial burden which the East African Administrations at present involve.

Terms of the Mandate

ROAD AND WEATHER REPORT

Mr. Galton-Fozzie writes as follows: During the past week the weather in Kenya has been dreadfully dry, but far rains have fallen in Uganda, where there have been good rains in the Lake Victoria area. 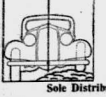

30 dead; 40 alive; 26.3 per cent killed. Exceeding 200 palls, 469 dead; 1 alive; 100.0 per cent killed.

Field Trial

Test No. 3.—This was carried out on a square in Daguerri location from November 1-7. The spray was applied in a closely packed mist and it had a good effect. It was divided into two sections (a) in open land and (b) in a forest. In (a) the locusts were thick shrubby undergrowth. Spraying was carried out in the morning between 8.30 and 7.30 in the evening. The spray could be applied with most effect at that time.

Area (a) Open bush.—Spraying at three places was attempted in order to obtain particulars of relative kills. One half acre of bush was treated and about 50 per cent of Powell's spray applied. About 100 locusts were taken to another after application of spray. Accurate counts of the percentage kill obtained in each section. Nevertheless, efforts were made to record them. Counts of dead locusts in respective sections of the sprayed area were made over five days during which a total of thirty-one locusts were collected. As locusts had the sprayed area subsequent to application of the spray, this figure conveys no information.

Area (b) Forest.—Two consignments of one acre each and numerous other patches making a total of approximately four acres were sprayed for the experiment. Approximately 240 gallons of fluid were used in this area. One of the one acre plots was sprayed twice. The quantity applied per acre was approximately 120 to 200 gallons per acre of locusts.

To determine the effect produced by spraying at different rates in this area, isolated batches of locusts five yards square were selected and sprayed at fixed rates varying from 40 to over 200 gallons per acre. Immediately subsequent to this, locusts were collected and counted and examined after three days. Particulars and results are as follows: Estimated dosage per acre: 40 gallons, 51 dead; 124 alive; 28.9 per cent killed; 50 gallons, 180 dead; 73 alive; 72.1 per cent killed; 75 gallons, 120 palls, 53 dead; 48.6 per cent killed; 100 palls, 100 dead; 40 alive; 81.2 per cent killed; 150 palls, 200 dead; 40 alive; 20.0 per cent killed.

17 alive; 87.6 per cent killed. Exceeding 200 palls, 469 dead; 1 alive; 100.0 per cent killed.

Deduction from Test The field trials demonstrated that it is possible to kill locusts in the field by application of this spray (a) with application of 20, 20 and 40 gallons per acre it is possible to obtain a 50 per cent kill. From results obtained in an area it is probable that it would be possible to apply this fluid in quantities of five approaching 200 gallons per acre to obtain a 50 per cent kill.

It is essential to stress that compressed in this case are such as were used to obtain statistical results. Descriptive notes were given above which are essential to prove the value of this important spray for application under these circumstances.

Locusts Test on Animals Test No. 4. The Veterinary Bureau Officer, Veterinary Laboratory, Kilindi reported as follows on October 20: "I certify that the following locusts were carried out, numbering at 230 palls, on the 19th inst. in the presence of the undersigned and Mr. Powell, Mr. Detheringham, Veterinary Laboratory, Assistant Laboratory by Mr. P. J. Powell and which is stated to be a true sample of his locust spray."

Adult Cattle: Doves 810 and No. 810 were each dressed with two palls of the fluid. Cows: Doves No. 808 and No. 810 were each dressed with one pint of the fluid. Sheep: Doves No. 418 and No. 419 were each dressed by means of a stomach tube with half a pint of the fluid. All the above animals have up to the present shown in good health and have shown no ill-effects.

Test on Crops Plants Test No. 5. The following tests were carried out on midday on November 10, 1934, when Mr. Powell's spray in large quantities was applied to the crops. Spraying was carried out in the open field during the period of the experiment. In every case, a Spirit-hand sprayer was used in the field and the locusts were not yet covered.

After the murder of Piet Reef and his followers the Zulu chief, Dingaan, sent his warriors to wipe out the Voortrekkers, who were in small parties, scattered in the bush waiting the result of his negotiations.

Dingaan. The first party encountered by the Zulu impi were lagged on the spot which is now the village of Weren, and with the exception of one youth every man, woman and child was massacred. This lad who was being sought in the vicinity heard the approach of the Zulu and gave warning to the next party who were camped on the banks of a river (now called "Blood River").

Dingaan's power and terror was finally broken on the 16th December, which day was now commemorated in thanksgiving to God for the remarkable deliverance, as the Voortrekkers consider that it was only by His Power that they then achieved the victory South.

Africans do not celebrate this day but attend Divine Service in thanksgiving. The name "Weren" which means "weeping" was not given to the little village commiserate the weeping and grief of the Zulu women as mentioned in your paper but was given in memory of the Voortrekkers war, women and children who were massacred there.

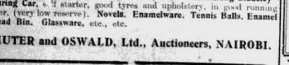

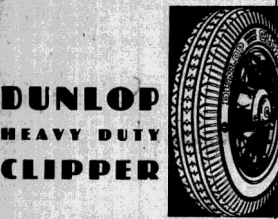
